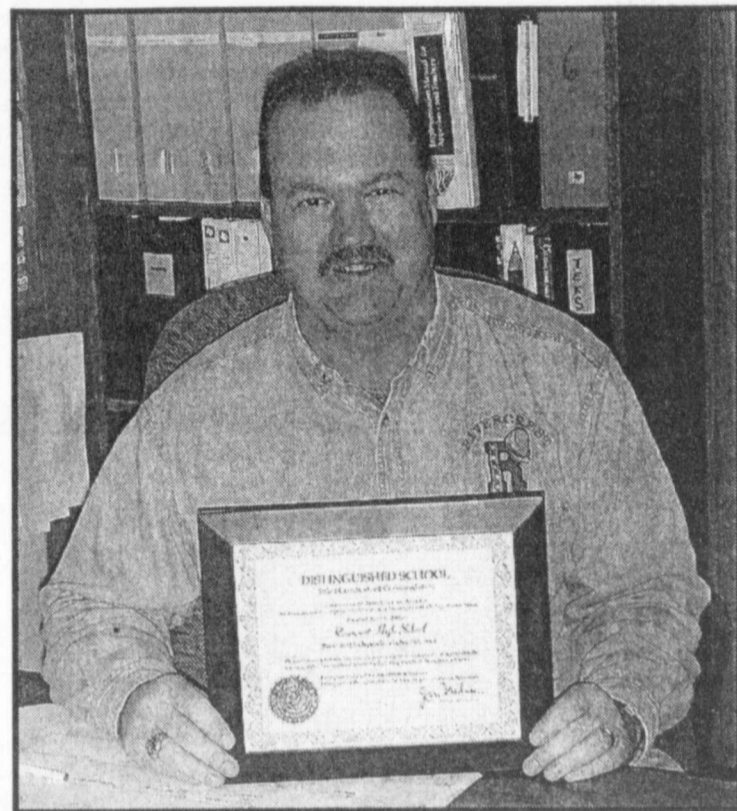

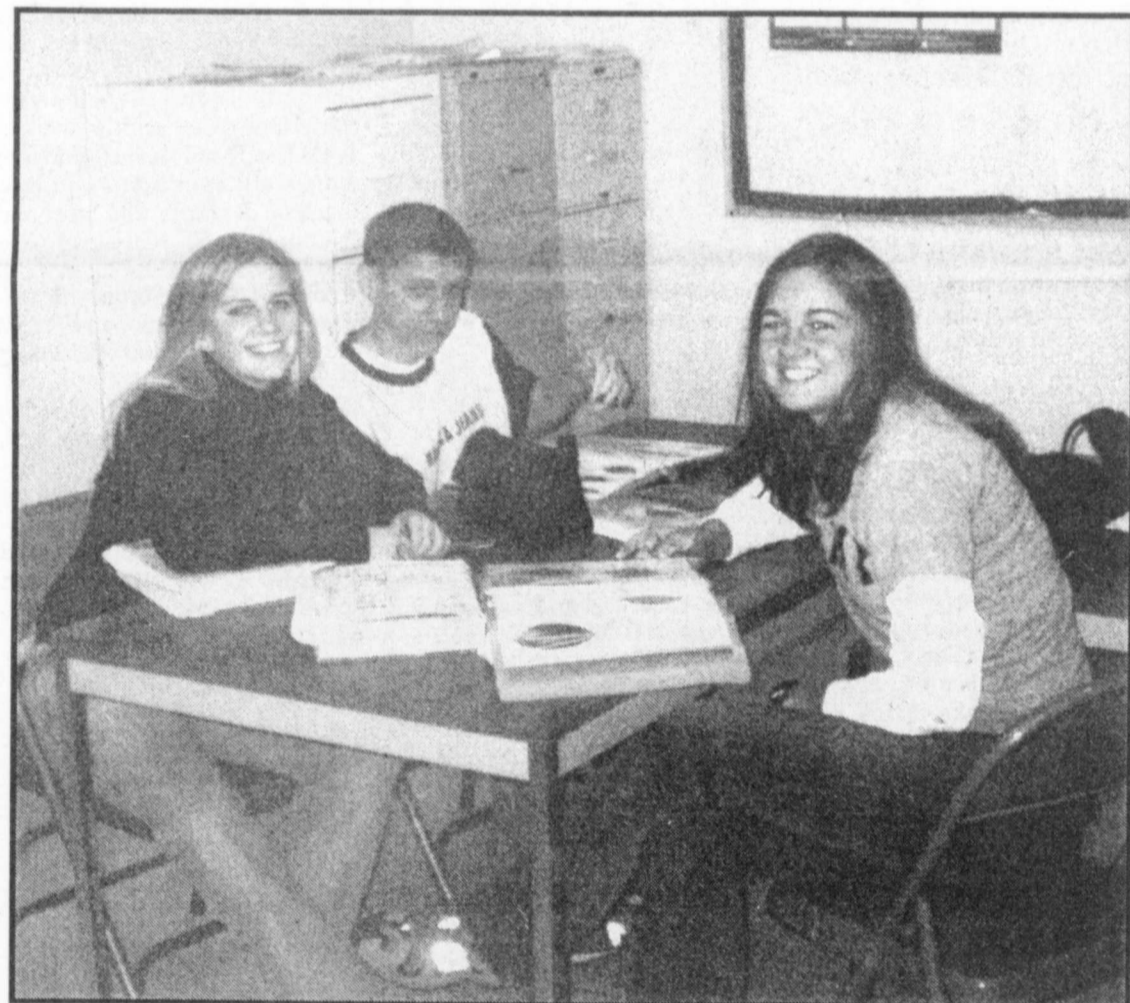

Each candidate will have five minutes to say something positive

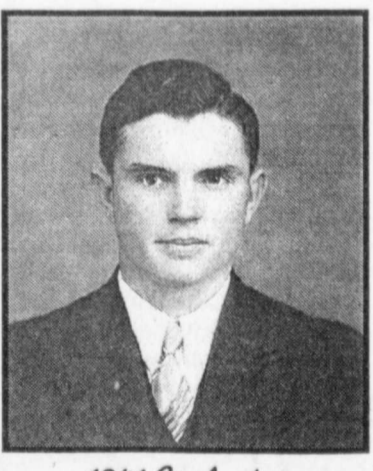
about themselves. The Lions Club is a neutral party in the election. The club wishes to bring the candidates before the community so they can make informed decisions when election day arrives.

Country Cooking

Did you know that history first knew of rice existing back in 2800 B.C.? Coming from China to Greece and also from Persia to the Nile Delta. Several thousand years later, on a stormy night, a ship from Madagascar ran off course and came to rest in Charleston, South Carolina. As a gift of thanks for the harbor, the ship's captain presented a local farmer with some "Golde Seed Rice" (named for its color).

The land was ideal for the milling process of rice and the seed soon spread throughout the Carolinas and Georgia. The Civil War and harsh weather on the East Coast forced the plantations to move west and today the major rice growing states include Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Florida, Missouri and California.

The rice arrives at the mill in its "hull" or shell. The "hull" is discarded and used for fuel in power plants and in various other products. The brown rice kernel is then exposed and the miller can polish off the brown fiber layers and make white rice.

There are three major types of rice. They are long, medium and short grain.

The shorter the grain, the stickier the rice. When brown rice is consumed, it is chewy and has a nutty flavor. Brown rice is recommended by health advocates as a means of vitamins and minerals. Compared to white rice, brown

rice has 250 percent more fiber, Vitamin B6, Folicin, Vitamin E, Magnesium, Phosphorus and Potassium. White rice is the perfect addition to main dishes around the world. Although most of its vitamins and minerals have been polished off the kernel, most white rice is enriched to restore nutritional value.

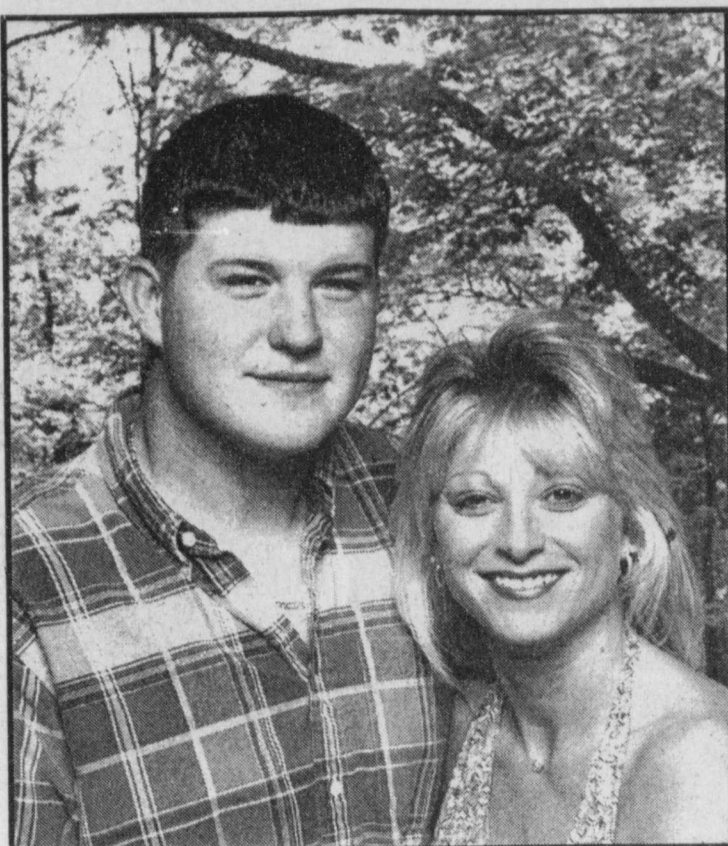

Thursday, February 21 Rice Recipes

Creamy Rice Pudding
3 tablespoons rice
3 tablespoons sugar
1 quart milk
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup golden seedless raisins
1 dash cinnamon
Combine milk, rice, sugar and salt in a 6 cup baking dish. Bake in moderately high oven at 325 degrees for 2 hours or until rice is soft, stirring every 20 minutes. Stir in vanilla and raisins, sprinkle with cinnamon and bake without stirring until light and fluffy or golden crust forms, about 15 minutes longer.

Spicy Mexican Cheesy Rice Casserole
4 cups cooked rice
1/2 cup reduced-fat cheese-shredded
4 ounces green chilis-chopped
4 green onions-chopped
2 ounces red pepper-chopped
1 cup sour cream
3 tablespoons recaito-cilantro based spice
1/2 teaspoon cumin
chili powder to taste
salt to taste
1/4 teaspoon pepper or to taste red pepper flakes
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In mixing bowl, combine rice, cheese, chilis and green onions and mix together. In small bowl, stir together sour cream, recaito, cumin, chili powder, salt and pepper. Add to rice mixture and stir well. Spray ovenproof dish and spread rice mixture to bake uncovered for 30-40 minutes until cheese melts. Top with additional cheese.

Crockpot Creamy Italian Chicken
4-6 skinless boneless chicken breasts
1 envelope dried Italian salad dressing mix
2 ounces water
8 ounces cream cheese-softened
1 can reduced-fat cream of chicken soup-undiluted
1 can mushrooms stems and pieces-drain
hot cooked rice
Place chicken halves in crock pot. Combine dressing mix and water until smooth; pour over top of chicken. Cover and cook 3 hours on low. Combine cream cheese and soup until smooth and blended. Stir in mushroom pieces. Pour soup mixture over chicken. Cook 1 hour or more until chicken is cooked through. Serve over hot rice.

Moving Day Beef
2-1/2 pounds beef stew meat
2 cans low-sodium cream of mushroom-undiluted
1 package dry onion soup mix
1/2 cup red wine or water
1 teaspoon dill weed
Mix all ingredients together in crockpot. Cook on low for 10-12 hours. Serve over rice.

Fire House Tex Mex Casserole
3 cups minute brown rice
1-1/2 cups hot water
1 pound lean ground beef
1/2 cup barbecue sauce
19 ounces canned stewed tomatoes
14 ounces refried beans
1-1/2 tablespoons chili powder
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/2 cup grated cheese
2 green onions-thinly sliced
Heat oven to 350 degrees. Place rice in 3-quart casserole dish. Add hot water; cover and let stand for 5 minutes. Meanwhile brown meat in large fry pan. Add sauce, tomatoes, beans and chili powder. Mix well and bring to boil/ Spoon meat mixture over rice. Sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Cover and bake 30 minutes and garnish with green onions.

Unstuffed Bell Peppers
8 cups water
3/4 cup long grain brown rice
1-1/2 cup onion-diced
2 tablespoons olive oil
2 large red bell peppers
2 large green bell peppers
2 cups celery-chopped
3/4 cup diced carrots
2 teaspoons leaf oregano-crumbled
2 teaspoons dried leaf basil-crumbled
1/2 teaspoon ground celery seed
12 ounce can tomato paste
2-1/2 teaspoons mild chili powder
3 tablespoons tamari salt
Bring water, rice, onion, olive oil and diced pepper to boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered for about 25 minutes or until rice is tender. Add celery, carrot, garlic, oregano, basil, celery seed and tomato paste. Continue simmering about 30 minutes or until added veggies are tender and rice is completely cooked. Add chili powder, tamari and salt to taste. Simmer 5 minutes or until flavor is blended.

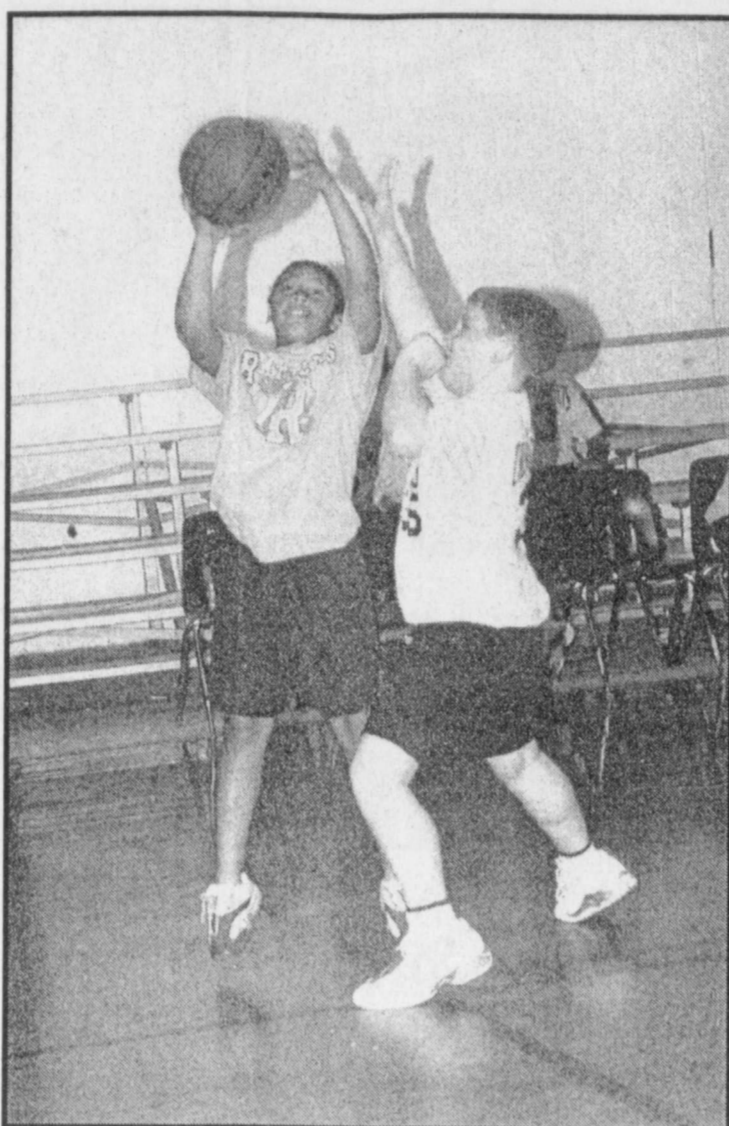

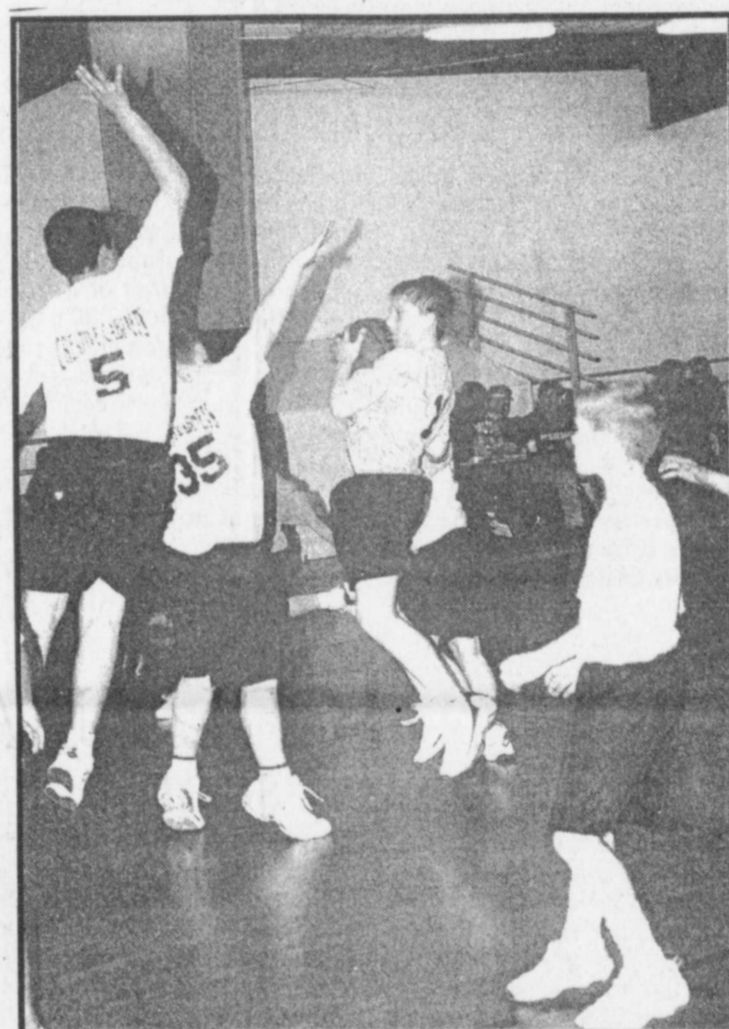

2002 elections are upcoming

Texas is gearing up for the 2002 elections. Are you ready?

Texas will be voting for federal, state and local officials. Primaries for the Democrats and Republicans are just a little more than a month away.

The deadline to register to vote is February 11 for the March 12 primary.

On primary election day, Green and Libertarian parties will be conducting their precinct conventions. These parties make their nominations through conventions rather than elections.

After the primary election, Independent candidates begin circulating petitions for ballot access. Independent candidates are not affiliated with any party and obtain ballot access by filing petitions signed by eligible voters.

You may register to vote in Texas if you are: a U.S. citizen, Texas resident, 17 years and 10 months old, not a convicted felon (unless sentence, probation and parole are completed), and not declared mentally incompetent by a court of law.

You may submit a voter registration by mail or you may register at several state agencies including the Department of Public Safety when you apply for or update your driver's license and at your county voter registrar's office.

You may request a form by calling the Election Division's toll free number at 1-800-252-8683 or request one online at www.sos.state.tx.us. In most Texas counties, the voter registrar is also the tax assessor-collector.

If you have recently registered, a new voter registration card should be mailed to you within 30 days. Make sure you have the new orange voter registration card. If you have not received your card, contact your county voter registrar.

If you have moved within your county, you must update your address with your local voter registrar in order to be able to vote in your new precinct. The deadline for changing your address is February 11.

If you have lost your voter registration card, contact your county voter registrar to get a new one.

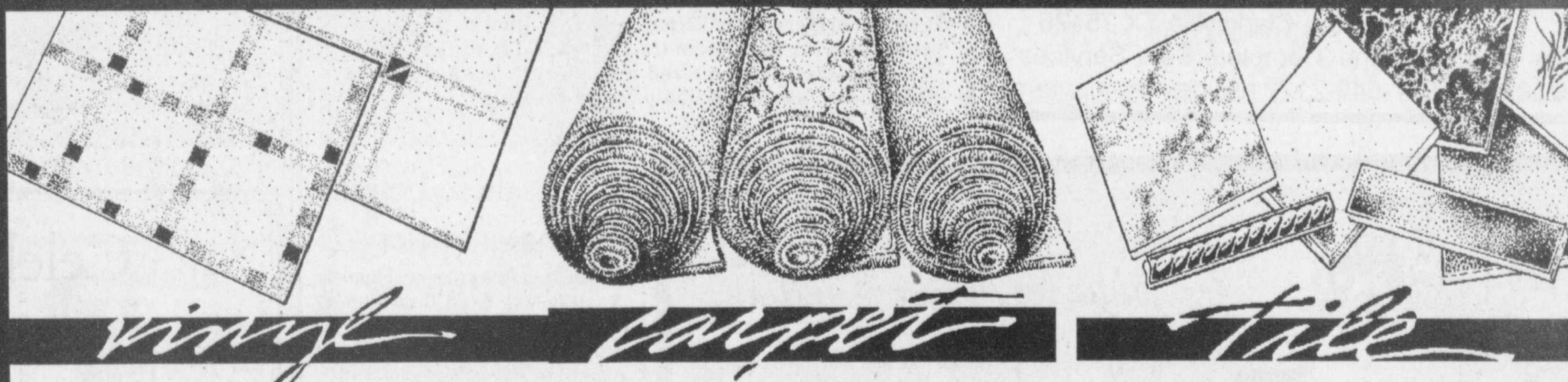

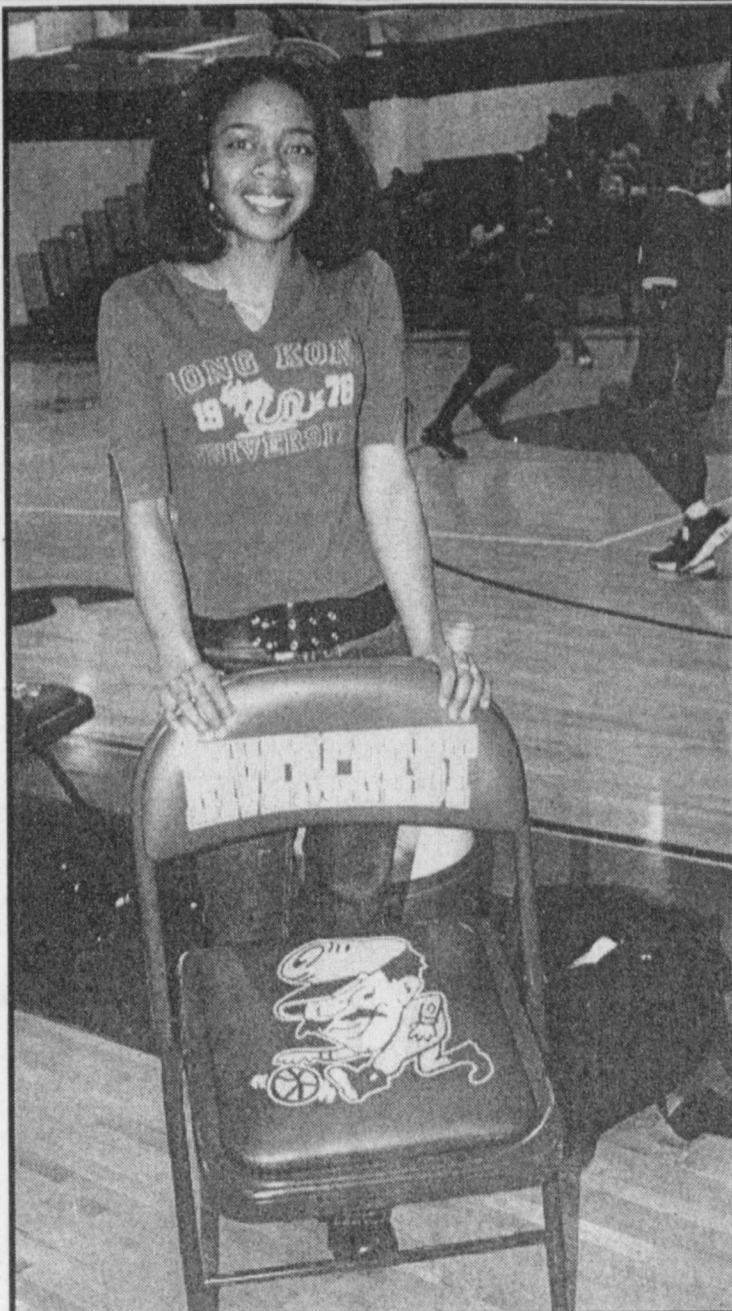

PET TALK

If Sparky separates the kibbles from the bits, it may be a sign he is a picky eater. But don't worry - it may be typical of some pets, says Dr. Melanie Landis, a veterinarian at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine who has some suggestions to keep your pet from turning up his nose.

"There are at least three ways to make your pet a picky eater," says Landis.

The first is by feeding an animal the same food its entire life, and while this helps prevent gastrointestinal problems, a picky eater may result. Later in life, if the animal's diet must be changed for health reasons, the pet may be reluctant to change.

The second way a picky pet eater may occur when an animal is bottled and makes a slow transition from soft or semi-solid food to dry food. The third way is when owners feed their pets table scraps, ordinary pet food may become less appealing.

Pets have a tendency to hold out for the "good stuff" when they know their owners will give in, Landis said.

"Some common signs of a picky eater are leftover food and sniffing at or nibbling at the food that is offered and then begging to be fed again," Landis explains.

"Most animals will have a brand or flavor preference. If a pet is eating a particular brand and it is not necessary to change to a different brand for health reasons, let the animal eat its preferred brand," says Landis.

She says to use caution when feeding table scraps to animals. Feeding people food to animals can cause gastrointestinal problems and add unnecessary calories that could lead to obesity, Landis confirms.

A few simple ways to modify the behavior of a picky eater is by first paying special attention to the eating habits of your pet.

Dogs will usually not starve themselves, but cats can and will starve themselves if they do not receive the food they like. Always throw out uneaten food and refill the bowl with fresh food at each mealtime. If the diet must be changed, do so very gradually to give the pet a chance to accept the new food.

"When in doubt or if the animal has not eaten in several days, have a veterinarian examine the pet. There may be a health problem disguising itself as a picky eater," Landis believes.

When feeding cats canned food, make sure the food is near body temperature or at least room temperature, Landis explains. Using a microwave oven can often alter the taste of foods, so place cold cans in a dish with hot water.

The food should be stirred and hepatic lipidosis (fatty liver syndrome), may occur especially in heavy cats that have become anorexic, Landis adds.

"Cats are nibblers and it may be necessary to feed them numerous small meals throughout the day," Landis said. "They also tend toward a food shape preference in relation to how the kibble is formed or shaped more than dogs."

Landis says to avoid switching brands and/or flavors frequently. It is okay to stay with one brand unless health reasons dictate a change. Remember to check the expiration dates on cans and bags of pet food. Your pet may be reacting to mild degrees of food spoilage.

"Picky eating does not cause a health problem for most pets, but be sure to monitor your pet's overall attitude, as well as appetite," Landis says. Changes in either, especially in older pets or those without a past history of pickiness, may indicate a health problem, Landis notes.

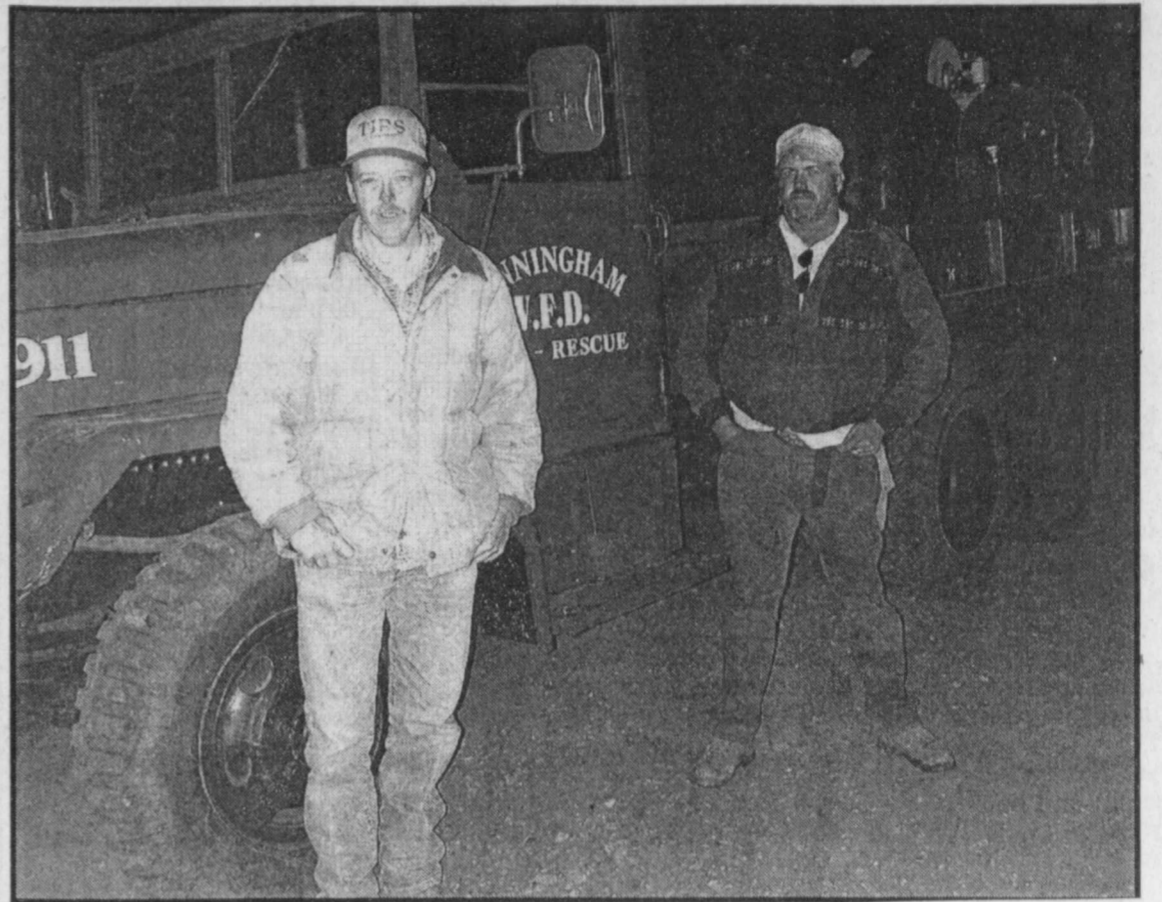

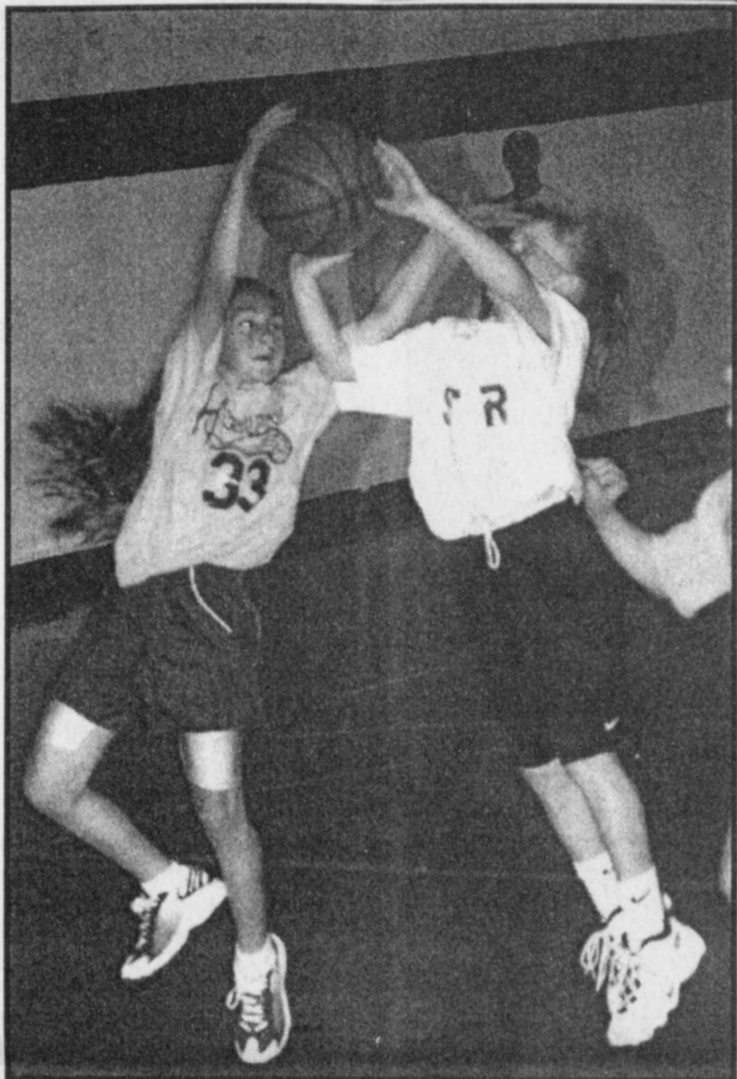

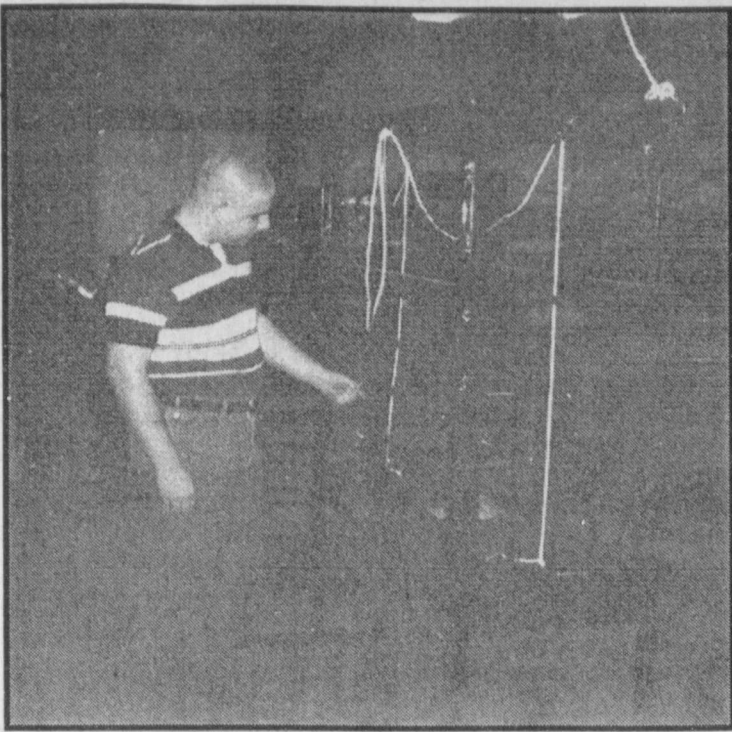

National Child Passenger Safety Week

Today, Austin area law enforcement and state officials kicked off National Child Passenger Safety Week by emphasizing the importance of properly restraining children while transporting them.

Texas and Austin SAFE KIDS Coalitions, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Department of Health Safe Riders Programs, the Texas Department of Transportation and Henna Chevrolet participated in a car seat checkup and news conference.

During the conference, National SAFE KIDS also released the results of a national study on how many children ride unrestrained.

Despite nationwide efforts to educate the public on the importance of using passenger restraints, failure to use safety restraints remains the leading cause of child traffic fatalities. In 1999 alone, a total of 299 Texas children ages 16 and under were killed

in traffic crashes, and 154 of these were not restrained. According to the National Traffic Safety Administration, 64 percent of children killed in traffic collisions nationwide were completely unrestrained.

Since Sept. 1, Texas law requires the following:

Children under 4 years old or less than 36 inches tall must ride in a child safety seat in accordance to the manufacturer's instructions.

All children ages 4 through 16 must be restrained in a seat belt, regardless of their position in the vehicle, and

All persons age 17 or older must be restrained in a seat belt when seated in the front seat.

Children under 18 cannot ride in the open bed of a pick-up truck or trailer on a public road.

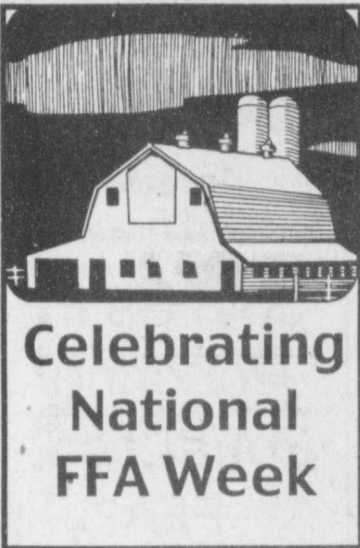

Junior, Krystal Valenzuela placed 4th in the 132 weight class

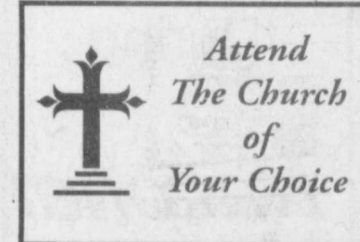

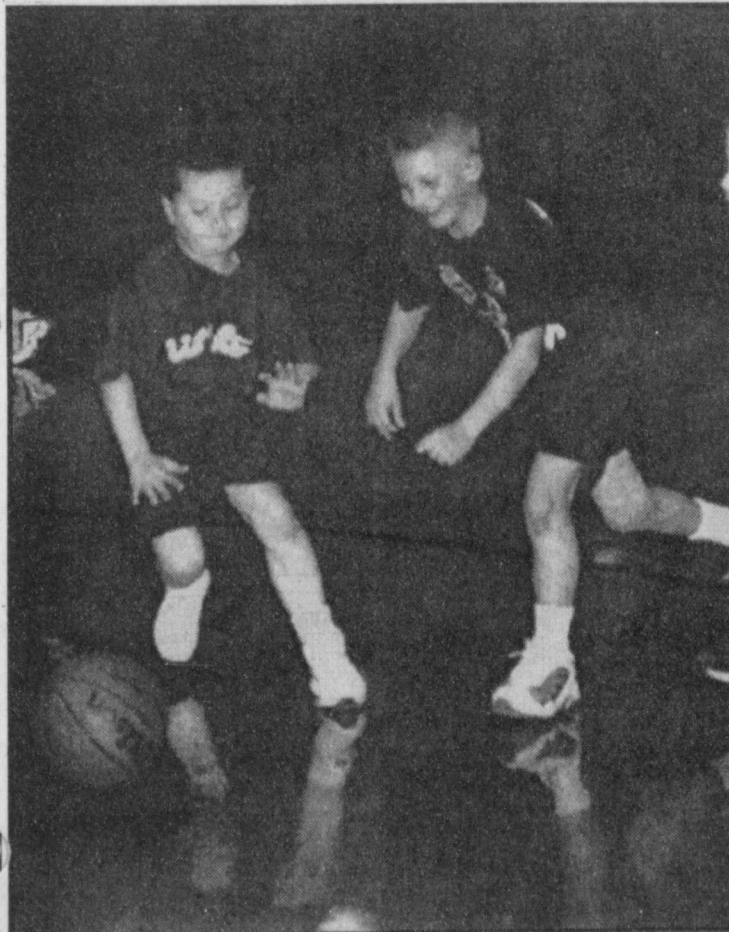

PET TALK

A pet is often a member of the family and the pet-owning experience will be enjoyable if prospective pet owners take time to consider which animal suits their wants and needs.

When choosing a pet, consider space and exercise requirements. Evaluate your activities and daily schedule to help determine which pet is best for you.

Most family pets are better kept indoors or in an appropriate kennel when its owners are away. Cats, birds, fish and small animals can adapt to suitable living quarters.

But certain animals, such as active dogs, require more space and need more daily exercise.

Always consider temperament and physical abilities when selecting a pet. Your pet should be suited for the activities you enjoy. Is your pet suited for outdoor activities and weather conditions, or quiet time at home?

Consider the temperament and needs of animals and identify those that best match your lifestyle, he believes. And remember that pets depend on their caregivers for daily affection and needs.

Feeding, grooming and exercise are daily time commitments that must be considered. Family members should decide what kind of animal they want, who will be responsible for needs of the pet and the amount of time that will be devoted to the pet.

There are two types of dogs, purebred and mixed-breed, and each animal has its own personality and temperament. You should consider size and hair coat as well as specific breed traits and characteristics.

For some families, the best choice is an older housebroken dog whose behavior has been established. Obedience training for a puppy or adult dog to promote good manners and reinforce the bond between you and your pet.

Cats come in many sizes and colors as well as purebred and mixed breeds. Select a kitten that is neither too shy nor too aggressive. Kittens are easily housebroken, adapt to a variety of environments and do not have to be walked. Hair coats -- long, short or curly -- should also be considered when selecting a cat.

Birds, rabbits and other exotic animals can be family companion animals, too, and I would suggest researching the care and needs of these animals. Some have special diets and temperature requirements.

To be a responsible pet owner, plan ahead by choosing your pet wisely. You should try to research the needs and habits of different breeds and species before you bring your pet home.

The story of a dog lost...and found

This story is one that Martha Jayne Guest Anderson, formerly of Deport, wrote for a "Grandmother's Memories" book for her grandson, Scotty Floyd. His little daughter, Sydney, told her to "not forget this story". We thought it would be worth doing.

A Man And His Dog
Christmas 1994 Scotty got a puppy and named him Snuffy. The new puppy was a blue heeler. The two quickly bonded as Snuffy rode in the back of the pickup truck in the pasture and where ever they went.

When Snuffy was about two years old, he fell from the pickup near Reno. Kenda (Kenda is Scotty's mother) and I (Jayne) met Scotty looking everywhere for his dog. He told us about his loss and was very sad. Everyone started to search for the lost Snuffy. There was a lot of publicity in the papers under Lost Pets.

I made signs and Lou (Scotty's Great aunt) went with me. I hammered stakes everywhere. The signs read LOST DOG and had phone numbers and all information. We just kept hoping someone would return Snuffy to Scotty.

Several calls were received and each one was checked out carefully, but no Snuffy was found.

About two weeks passed and I decided to pray. The Bible says "ask anything in my name", so I did. I asked for the little dog's safe return.

I was driving north on S.E. 24th St. in Paris, the first block past Clarksville Street, and I talked to

God. I asked God to bring Snuffy back TODAY, dead or alive. I explained how much he meant to his family!

It was close to the due date for the birth of Sydney, Scotty's little daughter. Her mom, Dashielle was in the hospital, having contractions. Scotty was leaving work and just before he left received a call-a blue heeler dog was at the gravel pit between Loop 286 and N.E. and Pine Mill Rod. The description just fit Snuffy to a "T". Scotty had to make a quick decision-hospital or gravel pit!

Perhaps this is Snuffy! But, he needed to be at the hospital, after all, it's his wife there, having a baby.

So, he asked his cousin, Kasey to check things out at the gravel pit. Kasey reported back. Yep, it's Snuffy, but he won't let me catch him. He acts like he will bite me". Snuffy had become unfriendly while he was lost and scared.

Council raises basic water charges effective April 1

Mayor Kennedy, all councilmembers, seven employees and ten guests were in attendance at the regularly scheduled meeting of the Bogata City Council on Monday, February 11 at the Bogata Community Center.

The invoice was given by the Mayor and Jason Stephens of B&B Equipment talked to the Council concerning extending their contract for trash pickup. Council voted to table this until the next meeting.

Minutes of the previous meetings and bills and final waterbill accounts were approved.

Police Chief Clegg gave his report and reported that Jason Henry will begin working with Wyatt Bush one day a week on code enforcement and will be paid from Crime Control Board.

Water Superintendent Wendell Davis reported 65 work orders the past month, 14 sewer stops, infiltration fixed and ten dogs picked up.

Kay Neading reported on health insurance. The council voted to table this until later this year, and perhaps have a workshop for this purpose and if the city can afford employee insurance it will be budgeted. A report was given by the City Secretary concerning office personnel cross training.

An ordinance concerning unattended placarded trucks was

tabled until next month.

The ordinance to expand the Police Department to include the Chief of Police, two full time peace officers, one part time peace officer and two reserve officers was approved.

Council voted to raise the basic water rate from \$8.00 to \$9.00 for 2,000 gallons. People living outside city limits on city water will have to pay \$18.00 for the first 2,000 gallons. This will be effective with the April 1 billing. Council voted to approve an ordinance to contract with a collection agency to collect delinquent water bills and to add their charge for collecting to each delinquent water bill they collect.

The council clarified the Drug Policy for City employees as non DOT. No action was taken on training for City Secretary's Assistant. They decided to get bids for prices for two security lights at the Community Center. They also voted to charge \$10.00 for fire reports from the Fire Marshal.

An election to elect two councilmembers to two year terms and a special election to elect a Mayor and two councilmembers to fill unexpired terms of one year each was ordered and will be held on May 4. First day to apply for a place on the ballot is February 18 and March 20 is the deadline.

Council adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Hydrocodone: legal drug that lends itself to abuse

Many Texans know what they know about drug abuse from the nightly news or the daily paper. While illegal drugs like cocaine, marijuana, methamphetamine, and heroin remain in the headlines, a lot of folks may be surprised to know that a legal drug called hydrocodone could lurk right behind them as one of the most widely-abused drugs in our state.

Hydrocodone is a powerful painkiller found in popular prescriptions like Vicodin and Lortab that are used by doctors to treat moderate to severe pain. It can provide short-term relief after surgery, manage chronic pain in cancer patients, and play a vital role in hospice care for the terminally ill. But hydrocodone is a narcotic that can produce a calm, euphoric state similar to heroin or morphine-and despite such important and obvious benefits in pain relief, evidence is pointing to chronic abuse.

In fact, the federal Drug Enforcement Administration believes hydrocodone may be the most abused prescription drug in the country. Nationwide, its use has quadrupled in the last ten years, while emergency room visits attributed to hydrocodone abuse soared 500 percent. Here in Texas, our State Board of Pharmacy reports hydrocodone is at the top of the list of drugs that are stolen from pharmacies or diverted to illegal use.

Subject to individual tolerance, many medical experts believe dependence or addiction can occur within one to four weeks at higher doses. Published reports of high profile movie stars, TV personalities and professional athletes who are recovering from addiction to hydrocodone are grim testimony to its debilitating effects.

Vicodin, Lortab-and more than 200 other products that contain hydrocodone-are regulated by state and federal law. But they are not controlled as closely as other powerful painkillers. The lack of regulation makes them vulnerable to widespread abuse through forged prescriptions, theft, over-prescription, and "doctor shopping."

All controlled substances in the

United States are regulated under the Federal Controlled Substances Act and state laws and classified into one of five categories-or schedules-based on medicinal value, harmfulness and potential for addiction or abuse.

Schedule I is reserved for the most dangerous addictive drugs that have no recognized medical value, like LSD. Schedule II is the category for narcotics that have a high potential for abuse, but are medically useful under tight restrictions, like morphine. Schedule III includes drugs with less potential for abuse that are used more broadly in medical treatment, such as anabolic steroids and pharmaceuticals that mix smaller amounts of narcotic substances with other less powerful drugs. Schedules IV and V cover drugs with the least potential for abuse.

Pure hydrocodone is a Schedule II substance, closely controlled with restricted use. But very few prescription drugs are pure hydrocodone. Instead, small amounts of hydrocodone are mixed with other non-narcotic ingredients to create medicines like Vicodin and Lortab. And that means they can be classified under Schedule III with fewer restrictions on their use and distribution.

The most frightening part of the problem with hydrocodone is that so few people are aware of it. I have grown increasingly concerned about the threat it may pose to Texas and recently asked the Senate Health and Human Services Committee, chaired by Senator Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth, to look into the misuse of prescription painkillers in Texas-especially Schedule III substances containing hydrocodone.

Knowledge is a powerful antidote that can protect the health and well-being of all Texans as we seek to balance the benefits of prescription painkillers to people who need them with the ever-present potential for addiction and abuse. I hope all Texans will educate themselves, their children and their parents on the problem and actively join our legislators in their fact-finding mission and debate.

PUBLIC NOTICE
ORDINANCE NO. 02-002
SUPERSEDES ORD. No. 1-2-96

An Ordinance of the governing body of the city of Blossom, Lamar County, Texas, providing for the regulation of truck and heavy equipment traffic and truck and heavy equipment parking; providing for a penalty clause; providing for a severability clause; and providing for an emergency clause that this ordinance take effect immediately.

SECTION I
A. It shall be unlawful for any truck, truck tractor and semi-trailer, or any commercial motor vehicle, or heavy equipment, with a rated capacity and one and one-half (1 1/2) tons or more, according to the manufacturer's classification, or the equivalent thereof, being operated as local traffic, to enter or use any City street, public right-of-way, or utility easement maintained by the City of Blossom.

B. Exceptions to the above regulations are as follows:

1. Vehicles as may be permitted by franchise agreement ordinances adopted by the City for public utility vehicles to provide for normal utility maintenance of City utility services.
2. Vehicles involved in immediate delivery or pick-up of commercial items or product, directed to or from an address within the City limits. Such deliveries shall be required to utilize state and/or County roads when available, and/or utilize routes approved by the City.
3. Semi-truck tractors, not connected to semi-trailer; whose owner or lease driver's legal residence is inside the City limits, when in the immediate process of driving to and from commercial employment activity. Such vehicles shall be required to utilize state and/or county road when possible, and/or utilize routes approved by the City. Such vehicles must be parked on private property and are not exempt from parking regulations detailed in Section I, paragraph C, below.

C. "Local traffic" as used herein means traffic originating inside or outside the

corporate limits of the City of Blossom with a destination inside the corporate limits of the City of Blossom.

SECTION II
It shall be unlawful to park any truck, vehicle, or heavy equipment, as detailed in paragraph A, above, on any public right-of-way or utility easement maintained by the City or on any property owned by the city.

SECTION III
A. Any person or persons violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a Class "C" misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$500.00. Each day and each instance of violation of this Ordinance shall be considered a separate offense.

B. The Mayor of the City of Blossom, the City Administrator, or his designee, shall be authorized to request the Lamar County Sheriff or any authorized law enforcement officer to assist with enforcement of, or compliance with this Ordinance or Section thereof.

C. As authorized in the "Inter-local Cooperative Agreement for Patrol Services between the City of Blossom, Texas and Lamar County", the City may request the Lamar County Sheriff to serve appropriate citations of alleged violations of this ordinance.

In order to protect the public safety and general welfare of its citizens, the governing body hereby adopts an emergency clause to this ordinance and declares that this ordinance shall take effect immediately, and shall be in full force and effect upon its passage.

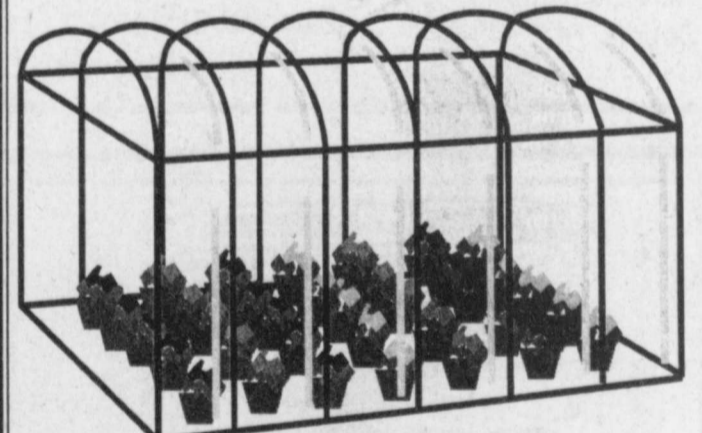

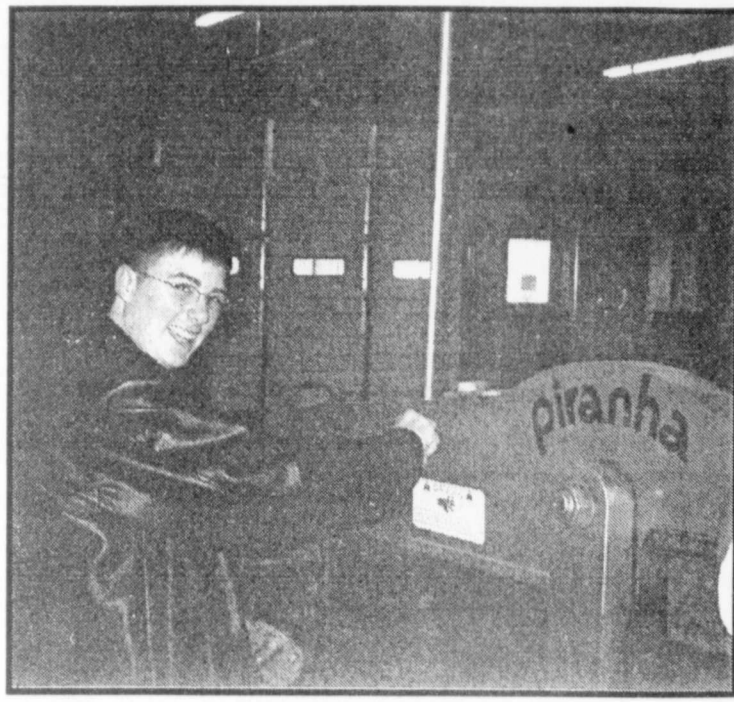

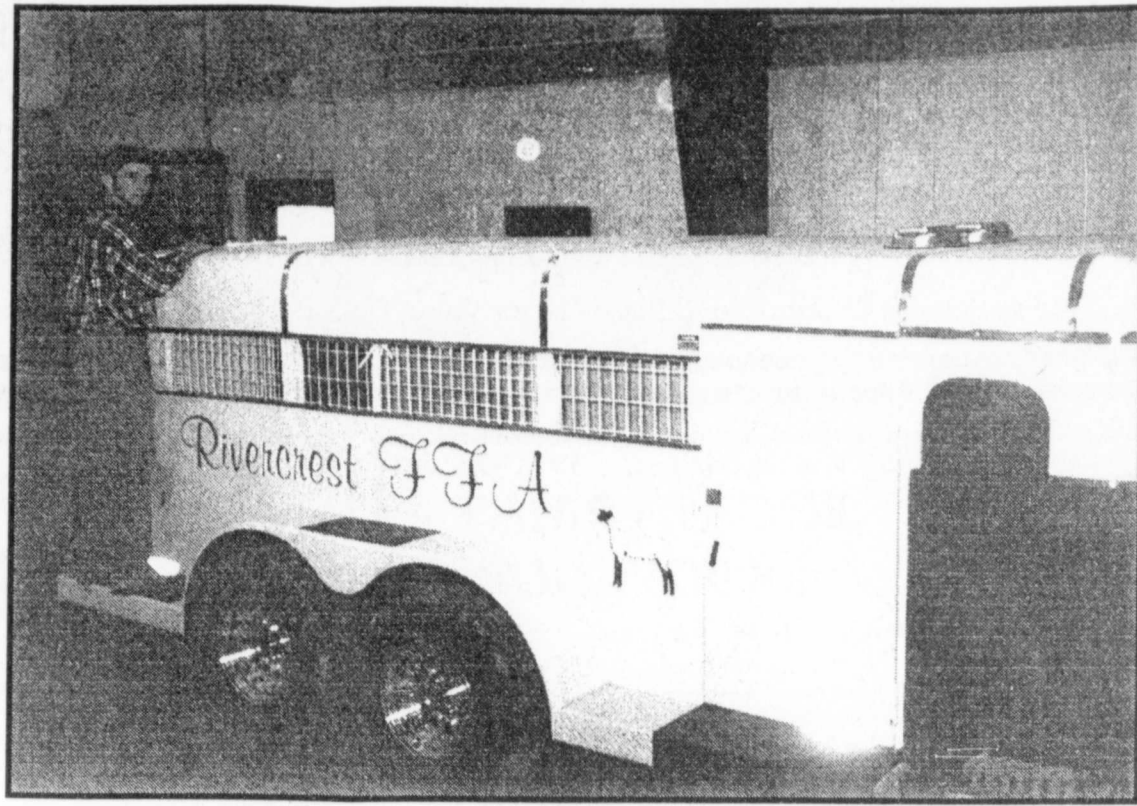

The Bogata High School graduating class of 1949 is planning reunion at the April 13, 2002 homecoming.

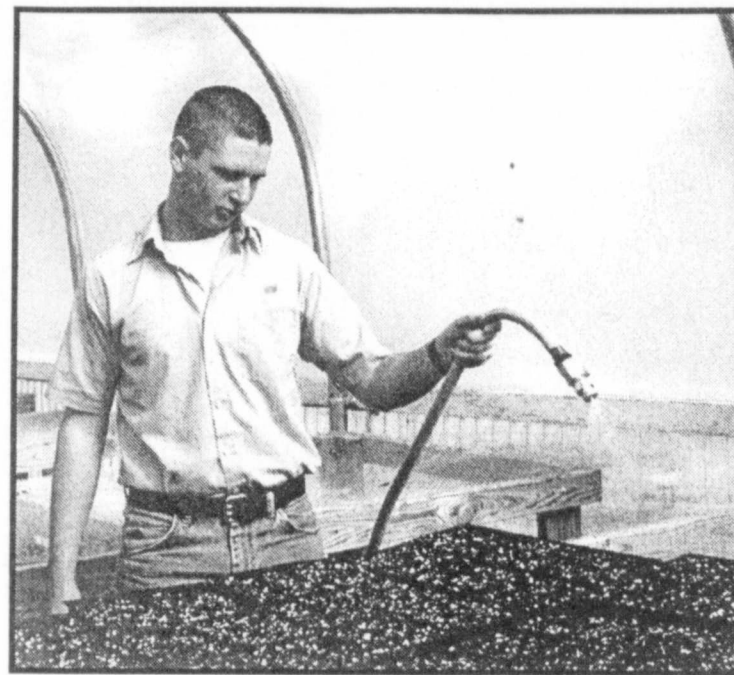

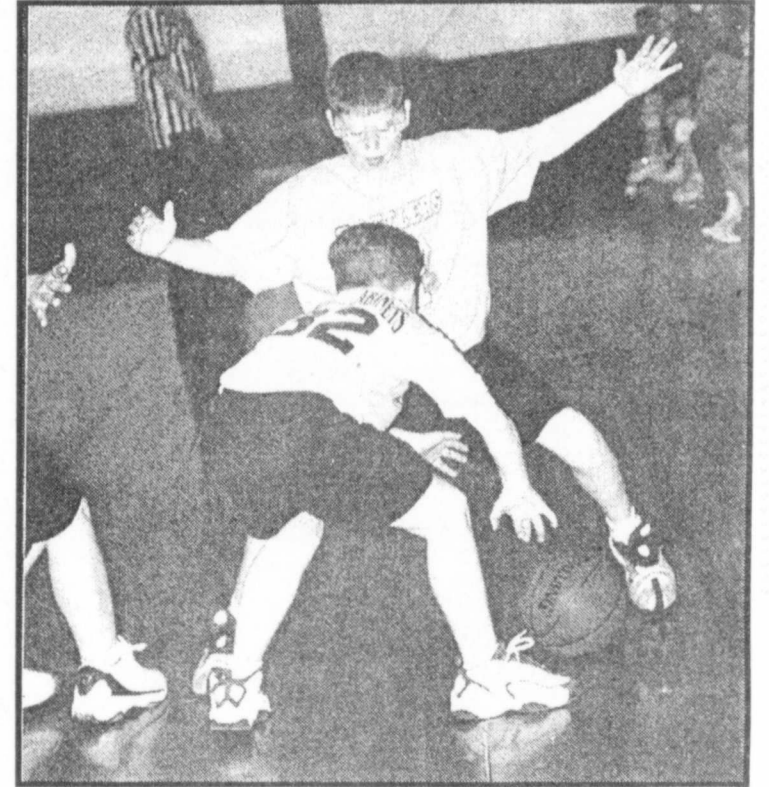
