Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

Mr. and Mrs. Wendell Stacy met with Council to discuss the riding of four-wheelers on City streets or alleys to outside City limits where they have permission to ride. After some discussion, Chief Davis assured the Stacys that kids would be allowed to push the four-wheelers down City streets or alleys without being stopped or questioned. This has been the policy of the Police Dept. since Chief Davis took office.

Remodeling of the Council chambers was discussed. Ronnie and Wanda informed the Council of their plans. A motion was made by Wanda and seconded by Kirk to accept the plans to remodel the Council chambers. Motion Carried.

Putting a stop and go traffic light at the intersec-

tions of Hwy. 54 and 287 and Hwy. 54 and Main st. was discussed. After some discussion a motion was made by Ronnie and seconded by Kirk to request a four-way stop at the intersection of Hwy. 54 and Main St. and leave Hwy 54 and 287 intersection like it is Motion Carried.

A working policy with the Sheriff's Dept. was discussed. Kyle gave a report of his meeting with the County attorney. Council would like to get the matter resolved. Kyle is to meet with the County Attorney again. A motion to this effect was made by R.J. and seconded by Ronnie. Motion carried.

A motions was made by Kirk and seconded by Bill to put up street lights at the following locations: 201 S. Grace, 201 S. Wall, and the corner of S. Maple and 4th street. Motion carried.

City bills were reviewed for payment. A motion was made by R.J. and seconded by Wanda to pay all bills. Motion carried.

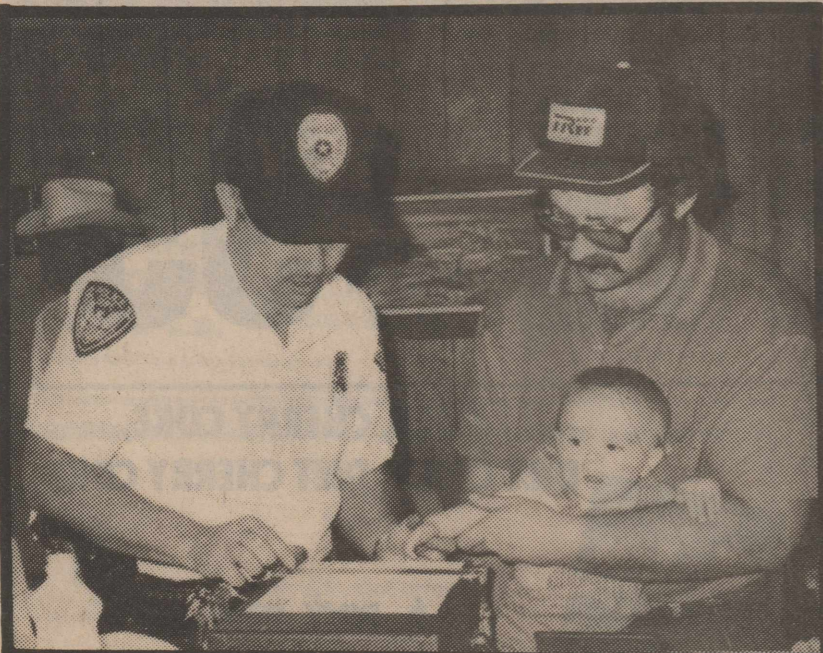

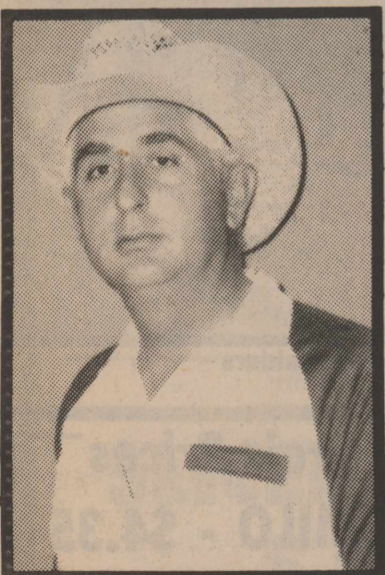
Take time to think about these people and what they go thru for YOU!

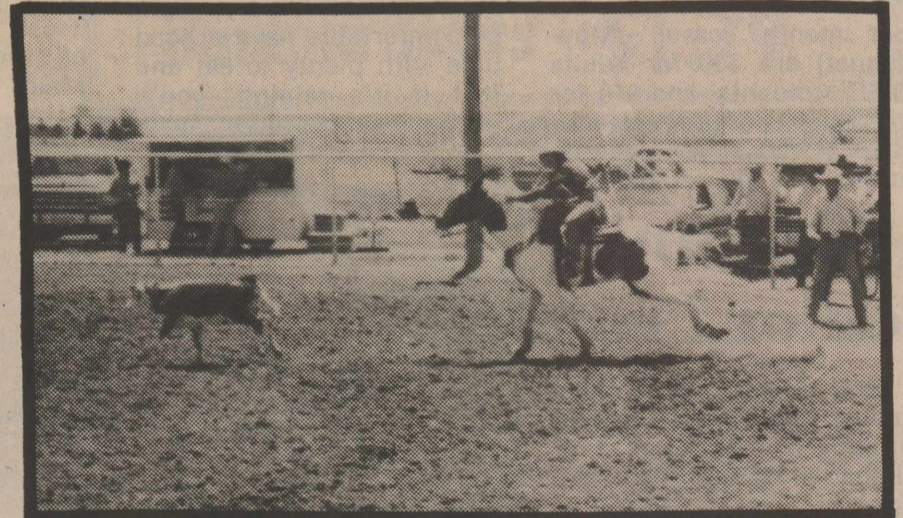

The test does not measure specific skills but does measure basic understanding and achievement and ranks the scores against a national norm. Overall, the scores showed considerable academic growth with group totals clearly above the national norm.

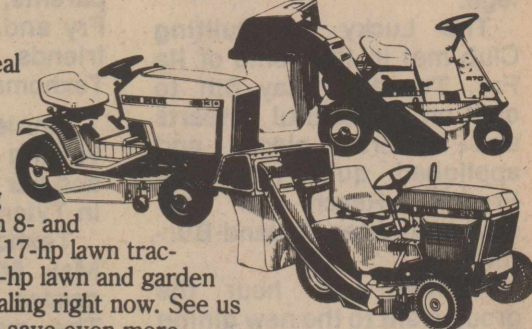
In all grades 1-4, 95% of all regular education students were achieving in the average or above average range in reading. In mathematics and language, the percent of students in the average or above range was 98% and 97% respectively. Playing for Keeps

Dear John: I have a new sod lawn and I need a good game plan to keep it in shape. Any suggestions?

Dear Sports Fan: Caring for a newly sodded lawn is a bit like playing baseball. To win, you have to play by the rules. When it comes to sod, the first rule of the game is to make sure the lawn is watered to a depth of 6 to 8 inches immediately after the sod has been laid.

Like all good players, your lawn will need to stay in top condition. A good training program for your lawn will include daily waterings.

But, by the time it was cut into strips, your sod was a seasoned veteran and had already established a healthy root system. So, once it's laid, all the grass needs to do is team up with your soil.

Dear John: I've just become the proud owner of my very first lawn mower. What should I do now?

Dear Beginner: Start at square one by reading your operator's manual.

Once you have done your studying, change into your mowing uniform—close-fitting clothes (no long scarfs, loose shirttails or dangling jewelry) and hard, closed-toe shoes with

good traction.

Next, take a walk around your yard, clearing the area of sticks, stones, dog bones, chains and other debris. These objects can become high-powered missiles if they're flung from the mower's whirling blades. Remove low hanging tree branches that can whack you in the face while you're mowing.

Before you start up the machine, send your kids and pets far away. You don't want them running into your path unexpectedly.

Dear John: Does it matter whether I use a preemergence herbicide or a postemergence herbicide on the weeds in my lawn? What is the difference between the two weed killers?

Dear Uncertain: A preemergence herbicide eliminates germinating weed seeds before the weeds ever break through the surface of the soil. A postemergence herbicide kills weeds after they have grown. Most herbicides are designed to work on specific types of weeds at certain times in the weed's life cycle. So, you'll need to figure out what kind of weed you want to kill before choosing the herbicide and deciding on the proper time to use it.

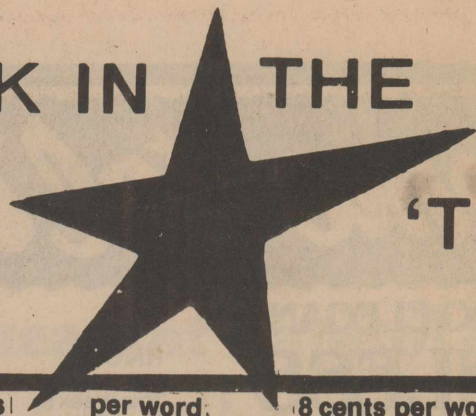
