## Large voter turnout in Sherman County

A total of 958 voters turned out to cast ballots in the May 1 Sherman County primary, according to the county clerks office.

Of that total 893 voted on the democratic ballot and 65 voted on the Republican ballot. Of that total, 89 democratic voters and 8 republican voters cast absentee ballots in what was one of the largest voter turn-outs in recent years.

In the local democratic races there were three contested primaries:

1. In the race for district and county clerk Shorty Albert with 334 votes will face Ernestine Almquist with 281 votes in the June 5 runoff election. The other two candidates in that race were Leonda Fedric with 200 votes and Millie Hacker with 69.

2. In the balloting for county commissioner for Precinct 3, Dale Hamilton was the winner over Glenn White by a 136-36 margin.

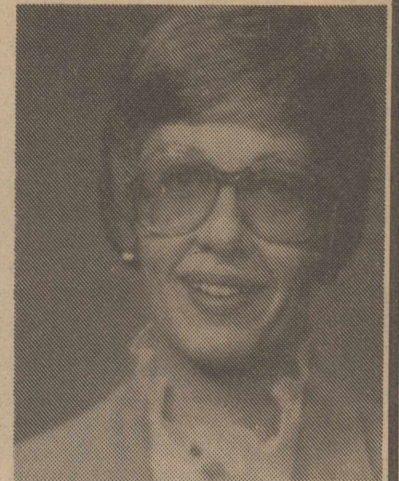
3. In the election for county commissioner Precinct 4, Mike O'Brien was the narrow victor over Wayland Brown by a 161 to 146 vote.

When asked about his new position Breitting stated, "I'm pleased and honored to have the opportunity to manage an Association of this size and stature."

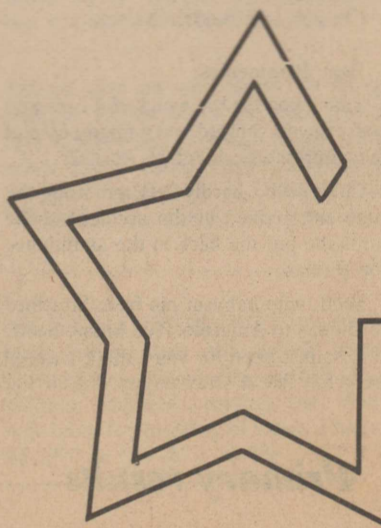

### Chamber of Commerce to Host an 'Agriculture Breakfast'

The Stratford Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an "Agriculture Breakfast" on Thursday, May 6, 1982 at 7:00 at Arnold's Headquarters Restaurant. A buffet style breakfast will be served at a cost of \$3.00 per person. The menu is sausage, bacon, scrambled eggs, hash browns, biscuits, gravy, and coffee.

### Local appraiser explains session

In response to questions concerning the Special Session of the Legislature called by Governor Clements for May 24, Marilyn Albert, Chief Appraiser for Sherman County Appraisal District, explained the call.

In 1979 the Legislature attempted to abolish the state tax on property by lowering the ratio for the state value only to .0001. This proved effective as demonstrated by the fact that the entire state tax for Sherman County in 1981 was \$49.

Midwestern College in Wichita Falls has filed suit against the State of Texas,

since the state tax at a \$.10 rate goes to the building fund for certain colleges and universities. If the college should win the suit, the \$.10 rate would be collected, levied on what is now 100 percent rather than the former 20 percent ratio. Further, the county would have to back assess and collect the tax for 1980 and 1981. Those two years alone would be over \$420,000.00 in revenue from Sherman County. The purpose of the Special Session is to pass legislation that will eliminate this happening. The State of Texas is not in need of money and it would be a tremendous drain on our local economy.

If you have already collected on one roof repair necessitated by a storm, you must prove through receipts, etc., that the roof was in fact repaired by a reputable repairman. This would qualify you for collecting from your insurance should another storm cause a leak. If your certification of repair is in order, the insurance company would look at the cost of repairs as necessitated by two separate catastrophes. ## Tips & Topics

Technology is changing the way consumers function in today's market place--so there are some "computer basics" to understand.

Today's bills and payments are processed by electronic funds transfer systems (EFTs). Inventories in retail outlets are maintained by computer. Household tasks are completed using electronically controlled devices. A majority of these processes affect the consumer indirectly, but as more and more families and individuals purchase their own microcomputer the impact will have a more direct affect.

While technology may simplify consumer transactions there are some rights and responsibilities which consumers must accept, too.

Electronic funds transfer is perhaps the most widely used electronic technology which affects today's consumer. Automated teller machines, 24-hour banking, pay-by-phone, direct deposit or withdrawal and point-of-sale transfers are all part of EFT.

Resolution of consumer problems is more tedious when using EFT.

Federal law gives the consumer no right to stop payment. It is up to the consumer to resolve the problem and get any money back. However, if the consumer arranged in advance for bills to be paid regularly out of his or her account, payment can be stopped by notifying the bank three business days before the scheduled transfer.

Written receipts are required at all automated teller machines. Periodic statements must also be issued. A consumer has 60 days from the date of a problem or error appears on the statement or receipt to notify the bank.

Loss of an EFT card presents an additional problem for the consumer. A bank must be notified within two business days after discovering a lost or stolen card. The consumer can lose no more than \$50 if someone else uses the card. However, if the bank is not notified within two business days, and the card is used, as much as \$500 can be charged against your account.

Recordkeeping becomes a prime importance when using electronic transfer of funds.

Up-to-date records checked against bank records will eliminate overdrafts and other problems.

Since there is no "float" with EFT, money is immediately debited from one account and credited to another.

Poor recordkeeping could ruin a shopping trip or vacation sometime in the future.

Scanners are another technological change which is affecting consumer behavior. A main computer stores the

prices of consumer goods and can be updated quickly. Individual pricing is being eliminated.

Consumers must be alert to any discrepancies in charges with this system. If an item is on "special" and the main computer program has not been changed, the consumer is responsible for double checking the prices.

Home computer appliances will add another dimension to our consumer patterns as they become more popular and lower in cost.

Today, almost the entire world is accessible by computer connection. No longer do we deal with a local merchant only.

Consumers will need to spend more time and effort in the near future seeking and acquiring information about the products and services they buy and use.

Consumers in a technological age must become sensitized to the potential and the problems that such change brings about.

For more information on consumer skill during National Consumer Week, April 25-May 1, or any other week, contact the County Extension Office.

Several Sherman County residents recently attended the PEP seminar, "Who's Being Fooled by Weight Control" in Amarillo.

Those attending the seminar received excellent information about nutrition, weight control, and the health hazards of being overweight. A panel discussion of the various weight control/loss methods was the highlight of the afternoon session.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service also offers educational material concerning weight control and diet modification.

The Sherman County Family Living Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the letter series, "Nutrition Today--Weight Control Tomorrow", beginning May 7 for all interested persons. The letter series focuses on weight control through good nutrition.

## Postal service recommends steps when mailing important items

When you need to send valuables or important papers through mail, the Postal Service recommends you understand what Registered, Insured, and Certified mail can do for you.

By becoming familiar with these service options offered by the Postal Service, your mail will receive the best handling and the most cost effective delivery. Registered, Insured, and Certified all give you the customized services needed for mailing that special letter or package.

Registered mail is the safest way to send valuables. It offers special handling for your letter or package mailed at the First-Class rates. You receive a receipt when you take the material to the post office. Then, the movement of the piece is monitored from the point of acceptance to delivery. All irreplaceable articles, regardless of value, and all items worth more than \$400 should be sent by Registered mail.

Jewelry, stocks, and checks or money orders for large amounts are good candidates for Registered mail. This type of service provides protection against loss or damage. The full value of the mailing must be declared when mailed for security and insurance purposes. The registration fee includes insurance protection up to \$25,000 for domestic mail.

The fees for Registered mail depend upon the value of the material being mailed. For instance, if the value of the package is from \$101 to \$500, the cost is \$3.60.

A return receipt costs 60 cents extra, but it will allow the sender to have a written receipt of when and to whom the item was delivered. For a return receipt indicating to whom, the date and the address where the item was delivered, the fee is 70 cents.

Restricted delivery service is also available with Registered mail. It allows delivery only to the addressee, or to someone who is authorized in writing to receive mail for the addressee.

Insured mail is a good bet if you are sending birthday, wedding, or other gifts or fragile items. First-Class Mail, Priority, Third and Fourth Class mail may be insured. Insurance, available for merchandise only, can be purchased for materials mailed which are valued at less than \$400. Insurance rates, like Registered mail rates, vary according to the value of the material being sent. If

articles are insured for more than \$15, a receipt of delivery is signed by the recipient and filed at the delivery post office. The insurance enables you to receive payment for domestic mail that has been lost, rifled, or damaged. You may request a return receipt or restricted delivery when sending something insured for more than \$15.

Certified mail is your best buy if you are sending important letters, insurance forms, contracts, or bids for business contracts mailed at the First-Class rate. At 75 cents plus the charge for postage, Certified mail costs less than Registered mail. It should be used when the sender requires a receipt as proof of mailing. The coupon receipt is postmarked to establish the date of delivery. A record of the delivery is also kept at the addressee's post office for two years, but no record is kept at the office from which you mailed the material. You may request a return receipt or restricted delivery with Certified mail.

Certified mail service is provided only for First-Class or Priority Mail containing no intrinsic value, and insurance is not available.
