## Brooks, Jones, Stephenson, Russell Are Elected

In the April 4th trustee election for the Talco-Bogata Schools, the following candidates were elected. De. E.E. Brooks received a total of 140 votes winning a three year term from the Bogata area; Donald Ray (Duck)

Jones received a total of 112 votes winning a three year term from Talco; A.D. Stephenson received a total of 115 votes thus winning the one year term at large. Jerry Russell, running unopposed for a two year

In voting for city councilmen on Saturday, April 4, 54 votes were cast with Travis Hale, and Morris Foster being re-elected and Robert Bishop being the new member. Hale received all 54 votes with the others

trailing only by one or two votes.

Voting was at city Hall with Mrs. Gordon Allen and Mrs. William Rozell as election judges.

## Livestock Show April 11

There will be plenty of activity out at the fairgrounds on Saturday with the annual spring project show and junior livestock show taking place.

This year's spring livestock show is bringing a new look to Red River County. It will be the first annual open show for breeding beef and dairy cattle. An open show is where 4-H'ers and FFA members from other counties can bring their animals and show them. 175 head of cattle are entered at this time, and more are expected on the date of the show.

In the breeding beef classes there will be: Angus Brahman, Brangus, Charolais, Horned Hereford, Polled Hereford, Limousin, Santa Getrudis, Simmental, Snorthorn, Chianina, and various cross-breeds.

In the dairy cattle classes there will be: Jersey, Holstein, Guernsey, and Brown Swiss.

The steer show will feature seven head of steers and will take place after the open show, probably a short time after the noon hour. All interested parties are invited to participate in the steer auction.

In addition to the livestock show, 4-H, FHA and FFA members will display their various projects. The projects will vary from clothing and canning to forestry and woodworking to

livestock. The projects will be awarded ribbons by two judges. These projects will be on display in the new exhibit building and in the livestock barn.

The public is encouraged to come and view the activities of the day, and there will be concession stands open that 4-H and FFA members will be operating. The livestock show will begin at 10:00 a.m. and public viewing at the project show begins at 11:00 a.m.

Highway Patrolman Steve Blake of Mount Vernon was called Friday morning to the scene of an accident on FM 71, one and one-half miles west of Talco, involving a vehicle driven by Richard Swarts.

Tulsa, Ok., hit a rain slicked bridge in White Oak bottom, causing Goforth to lose control, sideswiping the left side of the bridge, coming to a halt with the left front of the car receiving heavy damage. Goforth was not injured.

## Talco Elections Hold No Surprises

Two incumbents were re-elected to the Talco-Bogata School board and two others elected last Saturday.

Representing Bogata for a three year term will be Dr. E.E. Brooks with 140 votes. Representing Talco will be Donald Ray "Duck" Jones with 112 votes.

A.D. Stephenson with 115 votes will be the one-year at-large candidate. Jerry Stansell of Talco totaled 108 votes.

Jerry Russell was unopposed for the two-year unexpired term for Talco representative on the board.

In the City elections, Joe B. Morse was returned as Talco's mayor in his unopposed race. Morse totaled 94 votes in the

election. Leo Roberts was returned as alderman with 86 votes and John F. Cook replaced incumbent Morris Ellis Brown 70 votes to 31 votes.

### Errors Are Avoidable

Many of the errors that delay tax return processing, slow refund checks, and inconvenience taxpayers are avoidable, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The most common math error on both forms last year was incorrectly reporting the tax table for their filing status, following the line for the wrong income level, and looking under the incorrect column for number of exemptions for that taxpayer.

Other common errors on tax returns are not using the peel-off label and instead

writing incorrect or illegible social security numbers, only one signature on a joint return, failure to attach W-2's, "Wage and Tax Statements," and failure to attach supporting forms and schedules.

He was a retired carpenter and a member of Green Hill Methodist Church.

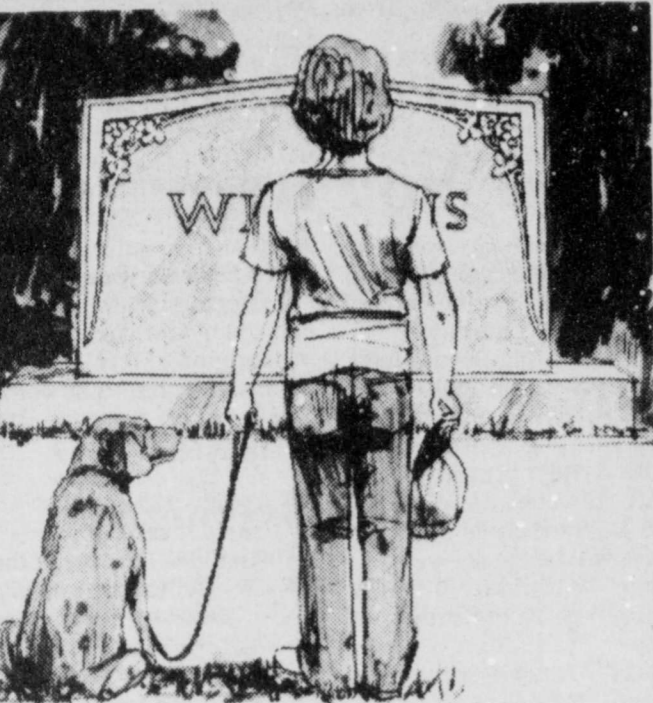

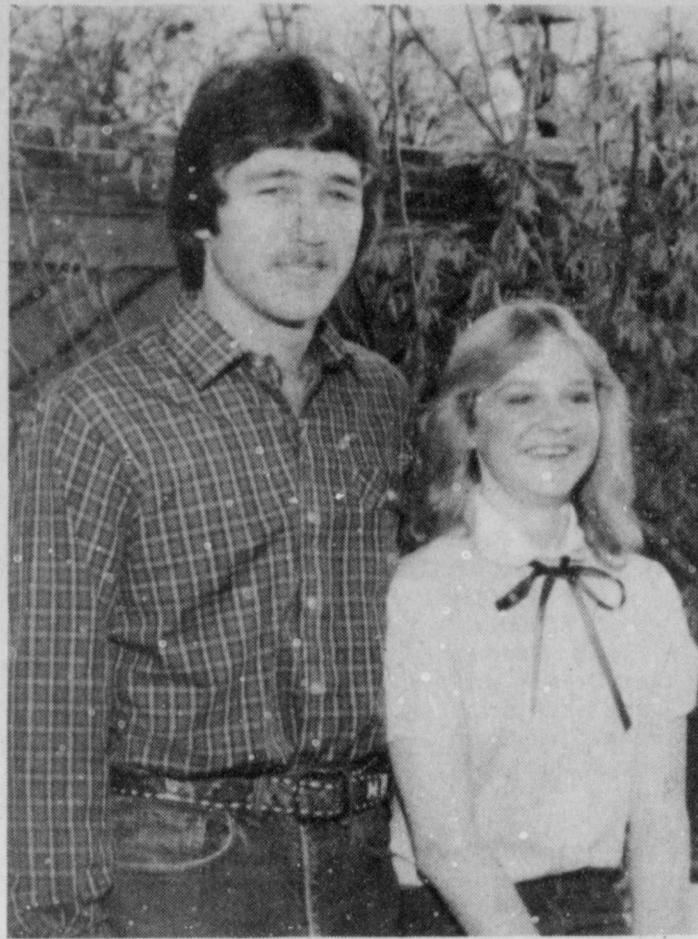

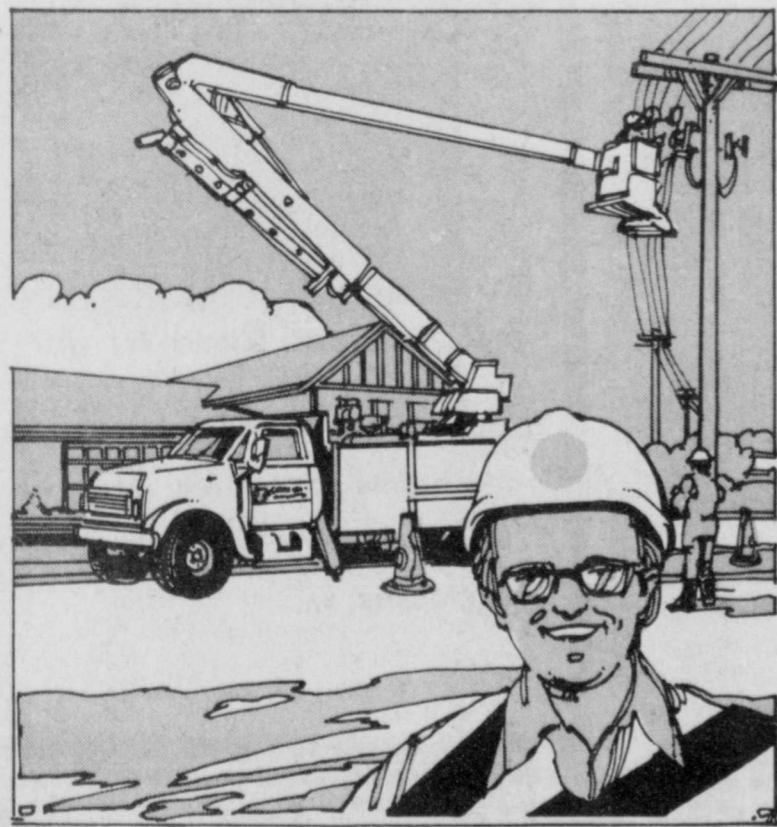

### Contributions Qualify As Tax Credit

Taxpayers making contributions to a political candidate in 1980 may take up to \$100 as a tax credit on their joint return. The credit is one-half of the amount contributed, up to the maximum of \$50 on a single return or \$100 on a joint return and may be claimed on either the Form 1040 or 1040A.

To qualify for the credit, the contributions must be made to (1) candidates for nomination or election to a federal, state or local office in a general, primary or special election, (2) a committee sponsoring such candidates, (3) national, state or local committees of a national political party or, (4) newsletter funds of an official or candidate.
