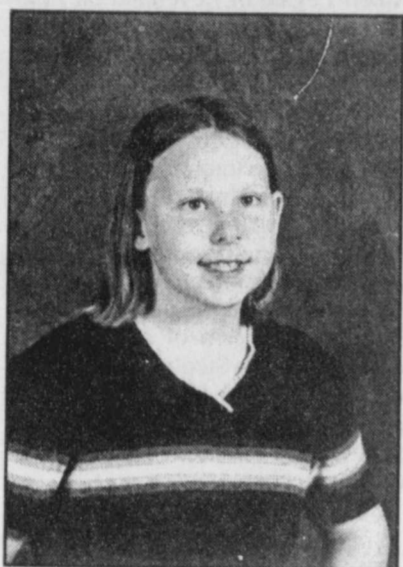

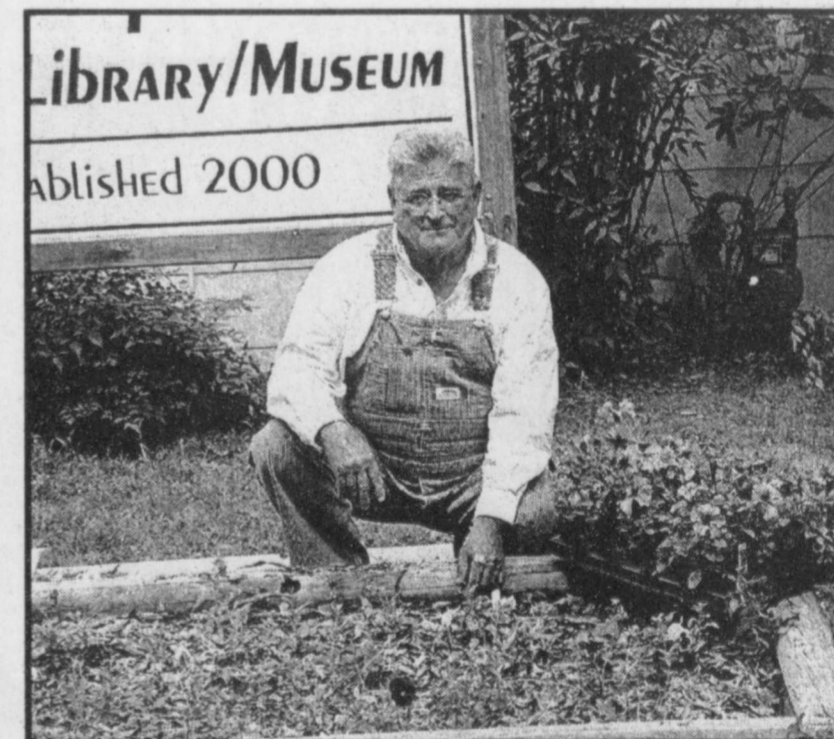
This year RRH Activity Director, Darnell Davis, who had just begun her job at Red River Healthcare last

Thursday, May 31 Della Blanton, Detroit

Homemade Chocolate Syrup
2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa
1 stick margarine
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup Karo syrup
Mix sugar and cocoa. Melt margarine in saucepan, add milk, syrup and dry ingredients. Bring to a rolling boil; boil for two minutes. Serve over plain cake or ice cream.

Apricot Fried Pies
1 package dried apricots
1 jar apricot preserves
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 stick margarine
-2 tablespoons water
For filling: Stew apricots in water until tender. Drain well; mash; stir in apricot preserves. Set aside. For crust: Stir in flour and soda in mixing bowl. Cut in margarine with a pastry blender until coarse. Add water and stir until well mixed. Pinch off a ball of dough and roll onto floured surface. Cut around a small saucer to form a circle. Spoon filling onto half of circle. Dab edges with water; fold over and press with a fork to seal. Fry in hot oil until golden brown. Hint: Make all pies before cooking. The flour tends to burn and you need to get the pies in and out of the oil as quickly as possible.

Roast Beef Burritos
1 beef roast
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon garlic salt
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1 can green chilis
1 cup picante sauce
8 ounces grated cheddar cheese
1 package flour tortillas
Rub roast with flour and seasonings. Brown in hot oil on both sides. Place in roasting pan and bake at 325 degrees until done. 1-2 hours depending on size of roast. Remove from oven; cool and chop; reserve drippings. Make gravy with drippings. Add roast, chilis, picante and cheese. Spoon meat mixture on tortillas and serve.

Monkey Bread
1 cup milk
1 cup margarine-divided
4 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 package yeast
3-1/2 cups flour
Melt 1/2 cup margarine in saucepan. Add milk, sugar, salt and yeast; stir until sugar and yeast dissolve. Place flour in large mixing bowl forming a well in center; pour in liquid and mix well. Place bowl greased with 1 tablespoon cooking oil; turn once; cover with cloth and let rise to double (about 1 hour). Punch down and turn out onto floured surface. Roll out 1/2 inch thick. Cut into squares. Melt remaining margarine and dip squares into margarine. Layer in bundt pan. Let rise again for 30 minutes. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes until golden brown. Hint: Squares can also be dipped into cinnamon-sugar mixture and then butter for added flavor.

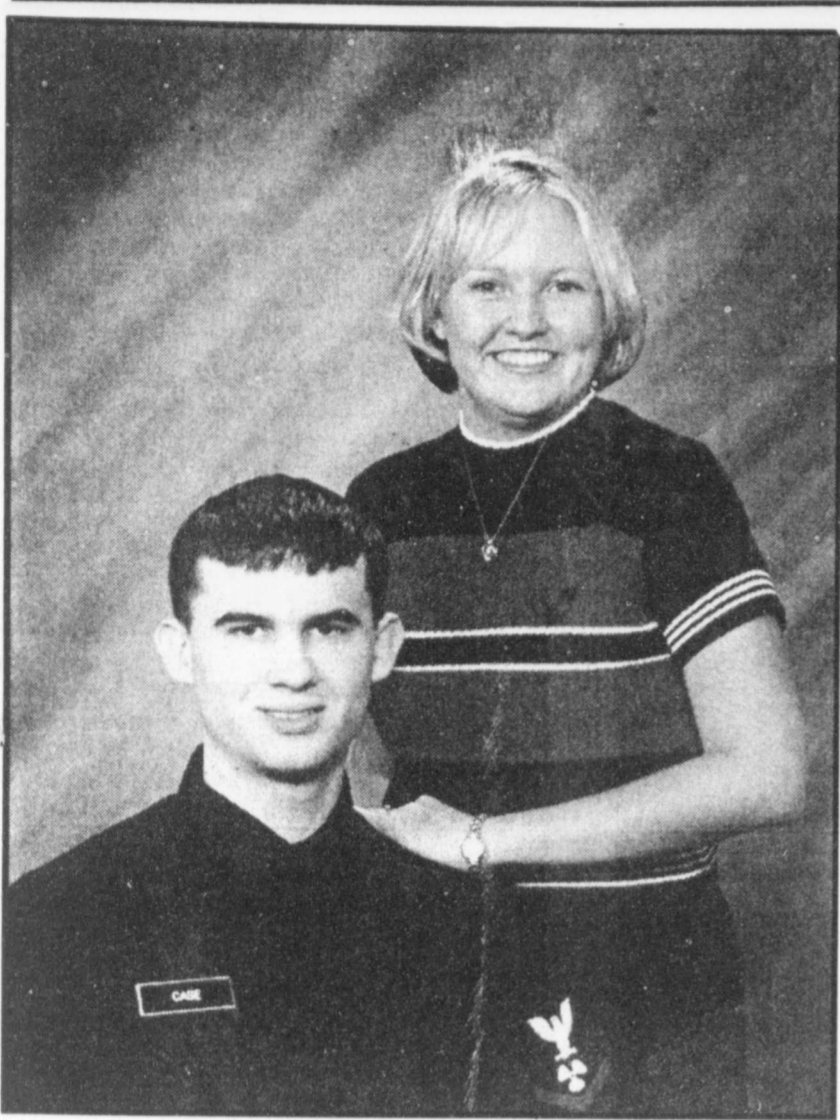

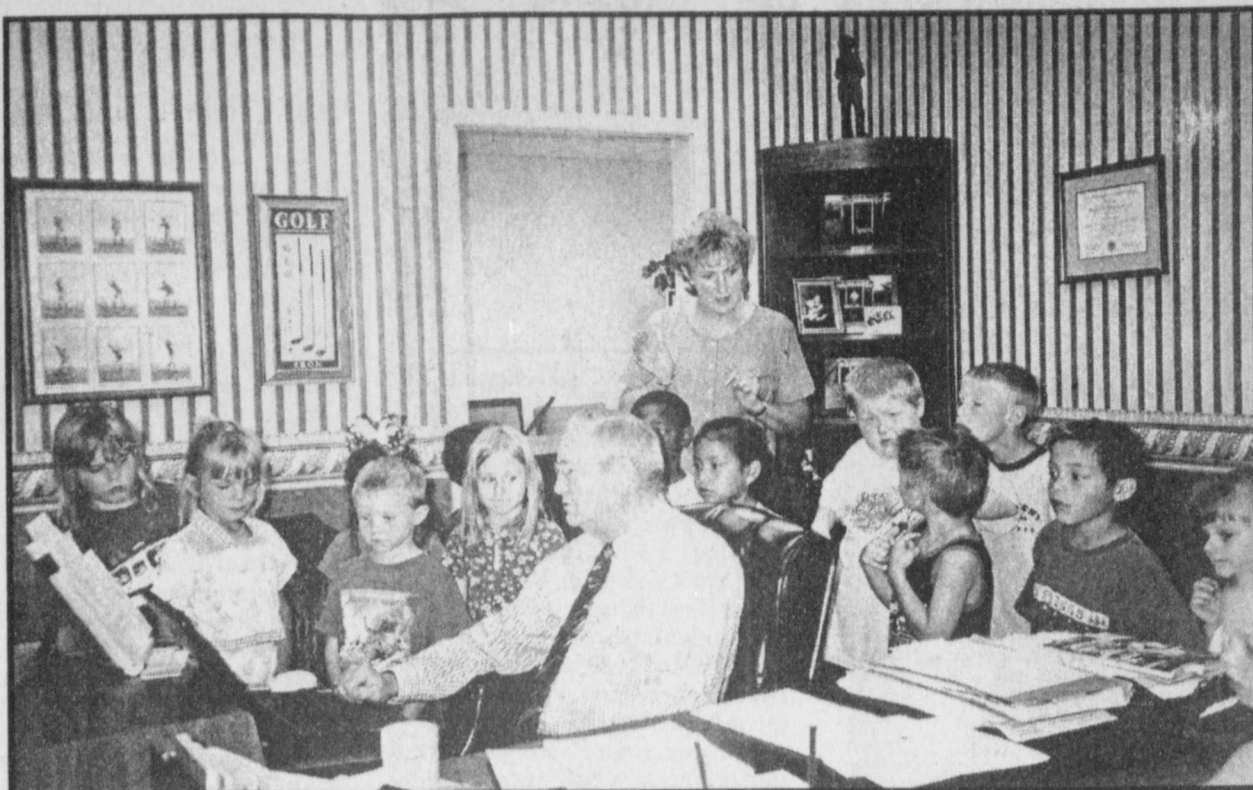

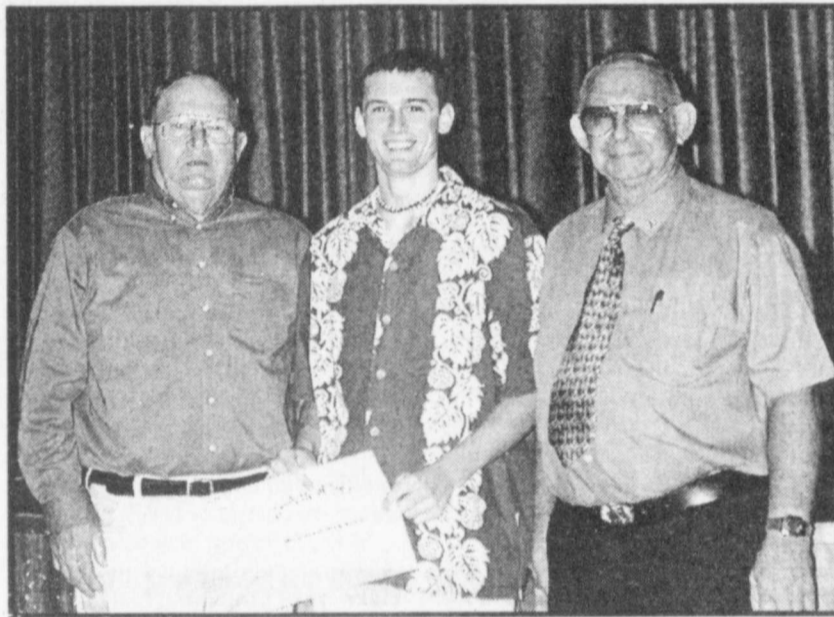

PEER PRESSURE
 We hear a lot about "peer pressure" today. Usually, the contest of such discussions centers upon our teens. Some boyfriend, girl friend or group at school is trying to get "little Johnny" or "little Suzie" to do something that they should not, or not to do something that they should. Now "little Johnny" or "little Suzie" knows what the right thing to do is...but, they want so very much to fit in, and be accepted by their peers, and thus you have "peer pressure".

Brethren, two myths need to be dispelled. Myth #1- "Peer pressure" is a new phenomenon. My friends, "there is no new thing under the sun" (Eccl. 1:9). We may not have always used the label "peer pressure" but the concept is now new. It was in the garden of Eden. Adam was not deceived (1 Tim. 2:4), but it was "peer pressure" to which he succumbed. Thus, this concept is not new. It is, in fact, one of Satan's oldest ploys. Myth #2- "peer pressure" only affects the young. No, on the contrary, it affects adults too. Notice the words of John 12:42-43: "Nevertheless among the chief rulers also many believed on Him (Christ-B.H.); but because of the Pharisees they did not confess Him (Christ-B.H.), lest they should be put out of the synagogue: For they loved the praise of men more than the praise of God. It was "peer pressure" that prompted Pilate's release of Barabbas, and deliverance of Jesus to be crucified (Mark 15:9-15). Peer pressure is a very real thing. It has existed for ages. It affects the young and old alike.

What can be done? (1) We must honestly ask ourselves, "Whose praise and friendship do I want? (2) We must acquaint ourselves with the fact: to compromise truth for the sake of earthly friends is to love those friends more than God (John 12:43), and in fact, is to make oneself an enemy of God (John 14:15, John 15:14; 1 John 2:15-17). (3) We should be selective in choosing our friends (1 Cor. 15:33; Prov. 22:24-25). We should choose friends that will better us and not hinder us in our walks of righteousness (Prov. 27:17). A friend worth having will not seek to influence or pressure us to do evil (1 Cor. 13:6; Prov. 27:5-6). (4) We, as God's people need to have close fellowship one with another, so that members of the church do not feel that they have to look elsewhere for acceptance and love. (2 John 5). (5) We must remember that the true Christian never will be popular with the majority (Luke 6:26; 2 Tim. 3:12; Matt. 10:25). We must accept this. (6) We must remember that even if all on earth reject us, we still have a friend who has promised "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee" (Heb. 13:5; Prov. 18:24).
