## Prairiland Patriots Trap Tigers 62-47

The Prairiland Patriots went after the Clarksville Tigers with a vengeance on Friday night, defeating the Tigers 62-47 in basketball action.

"Greyhound", Richard Williams, and Stephen Crawford took high scoring honors with 18 points for Crawford and 17 for Williams, even though Williams sat out the final

period after playing with four fouls.

Early in the game the Patriots kept things hot by

staying very, very close to the Pats. The opening quarter stayed almost neck and neck until Williams and

Jeff Kennedy both scored in the closing seconds of the quarter. That made the score 15-10 at the end of the

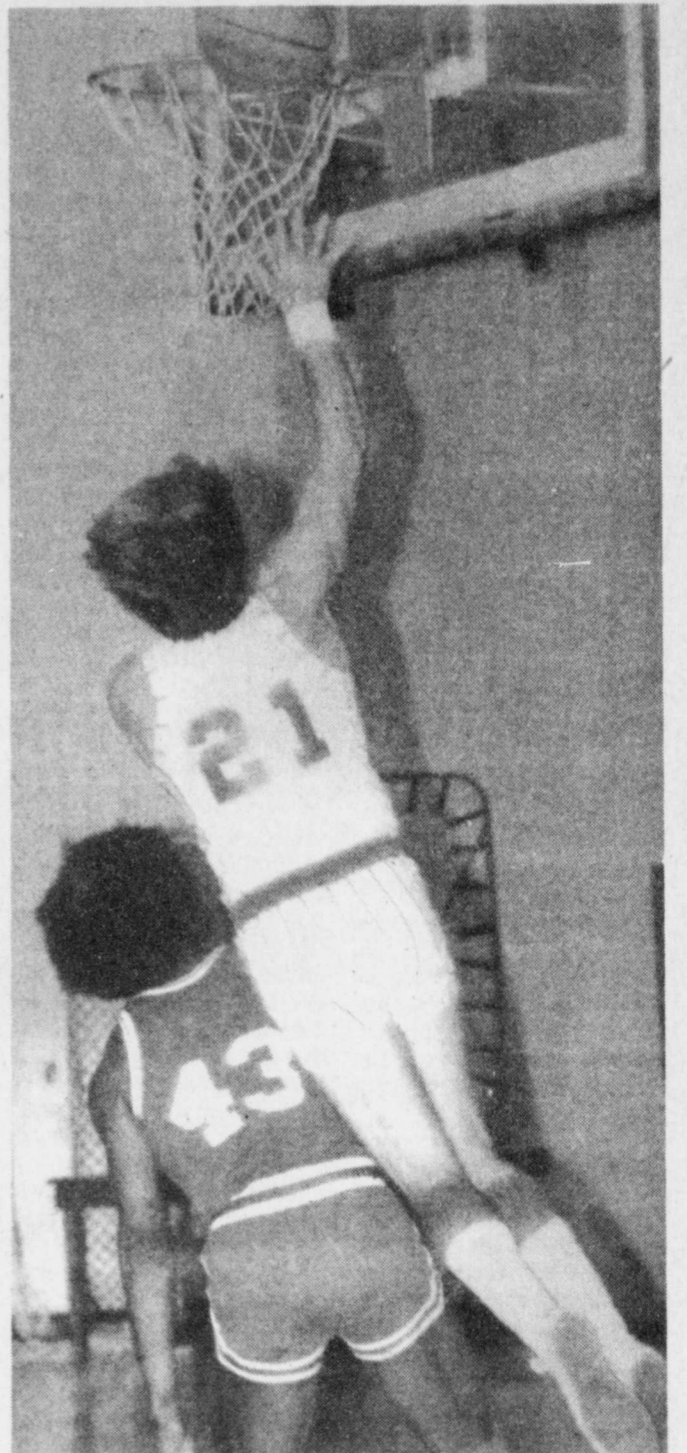
first quarter, and it was the last time the Tigers were really close.

## Three Places To Be Decided In Trustee Election

At a regular meeting of the Prairiland School Board, it was decided to hold a trustee election on April 4, 1981.

Three places will be open on the board, Place 2, currently filled by Harold Morrison, Place 3, Paul R. Keys, and Place 6, Pete McKnight.

Both McKnight and Morrison plan on re-submitting their names for re-election, but Keys will not, since he has resigned due to having a relative hired for the school faculty. The board also approved the purchase of a 53 passenger school bus, which is scheduled for delivery by

September 1, 1981. They also approved the time warrants for the pickup used by the vocational agriculture department.

The board voted to adopt the Texas state proposal concerning suspension of students.

There were several visitors to the board meeting, which were concerned that the school cafeteria at Blossom was serving chili, burritos and other such foods too often. It was pointed out that all menus meet state guidelines, and are well-balanced and meet with approval by experts.

An executive session resulted in extending the contracts of the school principals for another year,

providing them with a two year contract. The principals concerned were Lowry and Geer at Blossom,

Martin at Deport and Simmons at the high school. The board also continued Joyce Allen as secretary for the school.

## Hall Named Subcommittee Chairman

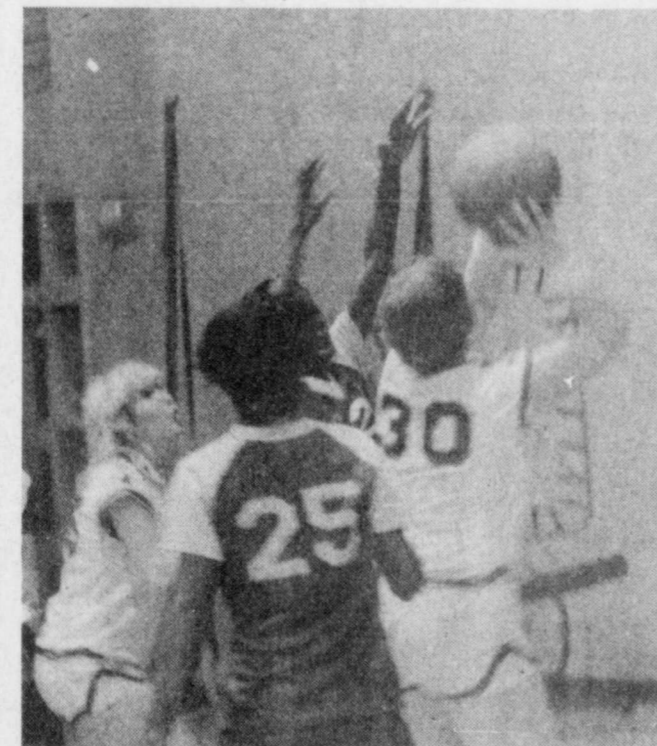
First District Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. has been elected Chairman of a key Subcommittee on the House Veterans Affairs Committee. During an organizational meeting of the Veterans panel recently, Congressman Hall was named Chairman of the Subcommittee on Compensation, Pension and Insurance. The Subcommittee

assignment means that Hall will preside over a budget estimated to be \$13.8 billion during the Federal government's fiscal year 1982. In addition, Representative Hall will be charged with legislative responsibility over the veterans life insurance program, which represents an investment of some \$93 billion.

Few Congressional Subcommittees match the overall dollar amount of

budget authority embraced by the Subcommittee on Compensation, Pension and Insurance. The Veterans Administration is the third largest federal agency.

There are 2.3 million veterans receiving compensation payments for disease or injury received during military service, and 1.3 million veterans and dependents receive pensions due to non-service-connected disabilities.

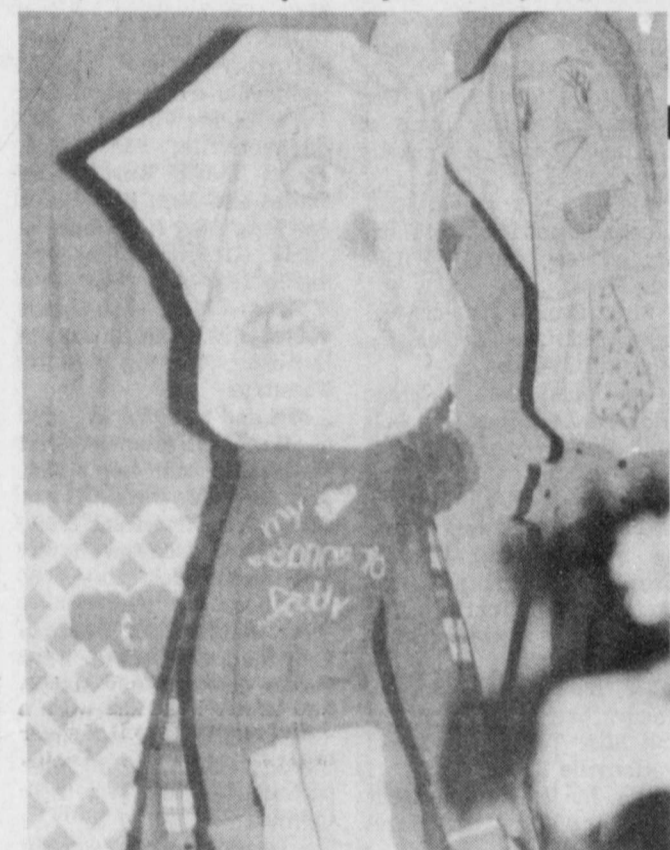

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### Taxpayers Can Have Tax Computed By IRS

Taxpayers who file the single-page 1040A form may choose to have the Internal Revenue Service compute their tax, regardless of the amount of adjusted gross income, the IRS says. The same tax computation service is offered to taxpayers who file the 1040 long form, whose adjusted gross income is not more than \$20,000 on a single return or \$40,000 on a joint return, and who do not itemize deductions or use income averaging.

Income must be from wages, salary, tips, dividends, interest, pensions or annuities for the IRS to compute the tax.

All the taxpayer has to do is complete limited portions of either return, attach all W-2 earnings statements, and sign and mail the return by April 15, 1981. The IRS will complete the return, compute the tax, and forward any refund due. If additional tax is due, the IRS will bill the taxpayer and no interest or penalty is charged if the bill is paid within 30 days, or by April 15, whichever date is later.

The tax return instructions explain which sections of the return to complete so that the IRS can compute the tax.

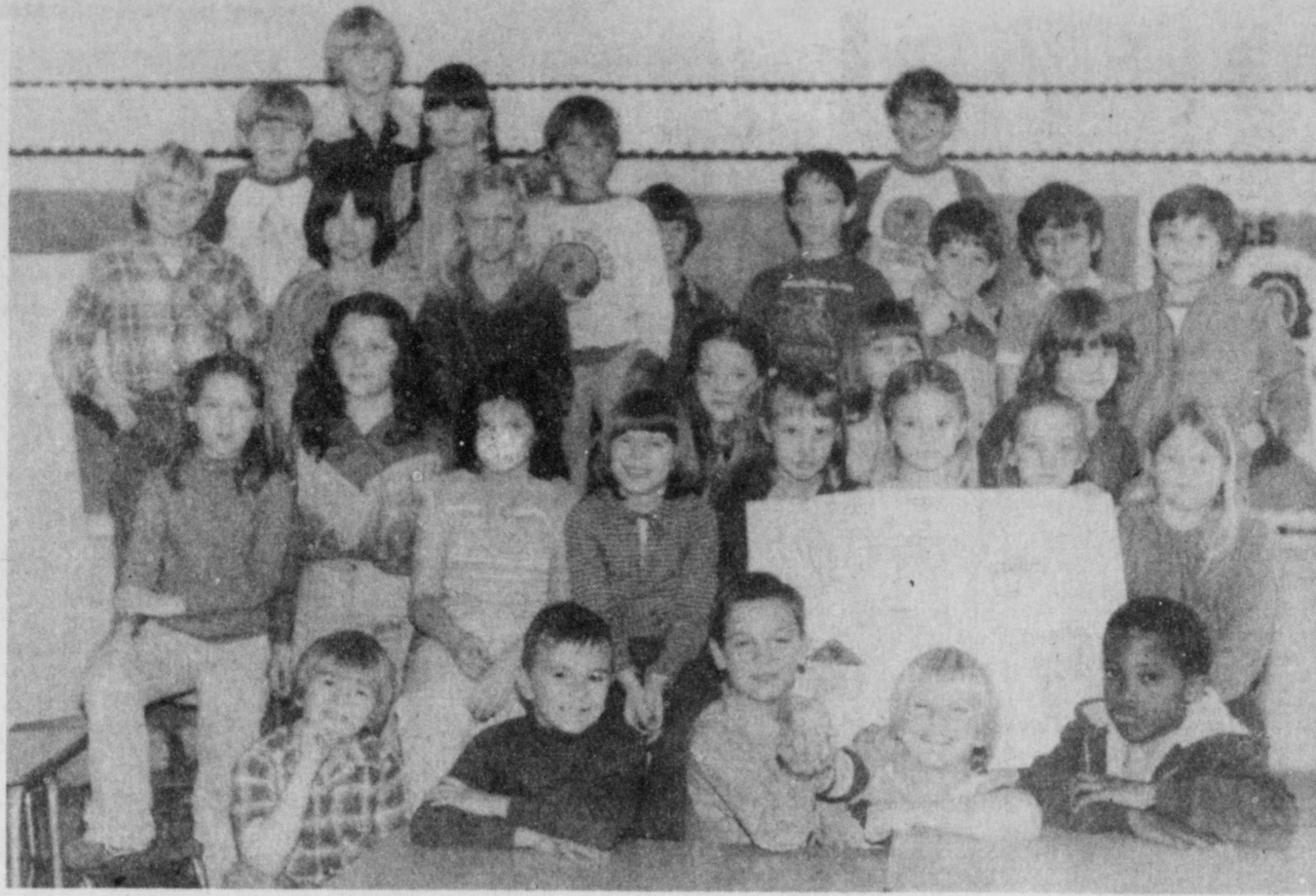

## Old Time Hunts Were For Fun Or Food

It may that my mind deceives me, but it seems that it used to snow more when I was a kid than it does now.

My dad used to bring home a rabbit to hang in a tree overnight so that it would chill. We would have it for breakfast, and it sure was good.

I haven't had any rabbit since the depression. We weren't the only ones who ate rabbits back then. They were known as Hoover Hogs back then, after the president.

One of these days I'm going to try cooking cotton tail rabbit again.

We also did a lot of squirrel hunting. I never did hunt with a dog, but went "still" hunting. That meant that you found a likely looking tree and you sat and watched until a squirrel came out and tried to shoot him.

Lots of times we missed the squirrels, but we also had a lot of fun.

We also used to go snipe hunting. Some of the older boys in the community tricked me into that once. ## Weekly Ag Update

An abundance of catfish fingerlings should be available from commercial producers in the area this year, according to Dr. Joe Lock, area fisheries specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If water is available, now is a good time to stock ponds with fingerlings. Transportation of the fish is much easier during cool weather. People who have previously stocked ponds with catfish should keep a close watch on the water level. Due to last year's drouth and low rainfall this winter, the water level in most ponds is down drastically. Some of the fish may need removing to prevent overstocking.

Dr. Randall Grooms, Extension area livestock specialist, says that some producers have hopes of finishing the winter with reduced feed supplies. We still have almost two months until the end of winter. The first hint of green in pastures could be misleading. Lush spring grasses are extremely high in moisture and low in dry matter.

Therefore, it does not provide as much nutrition early as it will later in the spring.

Although feed costs are extremely high, Grooms says that the cows must have a subsistence level of nutrition to make it until spring grass. It takes considerable more than subsistence levels for the most efficient reproduction. If cattle are to make it through the winter, feeding is a must.
