Pre-Kindergarten/Kindergarten round-up May 3

Rivercrest Elementary will hold Pre-Kindergarten/ Kindergarten Round-Up on May 3, 2002 beginning at 9:00 a.m. in the cafeteria.

For Pre-Kindergarten: If your child will be 4 years old on or before September 1, 2002 he/she may register for pre-kindergarten.

Parents should bring their child's official birth certificate, social security card, shot record, proof of household income and parent/guardian's driver license. These records may be copied at the school on the Round-Up day

but, having them previously copied and ready to turn in will speed up the registration process. Children will not be considered registered until all records are turned in. Kindergarten space is limited and places cannot be reserved.

For Kindergarten students: If your child will be 5 years old on or before September 1, 2002, they need to register for Kindergarten.

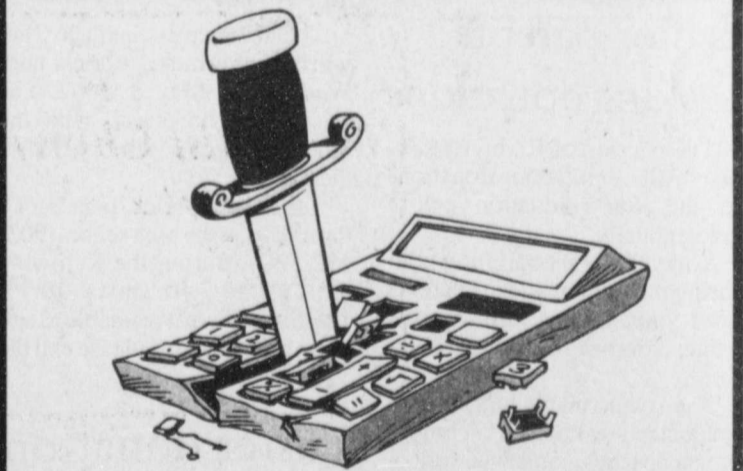

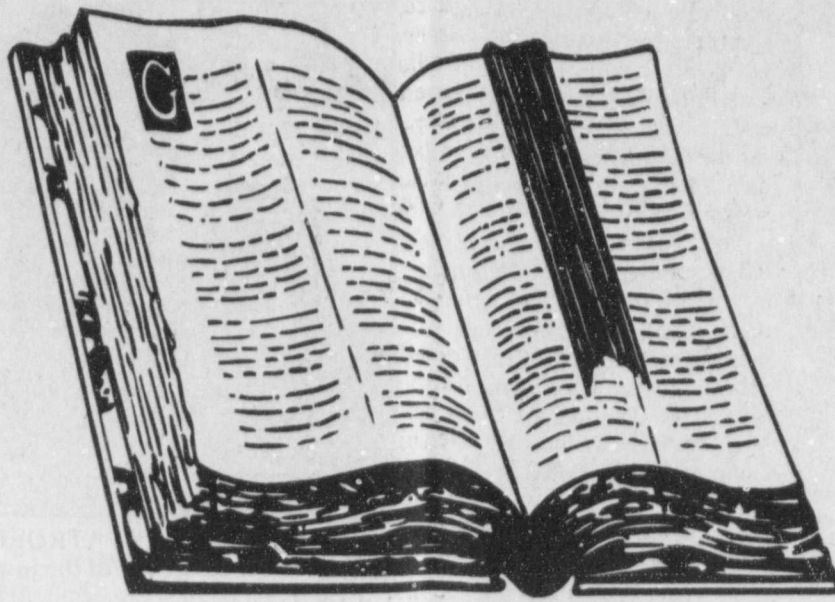

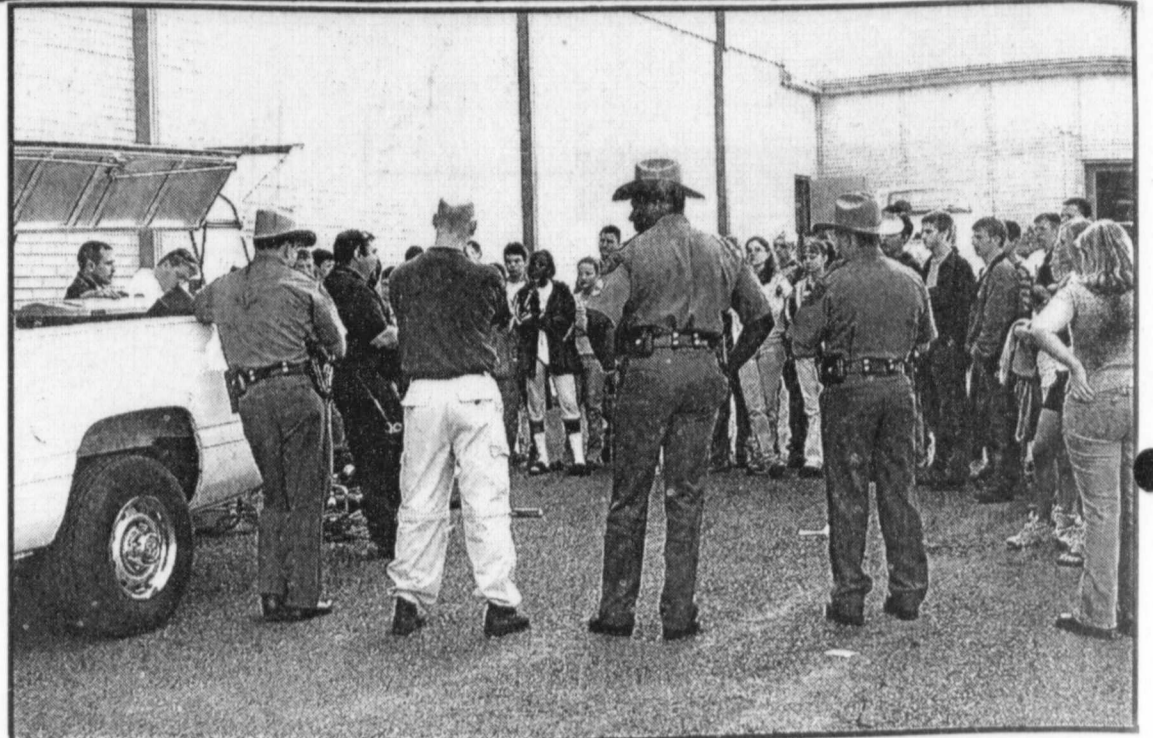

Letter to the Editor

To Whom It May Concern:
I am writing this letter in regards to county road 1305 and 1300.

Due to the recent rains that we have experienced there have been numerous times that we have been unable to leave our home, or return home due to high waters on 1305 by Wendell Reeder ranch. This could have been avoided if County Road 1300 was drivable to people without a 4 x 4. The road (1300) is full of long, deep ruts that will cause a regular vehicle to bog down and risk being damaged by being pulled out among the trees that are lying in the sides of the roads and across the road.

There is another means of travel from and to our home. There is a beautiful bridge across Line Branch Creek that will take you out to Fm 909. Unfortunately, the bridge is not completed yet, and the concrete is approximately 12-18 inches higher than the road. This is a factor that has not deterred others from using materials left behind by the state/county workers to get across the bridge. The barricades warning that the bridge is out has been a favorite of travelers to use as a ramp. (I was informed that this is not a concern of Red River County.)

The solution? It appears to be simple, maintain county roads 1300 and 1305 until the bridge is completed. (I have been told the bridge will be completed when the others on Fm 909 are complete first.) However, this simple solution is not being taken into consideration even in weather that is favorable for working outside on the roads.

I realize that I have made phone calls to those in charge and made personal visits, but I am not the only one on our road that feels our roads are neglected. When our roads are undrivable my son misses school, my daughter misses college and my husband and I both miss day (s) from our jobs at Rivercrest ISD.

Our roads need attention as soon as possible.

Oklahoma cigarettes burn local store operator

According to District Attorney Val Varley on April 10, 2002, the Red River County District Attorney Office, in cooperation with the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Regional Drug Task Force seized 11,600 un-stamped Texas cigarettes. Upon receiving information that a local store was selling illegal cigarettes, Investigator Mark Perkins contacted the Comptroller's Office and they sent Criminal Investigator Robert Cone to Clarksville.

After an undercover operation at the Latino Sounds and Smokes located at 805 E. Main in Clarksville, Investigator Cone, along with D.A. Investigator

Perkins and DTF Agents Danny Powell and Rick Teer, made an inspection of the store. It was determined that the store was selling cigarettes purchased in Oklahoma. Cone stated that possession of more than 10,000 un-stamped cigarettes is a third degree felony. One person was arrested at the 805 E. Main location for possession of over 10,000 un-stamped Texas cigarettes. During inventory of the store, 5 sets of brass knuckles, a prohibited weapon under Texas law, were found, of which possession is a Class A misdemeanor.

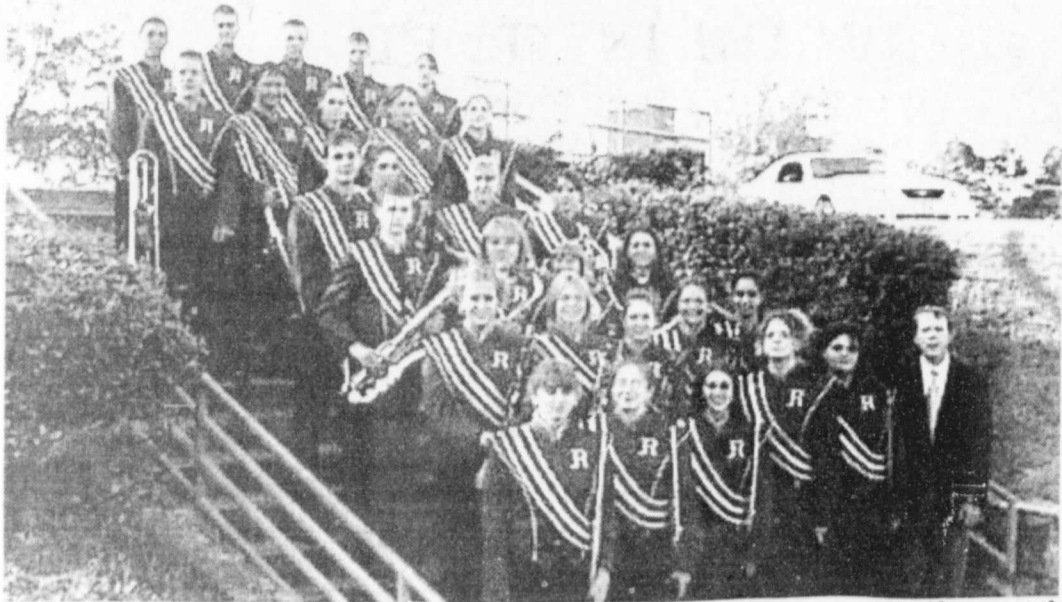

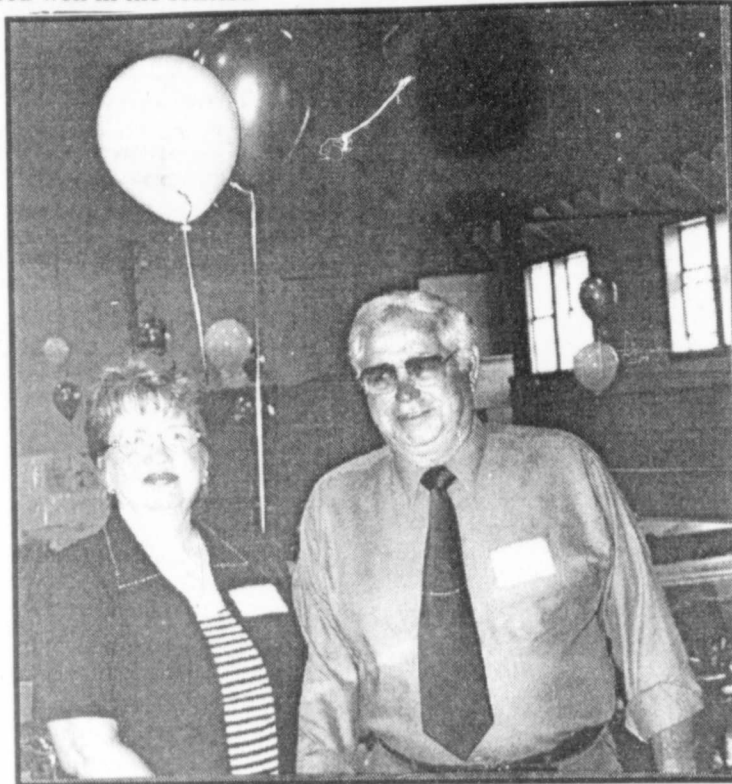

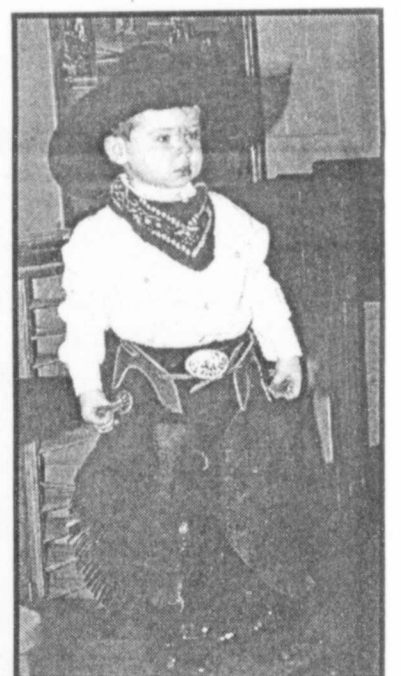

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1 (and used it as a primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowner's exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2001, you won't need to reapply for 2002 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2002. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 2001, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

When and where should I file?
