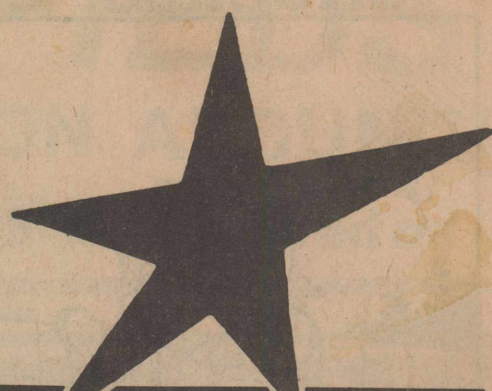

Reception to honor Lanners

The first of a series of receptions honoring pioneer families from Sherman County will be held Sunday, September 8, at the Sherman County Depot Museum in Stratford. The John Lanners family, who moved to Sherman County in 1892, is the first family to be recognized in this manner. Mrs. Cordie Lanners, the oldest surviving member of the family, and who still lives in Sherman County on the Palo Duro, will be present as well as many other family members. Everyone is invited to come by the museum, from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. to visit and join in this tribute to early day settlers.

The John Lanners family came to Sherman County in 1892. They were among the earliest settlers, along with J.D. Rawlings (1874), Thomas Snyder family (1892), George Loomis family (1890), and Dick Pincham family (1895).

The Lanners were on their way to Colorado, and stopped off so John could visit with an old cowpunching buddy on the Coldwater. As it turned out, Lanners bought his friend's

cattle and one room shack, and spent the rest of his life in Sherman County. At first, John and his wife Laura Ellen, lived with J.D. Rawlings. When Rawlings sold out to W.B. Slaughter, Lanners worked for Slaughter. The Lanners then moved into Coldwater so the children could attend school, which was held in the jail.

Lanners then decided to move down on the Palo Duro and settle. The dug-out home where they lived, still remains. In 1899 Lanners and Tom Cadenhead built a school building, probably the earliest school building in Sherman County. This school was 10' X 13' and designed for four desks. Miss Belle Cadenhead taught the two Cadenhead children and Irene and Barney Lanners. That building still stands.

John Lanners served two terms as County Sheriff and was among those opposed to moving the county seat from Coldwater to Stratford. No wonder, the Lanners place was in the Southeast corner of the county, and a long ride from Stratford!

John and Laura Ellen Lanners had

two girls and two boys. Louie, Ruby, Irene and Barney. John died in 1933 and Mrs. Lanners in 1934. They are buried in Texhoma, Texas cemetery along with their daughter Ruby.

Irene married Emmett Ryan and lived in Sherman and Hansford counties. They had five girls, Emily Tompkins, Ina Meier, Louise Vaughn, Margaret Beck, and Emma Brown. Irene and Emmett are buried in Sunray.

Barney moved to Missouri shortly before his death. He had two children, Mary Vaughn, and Ray Lanners.

Louis married Cordie James of Texhoma, and they had four sons. Louis Jr., John, Daryl, and Calvin. Louie passed away in 1969. His widow, Cordie, who is the oldest living member of the Lanners family, still lives on the Palo Duro. The home they built there is adjacent to the section where John and Laura Ellen settled and raised their family. The courage and strengths of this outstanding pioneer family is an inspiration to all.

Fair schedule changes made

All those entering exhibits in the 1985 Sherman County Fair should note some scheduling changes in effect this year.

Beginning at 8 a.m. Thursday September 12, the fair will open to receive educational and commercial exhibits. At 1 p.m. the departments open to receive all other exhibits (excluding livestock). At 7 p.m. all exhibits must be in place with the exceptions of the livestock and educational exhibits. Educational exhibits must be in place by 10 p.m. when the fair building closes.

It is important to remember that the exhibits will be accepted between the hours of 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Thursday only. Judging will begin promptly at 9 a.m. Thursday. This includes these categories of exhibits: Agriculture, Antiques, Art, Baked Goods, Clothing, Crafts and Hobbies, Culinary, Flowers, Record Books, Handwork, Horticulture and Photography.

Due to changes in school attendance rules, the livestock judging will be on Saturday. All livestock must be in place by 10 a.m. Saturday. For a complete schedule, set of guidelines and animal classes, refer to the Sherman County Fair Book.

The Pheasant Capitol Fun Run will begin Saturday at 8:30 a.m. at the Football field. This

year a 10K run, a two-mile fun run and a one-mile walk will be featured. Trophies will be awarded for the first three places in the 10K only. T-shirts will be given to all entries in all three races. First place overall man and woman in the 10K will receive a mounted pheasant. All runners as well as walkers are welcome to enter.

The pre registration for the Old Timers Reunion will be at 9:30 a.m. in the lobby of the 1st State Bank. At 1:30 p.m. regular registration and visiting will be at Mary Allen Elementary School. The Old Timers Reunion program will begin at 2 p.m. During the program, the 1985 King and Queen will be crowned. Also past royalty and their families will be introduced.

The traditional County Fair parade will begin at 11 a.m. Floats will be judged at 10:15 a.m. on the North Main Street. The theme this year is "We Think We can, We Know We Can." Immediately following the parade, a barbecue lunch will be served at the County Barn at noon. Tickets for children age 6-12 are \$3, Adults age 13-64 tickets are \$4. There is no charge for children under age six and adults over 65. The barbecue is prepared by the Stratford Lions Club.

Other events on Saturday af-

ternoon include a remote control airplane show beginning at 1 p.m. at the airport. A horse play day will be at 2 p.m. at the horse arena. Also at 2 p.m. community recreation will be in the Park North of the County Barn.

Area residents are invited to get their favorite chili recipes together and enter the Sherman County Chili Cook-off. Entries will be received between the hours of 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. Showmanship will be judged between 5 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Chili turn-in time will be 6 p.m. with judging beginning at 6:15 p.m. Chili will be sold at 6:30 p.m.

Those of you who tend to stretch the truth should attend the Tall Tales contest during the judging of the Chili. Stories should be clean and moral and shorter than 4 minutes. A trophy for first place will be awarded.

A street dance at the museum parking lot beginning at 9 p.m. will wrap up the weekend activities.

Charges filed against two juveniles

Charges of incest have been filed against two juveniles (brothers) in Stratford last week. One of the two juveniles had a charge of assault added to the incest charge.

Juvenile probation officer David Campbell advised Stratford police officers that while visiting with one of the juveniles about some recent problems, their mother told him of an incident that had happened the day before.

Upon questioning the youth, it was learned that he had stabbed his brother with a small screwdriver because he had become angry with the younger brother and sisters for "kidding him." He said that while his mother, brother and two sisters were looking for a different house to move into, he became upset and began hitting the younger brother with a ball point pen.

Later after his mother had taken the pen away from him and had left the car, the younger brother began kicking the older. That was when he stabbed the younger brother with the screwdriver.

During the same interview, the older youth admitted that he had committed incest with his sisters and had committed homosexual acts with his younger brother. The youths' mother had told Stratford police of her suspicions of him committing incest with her two daughters.

The younger brother confirmed the older brother's story. He also confirmed that a third and older juvenile had forced his sisters into performing sexual acts with him.

Copies of the reports and the

youth's statements were forwarded to the county attorney, Juvenile probation department and the Department of Human resources for disposition.

Stratford police received a report of a man who had been beaten as well as his brother. He had said that several others were still fighting.

After arriving at the scene, several subjects were found, screaming at one another and were wrestling with each other. The officer notified the dispatcher that he needed a backup officer and to dispatch an ambulance because some of the subjects had cuts and bruises.

Two of the subjects had to be handcuffed and placed into the patrol car until he could determine what was the cause of the fight.

While questioning the subjects, one subject (the one reported to have beaten the two brothers) was seen in the alley. He started running in spite of being told to stop and ordered not to run. The officer chased him but could not catch him and returned to the scene. A sheriff's deputy and the ambulance arrived. The subjects were checked and were not seriously injured enough to be hospitalized.

The officer released the subjects and told them if he had any more trouble then they were all going to jail. The subject that fled could not be located. Later that day the subject was arrested for public intoxication and disorderly conduct. The officer handling the incident noted the incident could have been avoided had

the subjects not been drinking.

Stratford police received a report of a stolen pickup belonging to Sherman County. The employee who had the pickup at his residence, said that the pickup was last seen between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. when it was noticed to be gone.

Later that afternoon, the pickup was found east of Boise City. Since no finger prints were in the pickup and the vehicle was driveable so it was returned to the County. The pickup had not been damaged nor had anything been taken from it. The keys had been left in the pickup that night at the employee's residence.

August 26 Stratford police received a report of a stolen bicycle. The complainant had said that 10-speed bicycle was stolen from his residence sometime during the weekend. The bicycle was parked in his drive way.

The complainant said later that a transit-type white male had stopped at their residence to ask for something to eat. He walked on south and the family did not pay any more attention to him. It was possible that he had returned and took the bicycle for transportation.

Stratford police also investigated a minor automobile accident on August 27. A pickup pulled from its illegal parked position on the street and collided with the car being driven down the street. The driver of the pickup had not seen the car. The driver was cited with no driver's license and failure to yield right of way.

Pleyer receives scholarship

Scholarship grants, totaling more than \$30,000, have been awarded by the NCOA Scholarship Foundation. The grants are being shared by 60

students, nationwide. Janet Pleyer of Stratford, was among those receiving grants.

Awarded for the 1985-86 school year, the grants are for both academic and vocational college educations. The grants are renewable providing the student maintains established academic grades and levels of performance. This year, 17 grants are initial awards and the remainder are renewals.

The non-repayable grants are available to the sons and daughters of Association members. The Scholarship Foundation was established in 1975 and derives its funds solely from membership donations and accumulated interest.

The Non Commissioned Officers Association currently has in excess of 182,000 members with 250 chapters, worldwide.

Helpful Hints

Keeping leather shoes looking like brand-new is easy if you do this: wipe soil off smooth leather with slightly damp cloth, let dry before polishing with wax polish.

A nice item for a bridal shower is a "Recipe Apron". Take 1/2 yard white material, write with indelible black or red ink a favorite recipe on it, hem it, and gather it on a band or ribbon long enough to tie around waist.

Vegetables are most attractive and appetizing if they are cooked as quickly as possible with a small amount of sugar. Carrots, peas, brussel sprouts or beans; a little sugar brings out flavor.

To make clean dust cloth, put 2 t. turpentine in a jar of hot sudsy water; put a clean cotton flannel cloth in it, let soak over night, take out, let dry before using.

To make nice bread crumbs, put bread slice in oven till lightly brown and dry. Put in bread wrapper and crush with rolling pin. Will keep a month.

When whipped cream has to stay on a pie a liquid will sometimes appear but just put a tablespoon unflavored gelatin dissolved in hot water in while whipping cream.

Rubbing alcohol will remove ballpoint pen ink.

All those entering exhibits in the 1985 Sherman County Fair should note some scheduling changes in effect this year.

Beginning at 8 a.m. Thursday September 12, the fair will open to receive educational and commercial exhibits. At 1 p.m. the departments open to receive all other exhibits (excluding livestock). At 7 p.m. all exhibits must be in place with the exceptions of the livestock and educational exhibits. Educational exhibits must be in place by 10 p.m. when the fair building closes.

It is important to remember that the exhibits will be accepted between the hours of 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Thursday only. Judging will begin promptly at 9 a.m. Thursday. This includes these categories of exhibits: Agriculture, Antiques, Art, Baked Goods, Clothing, Crafts and Hobbies, Culinary, Flowers, Record Books, Handwork, Horticulture and Photography.

Due to changes in school attendance rules, the livestock judging will be on Saturday. All livestock must be in place by 10 a.m. Saturday. For a complete schedule, set of guidelines and animal classes, refer to the Sherman County Fair Book.

The Pheasant Capitol Fun Run will begin Saturday at 8:30 a.m. at the Football field. This

year a 10K run, a two-mile fun run and a one-mile walk will be featured. Trophies will be awarded for the first three places in the 10K only. T-shirts will be given to all entries in all three races. First place overall man and woman in the 10K will receive a mounted pheasant. All runners as well as walkers are welcome to enter.

The pre registration for the Old Timers Reunion will be at 9:30 a.m. in the lobby of the 1st State Bank. At 1:30 p.m. regular registration and visiting will be at Mary Allen Elementary School. The Old Timers Reunion program will begin at 2 p.m. During the program, the 1985 King and Queen will be crowned. Also past royalty and their families will be introduced.

The traditional County Fair parade will begin at 11 a.m. Floats will be judged at 10:15 a.m. on the North Main Street. The theme this year is "We Think We can, We Know We Can." Immediately following the parade, a barbecue lunch will be served at the County Barn at noon. Tickets for children age 6-12 are \$3, Adults age 13-64 tickets are \$4. Reception to honor Lanners

The first of a series of receptions honoring pioneer families from Sherman County will be held Sunday, September 8, at the Sherman County Depot Museum in Stratford. The John Lanners family, who moved to Sherman County in 1892, is the first family to be recognized in this manner. Mrs. Cordie Lanners, the oldest surviving member of the family, and who still lives in Sherman County on the Palo Duro, will be present as well as many other family members. Everyone is invited to come by the museum, from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. to visit and join in this tribute to early day settlers.

The John Lanners family came to Sherman County in 1892. They were among the earliest settlers, along with J.D. Rawlings (1874), Thomas Snyder family (1892), George Loomis family (1890), and Dick Pincham family (1895).

The Lanners were on their way to Colorado, and stopped off so John could visit with an old cowpunching buddy on the Coldwater. As it turned out, Lanners bought his friend's

cattle and one room shack, and spent the rest of his life in Sherman County. At first, John and his wife Laura Ellen, lived with J.D. Rawlings. When Rawlings sold out to W.B. Slaughter, Lanners worked for Slaughter. The Lanners then moved into Coldwater so the children could attend school, which was held in the jail.

Lanners then decided to move down on the Palo Duro and settle. The dug-out home where they lived, still remains. In 1899 Lanners and Tom Cadenhead built a school building, probably the earliest school building in Sherman County. This school was 10' X 13' and designed for four desks. Miss Belle Cadenhead taught the two Cadenhead children and Irene and Barney Lanners. That building still stands.

John Lanners served two terms as County Sheriff and was among those opposed to moving the county seat from Coldwater to Stratford. No wonder, the Lanners place was in the Southeast corner of the county, and a long ride from Stratford!

John and Laura Ellen Lanners had

two girls and two boys. Louie, Ruby, Irene and Barney. John died in 1933 and Mrs. Lanners in 1934. They are buried in Texhoma, Texas cemetery along with their daughter Ruby.

Irene married Emmett Ryan and lived in Sherman and Hansford counties. They had five girls, Emily Tompkins, Ina Meier, Louise Vaughn, Margaret Beck, and Emma Brown. Irene and Emmett are buried in Sunray.

Barney moved to Missouri shortly before his death. He had two children, Mary Vaughn, and Ray Lanners.

Louis married Cordie James of Texhoma, and they had four sons. Louis Jr., John, Daryl, and Calvin. Louie passed away in 1969. His widow, Cordie, who is the oldest living member of the Lanners family, still lives on the Palo Duro. The home they built there is adjacent to the section where John and Laura Ellen settled and raised their family. The courage and strengths of this outstanding pioneer family is an inspiration to all.

Charges filed against two juveniles

Charges of incest have been filed against two juveniles (brothers) in Stratford last week. One of the two juveniles had a charge of assault added to the incest charge.

Juvenile probation officer David Campbell advised Stratford police officers that while visiting with one of the juveniles about some recent problems, their mother told him of an incident that had happened the day before.

Upon questioning the youth, it was learned that he had stabbed his brother with a small screwdriver because he had become angry with the younger brother and sisters for "kidding him" He said that while his mother, brother and two sisters were looking for a different house to move into, he became upset and began hitting the younger brother with a ball point pen.

Later after his mother had taken the pen away from him and had left the car, the younger brother began kicking the older. That was when he stabbed the younger brother with the screwdriver.

During the same interview, the older youth admitted that he had committed incest with his sisters and had committed homosexual acts with his younger brother. The youths' mother had told Stratford police of her suspicions of him committing incest with her two daughters.

The younger brother confirmed the older brother's story. He also confirmed that a third and older juvenile had forced his sisters into performing sexual acts with him.

Copies of the reports and the

youth's statements were forwarded to the county attorney, Juvenile probation department and the Department of Human resources for disposition.

Stratford police received a report of a man who had been beaten as well as his brother. He had said that several others were still fighting.

After arriving at the scene, several subjects were found screaming at one another and were wrestling with each other. The officer notified the dispatcher that he needed a backup officer and to dispatch an ambulance because some of the subjects had cuts and bruises.

Two of the subjects had to be handcuffed and placed into the patrol car until he could determine what was the cause of the fight.

While questioning the subjects, one subject (the one reported to have beaten the two brothers) was seen in the alley. He started running in spite of being told to stop and ordered not to run. The officer chased him but could not catch him and returned to the scene. A sheriff's deputy and the ambulance arrived. The subjects were checked and were not seriously injured enough to be hospitalized.

The officer released the subjects and told them if he had any more trouble then they were all going to jail. The subject that fled could not be located. Later that day the subject was arrested for public intoxication and disorderly conduct. The officer handling the incident noted the incident could have been avoided had

the subjects not been drinking.

Stratford police received a report of a stolen pickup belonging to Sherman County. The employee who had the pickup at his residence, said that the pickup was last seen between the hours of midnight and 6 a.m. when it was noticed to be gone.

Later that afternoon, the pickup was found east of Boise City. Since no finger prints were in the pickup and the vehicle was driveable so it was returned to the County. The pickup had not been damaged nor had nothing been taken from it. The keys had been left in the pickup that night at the employee's residence.

August 26 Stratford police received a report of a stolen bicycle. The complainant had said that 10-speed bicycle was stolen from his residence sometime during the weekend. The bicycle was parked in his drive way.

The complainant said later that a transit-type white male had stopped at their residence to ask for something to eat. He walked on south and the family did not pay any more attention to him. It was possible that he had returned and took the bicycle for transportation.

Stratford police also investigated a minor automobile accident on August 27. A pickup pulled from its illegal parked position on the street and collided with the car being driven down the street. The driver of the pickup had not seen the car. The driver was cited with no driver's license and failure to yield right of way.
