partment will conduct a public hearing on June 1, 1973, at 7:30 p.m., in the Abernathy School Auditorium for the purpose of discussing Interstate 27 from 1.5 miles north of Monroe Overpass to the north city limits of Hale Center in Lubbock and Hale Counties.

This hearing will be held for the purpose of discussing the recommended route and design for Interstate 27. The proposed highway project will pass through the towns of New Deal, Abernathy and Hale Center.

The proposed construction will consist of improving the existing four land divided highway where required to conform to Interstate standards, developing 24 foot travel roadways with surfaced shoulders - multi-lane, controlled access facility with frontage roads, grade separations and interchanges. No additional right of way is anticipated in New Deal, Abernathy and Hale Center. The general right of way width on the remaining sections will vary from 340 feet to 360 feet.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design will be displayed at the public hearing and together with environmental studies and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office on Loop 445 in South Plainview, Texas, and the District Office of the Texas Highway Department at 601 Slaton Highway in Lubbock,
