Speaker for the evening was Miss LaJean Hill, member of the Hartley County 4-H Club and winner of last year's State 4-H Dress Revue.

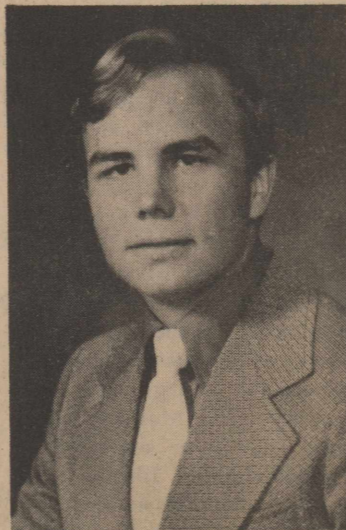
Miss Hill gave a talk and showed slides of her trip this past year to the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago.

Bids, Contracts, Heard By Commissioners

Truck bids, approval of new contract for Pritchard & Abbott, upgrading of insurance group policy and refusal to go along with a request by the district attorney for a fugitive apprehension unit occupied members of the Sherman County Commissioners Court at their monthly meeting Monday.

Bids for a new dump truck for Precinct 3 were accepted with Panhandle Chevrolet & Implement Company getting the bid. Three bids were presented that included Duncan Chevrolet, \$9,868.35; Moore Implement Co., \$11,762.50; and Panhandle Chevrolet, \$10,500.

BEST BID
The bid of Panhandle Chevrolet was termed the "best bid" due to the type of truck submitted plus the delivery date involved.

The contract for services of Pritchard & Abbott, evaluation engineers, was renewed for the tax years of 1974-75 at a rate of 6 cents per \$100 valuation. This is one-half cent increase over the previous contract. The firm furnishes tax information to the county for oil and gas properties and other industrial firms.

The Court retained the firm of Rittenbury & Associates of Amarillo to make a study pertaining to the possible remodeling of the Sherman

County Court House utilizing Federal monies. The study is not to exceed \$750 for the firm and with the clause that if the work is approved, Rittenberry will be retained as architects at a rate of seven and one-half percent of the contract price.

RIGHT OF WAY
A right of way easement was granted to General Telephone for construction of a buried cable between the main Stratford Feed Yard and the new yard across the county road for a distance of 636 feet.

The Court approved the upgrading of the present Blue Cross & Blue Shield group policy held by county employees. The county will pay the employee's portion at a rate of \$11.75 per month to include major medical items with the employee paying for his or her dependent's portion of the policy.

REQUEST DENIED
The Court turned thumbs down on a second request by District Attorney Mike Metcalf asking for approval of funds to provide a Fugitive Apprehension Unit for the 69th Judicial District. The Court felt that such an expenditure would not be in the best interests of Sherman County taxpayers.

All members of the court were present.

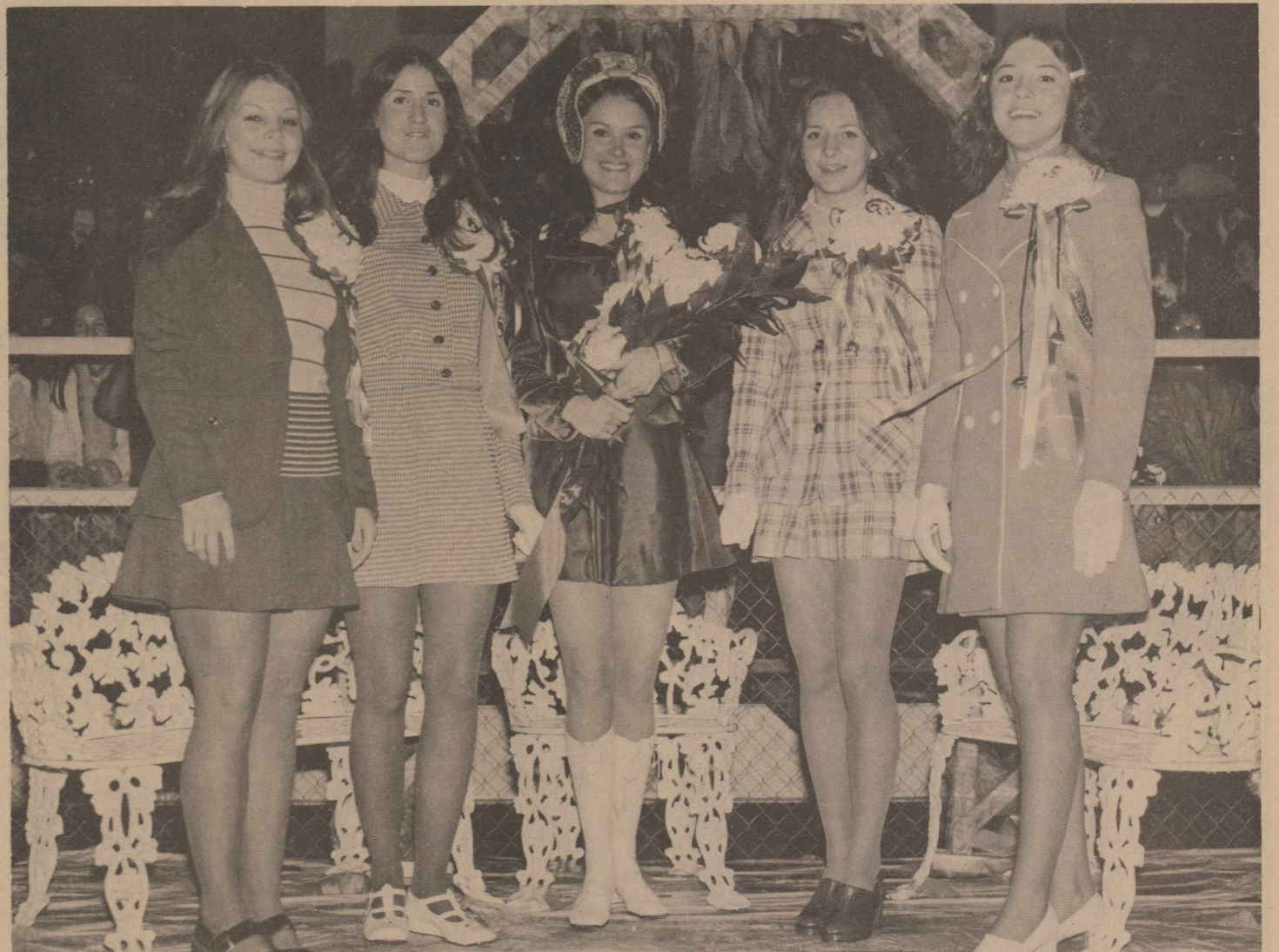
SA Fund Drive Winding Down

Aptitude Tests

For Juniors

This fall juniors at Stratford High School will have the opportunity to join over one million other students around the world in taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) as an important step in making college plans.

This test, to be given here on October 23, is designed to measure verbal and mathematical aptitude--two abilities that research has shown to be important in doing college work.

In addition to helping students find out more about themselves and their abilities, the PSAT/NMSQT can lead them to other opportunities. The PSAT/NMSQT Student Bulletin, available from the school counselor, will describe:

- how students can enter the competition for scholarships administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
- how students can enter their name in the College Board's Student Search Service files so they can get information from colleges that may be looking for students like themselves.

To help the students interpret and make the best use of their test scores, the school counselor will provide each student with a booklet called "Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores", and will interpret the results to each student individually.

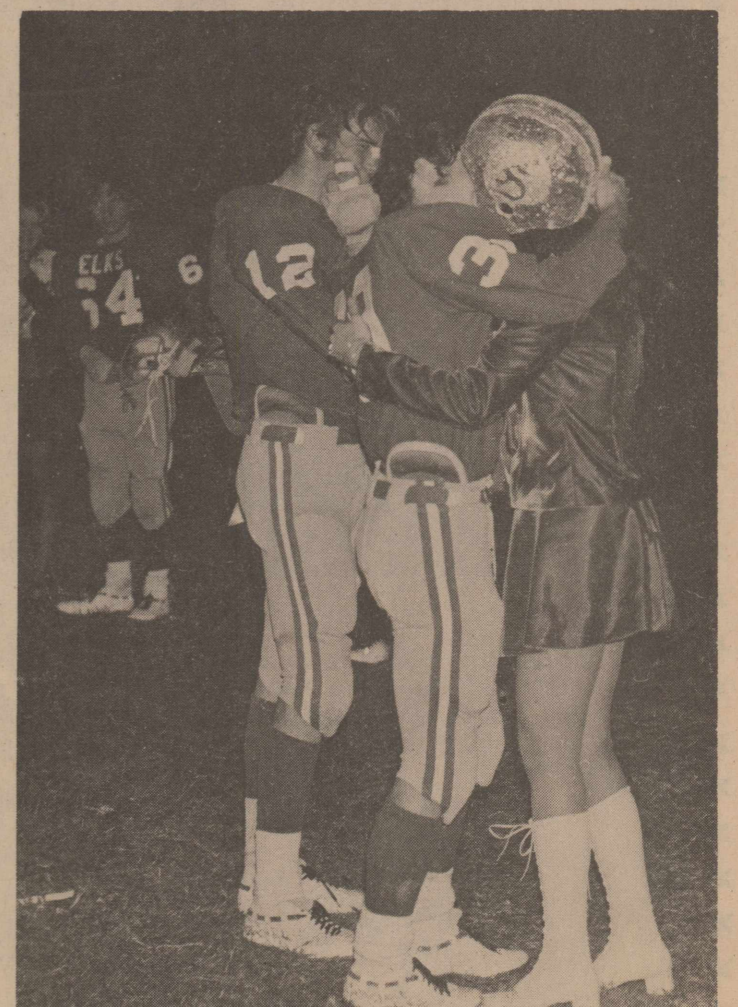

Statewide, the 1974 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Improve-

ment Program includes work on 5,095.2 miles of US and State-numbered highways and Farm to Market Roads. The program includes 810 individual projects in 209 counties of the State.

Fifty-seven per cent of the work statewide will be on US and State-numbered highways and 41 per cent on Farm to Market Roads with two per cent reserved for later assignment.

Description of the proposed work is as follows: In Sherman County on U.S. 287 at an entrance to an industrial area located 2.0 miles south of

Stratford, construct left turn refuge and speed change lanes at an estimated cost of \$30,000.

In Sherman County on U.S. 54 from Spruce Street in Stratford northeast, a distance of 0.2 miles, the sum of \$5,500.00 has been programmed as the State's portion of a widening project. The city of Stratford will pay for the curb and gutter.

The work will be under the supervision of H.L. Gallegly, supervising resident engineer at Dalhart.

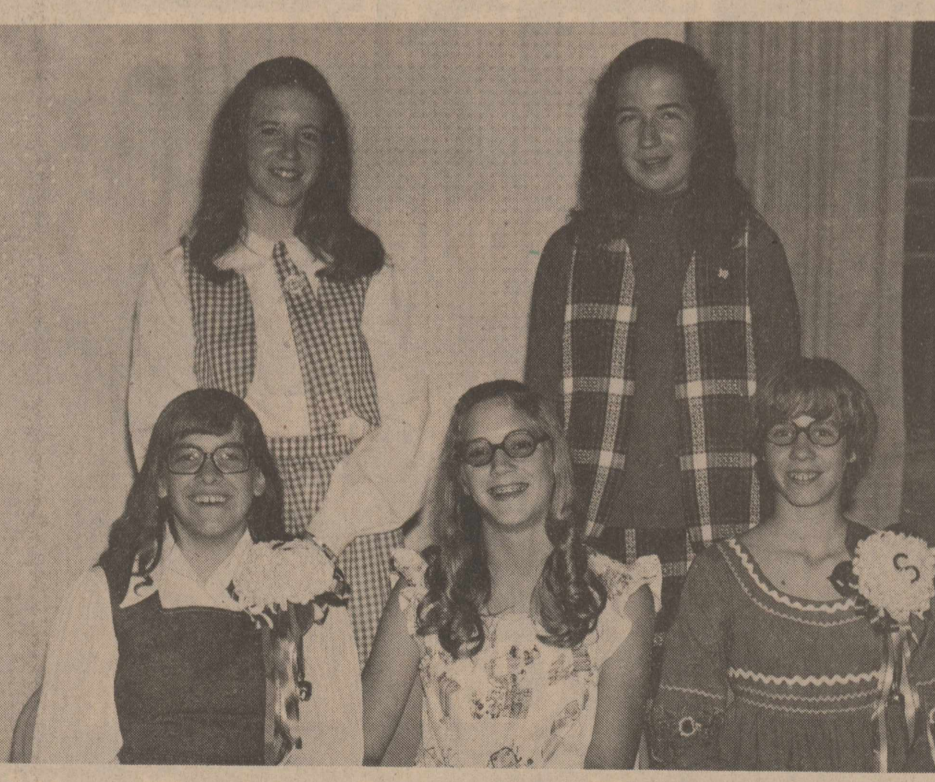

Stratford of Texas, Inc., today reported record revenues and earnings for the nine months ended August 31, 1973. Earnings per common and common equivalent share increased 51 percent to a new high of 98 cents on net income of \$3,829,000, compared with 65 cents per common and common equivalent share on net income of \$2,487,000 for the same period last year. Fully diluted earnings per share were 93 cents compared with 63 cents for the first nine months of 1972. Revenues for the period were \$86,278,000 compared with revenues of \$57,595,000 this time last year. 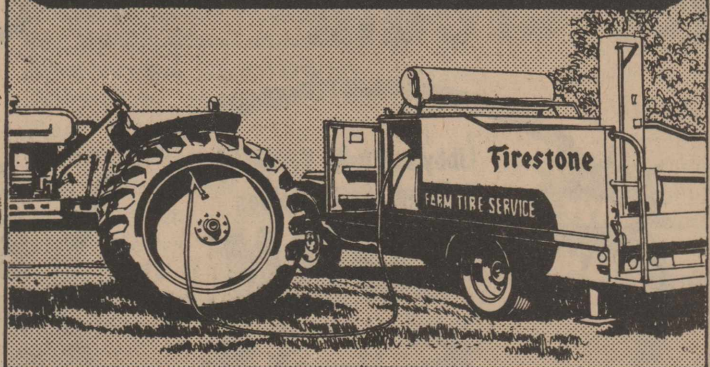


