Tickets for the meal \$25 each and may be purchased at Rivercrest High School. Everyone is urged to come out and support this worthy cause.



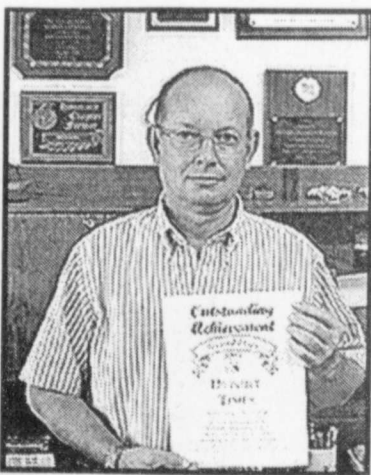

In addition, there will be an enormous garage sale at the Fire Station, which is located at the north end of Main Street in De-

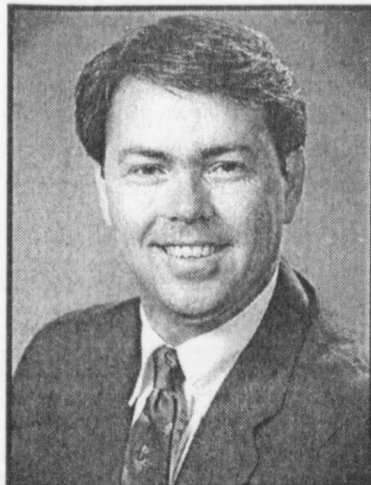
port. The sale will begin at 8:00 a.m.

From time to time, I have calls requesting easy, simple casserole dishes that can be made for the family and do not take a lot of time and preparation. Those are my kind of recipes. I found some that sound really good and might fill the bill.

Ingredients can be substituted to your families liking and now that the gardens are up and growing, fresh vegetables may also be added. Just use your imagination. The Cornbread-Beef Bake calls for black beans, we enjoy the Ranch Style beans more, but just use what your family enjoys.

All call for ingredients that you will have on hand and can easily fit into your budget for easy and economical preparation. Hope you enjoy them and we will see you in the kitchen!

CORNBREAD-BEEF BAKE-this is one that will appeal to all of the guys...its is loaded with lots

of rib-sticking ingredients and easy for the ladies to prepare!

KEILBASA-VEGETABLE STEW-this makes a mouth-watering dish with lots of color and flavor....fast too!

LAYERED CHICKEN SALAD-this one will be good when the weather gets warmer and you need something light and filling!

BAKED TACO SANDWICH-quick and easy and all you need for a meal is more cheese, sour cream, lettuce and tomatoes.....can be made ahead and stored in refrigerator for 24 hours!

HAM AND POTATO BAKE-can be spiced up with more red pepper and also made ahead of time for a quick meal in minutes!

ROASTED CHICKEN WITH POTATOES-serve with a salad and your family will love you for it!

Thursday, May 2, 2002

Cornbread-Beef Bake
1 pound lean ground beef
1 medium onion-chopped
14-1/2 ounce can Mexican-style stewed tomatoes-undrained
15 oz. can black beans-rinse & drain
8 ounce can tomato sauce
1/2 cup frozen corn
2 teaspoons chili powder
1 1/2-ounce can cornbread twists
Heat oven to 350 degrees.
Cook beef and onion in 10-inch ovenproof skillet over medium heat 8-10 minutes; stirring occasionally until beef is brown; drain. Stir in tomatoes, beans, tomato sauce, corn, chili powder and heat to boiling. Immediately top with cornbread twists left in round shape-do not unwind. Press down gently. Bake uncovered 35-40 minutes or until cornbread is golden brown.

Keilbasa-Vegetable Stew
1 medium red onion-cut into thin wedges
145-1/2 ounce can stewed tomatoes-drain
6 small red potatoes-cut into fourths
2 medium carrots-cut into 2-1/4 inch strips
1/2 pound fully cooked Polish sausage or Kielbasa
1 teaspoon chopped fresh or 1/4 teaspoon dried marjoram
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 cups coarsely chopped cabbage or coleslaw mix
Spray 12-inch non-stick skillet and heat over medium. Cook onion 2-3 minutes and stir occasionally until tender-crisp. Stir in tomatoes, potatoes, carrots, sausage, marjoram and pepper. Heat to boiling; reduce to medium-low and cover to cook for 10 more minutes. Stir in cabbage. Cover and cook 5-10 minutes, stirring occasionally until vegetables are tender.

Layered Chicken Salad
1 package salad mix
1 small zucchini-slice thin
10 ounces chunk chicken-drain
1/4 cup chopped red onion
1/2 cup pimiento-stuffed salad olives
3/4 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup frozen green peas-rinse and drain
tomato wedges
sprigs of parsley

Layer salad mix in bowl with zucchini, chicken, onion and olives. Spread mayonnaise over olives, sealing to edge of bowl. Sprinkle with cheese and peas. Toss just before serving and garnish with tomatoes and parsley.

Baked Taco Sandwich
1 pound ground beef
envelope taco seasoning
1 cup baking mix
1/3 cup cold water
3/4 cup shredded cheese
sour cream
shredded lettuce for four chopped tomatoes

Grease square 8x8x2 pan. Cook beef as directed on envelope of taco seasoning. Mix baking mix and cold water until smooth; spread in pan. Spread beef mixture over dough. Heat oven to 450 degrees and bake uncovered for 25-30 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Immediately sprinkle with cheese. Serve with remaining ingredients.

Ham and Potato Bake
1 package shredded hash browns
1 cup fully cooked ham
1 cup seasoned croutons
1/2 ounce can Cheddar soup
4 eggs
1/2 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon red pepper sauce
Grease rectangle baking dish 11x7x1-1/2 and spread potatoes on bottom. Sprinkle ham and croutons on this. Beat soup, eggs, milk and pepper sauce until blended. Pour over ingredients and bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 50-60 minutes until top is light brown and center is set.

Roasted Chicken and Potatoes
6 skinless boneless chicken breast halves
1 pound small red potatoes
1/3 cup mayonnaise
3 tablespoon Dijon mustard
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 cloves fresh garlic
chopped chives for garnish
Heat oven to 350 degrees and grease shallow pan 15-1/2 x 10-1/2 x 1 inch. Place chicken and potatoes in pan. Mix remaining ingredients except chives and brush over chicken and potatoes. Bake uncovered 30-35 minutes or until potatoes are tender and juice of chicken is no longer pink. Sprinkle with chives.

Royal Southern Miss & Master Pageant to be held in Bogata, Tx.

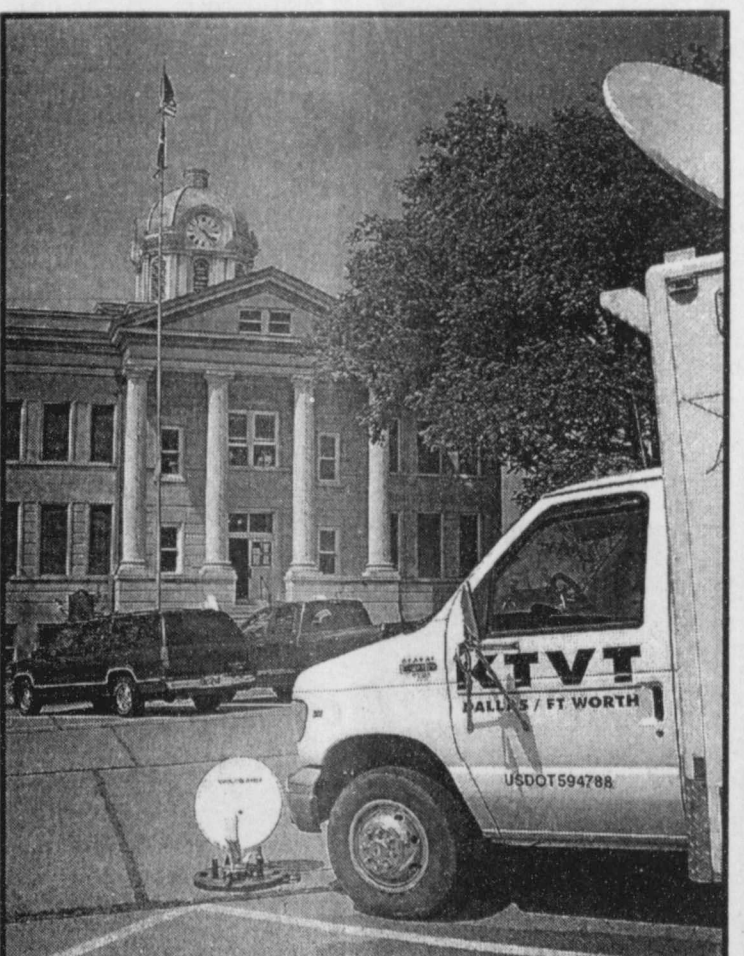

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Letter to the Editor

Letter to the Editor:
from Dr. James Presley

I spoke at Talco City Hall on Monday, April 22, 2002 about the Marvin Nichols Reservoir. Here are excerpts of what I said there.

Let's talk about language. Language is more than communication. It also can be a weapon. It has already been made a weapon by the promoters of the Marvin Nichols reservoir.

Their idea: if you control the language, you control the issue. When you control the language you also limit the way people think about the issue. Well, that can work both ways. If we recognize what they're doing, we can protect ourselves and use it against them.

Let's clump the reservoir schemes all together and call them Lake Pork Barrel, designed by the Water hogs, who are really Money Hogs. This is not about water, it's about money. About who gets contracts, who controls the pursestrings, who stands to profit.

They've been spreading the words, "done deal", as if we, the public had no business interfering with their scheme to take your land, your heritage, your community and destroy it so that a few men could make tons of money.

The words "done deal," have no validity. Sure, it's a deal they want done, but you have the power to make it an undone deal.

There's another phrase "undeveloped water resources" in talking about the Sulphur river basin.

"Undeveloped water re-

sources" refers to your property that they want to destroy to build Lake Pork Barrel. I seriously doubt that you want it developed.

They already have more water developed than they are using.

When they say "this is where the lake will be" we are being inaccurate. Let's put it like this. "This is where the lake would be if it ever went in."

Let's say it our way "The lake won't be, because we are going to fight it fiercely and successfully".

They try to pin labels on us. They throw out terms like "radical environmentalists" and "extremists".

This is another scare tactic and cheap propaganda to divide, to scare off. Is there something radical or extreme about fighting for your home?

The real radicals and extremists are those trying to take away your land to build Lake Pork Barrel, to pipe unneeded water to Dallas.

Let them know their words will become boomerangs.

The Sulphur river Basin Authority has tried to shut out public comment on Lake Pork Barrel, disregarding their own established rules and practices, to keep the people from participating freely.

Words are important. Recognize when they are aimed at you, and use them to your advantage. When you use them right, you are powerful too.

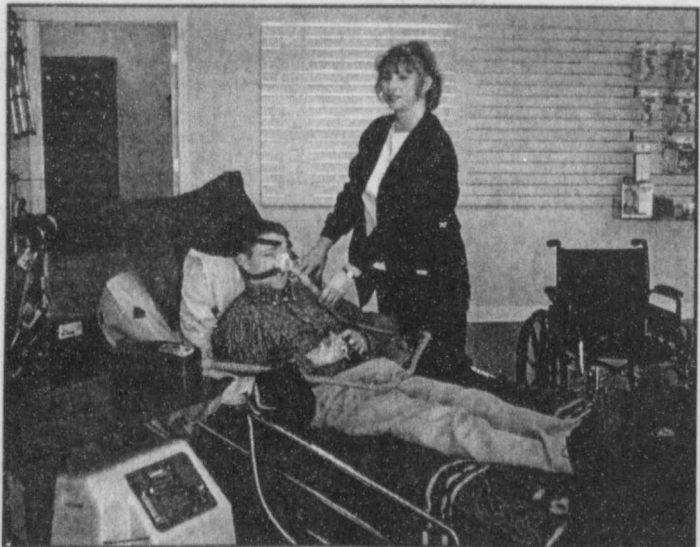

The event is being sponsored by the Franklin County Law Enforcement, Fire Departments and elected County Officials and will

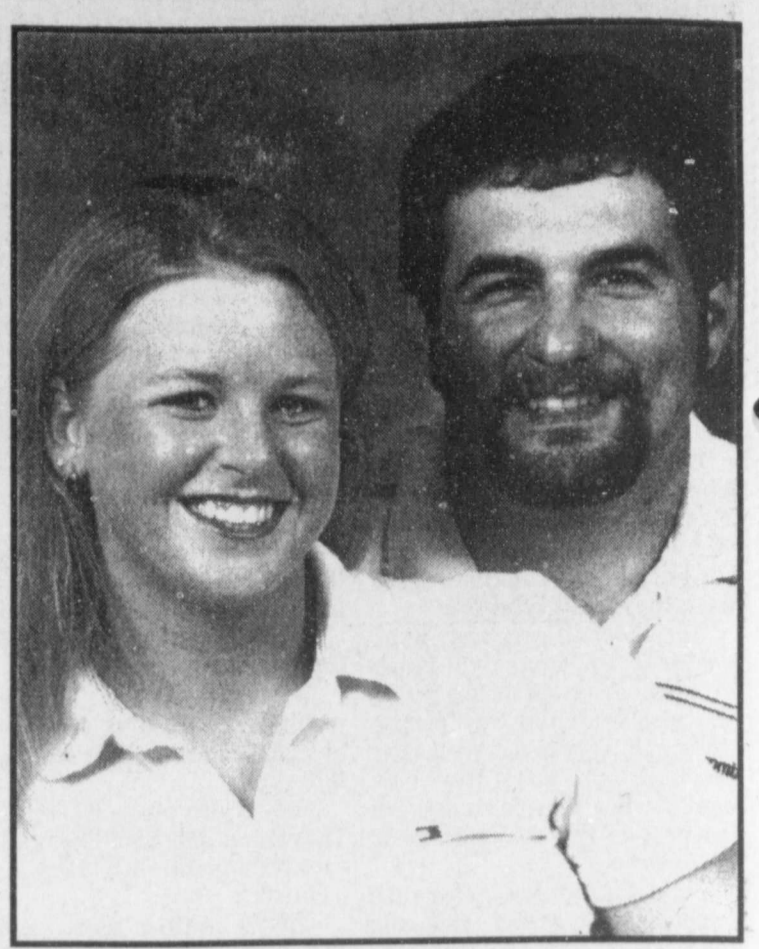

Sixty minnows were poured in a kiddie swimming pool. Each team had to try to catch the most

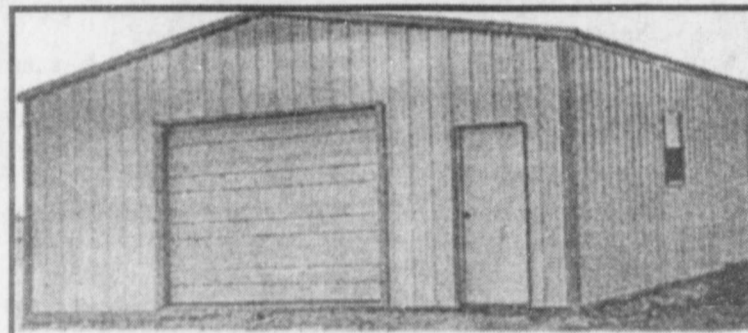

Loan funds available in Red River county

In June of 2001, Red River county received a Rural Enterprise Grant in the amount of \$100,000 from the USDA to be used as revolving loans for Red River County businesses. To date, no applications have been received for loans and the USDA has advised that the grant will be rescinded unless loans are made within the next sixty days. Loans made under this program will have a favorable interest rate. Basic conditions of the program are as follows.

- * The maximum loan per project is limited to \$40,000 which will not exceed 40% of project equity.
- * Must be recognized economic enterprise.
- * Must be located within, or have imminent plans to locate in,

Red River County.

- * Must demonstrate financial viability.
- * Must operate within the laws of the State of Texas.
- * Must commit to the retention and/or creation of a certain number of jobs, the majority of which will be for County residents.

Peek, County Auditor Shirley Anderson, Joe Rose of Guaranty Bank, Jimmy Peek of Annona Mfg., and James Martin of Martin Construction. UM ARMY to be doing repairs this summer

The United Methodist Action Reach-Out mission for Youth (UM ARMY) will return to Clarksville Sunday, June 16 for another week's stay. The Texas Department of Human Services and United Methodist ARMY has partnered since 1979 to improve the quality of life for clients. UM ARMY's youth and sponsors have provided repair and construction work for needy Texas homeowners. Plans for the summer of 2002 call for 4,000 UM ARMY participants throughout Texas. Last summer UM ARMY assisted 1,329 client families. Thousands of homes received repairs and peoples' lives were touched, volunteers as well as service recipients.

By working together and sharing resources UM ARMY and Department of Human Resources build a stronger Texas.

The UM ARMY is made up of volunteer youth who have completed at least one year of high school. They are community and people oriented. They are a God-

led organization and will enjoy not just the repair work being done, but the new people they will meet while they are here.

They will be staying on McKenzie Memorial United Methodist Church, where they will sleep, help prepare their own meals and clean the facility daily. Each day, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 P.M., a team of five youths and one adult will work in the community and after a shower at Clarksville High School they will have an evening program and reflect on the day's work and what it meant.

The organization will be in Red River County to paint, do yard work, house cleaning, porch and step construction, window screen replacement, hand railings, weather-stripping, minor roof repairs, window pane replacement and other needed repairs for owners of property who are in a financial condition which hinders them from doing the job themselves or

hiring others to do it for them. You must own or be buying your own home to be eligible for these services. UM ARMY wants to help at least 50 people in the area. The homes must be located with 50 miles of McKenzie Memorial United Methodist Church. Presite visits will be made in May to determine the jobs they will be able to handle. They often receive referrals from the Department of Human Services, united Way, senior citizens agencies, visiting nurses, Meals on Wheels and other community organizations.

Referrals can also be made by completing the form in this paper and mailing it to Texas Department of Human Services, 308 N. Cedar, Clarksville, TX 75428, or by calling (903) 427-8874 and speaking with Charlotte Rozell, Ellie Wolf, Kevin Davis or Pam Limbok. All referrals need to be in by May 1st. 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Guaranty Bancshares, Inc. reports first quarter results

Guaranty Bancshares, Inc., parent company of Guaranty Bank, reported first quarter earnings of \$982,000 or basic and dilutive earnings per share of \$0.33, up \$244,000 or 33.1% compared to the same comparable quarter in 2001.

The increase in earnings for this quarter compared to one year ago was due primarily to an increase in net interest income of \$824,000 or 26.4% offset by an increase in non-interest expenses of \$225,000 or 6.9% and a decrease in gain on sale of securities of \$229,000.

Net interest income increased \$824,000 or 26.4% for the three months ended March 31, 2002, compared to the same quarter in 2001. Interest income component of net interest income decreased to \$7.1 million for the three months from \$7.6 million for the same quarter in 2001, a decrease of \$536,000 or 7.0%. This decrease in rate was offset by an increase in volume as average earnings assets increased to \$423.1 million for the three months from \$376.3 million for the three months ended March 31, 2001, an increase of \$46.8 million or 12.4%.

Non interest income, disregarding the gain on sale of securities of \$37,000 and \$266,000 during the first quarter of 2002 and 2001, respectively, was \$997,000 for the three months ended March 31, 2002 compared to \$992,000 for the three months ended March 31, 2001, an increase of \$5,000 or 0.5%.

Non interest expense increased \$225,000 or 6.9% for the three months ended March 31, 2002 over the same quarter of 2001. Salary and benefits expense increased to \$2.1 million for the three months ended March 31, 2002 from \$1.0 million for the three months ended March 31, 2001, an increase of \$187,000 or 9.7%. Full time staff equivalent increased to 193 in March 31, 2002 from 191 at March 31, 2001. In addition to the small staff increase, benefit such as insurance, retirement and taxes also showed increases of \$56,000 or 8.7% during the two comparable quarters. Occupancy and other operating expenses remained steady for the two comparative quarters due to cost controls established and put into force by the Company.

Shareholders' equity was \$232.6 million at March 31, 2002. Tier 1 capital was equal to 8.02% of assets. For the three months ended March 31, 2002, on an annualized basis, the Company realized a return on assets of 0.86% and a return on equity of 12.20% versus 0.72% and 9.90% respectively for the three months ended March 31, 2001.
