Stratford Elks will open their 1974 grid wars Friday night as they entertain the top-seeded team in District 1AA, the Spearman Lynx, in a game to be played at Elk Stadium with kickoff at 8 p.m.

Coach David Bornstein's Elks will field one of the quickest teams, although one of the smallest, in recent years against the experienced Lynx.

The Elks will be going without one of their biggest team members. Senior Linebacker Steve Coats, a 206 pound senior and second team all district selection at linebacker a year ago, has been suffering with the flu for a week and is not expected to see action.

"The Lynx will be one of our biggest challenges of the entire season," said Coach Bornstein. "They run the Winged T with excellence and will be out to extend their winning streak from last season," he added.

"The Elks have done well in our two scrimmages this year," said Coach Bornstein. "However, this one will be for real come Friday night."

The Elks will be facing a team of well-experienced Lynx, a team which tied for the District crown with Dalhart last year. The Lynx have 10 lettermen back from last year which includes Senior Halfback Don Davis, 160 pounds; Roger Jones, Junior linebacker at 175 pounds; Tim Harper, 154-pound signal caller and senior; Don Cooper, 206 pound senior guard; Mark Fox, 166 pound junior fullback; Mike Tucker, senior 168 pound defensive safety; Jeff Beedy, 153 pound junior end; Gary Collier, all district nose guard at 163 pounds and a junior and Carl Roberson, 170 pound senior linebacker.

The Elks will probably be starting Mark Beaty, senior quarterback, Ricky Howard,

senior tailback, Don Harris, sophomore fullbacks and Leonard Duncan, sophomore wing-back at the running backs.

Offensively on the line will be Gary Ferguson, senior end; Jimmy Powers, junior tackle; Carl Luther, junior guard; Johnny Slover, junior center; Tony Urias, sophomore guard; Danny Kirkwood, senior tackle and Willie Mungia, senior, split end.

Defensively the Elks will probably go with Duncan, Danny Kirkwood, at end and tackle, respectively, with Terry Kirkwood, junior noseguard. On the other side will be Ricky Reed, junior tackle and Ferguson at end on the "up front" positions. Linebackers will be Johnny Slover and Willie Mungia. Harris will play left corner back and Senior Dwayne Miller, right corner back, with Beaty at strong safety and Howard, free safety.

August Moisture Sets New Rainfall Record

August, 1974, set new moisture records for Stratford, according to Weatherman Horace Sneed.

The total rainfall measured by Sneed for Stratford during August, 1974, totalled 7.70 inches, an increase of 2.42 inches over the previous monthly record for August which was set back in 1965.

The records kept by Sneed go back to 1957 and never before had so much rainfall been recorded by him during the month of August.

The 7.70 inch boost jumped the annual total for 1974 from a dry to wet and most of the rainfall came in a beneficial manner.

The monthly total for 1974 through August 31 totals 13.76 inches of moisture. By months the totals are: January .48; February .06; March .93; April 1.15; May .15; June 2.38; July .91; August 7.70.

Sneed said the August 28, 1974, rainfall total for a 24-hour period came close to setting a new record with a total of 3.41 inches recorded in that period. The record amount of rainfall recorded in a 24-hour period is 3.92 inches set back on May 11, 1972. A total of 3.00 inches also fell on May 6, 1967.

Looking back at Sneed's records which date back to 1957, for August 23 find that month is not normally a month in which

any great amount of rainfall falls.

Sneed's reports since 1957 show for August the following totals. August, 1957, 2.60; 1958-.41; 1959-4.31; 1960-1.52; 1961-5.31; 1962-.71; 1963-1.43; 1964-.99; 1965-5.28; 1966-3.45; 1967-1.23; 1968-1.04; 1969-.95; 1970-2.98; 1971-1.90; 1972-1.31; 1973-1.78 and 1974-7.70.

First Steps Taken For Hwy 287

AUSTIN--The Texas Highway Commission today took first steps toward improvement of a section of US Highway 287 in Sherman County.

The Section extends from Stratford southward to the Moore County line, a distance of 19.3 miles.

The Commission said the Highway Department will participate in the purchase of right of way with local jurisdictions in accordance with customary procedures. If local officials agree, then right of way would be acquired as rapidly as the availability of funds will permit.

The Commission also directed the Highway Department to proceed with advance planning with the understanding that no funds are presently available and that work would be accomplished as funds do become available.

Word was received this week of the death of Chester Welchimer of Mesa, Ariz. He passed away on August 12 and was a resident of Stratford during the 1920's.

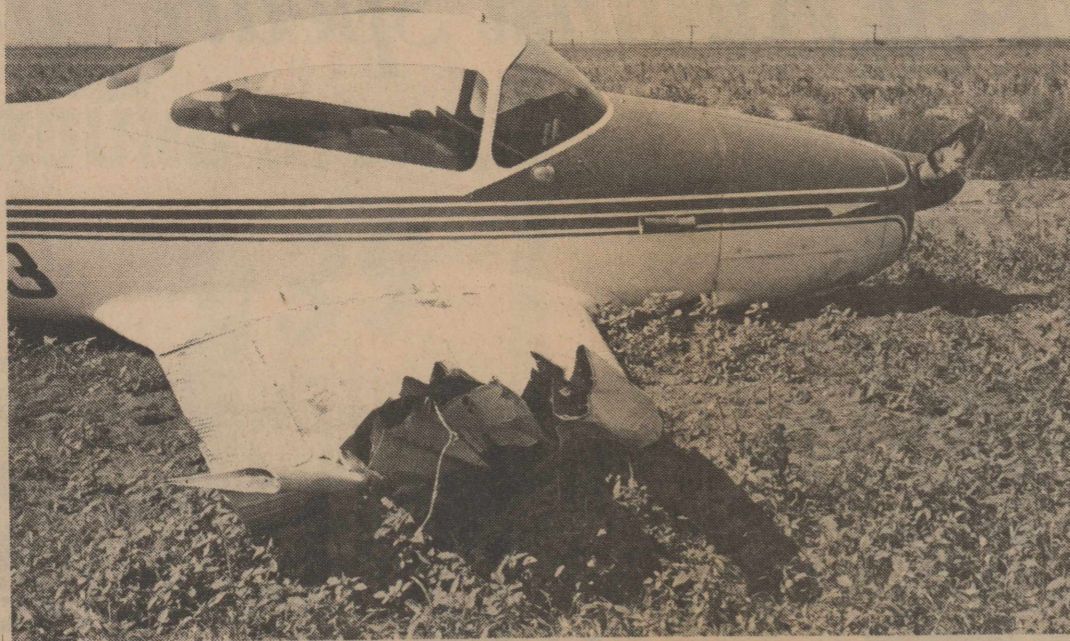

AIRPLANE CRASH SUNDAY--This crashed on an attempted takeoff along the Santa Fe Stock Pens road just west of the city about 1:45 p.m. Sunday. The plane had made an emergency landing in a field adjacent to the road earlier than the pilot, Neal Gathwright of California, attempted to take off. David McReynolds, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dave McReynolds, was taking film for Channel 7 News [KVII-TV] in Amarillo standing in a field adjacent to the road when the plane went off the road and into the field striking McReynolds with the wingtip in the foreground. McReynolds, by some sort of miracle, was not severely injured and was returned to his home early Tuesday after being rushed to Dumas Memorial Hospital for treatment following the accident. None of the three occupants of the plane were hurt.

Young Newsman Hurt In Sunday Accident

David F. McReynolds, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dave McReynolds, fell victim Sunday afternoon to a series of

mishaps that began with a routine news event.

David went to help his father cover a downed airplane in a field just northwest of the city limits of Stratford shortly after 1 p.m. Sunday.

Upon arrival at the scene, W.D. Brannan, of Brannan & Sons Flying Service, had refueled the 1947 Navion which was owned by Neal Gathwright of Buena Vista, Calif. Gathwright, his wife and daughter, were returning from Illinois to California when they ran out of

fuel and the father landed the plane in a field owned by the Price Estate.

The plane was pulled upon the county road, known locally as the Stock Pens Road, and Gathwright announced his intentions to taking off down the dirt road.

McReynolds and his son went back towards town with the younger McReynolds getting out of the car about 2,000 feet from the railroad tracks to film the plane with movie film for KVII-TV in Amarillo while McReynolds blocked traffic and intended to film the proceedings from the east end of the road.

Gathwright gunned the plane and down the road he came, the plane never got flying speed and as David McReynolds shot away with the movie camera the plane's right wheel dropped off into the borrow ditch pulling the plane from the road down into the ditch and up into the field adjoining the road.

BETTER IRRIGATION WATER MANAGEMENT--can be accomplished many times by shortening the length of rows. This is especially true on shallow open soils. This is what several farmers such as Clyde Tims is doing in preparation for the 1975 wheat crop. In doing so Tims has found that he can better determine when to irrigate and how much water to apply and apply it more efficiently. Tims believes that shorter rows on the more shallow soils will not only yield better crops but also conserve irrigation water for future use. Tims who farms southwest of Stratford says that "on some land it may be more economically feasible to construct a tailwater pit and pump the runoff back to top of hill for re-use." This is a good alternative to shortening row lengths on Sunray soils and especially so if you have a sizable acreage of Sherm clay loam soil.



"Oh! I don't waste too much water." is the reason given many times for not shortening length of rows or installing tailwater recovery systems. However, do you realize that Sherman County farmers are currently pumping approximately 250,000 acre feet of water from the Ogalalla formation each year. One percent of that would be sufficient water to irrigate 1500 acres. Ten percent would water 15000 acres.

The more loss the greater this amount becomes. We can readily see that we must do all that can possibly be done to conserve our most precious natural resource and source of life.

The cattle feeding industry has suffered some critical periods this year and to give you an idea of the situation here are some figures that might be of interest to you. As of August 1, 1974 there were 1,795,000 head of cattle on feed for slaughter. This is 22 percent below one year ago.

Cattle coming into Texas Feedlots in July totaled 344,000 head which is 3 percent below the previous year in July.

Other states that feed cattle are experiencing the same problems as Texas. Following are the number of cattle they had on Feed August 1: Arizona: 431,000 head, 21 percent below one year ago. California: 976,000 head 16 percent below one year ago. Colorado: 690,000 head 24 percent below one year ago. Iowa: 1,210,000 head, 25 percent below one year ago. Nebraska: 1,030,000 head 25 percent below one year ago. Kansas: 875,000 head 25 percent below one year ago.

Social Security News

Have you a question about social security? Address it to Robert Schaller, Branch Manager, P.O. Box 1292, Guymon, Oklahoma 73942. You will receive an answer in this column or by mail.

Q. My wife, who is 65 years old, will need to undergo surgery. Is there anyway this can be covered under Medicare. She has never worked, and I am only 62 and not yet retired.

A. You can qualify her for Part A of Medicare (hospital benefits) by filing a claim for retirement benefits. You are old enough-age 62-to do this, even though no cash benefits are payable because of your earnings. If you do this, she can file for wife's benefits and qualify for Hospital Insurance under Medicare since she is already 65. This can be retroactive to cover any hospital stay within the last 12 months, if she was 65 and you were 62 at the time. She has medical insurance coverage (Part B) to help pay the doctor bills only if she signed up for it during her initial enrollment period. If she missed this enrollment period, she can enroll for Part B during any General Enrollment Period, an open enrollment period from January 1st through March 31st each year.

Q. We have a retarded son, age 32, who has to be fed, dressed, and otherwise cared for by my wife. When I became entitled to social security benefits, will my son also receive a check?
A. Since your son became disabled before age 22, he very well may be eligible for disabled adult child benefits when you start receiving benefits. Also, your wife, because she is caring for him, may be eligible for monthly benefits regardless of her age.

ON WALL STREET

There's a good side to the high price of oil and the flood of dollars the Arabs are receiving for their black gold. A lot of those dollars are coming back to the U.S. as the Arabs discover that there are very few countries where the investor is as well protected as he is in the U.S. There are also few countries which can supply the military hardware the Arabs are buying.

As a result of the Nixon/Ford Administration efforts to strengthen U.S. influence in the Middle East, big contracts are being signed between Saudi Arabia and this country. Bechtel Corp. is designing a \$100-million airport; Rathcon is supplying the hardware for the Saudi air defense system; Lockheed is selling the Saudis 30 C-130 cargo planes and Whittaker Corp. will provide \$17-million worth of equipment and maintenance for three Saudi military hospitals. Before the year is over, one American company is expected to win a \$300-million contract to equip the Saudi Arabian National Guard. Contracts of less than \$20 million are considered to be penny-ante.

A lot of merchandise could have been sold to the Saudis if it could have been produced. Caterpillar had orders for 1000 heavy construction units but could allocate only 350 because their production lines are operating at top capacity. Lockheed snared a contract for two TriStar jets with a price tag of \$25-million each for the national Saudi Arabian Airlines. General Motors is building an assembly plant at Jiddah.

The Saudis are upgrading almost every phase of their economy, including communications, education and transportation systems. Over \$1-billion alone will be spent on the University of Riyadh. A 3-million metric ton steel mill is under construction and Bechtel has also been hired to design an industrial complex for the oil/gas rich eastern province near Dhahran. Over \$10-billion will be spent on petrochemical and fertilizer plants in the next ten years. The Saudis are also looking for opportunities in food processing, cement and aluminum.

Much of this program is many years down the road. But for the moment, the Saudis are going to have a rough time spending just 25 percent of this year's revenues of \$25-billion.

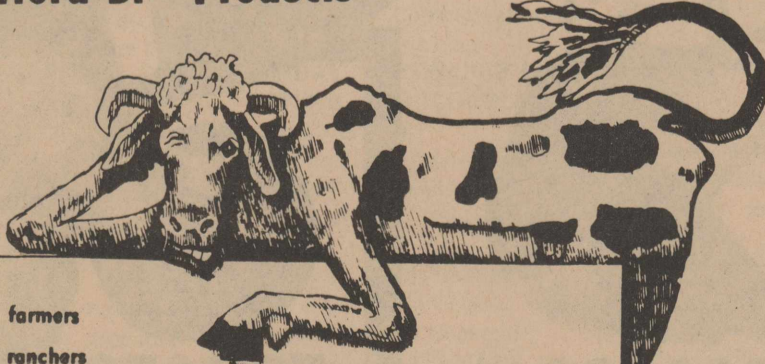

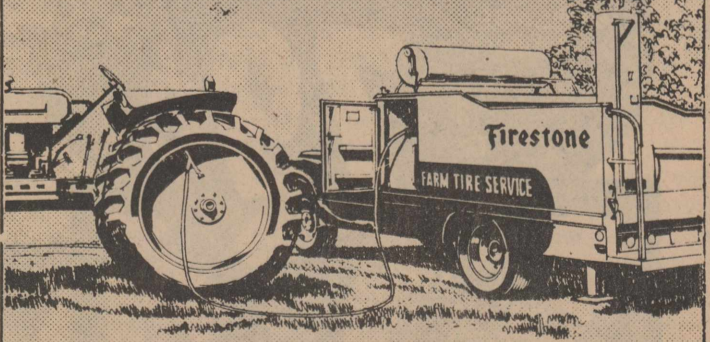
