Absentee Voting Slow For April 6 Elections

Only five absentee votes have been cast for the April 6 election, indicating a light turnout and little interest with only two contested races in the election.

The four elections slated for April 6 include the office of Mayor plus two members of the City Council; two seats on the board of trustees for the Stratford Independent School District; three places on the board of the Stratford Hospital District; and two seats on the County School Board.

Absentee balloting will continue through April 2. Absentee ballots may be cast at the City Hall and at the school.

The two contested races are for the office of Mayor with incumbent Annell Wall and Odell Arnold running for that position. The three men running for two places on the City Council are incumbents Bill Blain and J. E. [Ed] Moore with J. J. Williams throwing his hat into the political ring for the first time.

Holdover members of the City

Council include Ron Hager, Bill Riffe and Dwayne Plunk.

Three places on the board of the Stratford Hospital District will be up in April. Currently these three seats are held by Shirley McReynolds, Jack Vincent and Phillip Bain. Shirley McReynolds and Phillip Bain are both seeking reelection with Joe Pete Flores seeking his first term of elective office.

Holdover members of the Hospital Board are Walter Lasley and Carol V. Wisdom.

Those who have filed for the uncontested race for the two vacancies on the SISD board of trustees are Johnny Summerour, an incumbent seeking reelection, and Joe Wells, seeking his first term.

Holdover members of the Board of Trustees for the SISD include E. R. Bell, V. O. Lasley, Rex Christian, Don Gurley and Don Riffe.

C. L. Guthrie is the only candidate seeking election as a County Trustee-at-Large and nobody from Precinct 3 even bothered to file for the vacancy

on the county board from that area.

The position of Trustee-at-Large is currently held by T. F. Baskin III with W.M. Bridwell of Texhoma holding the position on the Sherman County School Board for Precinct 3.

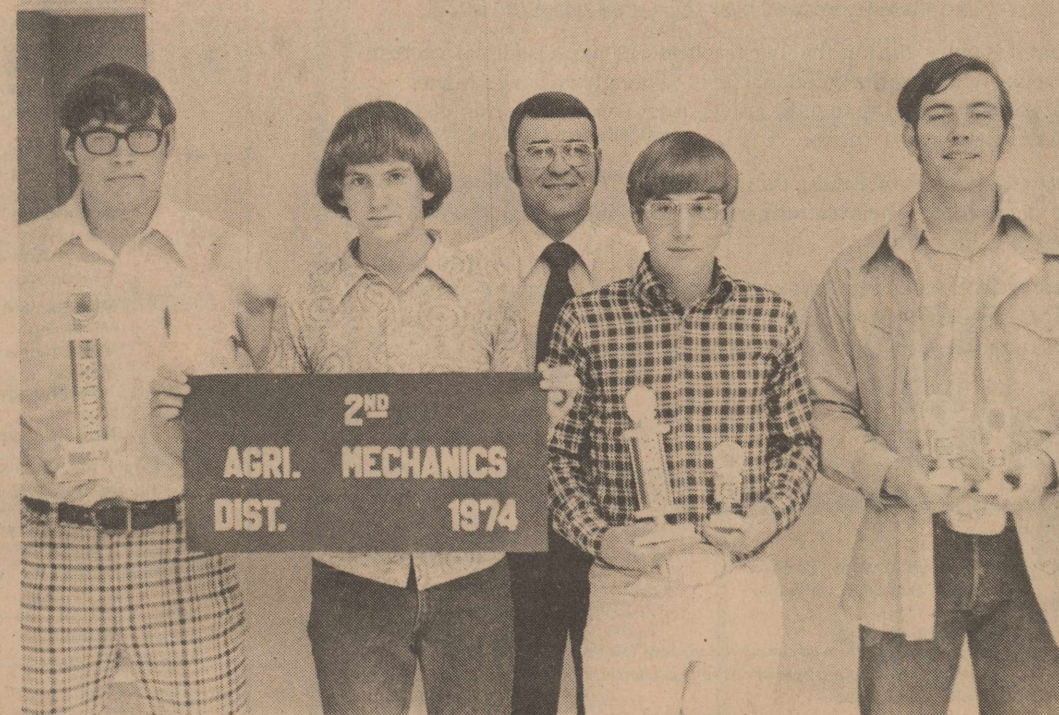
Votes for the city elections will be cast at the City Hall with all other votes cast at the school in the April 6 election.

CHANNING TAKES HONORS

Annual Literary Meet Attracts Six Teams

Six schools participated in the 1974 Stratford Invitational Literary Contests held this past Saturday despite chilly temperatures and blowing wind.

Channing won top honors in the high school division with a total of 138 team points with Dalhart taking second place with 124 points and Stratford in third place with 99 points.

Down in the Junior High Division, Channing led all competition with 84 1/2 points for top team honors followed by Stratford with 62 points. However, in the Junior Division not all schools entered all the many divisions of competition accounting for the big variation in final scores.

Channing competed in seven events with Stratford competing in 8 events. Other teams and their total points and number of events in the Junior Division included Texline with 33 1/2 points in six events; Canadian with 30 points gained in only two events; Gruver with 25 points gained in one event and Dalhart with 17 points gained in two events.

The Stratford Literary Contests are held annually in an effort to prepare area schools for the District University Inter-

scholastic League [UIL] Literary Contests which will be held at Frank Phillips College in Borger next week.

Five SHS students won first place honors in the Senior Division of the competition, these included Stephanie Summerour in Editorial Writing; Gloria Pleyer in Feature Writing; Jeree Gilley in News Writing; Ty Hacker in Science; and Phyllis Miller in Girls Prose Reading.

Miss Summerour is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Summerour, Miss Pleyer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Pleyer, Miss Gilley is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Gilley, Hacker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Al Hacker and Miss Miller is the daughter of Buddy Miller of Stratford and Geneta Miller of Amarillo.

Other high school students who placed in the contests are as follows: Dwayne Miller, 2nd in Editorial Writing with Belinda Irlbeck winning 3rd in that same event; Estella Olivias with a 3rd in News Writing; Melinda Zaricor with a 2nd in Headline Writing and Debbie Crawford with a 3rd in Headline Writing; Gina Bass won 2nd in

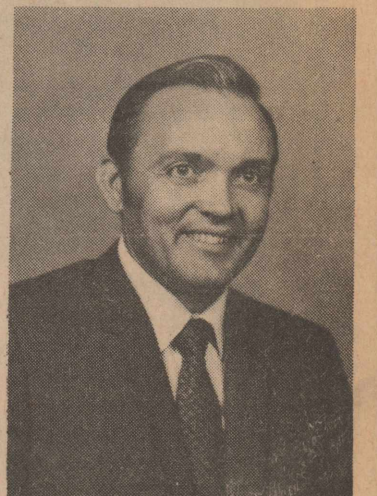
Revival Services Set At Church of Christ

Stratford FFA Teams Win Second In Area

Vega, Stratford and Texline finished in that order in the Amarillo District FFA Agricultural Mechanics contest held this past week at Hereford High School.

The contest covers the fields of farm electrification, plumbing, welding and tool identification. Vega had a score of 4879 out of a possible 5600. Stratford scored 4761 and Texline 4630.

High individual for the contest was Mike Flores of Stratford. He made 1280 points out of 1400 possible. He also tied for first in the electrical contest with a perfect 400 score, in a deadlock with Bob Zimmer, also of Stratford and Arnold Galbrath of Vega. Perfect scores of 200 in tool identification were turned in by Zimmer, Kerry Wyatt and Elbert Jones, both of Texline. Wendell Feerer of

Texline led the welding division and Zimmer was high in plumbing.

Other teams in the contest were Adrian, Boys Ranch, Canyon, Groom, Hereford and Panhandle.

The contest, being held for the eighth year, is sponsored by Rita Blanca Electric Cooperative of Dalhart and Deaf Smith Electric Co-Op of Hereford.

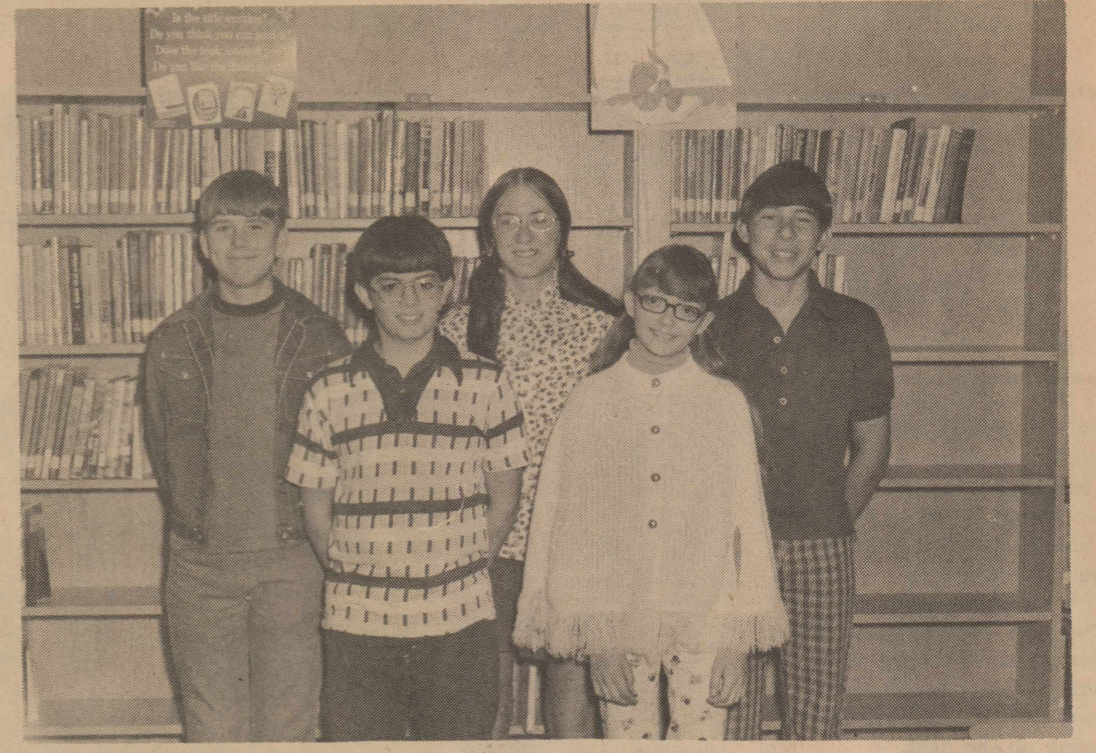

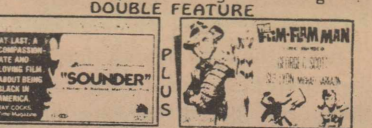
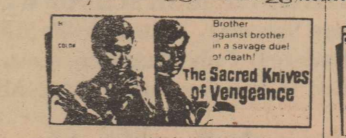
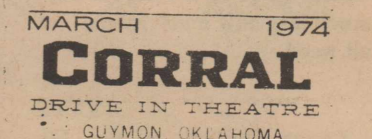
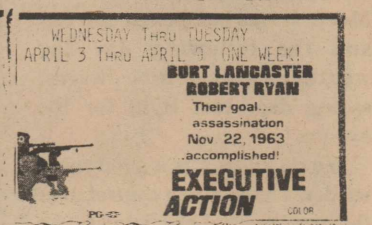
totaled \$2,109 for 3 per cent of the sales goal.

- 1 envelope plain gelatin
- 1 c. cold water
- 2 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1/2 c. sugar or light c orn syrup
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/2 c. peanut butter
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 t. vanilla
- 1 9" baked pie shell

Soften gelatin in 1/4 c. cold water. Combine egg yolks and half of sugar (or syrup), 1/4 c. water and salt in double boiler. Blend. Add gelatin. Place over boiling water. Beat constantly with rotary beater until thick

and fluffy. Cool. Place peanut butter in a bowl, add remaining water gradually and beat until smooth. Add egg mixture and vanilla and blend with mixer. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg white until foamy. Add remaining sugar or corn syrup gradually; beat until stiff. Fold into peanut butter mixture and turn into pie shell. Chill until firm.

SOUR CREAM BANANA CAKE

- 1/4 c. [1/2 stick] butter
- 1 1/3 c. sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 t. vanilla
- 2 c. sifted flour
- 1 t. baking powder
- 1 t. baking soda
- 3/4 t. salt
- 1 c. dairy sour cream
- 1 c. mashed ripe bananas [2medium]
- 1/2 c. chopped nuts

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and gradually add sugar and beat until light and fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add vanilla. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Add bananas and nuts, mixing just until blended. Turn into buttered baking pan, 13x9x2 inches. Bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes. Top with Broiled Coconut Frosting or cool on wire rack and sift confectioners sugar over cool cake for a quick topping.

High Plains Beet Growers Get \$1 Million

High Plains growers for Holly Sugar Corporation's Hereford factory on March 29 will receive an additional payment of \$1,245,000 for their 1973 crop, said Robert F. Ginn, agricultural manager.

Ginn said the additional payment of \$3 a ton is based on a record net return of \$13.25 per hundred weight of sugar, highest in the history of the Shoup plant.

He said that higher sugar prices have improved the net returns in all of the factory's contracting area. He said the additional payment will boost returns to growers to about \$9,017,000 which includes both Holly and Sugar Act payments.

Growers will receive a final payment for their crop in October based on the selling price for sugar between now and then, Ginn explained.

He pointed out that he hoped the record returns being received for sugarbeets will bring back many of the former growers.

Ray Ruffin Slates Open Forum Meeting

An Open Forum meeting for all residents to meet and visit with Ray Ruffin, Democratic candidate for the nomination of Congressman for the 13th District, will be held Thursday night (April 4) in the Farm Bureau Building at 8 p.m. in Stratford.

All residents are urged to attend this meeting.

Ruffin, 36, is a native of Amarillo. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin L. Ruffin and attended schools in Amarillo and later West Texas State University. In the years following college, Ray worked as a patrolman for the Amarillo Police Department and then spent a year of professional baseball with the Pittsburg Pirates.

Always interested in music, Ray entered the business fulltime by becoming vice-president of both 20th Century and Paramount records in California.

Ruffin later realized a boyhood dream in 1967 when he became owner of a cutting horse he had worked as a teenager. The horse, three time world champion cutting horse, Senor George, became the sire of the Ruffin Quarter Horse Ranch near Old Tascosa.

Ruffin is married to the former Paula Allen of Memphis, Tenn., and the couple have two daughters, Holly, 8, and Jessica, 3. The family are members of the First Baptist Church of Amarillo.

Ruffin entered the race for Congress in January of 1973 and has been on the road shaking hands and meeting residents of the 13th District since that time.

Ruffin has become outspoken on various issues of the day. He made a strong stand against the proposed pay raise issue stating that "I think the present level is adequate with the added benefits the office carries with it." Ruffin added that "some of

the elected Congressmen have such poor attendance records on the floor of the House and in their assigned committee hearings that I would question their present salary levels. I cannot vouch for taxpayers' money wasted for duties not performed"

On the subject of dealing with issues involving both Federal and State issues, Ruffin has stated "A Congressman has two constituencies, his colleagues and the people of his district. The fact is to be effective in furthering the interests of the 13th District I will have to establish working relationships with other Congressmen and educate them on the potential of the Panhandle of Texas. I deal with the water supply problem every day on my ranch and one of my first concerns as a Congressman will be to work towards the end of obtaining Federal funds to drill for the saline base in the Panhandle."

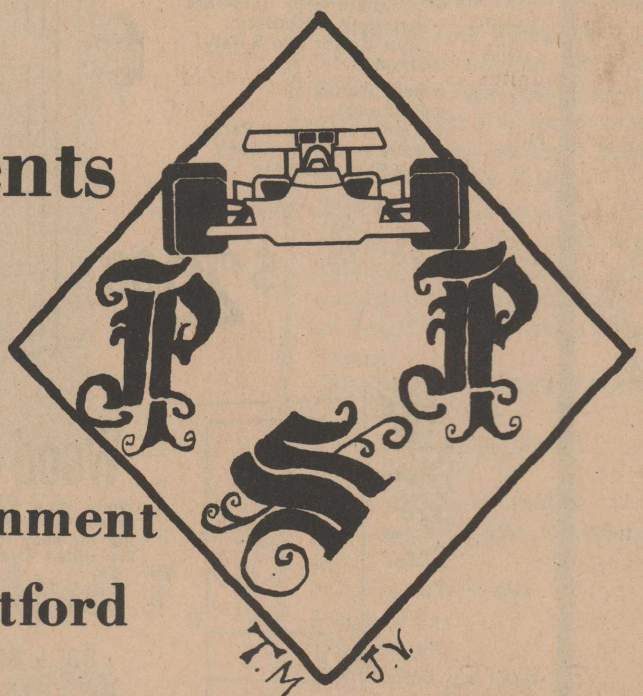
