## Waste Dumping Has Many Aspects

Ron Weddell, a Texas Utilities Generating Co. (TUGCo) environmental specialist from Fairfield, expressed confidence Thursday in the ability of the Texas Department of Water Resources (TDWR) to adequately monitor and inspect any chemical dump site located within the state.

TDWR has already been granted authority to administer Phase I of an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) plan which governs the storage, transportation, treatment and disposal of hazardous waste, Weddell said, with every indication positive

that TDWR will also be given authority to administer Phase II of the plan, not yet finalized.

"I have a lot of faith in their integrity and their ability," Weddell said. "There are extremely competent people in Kilgore (the area enforcement office for TDWR)."

Weddell also expressed doubt that the hazardous waste generated by the TUGCo plant would be disposed of in a Red River County chemical dump site proposed by Chem-Security, Inc., a Bellvue, Washington based industrial waste disposal company. All of TUGCo's hazardous

waste, Weddell said, is contracted to a disposal site in Robstown, Tx. The plant generates about three large dumpsters of hazardous waste a year, according to Rob Trimble, assistant fuel superintendent for the Winfield plant.

Core drilling already completed and additional core drilling will be the primary information TDWR will consider in the granting of a permit to Chem-Security, Weddell commented, along with the flood plain.

"The primary issue will be ground water," Weddell said, "because that's where the emphasis is right now."

system described by Chem-Security spokesmen as a 600'x200'x40' trench lined with impervious clay will probably not be allowed by TDWR, Weddell observed, unless it has a leachate detection system. The leachate system could consist of a layer of clay, then a layer of sand, covered with still another layer of clay. The sand layer would be the leachate, and would drain to a sump, which would be monitored, Weddell said.

"It's a low-risk situation," Weddell commented, "providing for the earliest possible detection."

"TDWR requires the leachate system even in non-

hazardous sites," Weddell observed, "such as the sites at our generating plants." (TDWR requires non-hazardous solid waste disposal sites be located at all electric generating facilities.)

Four agencies within the state deal with hazardous waste, Weddell continued, TWDR, the state health department, the Railroad Commission and the Texas Air Quality Board. The Railroad Commission, the federal Department of Transportation and EPA all regulate the transportation of hazardous waste.

"The people of Mt. Vernon would be shocked to know

what hazardous materials are already being transported through town," Weddell said.

Jay Snow, an officer with TDWR, said Friday, May 15 that he felt that the responsibility for issuing permits would be transferred soon to state governments because of the changes in agency funding in Reagan administration policies. Snow felt that the state agency would be adequately funded, however, because additional federal money will become available when the state governments take over the programs.

## 4-H'ers Sponsoring Energy Literature

4-H'ers from the Midway 4-H club will sponsor an Energy Conservation and Community Service Campaign until May 30. They will be distributing free energy conservation literature and a free shower flow control valve. They will also offer a packet of electrical outlet and switch insulators for sale.

The water flow control valve is a small plastic valve that is easily installed by unscrewing the shower head, inserting the valve and then returning the shower head. A shower can use up to 12 gallons of water per minute. The flow controller reduces the flow to three gallons per minute without reducing the water pressure. By installing the valve, the home owner can save \$30-\$100 per year depending on whether there is a gas or electric hot water heater in use.

The outlet and switch in-

stallating gaskets offered for sale are used to cover holes cut in walls for electrical

outlets and switches. If seals in a home are faulty, air leaks through the outlets and switches thus increasing utility costs. To install the gaskets, remove the outlet and switch plates, place the gaskets on top of the hole and return the plate covers. The installation of the gaskets can save a home owner \$20 per year. The gasket packets are being sold by the Midway 4-H club for \$2.50.

## Ambulance Service Offering Six Month Renewals

Red River Ambulance Service is now selling memberships for six-month renewal. Those who are currently six-month subscribers, have until May 31, 1981 to renew. For those who are not members, now is the time to subscribe for immediate coverage.

Six-month memberships are offered to families for \$25 and to individuals for \$15. A member's mileage benefit is 75 miles. This means that a member receives the first 75 miles free and is charged one dollar per mile for any miles over the first 75 miles of each trip. Mileage is figured from the point of pick up to destination. Six-month memberships are effective immediately upon purchase and expire on November 30, 1981.

In addition, for those who would like to have their memberships expire annually on May 31, the Board of Directors of Red River Ambulance Service, has decided to offer annual memberships during this six-month renewal drive. This allows those who are renewing to pay the annual rate and have their next

renewal date May 31, 1982 rather than November 30, 1981. Choosing this option, gives the advantage of subscribing to the ambulance service at our current rates. Annual memberships are also effective immediately and are offered to families for \$50 and to individuals for \$30.

Business and industrial firms may purchase memberships to cover employees while at work, going to and enroute home from work, and anyone requiring ambulance service while on the premises. These memberships are available on the following scale: 1-50 employees for \$100; 51-100 for \$150; and 101 or more for \$200. School districts may purchase memberships based on the same scale determined by the number of students in the district.

Charges for non-members are as follows: Base pick up charge \$60 plus \$1.50 per mile from point of pick up to destination.

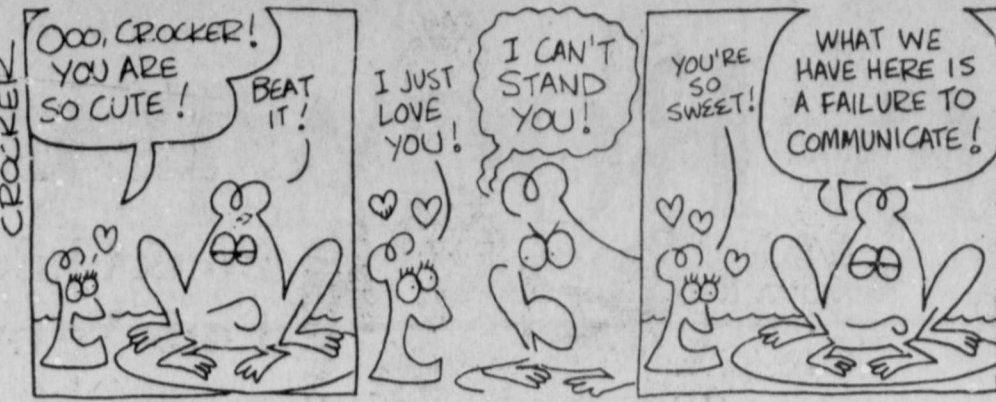

### Bond Sales Announced

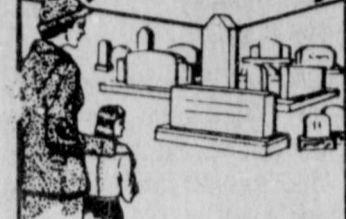

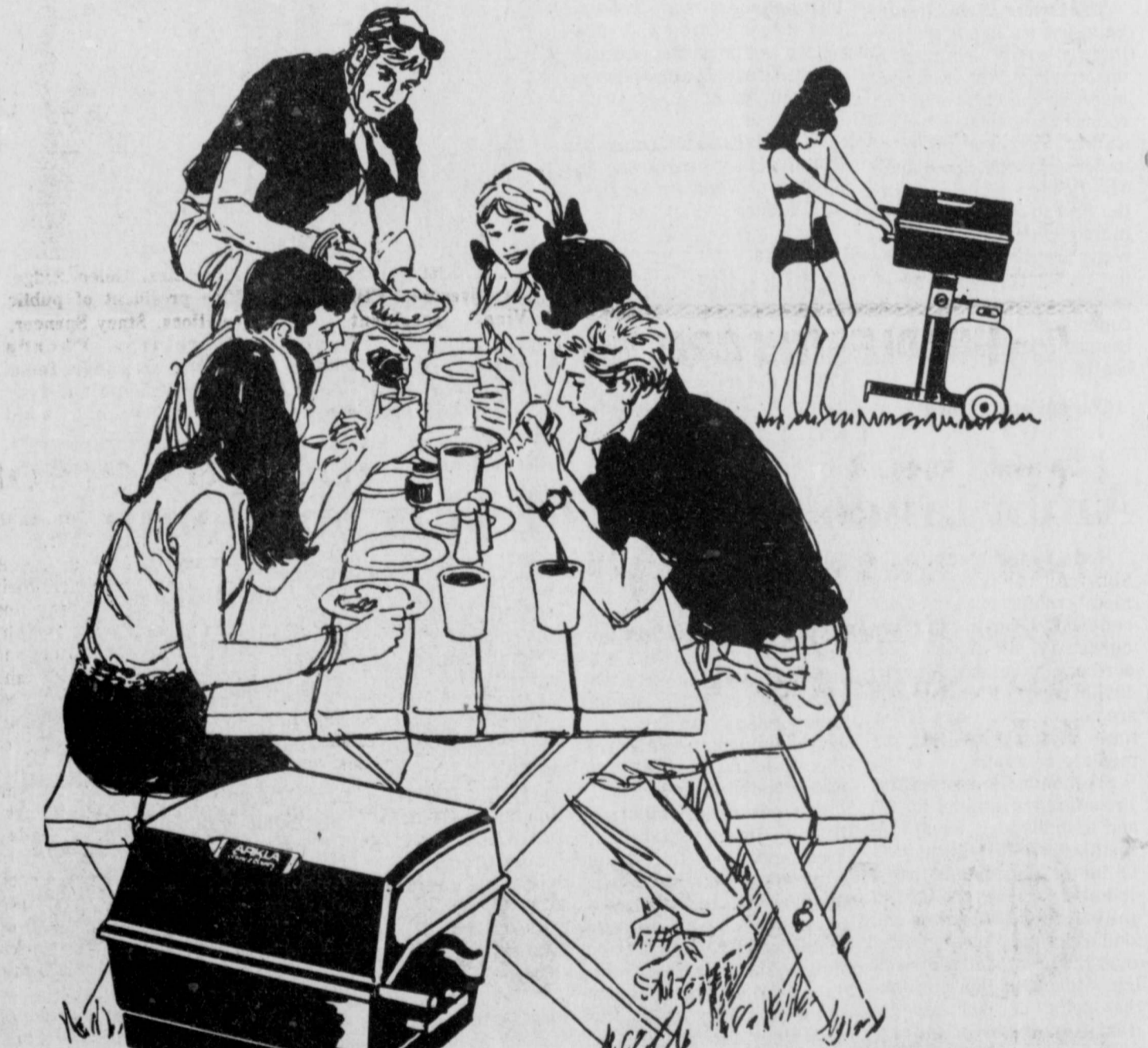
#### James H. Lawson

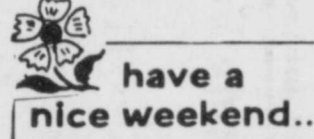
