

Southwestern Public Service Industrial Development Drive

Southwestern Public Service Company is embarking on an expanded industrial development program, it has been announced by W. L. Pearson, vice president and industrial manager for the electric company.

Larry S. Milner, who has been an industrial development consultant with the Texas Industrial Commission, will become manager of industrial development at Southwestern Public Service, Pearson said.

Pearson also announced that an industrial development seminar for the company's managers will be held at the Southwest Service Center in Amarillo on September 22nd.

Milner, who is a native of Brownwood, has been with the Texas Industrial Commission since 1964. Prior to that time, he was chamber of commerce manager at Cisco and a staff member of the San Angelo Chamber of Commerce.

The new industrial development manager attended Howard Payne College and graduated from the University of Texas. In addition, he has taken a number of post-graduate courses in area and industrial development.

"As far as electric power is concerned, and its role in industrial development, each of the communities that we serve starts off equal with any other. Because of our interconnected generation and transmission system, we can meet the electrical needs of any industries that are likely to locate in this area at any point in the area. What we hope to do now, with the addition of Milner to our staff and with the seminar and other activities that we are planning, is to provide for each community some additional manpower, informed manpower, to help it in its industrial development program," Pearson said.

"The meeting is the 49th for the organization, and a special recognition ceremony is planned for 40-year club members," Mrs. Berkley says.

Key speaker at the opening convention session will be Ben Barnes, Texas' speaker of the House of Representatives.

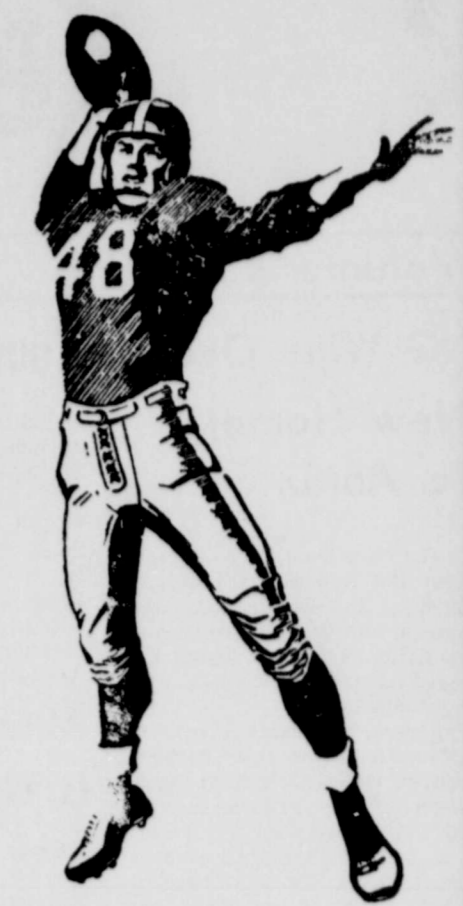
