## Council Approves Points Toward Settlement Of Suit

The Clarksville City Council approved several points that could serve as a basis for settlement of a \$300,150 civil rights lawsuit in executive session on Monday, January 12. Attorney for the plaintiffs in the suit, Jim D. Lovett met with the council and the council agreed to put into action several of his recommendations.

The city was named as a co-defendant with Red River County and four law enforcement officers in a lawsuit alleging that plaintiffs Gene Shadid and Peggy Mitchell were subjected to police brutality while being held in the Red River County Jail.

On Tuesday, January 13, Jim D. Lovett met with Red River County officials to discuss the county joining with the city on the points decided upon. He was also scheduled to meet with the Red River County Commissioners on Wednesday, January 14, at 1:30 p.m. The commissioners will have the final say as to whether the county accepts or rejects the proposal.

The points agreed to by the city council include the establishment of a public review board which would investigate all acts of violence and assault alleged against police officers, Lovett said.

The board would contain five members, four of which would be appointed by state district judges. Two of those members could not be or ever have been a police officer or judicial officer. The fifth member of the board, which would be the chairman, would be selected by the other four members and could not currently be a peace officer or judicial officer.

Lovett said that the board would be funded to the extent that they could hire private investigation and that they would have funds for administering polygraph tests. An officer could be fired for refusing to take a polygraph test.

Lovett has also proposed that the board would recommend the hiring and firing of officers and would be empowered to investigate

the background of prospective officers and investigate mistreatment in the jail.

The board would also establish uniform operating procedures for all law officers.

Another point the council agreed upon in any settlement of the lawsuit was the issuance of a statement of principle saying that it is

the duty of government to see that justice is done.

Lovett said that a money settlement had not been reached, and further stated that he and his clients were interested only in attaining enough to cover actual costs and damages incurred in the beating. He stated that they were more interested in the policy changes than a large amount of money.

The council requested the session with Lovett, which lasted for ninety minutes.

Additional time in which to answer the lawsuit has been requested by city attorney Clayton Hall. The suit was filed December 23 in U.S. District Court in Tyler. Originally the defendants had 20 days to answer the suit.

## Red River County Jail Must Meet Standards Or Close

The Red River County Jail, which failed to comply to the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, will have to be closed if life safety items are not immediately installed.

The jail was inspected on January 13, and failed to meet the state minimum standards. At last inspection, the jail had also failed to meet all standards.

A letter sent to the county from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards urged that the areas of noncompliance be given serious and immediate consideration, and that corrective measures be initiated and completed. If life safety items were not immediately installed, it was recommended that the facility be closed.

Twelve items were listed in which the aged facility did not comply to minimum standards.

These areas are: no audible communications provided between inmates and custodial personnel at all times; no visiting area provided; Dayrooms are not provided for any cells; Safety vestibules are not provided for the six man and four man cells; No remote reliable means is provided for opening any cell doors. Padlocks are used on four cell doors; Stationary benches are not provided for the two Detox cells; the two separation cells do not provide a shower or a mirror; doorstops are not provided for swinging detention doors; windows in the east side are not equipped with either insect or security screens; temperature level cannot be maintained reasonably between 65 and 85 degrees F. year round; no emergency illumination system is provided and no smoke and fume removal system is provided.

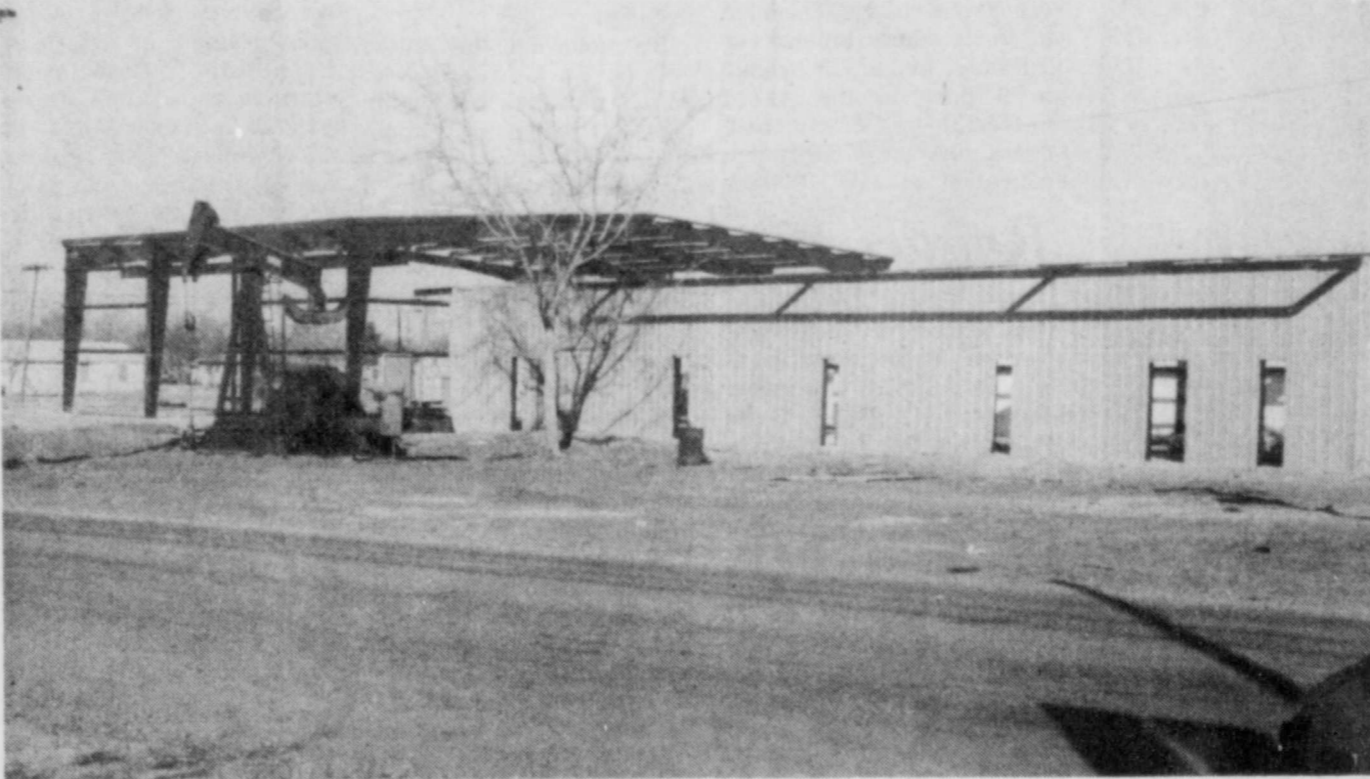
Red River County Judge Connie Sullivan stated that the Texas Commission of Jail Standards had informed her that the jail might be closed in as little as three months if some action were

not taken. She also stated that the county had already made arrangements with Farmers Home Administration for a 5 percent loan of \$350,000. This

would be available for the construction of a new jail facility if the citizens of the county approved.

She also stated that a jail

like the one the county wished to build had been constructed for that amount in Meridian, Texas, in Bosque County.

## New Building To House Business

The foundation has been laid and steel trusses erected on a new plant with 14,000 square feet of floor space, which will house a repair shop for drilling rigs, pulling units, oil field engines, welding machines and pump repair and supply service. The building will also house new offices for the Winchester Oil Company, C and S Service and Supplies and Talco Asphalt, all subsidiaries of Westchester Gas Company.

A spokesman said that if everything went according to plans the exterior of the plant would be ready by February 1 with the interior

finished by May 1.

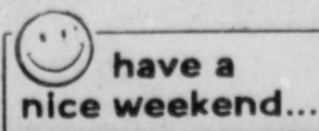
Sammy Vaughn, president of Winchester Oil Company has worked in the Talco field since 1967 and now has 21 wells that produce approximately 375 barrels of oil daily. Five of these are in the Talco city limits. They also have seven salt water disposable wells. There are 30 to 35 persons working on the company's two drilling rigs, one pulling unit, a roustabout crew, plus their

office employees.

Winchester has a busy year planned for 1981 with 85 proposed well sites, two of these in the city limits and with the completion of the new plant on loop 96 and FM 71.

## Oscar Rhodes

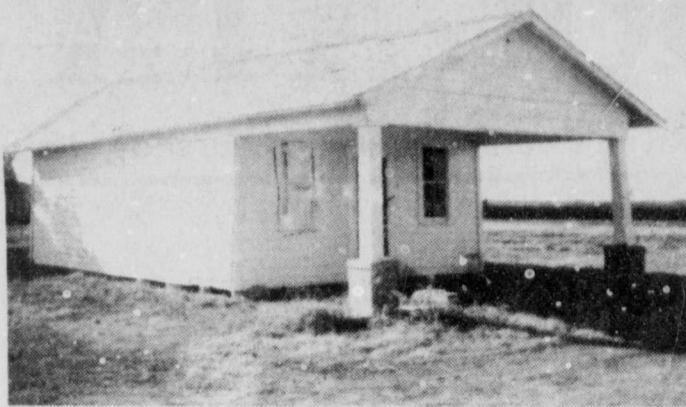
Oscar Buford Rhodes, 86, of Route 1 Deport, died Friday morning, January 9, 1981, in the Deport Nursing Home.

He was preceded in death by two sons, John Albert and James. Grandsons were pallbearers.

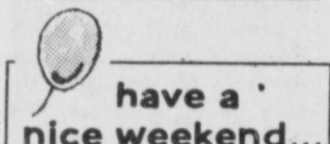


OLD STORE—one of only a few left standing in the area, the Shadowland Country Store is closed

## Feb. 2nd Is Deadline

Employers must provide each employee with a completed Wage and Tax Statement, Form W-2, for 1980 by February 2, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says.

If the Wage and Tax Statements are not issued on time, employers may be penalizing employees who will have to wait until February or later to file their tax returns, possibly missing out on the faster refunds available to early filers.

For additional information on the proper distribution and handling of Wage and Tax Statements, employers may get a free copy of IRS Publication 15, "Circular E, Employer's Tax Guide," from the IRS.

# Country Stores Fading Away

The old shadowland store building still stands on the road between Fulbright and Deport. There aren't many of the old country stores around any longer. There used to be a store at every little community. Folks would go for the things they forgot on their weekly trips to the larger towns like Bogata, Deport or Cunningham.

When I was a small boy there were stores at Halesboro, Lone Oak, Shadowland and Minter, which had several.

Back then of course, there were car agencies, banks,

schools and service stations in each little town.

Pattonville also had a bank, and a good dry goods store, and three grocery stores, plus a blacksmith shop.

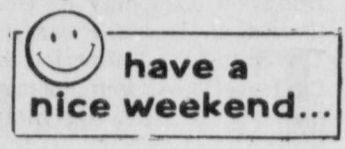
Most all the stores had a gas pump in front. The gas had to be pumped into the top of the pump and then let gravity force it into your tank.

The old stores were a meeting place for the men of the community, and you could swap most anything that you wanted to. The trade system worked well here. If someone had a few chickens extra they took

and swapped them for something they needed, such as groceries or clothing.

One country store still in existence and going strong is Jim's Country Store at Pine Branch on the old Bogata road. Cunningham still has Musgrove's, and there are several still around!

But for the most part, the leisurely pace of the country store has been replaced by supermarkets. I, for one, kind of hate to see them go completely.

# Hall Opposed To Refugee Resettlement

In regard to the proposal to resettle 2,000 Cuban refugees in East Texas, Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. has sent the following telegram to President Carter, President-Elect Reagan, Senators Lloyd Bentsen and Tower of Texas, and Governor William P. Clements:

Local officials in East Texas have been informed that they must prepare for a resettlement of some 2,000 Cuban refugees into East Texas, the area that I represent in Congress. I am adamantly opposed to such a resettlement. In numerous discussions with public officials and community leaders throughout the targeted area for resettlement, I find total support for my position. I am informed that little, if any, coordination and planning from Federal officials and humane organizations have gone into basic problems associated with jobs, housing, social services and law enforcement for the refugees. Furthermore, I have been informed that those refugees left at Fort Chaffee are undesirable and are not suitable for relocation in East Texas. The proposal is ill-conceived and ill-timed. For these reasons, I implore you to oppose such a resettlement.

## Cabinet Making Course Set

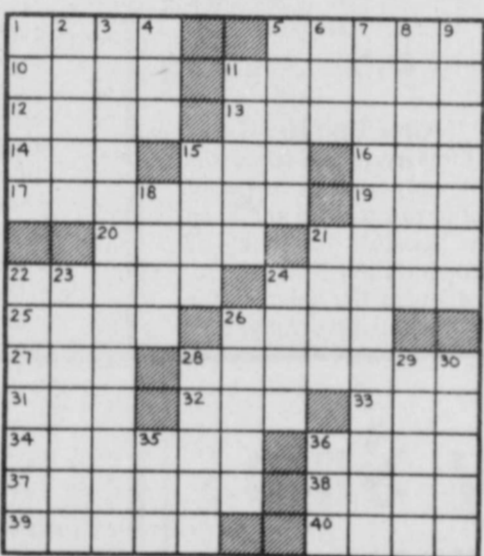

# Ten Outstanding Women To Be Honored

Ten outstanding women from the East Texas area will be honored April 8 when they will be presented the first East Texas Women's Distinguished Service Award.

The open-ended nomination form requires the sponsoring organization to provide a narrative of the nominee's outstanding business, professional or volunteer accomplishments.

# Widows, Widowers May Qualify For Special Tax Benefit

A taxpayer who became a widow or widower in 1978 or 1979 may be entitled to a special tax benefit. The benefit allows the taxpayer to use the "Married Filing Jointly" Tax Table or a Tax Rate Schedule in computing the tax liability, a tax rate

significantly lower than those in the "Single" category.

To qualify for the benefit, the taxpayer (1) must have been entitled to file a joint return with the deceased spouse for the year of death, even if one was not actually filed; (2) must have a child or stepchild who qualified as a dependent; and (3) must have furnished over half the cost of maintaining a home which was the principal residence for the dependent child or stepchild for the entire year.

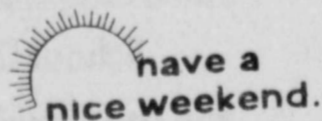

## BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Bathtub Treatment Can Refurbish Lampshades

Can lampshades be cleaned? Except for being soiled, they are in good condition.

"Don't junk it...dunk it" could be the motto of the homemaker who finds her lampshades need refurbishing.

Many lampshades are washable, especially those made of fabric that is sewn, not glued, says Charlotte Womble, N.C. State University. Remove any colored trim or trim that is on before you try to wash a lampshade by the following methods. Then fill the bathtub or sink with enough warm water to cover the shade. Add detergent and swish to dissolve. Vacuum the shade inside and out to remove surface dirt. Then dunk the shade in the water and move it from side to side and up and down. If soil is stubborn, you may need to rub with a well lathered, soft-bristled brush. Rinse shade in several changes of clean water. Dip up and down.

Dry the shade by tying a string to the middle of the frame. Then hang up over the bathtub or from a clothesline outdoors to drip dry. Or pat dry with a bath-towel.

Plastic, plastic coating or parchment shades may be cleaned with a sponging of thick suds. To rinse, wipe with a damp cloth and dry with a clean cloth.

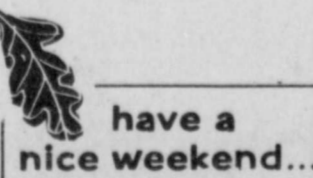
