We finally slogged through the mud until we managed to get her into the barn where it was at least dry. It seemed to me the poor thing visibly re-




Display case donated to Bogata Library/Museum


Bogata residents are urged to take should protect their own pets with the rabies vaccine and be sure the animals wear their tags.

All applications are screened for ligibility.





W.T. Harbison dies November 17

A memorial service for Travis Harbison will ble held Saturday, December 2 at 2 p.m. in the Bogata Community Center.

William Travis Harbison was born May 9, 1917 in Bogata, the eldest child of William Lee and Lizzie Agnes Wright Harbison, both natives of Red River County. His grandfather, Samuel Augustus Harbison, came to Texas as a small boy in the 1870's.

Travis was in high school during the Great Depression and guit school to work and help feed his eight younger brothers and sisters. He joined the U.S. Army at age 17. In 1937, while stationed at Ft. Sill, OK, he met Eva Ivonne Jones and they were married on January 23, 1938. He went to work for English Trucking in Oklahoma City and rejoined the Army after the outbreak of World War II.

While in the army, he was given an IQ test along with 1500 other men on the bast and he scored higher than everyone at Ft. Sill except one Lieutenant. He turned down a chance to attend Officer Candidate School and finished his military career at the end of the war.

Travis and his family lived in Tulsa, OK until his retirement from Santa Fe Trails. He spent 35 years driving a truck long distance covering over two million miles without an accident. He turned down several offers to be promoted to management because he did not want to "give orders" After retirement, he moved back

to Bogata and began his second career as a politician, volunteer and good neighbor. Travis served terms as Mayor of Bogata as well as on the City Council. He was a member of

final quarter.




