## Champions Entering Bogata Rodeo Team Roping

Sonny Shankles, the current Team Roping Champion in the Central Rodeo Association, will be a contestant in the local Bogata rodeo June 25, 26, and 27. The performances are scheduled for 8:30 p.m. on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings. Shankles, who comes from Overbrook, Okla., has been rodeoing for most of his life and now teams up with his

son Kent in the heading and heeling event. The Shankles team have been team roping in the CRA Association for the last six years. Sonny was the champion in 1977 and Kent was the champion in 1978. Kent was also "The Worlds Junior Team Roping Heeler" in 1980 and Sonny won the championship in 1980. With Sonny's style and ability coupled with Kents accuracy in "Heeling", the

father and son team are looking for another championship in 1981. Both Kent and Sonny will be entered at the Bogata rodeo. Team roping, sometimes called "headin and heelin", is directly related to its Mexican ancestry in that neither competitor is allowed to tie his rope to the saddle horn. Each roper must make his catch and then take a wrap around his

saddle horn with the rope. The wrap is called a "dolly". Team roping like all times events, is started from behind a barrier. This gives the steer a head start and a penalty is added if the cowboy breaks the barrier. The first roper is called the "header" and he tries to catch steer around the horns and turn him so the second roper, called a "heeler", can catch the two back heels.

The team roping event is a great contest to watch as it involves three animals and two cowboys. Close cooperation is a must between the cowboys and horses and accuracy and ability along with a pair of excellent horses is what it takes to be a champion. Team roping will be one of the events at the Bogata Rodeo.

### Top Calf Roping Champ To Appear At Rodeo

Leslie Jenkins, Rookie of the Year in 1979 and Champion Calf Roper in 1980, will be one of the champions in the Central Rodeo Association featured at the Bogata rodeo June 25, 26, and 27. Leslie hales from Moon, Okla., 20 miles east of Idabel. He started his career as a team roper pairing with his dad J.W. Jenkins and brothers, Steve and Ronny. He started Calf Roping at age 16 and continued to excel until he became the CRA Champion in 1980. At the CRA Finals held in Sulphur Springs, Texas, Leslie placed in three of the four go rounds. He won a third, second, and first and also won the Average and won the Championship by \$200 over second place calf roper Wade Matheson. Jenkins also competes in the team roping and finished the year in fourth place. This,

with his calf roping money, put him in second place for the All Around only \$1.12 behind the leader Mike Fletcher.

Calf Roping is one of the real cowboy events and is a race against time. Perfect coordination between horse and rider is a must in this event. The calf roping contest starts with the fast running calf having ten feet head start on the horse and roper. After roping the calf, the cowboy comes off his horse running. He must throw the calf down by "ligging" or "flanking" and then tie three legs so the calf cannot kick loose. He signals his completion by raising his arms over his head. Average times for a good run are 8, 9, 10, or 11 seconds. Make your plans now to attend the Bogata rodeo and see calf roping at its best.

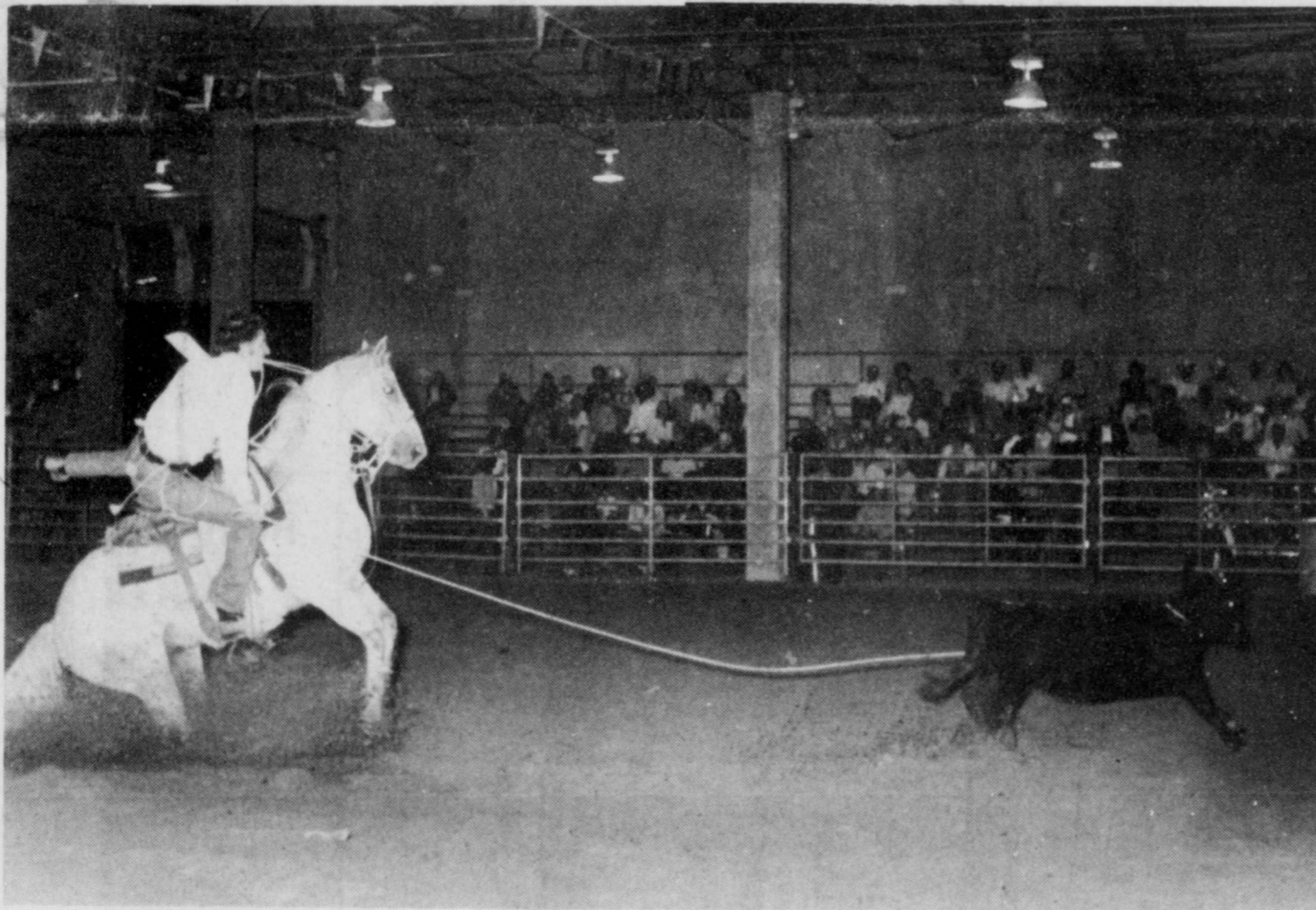

With our long wet spell there has been a definite increase in an old childhood past time, namely, crawfishing.

Small boys and girls can be found almost anywhere diligently plying their salt pork and string down crawfish holes, hoping to pull out the granddaddy of all crawfish.

One small boy has brought a new dimension to the sport.

After a heavy rain he stationed himself in the ditch below a concrete drain and with his mother's strainer, was catching crawfish from less than an inch long to several inches long. Now whether his mom knew about the strainer, who could say!!

Is there a native of this area that didn't wade the ditches and fish the holes in their bare feet at one time or another?

Although very few kids

seem to find a use for the clawed critters after capturing them, the fascination of the past time is undeniable.

Apparently the crop of crawfish is equal to the crop of children this year, and sometimes one can catch a wistful, longing look on the face of adults as they send their youngsters off with kite, string, a nail or staple and some bacon or salt pork. ## TABS Test Results Presented

Results of the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABs) taken by third, fifth, and ninth grade students in February were presented at the June 9 meeting of the Talco-Bogata School Board.

Talmadge Morgan, superintendent, presented the itemized results with an analysis of what they may mean for future planning. He was assisted by members of the administrative staff, Donna McBrayer and Bonnie Huddleston.

Students were tested to determine mastery of minimum basic skills in math, reading, and writing in the statewide assessment now required under Senate Bill 350 passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

At the ninth grade level, 88 percent of the Rivercrest students showed mastery in math, 80 percent showed mastery in reading and 93 percent showed mastery in

writing. This years results at the fifth grade level showed marked improvement over 1980 scores with some skills showing as much as 50 percent improvement.

Although the third grade was not tested last year, Mr. Morgan was pleased with this year's test results. Many skills showed mastery above 90 percent.

Results of the TABs testing program will be used to determine needed changes in curriculum, sequence of

teaching, and methods used, according to Ms. McBrayer.

Regional and state results will be available later this summer. While aggregate scores may be reported to the public, individual student results will be released only to the student, parent or guardian, and school personnel directly involved. For more information you may contact your school's principal or your child's teacher at the beginning of the 1981-82 school year.

## Barbara Russell To Coordinate Fibrosis Campaign

Mrs. Barbara Russell has been named to coordinate the Breath of Life Campaign for Cystic Fibrosis in Bogata. The announcement

was made by the North-East Texas Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable degenerative

disease that affects the lungs and the digestive system, is the number one genetic killer of children and young adults in this country. Money raised during the Breath of Life Campaign will be spent in three areas: medical treatment, public education, and research.

Medical therapy, developed through years of research, has raised the average life expectancy of the cystic fibrosis child. Twenty-five years ago, CF children did not live past preschool age. Today, nearly half of those born with CF will live into their twenties.

Public education increases the chances of early diagnosis and treatment. One out of every 20 persons carries a CF gene. For those who inherit CF, early diagnosis is vital since the disease often masquerades as other lung and digestive disorders.

There is no cure at present, but researchers are hard at work on the problem, and their work needs broad public support.

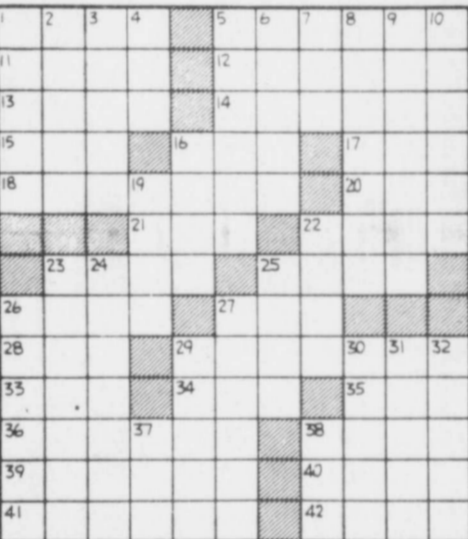

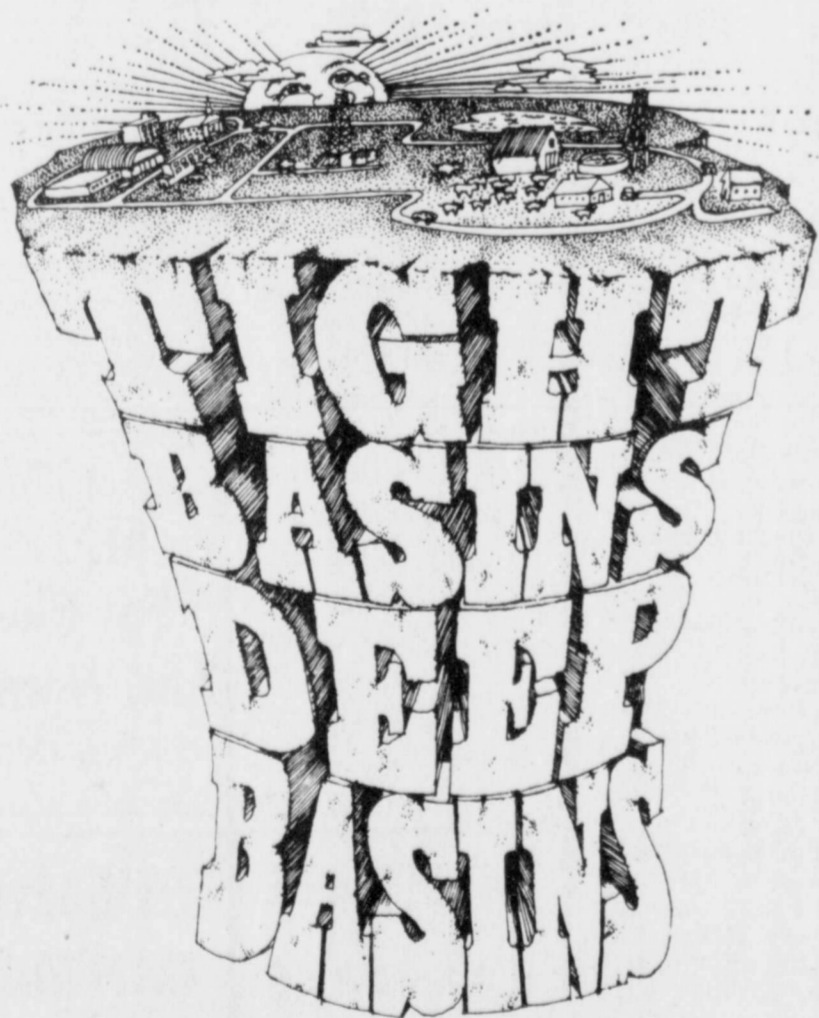

## Footprints From The Past

On a recent trip to Paris I noticed some farmers working and it made me think of the days when I was in my teens and working on the farm.

I never did mind working during the week but when it was Saturday afternoon and everyone else was going to town I wanted to be among them, because back then every one went to town on Saturday afternoon to buy their supplies for the following week. They also visited the people in town.

Spring time was a time of beauty also a time of hard work. As we prepared the land for planting and after that we had to do the planting of the crops that were going to feed us and also to make the money that we had to have to buy our winter clothing (also to pay off out note at the bank) as all the farmers had borrow enough money to make the crop with.

I was working for one of the prominent farmers of the Lone Oak community. We would work all week back in the field and on Saturday afternoon we would have to move to a field close to the main road to work. His son and I told him that he would lay off on Monday just so he could have us to work by the side of the road on Saturday afternoon so the other people who were going to town could see us working and think what a hard worker we were. Anyway, it sure did hurt us to have to

work on Saturday afternoon while everyone else was going to town. We would gripe and fuss about it but we had to do it anyway. I don't think he got a full day's work out of us as we spent a lot of our time watching everyone else who were going to relax and have some fun.

Just as soon as we got to quit, we would hurry and unharness the teams and feed them. Then we would run to the house to draw us some bath water from the well to fill up the No. 2 wash tub so that we could take a bath and go to town or sometimes we would go to one of the country parties that were going on.

We all always had a lot of fun on the weekends as we would get to be with the other young people of the community. Many times people would visit us from other communities as we would visit them.

Every summer some one would always be teaching a singing school in the community as everyone in the country that were going on back then. We had some pretty good singers in those days as that was one of the ways we had of entertaining ourselves. It was a lot of fun. I remember Mr. Sam Monk was a good singer and he would make all the singings. Mr. Monk, Pony Cobgil, Morris Hobbs, and Johnny McMore were very good and to me they were the best quartet that I had ever listened to.

**THE MARKET BASKET**  
**PANTRY PESTS**

Each year, Americans discard thousands of dollars worth of food that has become infested with insects. Several kinds of pantry pests feed on dried food in storage, says Rudy Hillman, extension entomology specialist at N.C.S.U. Pests often enter packages of food as tiny eggs that are undetected when packaged. During storage these eggs hatch and young insects develop. Other pests simply fly in during warm weather. Often you can prevent pantry pests by buying food in small quantities and using it in a short time or you may heat sterilize many dried foods. Simply place them in an oven set at 140-150°F. for 20 or 30 minutes. An alternative is to place the food in a freezer for a week or two. After heating or freezing, place food in airtight containers.
