I may twist my arm out of place putting myself on the back in boasting of the newsy society department of the Review now. In last week's issue there were 24 separate social items of local interest.

And in last week's issue of a newspaper bearing the slogan, "South Plains Leading Weekly Newspaper," printed in a town of over 3,000 population, there were only 24 social items of local interest.

Kathleen Reed, the Review's new society reporter, is responsible for a large amount of the news in this department.

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Gathering figures here and there in a recent issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, O. F. Rea compiled the following information: 908,677 head of cattle and 491,890 head of calves were shipped to Fort Worth during 1937. 350,637 hogs, 1,280,907 sheep and 44,010 head of mules and horses were received there during last year. Total, 2,916,021.

About 194,460 trucks were used to haul the animals. Rea figures if the trucks average 30 feet in length, put end to end they would extend 1,100 miles. Trucks delivered 3/4 of cattle, 13-14 of hogs, 3-5 of sheep, 2-3 horses and mules. If all had been shipped by rail, 44,188 cars would have been used.
