## Kickbacks Do Not Involve Local Commissioners

Recent allegations concerning kickbacks paid to some 20 county commissioners in East Texas will apparently not involve Pct. 1 (Bogata) commissioner Bruce Scott and former commissioner Earl Humphrey.

Scott took office Jan. 1, 1981, assuming Humphrey's post. Humphrey said Tuesday, March 31, that he never dealt with one of the vendors mentioned, Griffin Lumber Co. of Farris, Okla., and that he ordered most of his culverts by telephone direct from Texas Steel Culverts, and not from the salesman, Dallas Thompson, who has been named in some "Dallas Morning News" articles as a vendor involved in the illegal activity.

The alleged kickbacks, which a copyrighted story in the March 27, 1981 issue of "The News," said were under investigation by the FBI, were paid by vendors to some 20 county commissioners in Bowie, Cass, Red River, Titus and other Texas counties from 1977 through 1980. Apparently 10 percent of the cost of culverts, lumber and other road materials bought from the vendors was paid back to the commissioners in return for buying the items from the vendors. According to the story in "The News" indictments are expected within two months under the federal anti-racketeering statute.

Although some of the com-

missioners and vendors have been called to testify before a federal grand jury in Tyler, Scott and Humphrey said they had not been contacted by the FBI about the case.

"I fought these ideas when I was running for office," Scott said Tuesday, "and against doing private work with county equipment. I just don't think it's right."

"The first I knew about an investigation was after we (the commissioners) returned from Austin and Mary (Hausler, Red River County Clerk) told me the FBI had been there investigating everybody," Scott said.

Humphrey said he did not want to buy materials out of Oklahoma, but that Mrs.

(Dorothy) Griffin came by the Precinct Barn in Bogata one day and left a note for him to call. "I never called her," Humphrey added. "We

thought Dallas Thompson owned the culvert business," Humphrey commented, "but it turned out he was just a salesman. I think his grand-

son is vice president (of Texas Steel Culverts). When I needed culverts, I just picked up the phone and called them in Arlington and

ordered them direct. I kept a running inventory of the materials on hand and records of where they were used in a little brown book."

Humphrey said he didn't think a central purchasing agent for the county would work any better than each commissioner buying his own supplies, because of the problem of keeping the purchasing agent in the clear.

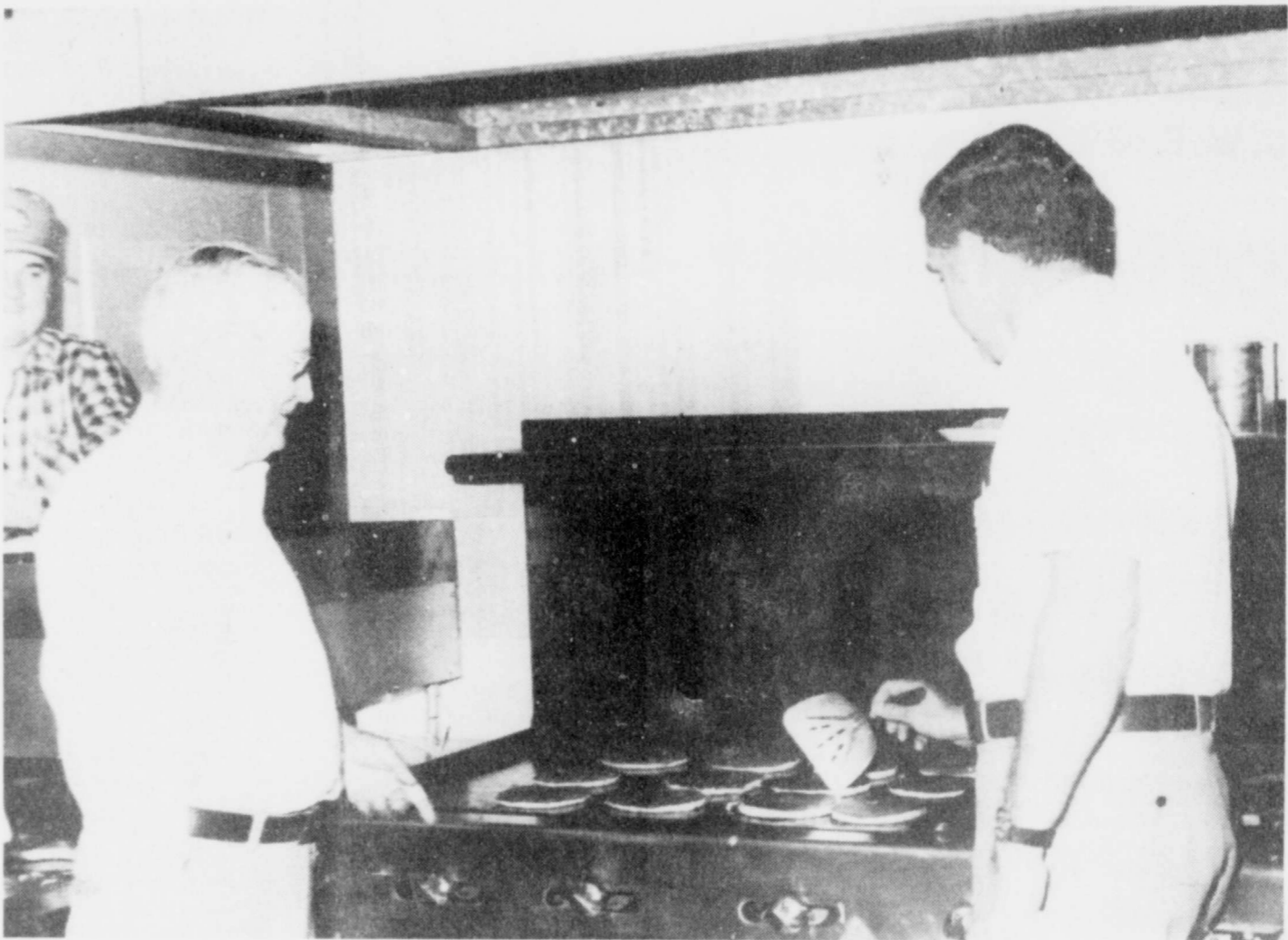
Bishop was raised in Bogata and upon his retirement, moved back to his home town. He wants to

## Rivercrest J.H. Girls Place Sixth At M.V. Track Meet

The Bogata Junior High girls track team placed sixth in a field of 12 teams at the Mt. Vernon Invitational Track meet on Saturday, March 28. The team accumulated 39 points through competition at the meet.

In the high jump two members of the team placed. Carla Belcher earned a second place honor with a jump of 4'6", and L. McGee took third with a jump of 4'6".

Miss Belcher returned in the long jump for another second place post with a jump of 14'5 1/2". Her teammate, Mary Savage earned a sixth place position with a jump of 13'9 1/2".

Miss Savage also earned a fourth place honor in the triple jump competition with a jump of 28'.

The 200 meter dash saw Miss Belcher in the placements again with a time of 29.51 to earn a fifth place position.

Both the 800 and 1600 meter relay teams from Bogata placed in the competition. The 800 meter relay team placed fourth with a time of 2:02.22, and the 1600 meter team placed sixth with a time of 5:06.62.

Paul Pewitt won the meet

in the junior high division with a total of 124 accumulated points.

Other teams, their final ranking in the competition and the total number of points accumulated are as follows: Clarksville, second, 76; Linden-Kildare, third, 74; Rains, fourth, 63; Blossom,

fifth, 45; Mt. Vernon, seventh, 38; Jefferson, eighth, 20; Como-Pickton, ninth, 16; Quitman, tenth, 15; Winnsboro, eleventh, 11; and Deport, twelfth, six.

The District 13AAA teams, including Deport, Blossom, Pittsburg, Clarksville, Winnsboro, Mt. Vernon and

North Lamar, will be returning to Mt. Vernon today to participate in the district track meet competition. Preliminaries will begin at 9 a.m.; field events will follow at 11:30 a.m.; and finals in the track events will begin at 1 p.m.

not the result of any long-term investigation.

## Landry Cleared Of Charges

Fred Neal Landry of Clarksville was cleared Friday, March 27, 1981, of charges that he and Gary Annis of Paris conspired to sell trade secrets from the City of Dallas to Warner Amex Company, the bidder chosen by the Dallas City Council for the cable TV franchise.

Charges were dismissed by the Dallas County District Attorney's office, which Clarksville attorney Jim D.

Lovett said was a "full vindication of Mr. Landry's innocence. His reputation was seriously hurt and he and his family have lived through a nightmare since his arrest last summer."

Annis pleaded guilty a few weeks ago in a Dallas County Criminal Court to Commercial Bribery and received a seven year sentence which reportedly was delayed for adjudication, Lovett continued.

Landry has requested his

attorneys to investigate the true causes that led to his illegal arrest for allegedly stealing documents that had been voluntarily and knowingly furnished to him by Dallas City Manager, George Sharder and his assistant, Camille Barnett, in his graduate management class at the University of Dallas. Those investigations are proceeding and will be concluded in the very near future, Lovett added.

Lovett said "Landry is very relieved to be free from the false dark clouds of accusation, and hopes he and his family can soon resume normal friendships and lifestyle."

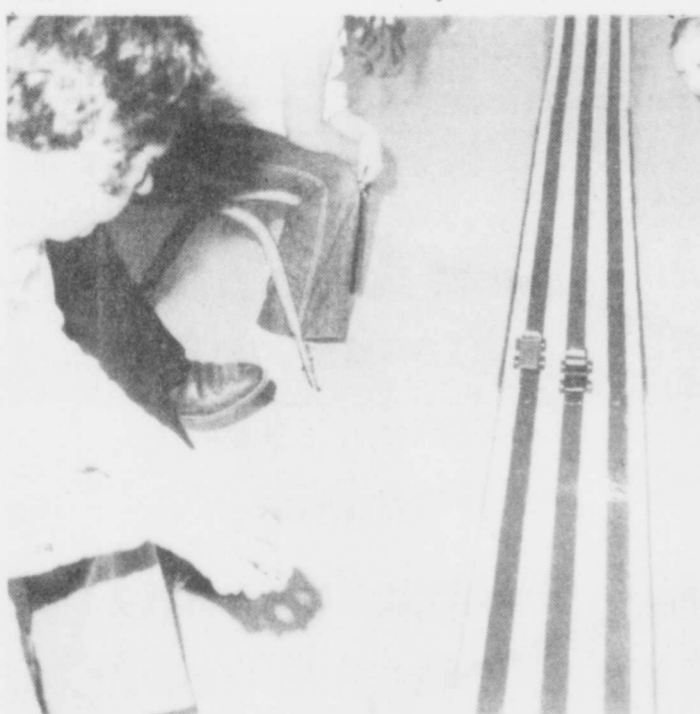

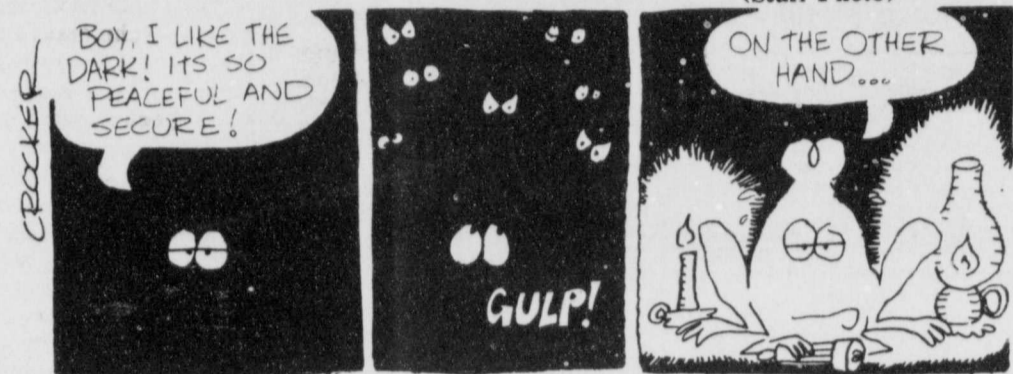

### Weekly Agricultural Update

Spring is traditionally the time of year that people become more concerned with insects and plant diseases. James Chandler, area forestry specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that pine tip moths are beginning to appear in Christmas tree plantations and urges producers to keep a close

watch and apply insecticides at the appropriate time. Dr. George Philley, Extension area plant pathologist, says that now is the time to start spraying roses for diseases. A regular spray schedule should be maintained on roses to prevent severe damage by diseases. Several fungicides are approved for

this purpose. It now appears that a good peach crop is being set in East Texas orchards. Philley urges producers, whether small or large, to maintain a strict spray schedule for both diseases and insects that attack peaches. If the good crop is to be kept on the trees, a regular spraying program must be carried out.

### Agriculture Briefs

Representatives of Celanese Plastics and Specialties Company from Vernon, Texas, will be in Paris on April 9 to discuss with area farmers the production and marketing of Guar. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the County Courtroom located on the second floor of the Lamar County Courthouse.

James W. Stewart, Guar Consultant, and Ken Stephens, Agronomy Manager with Celanese will present the program. Both have many years experience with Guar production and marketing.

According to Stewart, Guar is best suited to the well drained sandy soils of the area. It would be less adapted to the heavy black soils, but even there should produce 700 pounds of beans per acre. Guar is a legume and is almost as good a soil building crop as is soybeans.

It is a warm weather crop and should be planted relatively late in the spring to ensure seed germination. We are looking at a May 15 to June 15 planting period. A rule of thumb says that soils should be at least 70 degrees at planting depth by mid-morning for at least a week prior to planting.

No special equipment is needed for the crop. Most guar is planted using grain sorghum plates which have straight holes. Seed should be inoculated at the time of planting and a fertilizer rate of 10-40-40 should be considered.

The ideal depth is one and one-half to two inches at the rate of six pounds of seed per acre. No special harvesting equipment is needed. Celanese does plan to have a buying station at Telephone, Tx. It is possible that other

points could be established if acreage warrants.

The minimum contract price for No. 1 beans is \$20 per hundred weight. Contracts are available in my office for inspection and company officials will have contracts at the meeting for signing. By signing the contract, the producer agrees to sell all of his guar production to Celanese at the agreed upon price and the buyer agrees to buy all of the producers production. The contract further states that the producer shall be relieved of his obligation to make delivery of crop should it be destroyed by weather, fire or other casualty.

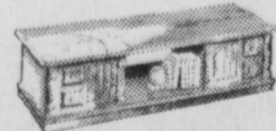

If you want to perk up a meatless meal, make it special by baking muffins. Spread the muffins with butter and top with honey or cinnamon. Cornbread is another good addition to make a meal interesting.

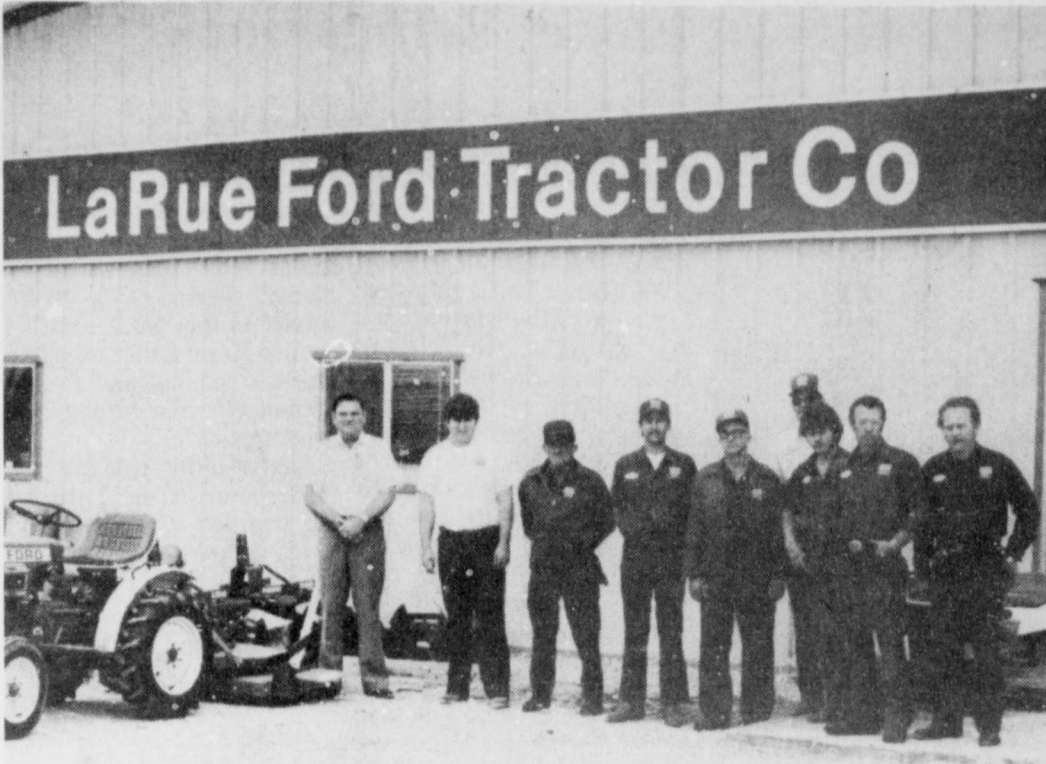

Deport Homecoming in July last year had the opportunity to renew acquaintance with her. Lenna had polio when only an infant. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cube Shuman, was born in Red River County, just east of Deport on a small ranch. After the bout with polio

she had to be tied into her high chair because she couldn't sit up, but slowly with the help of parents who refused to let her think she could not do something, she learned, and grew, and conquered her disability.

Recently she was featured by a Florida paper as a profile in the Easter Seal campaign.

She also is active in trying to see that barriers against the handicapped are removed from restaurants, stores and other business places.

She says that "When you come up against a six inch curb, brother, that's it".

Not many curbs, or anything else have slowed her down though. Tom created a platform with rollers on it, and at home she scoots around the house on it rather than the cumbersome wheel chair.

She keeps their six-room house, cooking cleaning and doing what she likes to do.

She recalls that her father once promised to whip her if she ever used her condition to get sympathy.

Her mother ran the hotel in Deport, once located just west of the Elementary School, but now torn down. Her early training, from her parents and the area folks, left her feeling that life was a challenge to be met, not run from. She has proved that such a challenge can be met, handled and stored away.

Pride and courage played a part in Lenna's conquest over a handicap. Pride and courage she learned from the beginning, here, in this area. Lenna is a remarkable woman, and part of that comes from her roots, which are firmly planted in East Texas.

Traveling to her home town in East Texas proved no obstacle, last year, only joy at seeing old friends, faces and places. For those who saw her again, it was joy at renewing friendship with a wonderful woman, whose courage and cheerfulness can serve as an example to all.

### Special Rules Apply To Divorced Parents

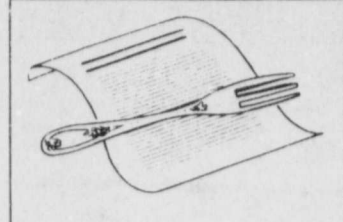
Separated and divorced parents should be aware of special dependency requirements when claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns. A dependency exemption for a child may be claimed only on the tax return of one of the parents. Generally, the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of the year is allowed the dependency deduction, according to the IRS.

Frequently, however, the terms of the divorce or custody decree or other written agreement define which parent may claim the dependent child. Also, if the parent without custody of the child contributes most of the child's support, that parent may generally claim the deduction.

The IRS has two free publications which explain in more detail the guidelines for claiming dependents. Publication 504, "Tax In-

formation for Divorced and Separated Individuals" and Publication 501, "Exemptions," are available by mail using the order form in the tax package, or by calling the IRS Tax Forms information number listed in the local telephone directory.

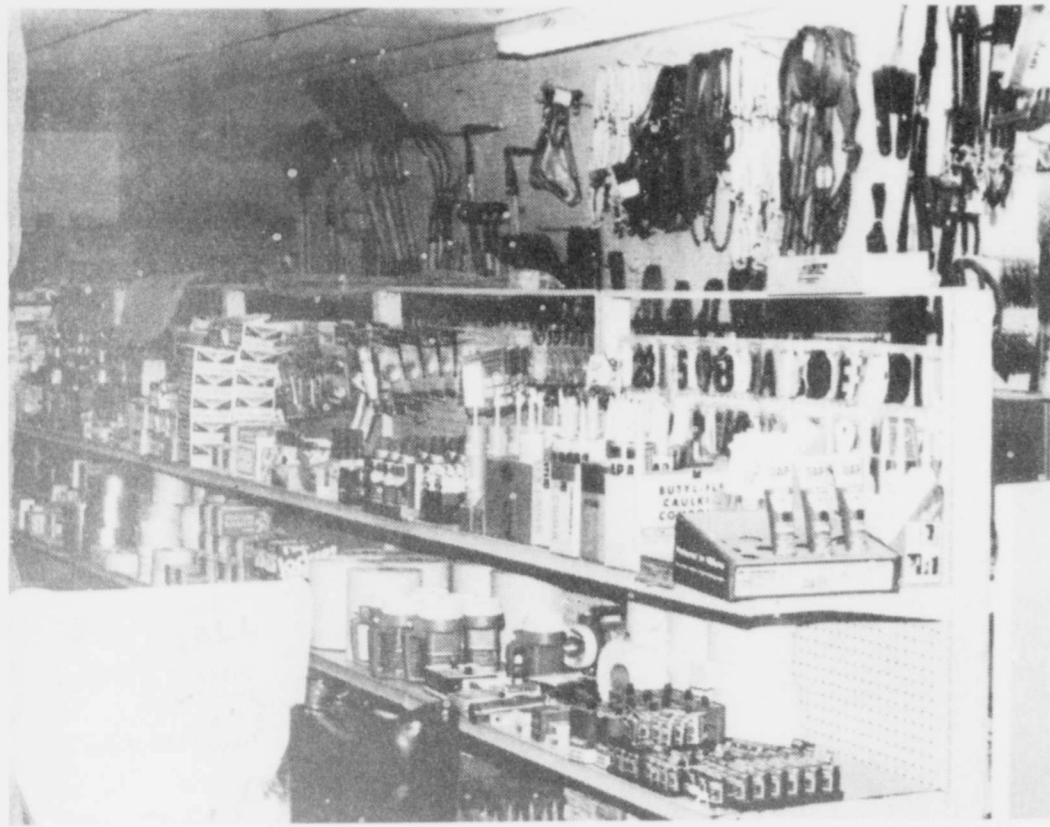

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

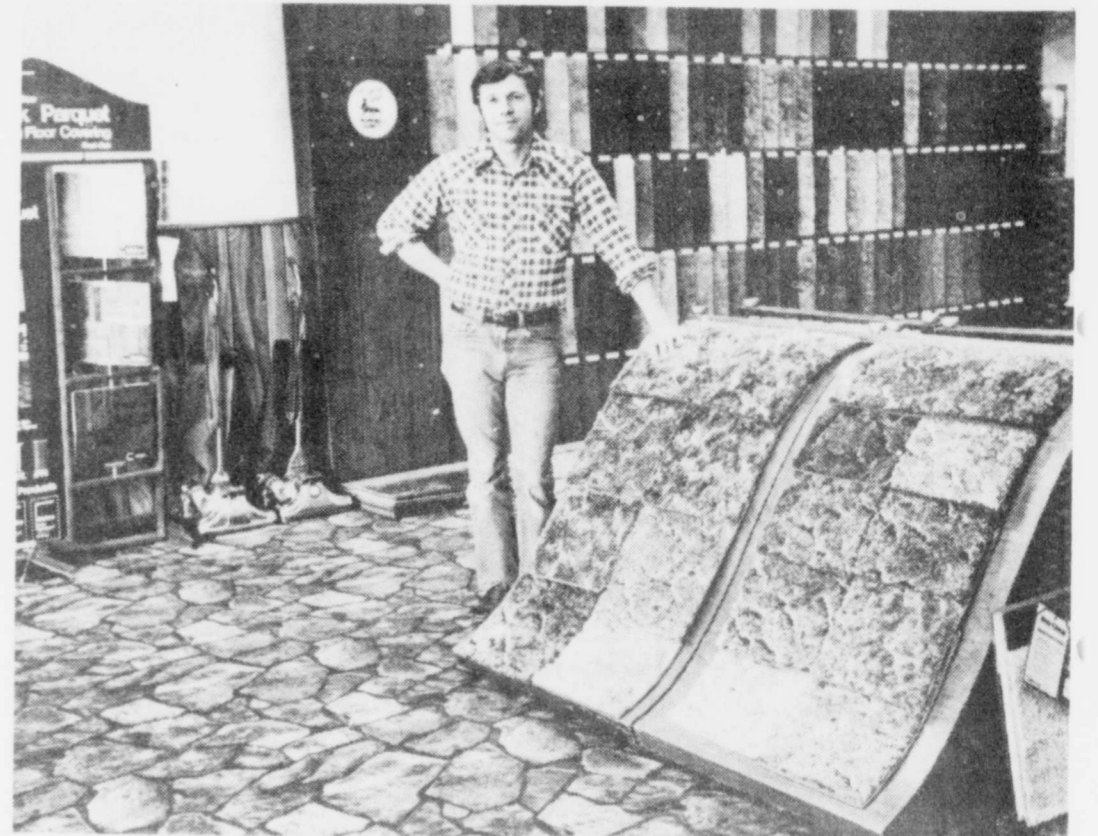
