14 Vehicles Vandalized During Olton Game

Many who enjoyed watching the Antelopes defeat the Olton Mustangs last Friday night were not so pleased to return to their vehicles and find that they had been vandalized.

During the game, 14 vehicles were scratched with sharp objects. Most of the vehicles damaged were parked in the high school parking lot on Avenue

H. The vehicles were scratched mainly on the sides with some scratches measuring 116 inches. The extent of the damages were unknown at this point.

The incident is presently being investigated by the Abernathy Police Department.

Lopes Seeking Revenge

The Abernathy Antelopes did not know what they were in for last year when they travelled to Hale Center to take on the Hale Center Owls. It was an evening of misery and frustration for the Lopes, as they were pounded 76-7... a game the Lopes will never forget.

The Lopes remember it well and will be seeking revenge this Friday night at 8 p.m. This time the Owls will be in Antelope territory facing a team that has wanted to get ahold of them all year.

A tough Antelope defense will be pitted against one of the most explosive offenses in the area. The Owls are 2-0 thus far for the season. They defeated Olton 27-6 in their season opener and demolished New Deal last week 51-0.

Owls Well-Rounded

The Owls have it all, as they are one of the most well-rounded teams in the area. They have 7 defensive starters and 8 offensive starters who returned from last year. They have 12 seniors on their squad giving them excellent leadership. They also have excellent reserve player depth, which means that even the back-up players can do the job for the Owls.

At the helm of the offensive charge will be Kurt Ashmore, who made all state defensive back last year. He intercepted 2 passes against New

Deal. Ashmore can throw or run with great expertise.

Fullback J. R. Compton has become a household word in 2-A football. He scored 4 touchdowns and 185 yards against Olton and 135 yards against New Deal last week. Senior halfback David Peggram will also be tough to stop. He gained 123 yards against New Deal last week. Wingback Barry Berg is also a tough runner.

The Owls are big! Center Larry Ward weighs 200 lbs.; James Pardo weighs 190 lbs. and plays linebacker and guard; Tim Mooney weighs 235 lbs. and plays tackle and guard; and Kenneth Wilson weighs 211 lbs. and plays end and tackle. All of these are strong players as well as quick.

Presently Hale Center is ranked first in the state in 2-A by the Harris Poll and third in the state by the Associated Press.

Coach's Comments

Head Football Coach Larry Aldridge stated that it will be a tough game, but has a positive outlook on the game saying "I have great confidence in the team and the team members have confidence in their own ability. They know they have to play well to win, but know that a victory is well within their reach."

Aldridge also stated that the team is more ahead in the progress they have made than he thought they would be at this point in the season.

Mustangs No Match For Powerful Lopes

The Olton Mustangs were no match for the powerful Abernathy Antelopes here last Friday night. The Lopes won handily 18-0, but had many more opportunities to score.

Excluding the many mistakes - 3 interceptions and 2 fumbles, and costly penalties - 10 for 70 yards, the Lopes completely controlled the Mustangs allowing them only 133 yards offensively.

Behind the "running machine" Chester Cooper, who rushed 29 times for 179 yards, the Lopes gained a total of 340 yards offensively. Darrell Young rushed for 68 of these yards and Harold Miller 32, as the Lope running attack was in full swing Friday. The Lopes made 17 first downs to Olton's 7.

The defense was awesome, allowing Olton only 109 yards on the ground and 24 in the air. Linebackers Randy Houston, Danny McDaniel and Ricky Rodriguez made 14, 12 and 10 tackles, respectively, to stop the Mustangs in their tracks. McDaniel showed no mercy to his old teammates from Olton, as he made several big defensive plays. Other big defensive plays were made by Darrell Young and Randal Stillwell, who both intercepted passes, and Randy Houston, who recovered a fumble.

First Half

The Mustangs elected to receive the ball first, and after 6 plays, were forced to punt to the Lopes. The Lopes took the ball, and on their first possession, put together a scoring drive.

The drive started on the Lope 26 yard line. McDaniel went 13 yards, then Chester Cooper went to work. In six carries, Cooper carried the ball down to the Mustang 8 yard line. On one of the carries, Cooper broke loose for a 15-yard gain. Cooper carried the ball the final 8 yards into the end zone and the Lopes were on top 6-0, after missing the PAT attempt.

The Lopes kicked-off to the Mustangs and Olton fumbled on their own 26 yard line. McDaniel recovered the fumble and took over. Three plays later they were intercepted on

the Mustang 14 yard line.

Olton was stopped on their own 32 yard line after 4 plays when Danny McDaniel recovered their next fumble. The Lope offense went to work on Olton's 34 yard line. Darrell Young broke loose for 14 yards on the next play. Then Cooper ran 3 times for 7 yards to take the ball down to the 18 yard line. From there kicker Wade Wesley attempted a field goal, but it was no good and the score remained 6-0.

The next Mustang drive ended when Ricky Rodriguez sacked an Olton quarterback for an 8-yard loss. Olton had to punt and the Lopes got good field position on Olton's 40 yard line. Then the Lopes were intercepted for the second time and the first quarter ended.

Olton's next drive was stopped abruptly when Randy Houston recovered a forced fumble. The Lopes got the ball, but were stopped after 5 plays. The tough Lope defense put Olton's next drive to rest after 3 short plays.

The Lopes put together another drive and were down to the Mustang's 44 yard line when they fumbled. Olton started from this point, and were stopped 3 plays later when Darrell Young came up with an interception.

The Lopes got to the ball again and Cooper broke loose on the first carry for 32 yards. On the next play the Lopes penetrated to the 9 yard line. Then, for the third time, the Lopes drive ended when they were intercepted at this point. The game went into halftime with the score still Abernathy 6, Olton 0.

Second Half

Cooper had already rushed for 117 yards by halftime, but he would get many more before the game ended.

The Lopes got the ball first in the second half and were forced to punt after 4 plays. After the punt, the Lope defense stuck it to Olton on the Mustangs 22 yard line when they caused Olton to fumble. The Lopes recovered it and had great field position on the Olton 17 yard line. On

the first play, Cooper dashed 17 yards for a touchdown and the Lopes increased their lead to 12-0 after the extra point attempt failed.

Olton had not given up at this point. The stands were still full of fans. They took the ball after the kick and marched on their own 26 yard line, down to the Lope's 12 yard line in 11 plays. This drive ended on the 12, when Jamie Mansanales jumped in front of a Mustang receiver to prevent a touchdown.

Abernathy could not go from here and were forced to punt after 7 plays. The Lope defense once again stopped

Olton after 5 plays.

The Lopes were stopped on their next 2 drives, as well as stopping Olton. Then, late in the fourth quarter, the Lopes put together a final scoring drive. It started following a poor Olton punt and the Lopes took over on the Mustang 47 yard line. Runs by Cooper, Ross Bradley, Mansanales and Young took the ball down to the Olton 1 yard line. From there Mansanales ran it in for 6 points and the Lopes capped off a 18-0 victory.

Coach's Comments

Head Football Coach Larry Aldridge stated that his team did not look as sharp as they did against Petersburg last week. But he did have some positive remarks saying that the defense did an excellent job. "The offense did a lot of things well, they just made too many mistakes," Aldridge added.

City Council Sets Budget Hearing For Sept. 26

The Abernathy City Council met Monday night at 7:30 p.m. to set the budget hearing date, as well as act on several other important business items.

The budget hearing has been set for Monday, September 26 at 7 p.m. At this time locals will be able to voice their opinion about the council's proposing to raise the tax rate 1 cent, from 45 cents to 46 cents per \$100 valuation.

The proposed budget is \$667,350, up 2.77 percent over the 1982-83 city budget of \$649,348. The increase amounts to an \$18,002 increase in the budget.

The budget was set according to how the city tax roll was appraised by the Hale County Appraisal District. The district appraised the city tax roll at \$37,650,047, which is \$1,401,954 less than the 1982 tax roll of \$39,052,001. The decrease in the tax roll was due primarily to a decrease in the valuation of the bank. Therefore, the 1 cent tax increase is necessary in order for the city to collect \$173,190 in tax revenues, which still does not

make up for the loss in revenues, considering the city took in \$175,734 in tax revenues last year.

Special Meeting

The city council set next Monday, September 19 at 4 p.m. as a special meeting to discuss whether or not federally subsidized housing will be allowed in Abernathy. The Council will also discuss what they are going to do about having zoning in Abernathy. Steve Fanning, a planning and zoning specialist from Denton, will be at the meeting to discuss zoning.

General Revenue Sharing Funds

The City will be given \$47,161 in general revenue sharing funds for the 1983-84 year. Of the \$47,161 to be received, \$22,000 will be used for street maintenance and seal coating, \$22,000 to purchase a high pressure sewer clean-out machine, and the balance of \$3,162 will be carried forward into next year's budget.

Other Business

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pete Thompson. All members except Gary Grant and Jerry Givens were present.

The minutes of the August 8 council meeting were approved after non discussion and visitors were recognized. The only visitors were Larry Griffin and the Rev. Tommie Beck.

Larry Griffin handed out an informal letter of complaint to each council member, then left the meeting. Tommie Beck made a request that he be allowed to park a mobile home on lot 7 and the north 1/2 of lot 8 on block 152 in Abernathy. The location is where Phil Grindstaff used to live.

Beck stated that the mobile home would be parked parallel to the street if at all possible. He also brought a petition with the names of most everyone on the block, stating that they approve of him moving a trailer to this location. He will be purchasing the lot from A. D. Helms.

The council approved of Beck moving the mobile home to this location.

Local Rafters Win Two Divisions In Raft Race

Six local rafters, four of which have won the Yellowhouse Canyon Raft Race the past two years, once again ended up winners at this year's race held Labor Day at the Yellowhouse Canyon.

Those who rode the raft were Cody Connell, Roger Howard, Darrick Stallings, Kevin Riddles, Danny Newton and Blance Neis. They won first place in the six-man raft division, and second place overall with a time of 23 minutes, 10 seconds.

The rafters from Abernathy used the same boat they had used last year called "Moby Duck." It was designed by Roger Howard and constructed by Howard, Stallings, Connell and Riddles.

Sponsoring the "Moby Duck" and the local contestants in the competition was Pinson's Pharmacy of Abernathy. The Great Yellowhouse Canyon Raft Race is sponsored by KSEL Radio,

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607. Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

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Plains Pest Management Report

Open bolls can be found in a few fields. These fields are ones that have "cut out" and have been somewhat moisture stressed. Bollworm activity continues to be on the decline. Eggs were difficult to find in most fields this week, although counts ranged up to 30,000

per acre. Bollworm larval counts have ranged from 0-25,000 per acre, with most in the 2,000-5,000 range. Predators remain relatively high for this time of year (up to 42,000/acre). It is hard for bollworms to establish in fields with low numbers of squares and

small bolls. As more bolls reach maturity and square densities drop, damage from bollworms will be decreased. If your field is in this situation, bollworm action levels should be about twice as high as those stated two weeks ago in the newsletter. This means that

cotton worth \$0.60/lb. and an application cost of \$12.00/acre had an economic threshold of around 6,000 bollworms per acre, should now be around 12,000 per acre. This will, of course, depend on the number of susceptible bolls, moisture available to the maturing boll drop and amount of time left to reach maturity.

Sorghum

Headworms continue to be found in sorghum, but economic infestations are few.

Sorghum midge have emerged in large numbers from earlier infested fields. If any grower has blooming sorghum, it should be scouted daily for midge migrating in from neighboring fields.

Panicle (head) feeding bugs have been found in some fields. The majority are an unidentified immature green plant bug type. Also, a few green stink bugs and conchuela stink bugs have been found. Panicle feeding bugs attack seed, and damage depends on numbers of bugs per head. Panicle infestations, from the milk to maturity stage of grain development, decreases yield when populations average 4 southern green stink bugs or 6 leaf foot bugs per head. A few

false chinch bug immatures have also been found. The threshold for these is an average of 140 per head. After hard dough is reached, yield losses have not occurred with populations as high as 16 southern green stink bugs, conchuela stink bugs or leaf footed bugs per head.

Spider mites still pose a threat in some sorghum fields and should be watched closely up to hard dough.

Corn

Corn harvest has started! Most of this has been in high moisture fields going to feed lots. Lodging from southwestern corn borer is beginning to increase and has reached the 5 percent level in some fields. Stalk lodging is also showing up in fields stressed for moisture or damaged by spider mites.

Soybean

Podworm infestations may increase as cotton becomes unattractive to the bollworm (corn earworm). Fields should be scouted for this pest up to pod maturity.

Spider mites have been observed in some soybeans. They can be found infesting the underside of the leaf and causing a mottled

National Farm Safety Week

Protecting rural children and teaching them safety measures is the emphasis of National Farm Safety Week September 18-24, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of the Texas Safety Association.

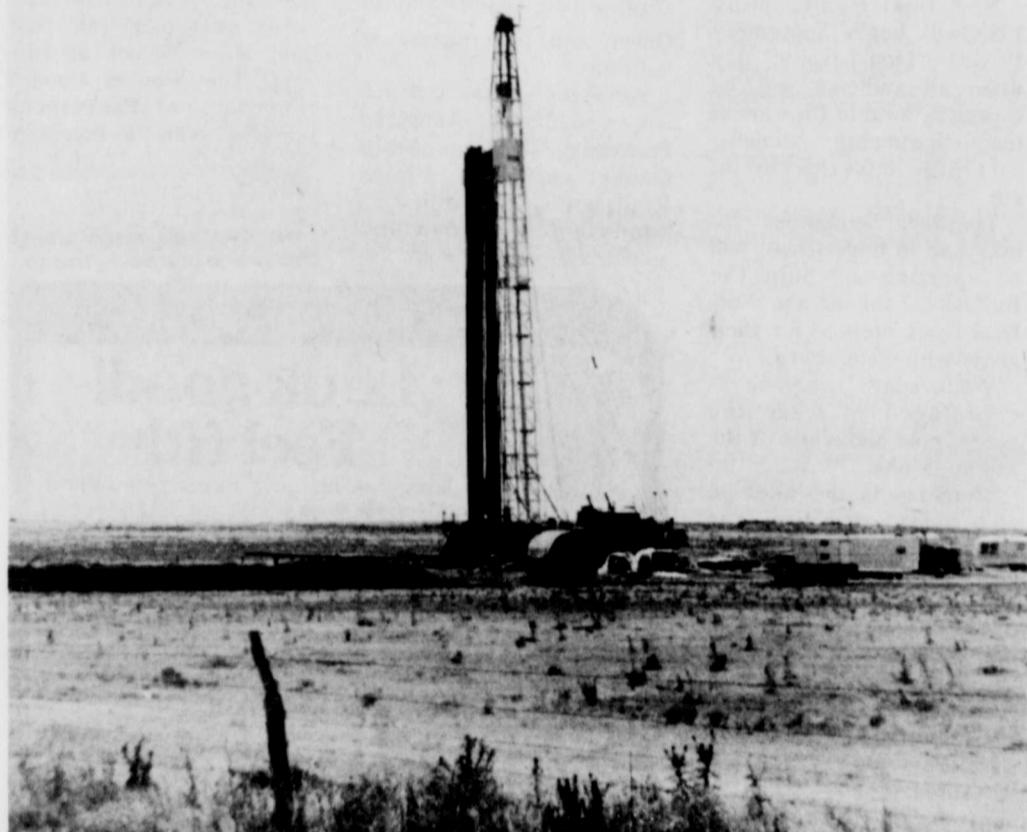
The 40th annual observance of rural safety has been proclaimed by President Ronald Reagan and is being sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Farm safety is a particular concern in Texas, where 100 persons lost their lives in farm accidents last year, according to Gustafson. The statistics are tabulated by the Texas Farm Bureau, based on data furnished by the Texas State Health Department. These records show that of the 100 deaths, most were related to tractors, firearms, drowning, electric current, and machinery, he said.

Safety leaders estimate that the incidence of these rural-type accidents is actually much greater than those numbers reported, he




said. Although farm fatalities are a major concern, farmers and ranchers should also be aware that up to 20,000 disabling injuries and up to 250,000 serious injuries requiring medical attention occur to Texas farmers and ranchers each year, according to Dr. Gary S. Nelson, Extension Specialist Safety Engineering, Texas A&M University and Texas Safety Association Vice President for Agriculture.

According to Nelson, "If you are a farmer or a rancher, the probability of experiencing a serious injury this year is 1 in 5."

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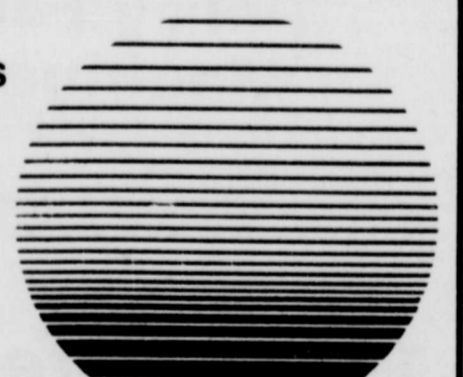

She is survived by her parents; a grandmother, Mary Hunley of Abernathy; and a great-grandmother, Ona Masering of Abernathy.

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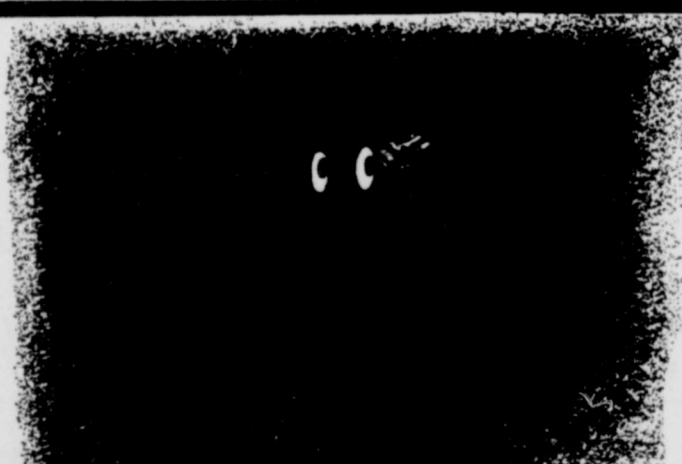
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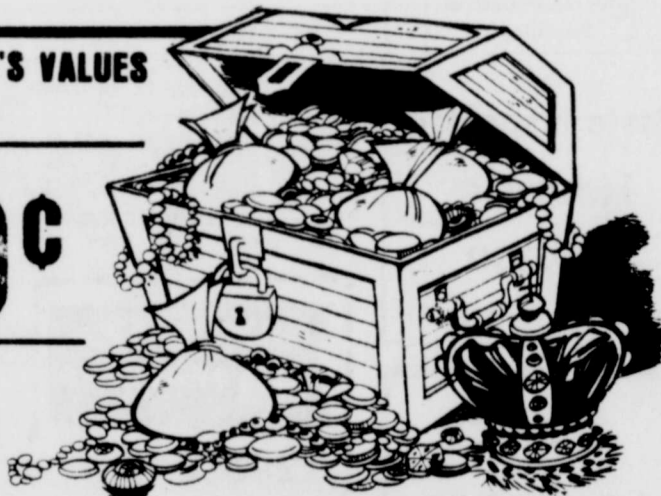

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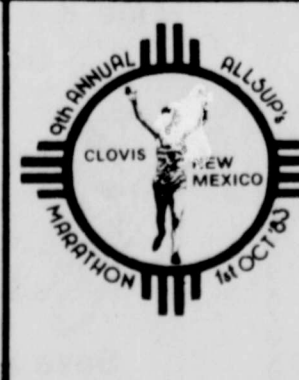
