## Hale County Oil Activity

Recent oil leases in southwestern Hale County indicate a revival of interest in oil exploration in the county. Within the last few weeks, leases have been signed on more than a score of sections west and northwest of Hale Center. The area involved is about six miles wide east-west by about nine miles north-south.

The region under lease extends westward from a mile south of the Hale Center-Cotton Center highway and north to U.S. 70 between Plainview and Olton.

## RR Crossing Lights Will Be Installed

The Texas Highway Commission Thursday approved the installation of automatic protective devices at a dangerous intersection in southeast Abernathy.

According to an announcement in Austin, the devices will be installed at the crossing of the Santa Fe Railroad and Farm Road 597 at an estimated cost of \$9,500. The crossing is located in the portion of Abernathy which dips into Lubbock County.

Mayor Roy Jones said the request for the flashing signals was made about two years ago. He said their crossing has no automatic devices at present, although at least three fatal motor vehicle accidents have occurred there in the past four years.

He said heavy traffic passes along the farm road, noting that the flashing signals "sure are needed."

Wells have been drilled in the general area of the Socony-Mobil block. The Toke Foster et al No. 1 G.A. Harrell, about two miles west of the west boundary of the Socony-Mobil block was drilled to a total depth of 7,009 feet and was dry and abandoned in November, 1949. It encountered the San Andres at 4,320, the Tubbs at 5,550 and the Wolfcamp at 6,205. Cooner & Hemphill drilled their Nick Alley No. 1 in 1948 to a total depth of 8,200 feet at a site one mile south of the south boundary of the Mobil block, and encountered San Andres at 2,710 and the Clear Fork at 4,250. It was dry and abandoned.

This block is about four miles east and 14 miles north of the Lee Irish No. 1, the discovery well of the Anton-Irish pool, which started producing April 2, 1946, at a rate of 354 barrels daily from the Clear Fork at 5,548 feet. It is in the north-east corner of Sec. 18, Lot DT.

The Anton-Irish field is the main oil-producing area of Hale County, which in 1960 produced 1,517,923 barrels.

## Cotton Transfer Vote Set

Cotton farms in Hale County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, E. J. Pope, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. The referendum on the question will be conducted by mail during the period May 16 through May 25. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next 3 years to other farms outside the county which are owned or controlled by someone else. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the State. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the next three upland cotton crops, 1967-1969.

## Accident Is Ruled In Death Here

Rosary services for Felipe Guillen, Rt. 1, Abernathy, were held at 8 p.m. Sunday at the family residence and Mass was at 10 a.m. Monday at St. Theresa's Catholic Mission here.

Funeral services were officiated by the Rev. William Hammond of Lubbock. Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery, Chambers Funeral Home directing.

Guillen, 21, was dead on arrival at West Texas Hospital in Lubbock Friday night after a shooting incident in Abernathy. Officers said no charges had been filed and circumstances of the shooting indicated an accidental wound in the abdomen resulted in Guillen's death.

He was accompanied by three other young Latin American men and had been tending a half mile east of Abernathy where the shooting occurred about 7:30 p.m., officers said.

Albert Resendes, about 20, and a friend and fellow-worker of Guillen at Lee's Sausage Co. here, was holding the .22 caliber pistol being used, officers said.

The men said they thought the pistol was empty, according to officers.

Surviving are his father, Guadalupe Guillen, a brother, Andy Guillen, and two sisters, Mrs. Urbano Saucedo and Mrs. Pablo Panchico, all of Rt. 1, Abernathy.

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A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall throughout the Cotton Belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers. The upcoming vote by mail marks a first in program administration, according to Mr. Pope. Farmers previously have been able to vote by mail in annual ASC committee elections, but the method has never before been used in a commodity program referendum.

Mr. Pope said, "It's easy to vote by mail, and we hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county."

The Chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote, is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office.

Final plans have been made for the erection of a new cotton mill in Abernathy. The spinning mill, utilizing local cotton, will be "Southwest Textiles, Inc."

The site for construction is on US Highway 87 in southeast Abernathy. The building will be metallic construction containing about 30 thousand square feet of floor space. In addition to the mill an adjoining office building of brick and tile will have 2,250 square feet of space.

Southwest Textiles, Inc. will involve a total investment of \$450 thousand dollars. The mill will employ approximately 60 people in the beginning, with an annual payroll of \$350 thousand dollars. As many local people as possible will be employed and percentage wise, will employ about the same number of men and women. It will be necessary to bring in several experienced employees to help get the mill in operation.

The new cotton mill will manufacture cotton yarn for sale to other integrated mills in the southeast U. S. It is anticipated that a weaving unit will be added in the near future, making Southwest Textiles, Inc. an integrated mill of spinning and weaving. The fabric would then be sold to Texas or West Coast markets.

Southwest Textiles, Inc. will have between 6 thousand and 7 thousand spindles, utilizing between 10 and 12 thousand bales of locally grown cotton annually. When the mill gets into full operation it is expected to produce around 60 thousand pounds of coarse yarns per week or a total annual production of 3 million 120 thousand pounds.

Local business men are investors with some outside investors. The local Abernathy business men are A. B. (Andy) Reid, Rudolph Struve, Bill Wolf and Joe Thompson, plant superintendent and plant manager will be announced later. Construction will begin in the near future. The contract for the building has been let and the target date for operation is October.

The above announcement was read by Abernathy Chamber of Commerce President Joe Thompson to a gathering of local businessmen and local area newsmen at Graham's Monday afternoon, Thompson will leave by plane Thursday for a trip to southeastern states in interest of the project.

## Nazarenes Set Annual Assembly

Pastor Charles Kirby and a delegation of members of the Abernathy Church of the Nazarene will take part in the annual Abilene, or northwest Texas, district assembly to be held at the San Jacinto Nazarene Church in Amarillo on Wednesday and Thursday, May 25-26.

Annual reports will be made by pastors of all 100 churches on the district. These churches now have a total of about 6,500 members and a combined Sunday school enrollment of 11,000 persons.

Rev. Raymond W. Hurn, Lubbock, will give his annual message as district superintendent. He will outline plans for the 1966-67 year. District officers will be elected.

The presiding general superintendent will be Dr. G. B. Williamson of Kansas City, Mo., who has served continuously since 1946 in the highest elective office in the denomination.

It maintains about 625 missionaries in 47 countries. The denomination's radio program is "Showers of Blessing."

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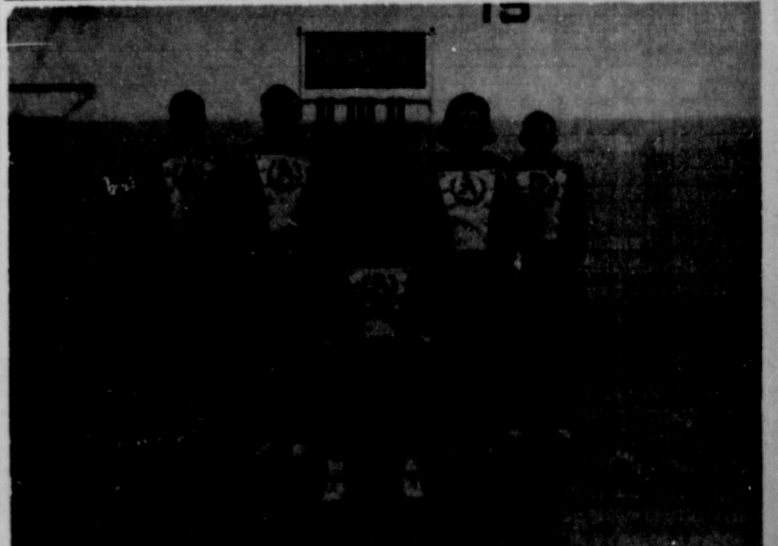
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## Eagles Open Season Sunday
