Candidates Express Views In Election

A major position and three council positions are open in the City of Blossom, and will be decided on April 2, with the election being held at Blossom City Hall. Running for mayor in an uncontested race is George Lemley. Lemley was appointed as mayor to fill the unexpired term vacated by L.C. Cotham when Cotham resigned.

Lemley is 49 years of age, and he and his wife have two children. They have lived in Blossom since 1972.

Lemley states that he "Wants to see Blossom better itself".

The three council seats open have only three can-

didates. Thomas House states that he wants to "Help improve

the city with street improvements, Low Income Housing Projects and a

balanced budget. Ann Thompson is 38 years old, and a speech therapist

for the Red River County Education Cooperation at Clarksville.

She has been a resident of the city for 3 years, and has two children. She is the daughter of Marvin and Otriel Bruce of Blossom. She is a graduate of Mary Hardin-Baylor. She states that "I am interested in this council seat because I am aware of the need for good government, especially at the grass roots level."

Nathaniel McDonald is 36 years old and has lived in Blossom for ten years. He and his wife, have five children.

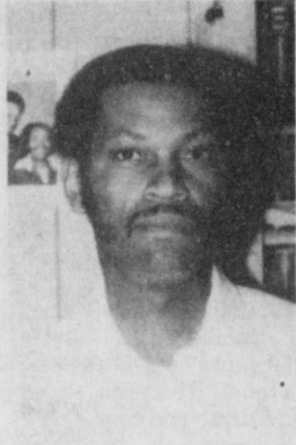
McDonald says that "I am interested in helping in governing city affairs, and in getting a proper sewer system."

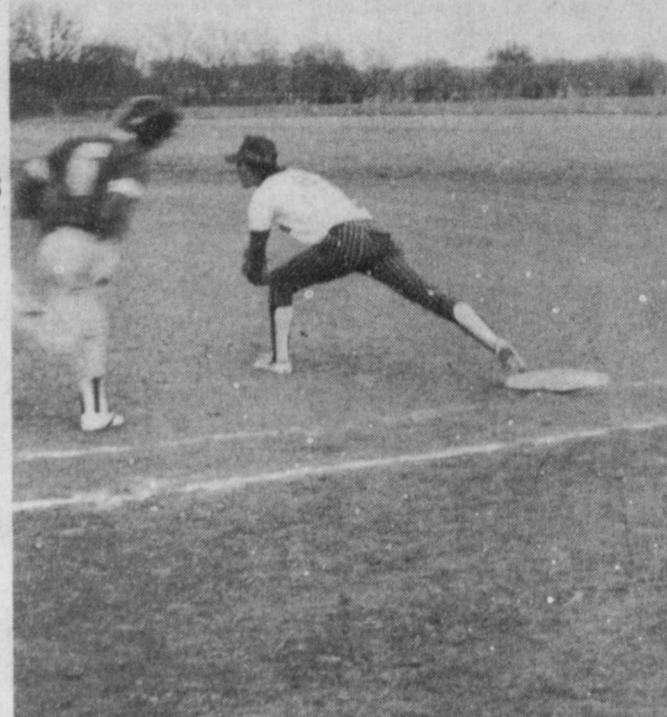

School Board

Election To Be April 4

The Prairiland Independent School District will hold its school board election on April 4, 1981.

The election will be from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. that evening and there will be four polling places. Cunningham Community Center in Cunningham will serve that area and Prairiland High School will serve the Pattonville area. The Blossom and Deport

Elementary Schools will be the polling places for those communities.

There are four people running for places on the school board.

Filing for Place 6 are James (Pete) McKnight of Cunningham and Johnny Dawson of Deport is running for Place 3. Harry Bright is running for Place 2. Bright is from Blossom. Also running for Place 2 is Harold Morrison of Blossom.

Pig Wrestling, Livestock, Stew And Auction Set

Prairiland 4-H and FFA members have a big day planned, and so do a few other people.

The Prairiland Livestock Show will start at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, April 4, and from there proceeds through all the judging, a championship pig wrestling, and stew supper, and finally a large auction, with items being donated by businesses ranging from a pair of Chinese Geese to hay movers and gates.

Concessions will be available at the Pattonville Community Center, and the livestock show will be held behind the center.

The Pig Wrestling, stew and auction will be held at the Prairiland Campus.

One of the highlights of the day is the Championship Pig Wrestling, which pits a wild pig, a large square of mud, and a barrel against three person teams. Within five minutes, the team must catch the pig and put him into the barrel.

Thirteen men's teams are entered, with such auspicious people on them as County Judge Brady Fisher, Gene Rader and John W. (Dub) Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Three women's teams are also entered. The winner with the best time will receive a hundred dollar prize.

A schedule of events is as follows: 10:00 a.m., All Swine, Poultry, Rabbits and

Miscellaneous to be in place; 11:00 a.m., Swing Judging; 12:30 p.m., Poultry, Rabbits

and Miscellaneous judging. At 1:00 p.m., Lamb Judging; at 1:30 p.m., Beef Cattle

Judging. Pig Wrestling will commence at 4:00 and the stew

supper at 5:30. The auction will follow the stew supper. Everyone interested in any or all of these events is urged to come out and enjoy a day in the spring sun surrounded by kids, animals and good clean fun, pig wrestling being excluded from the "clean" label!

Prairiland Girls Place Well In Meet

Three members of the Prairiland girls track team placed in four events at the Mt. Vernon Tigerette Invitational Track Meet (High School Division) held Saturday, March 28.

Sheila Morton took first place honors in the 1600 meter run at Mt. Vernon with a time of 6:06.98.

Penny Edwards placed in two events at the meet. Second place in the shot put was claimed by Miss Edwards after her toss of 34'4 3/4". She also earned fifth place honors in the discus with a throw of 97'10 1/2".

Sixth place in the 3200 meter run was earned by Prairiland's Vickie Coursey with a time of 14:23.42.

The team accumulated a

total of 21 points at the meet to place tenth in a field of 15 teams.

Paul Pewitt took top honors at the competition with a total of 93 points.

Other teams participating and their total accumulated points for the meet are as follows: New Boston, second, 92; Mt. Vernon, third, 84; Clarksville, fourth, 51; Commerce, fifth, 48; Winnsboro, sixth, 34; North Lamar, seventh, 33; Rains, eighth, 26; Linden-Kildare, ninth, 25; Quitman and Jefferson, eleventh (tie), 18; Detroit, thirteenth, 11; Honey Grove, fourteenth, two; and Rivercrest, fifteenth, none.

The team will be returning to Mt. Vernon today to participate in the District 13AAA Track Meet.

Girls track teams from all schools in District 13AAA will be in the competition, which will begin at 10 a.m. with preliminaries in the track events. Field events are to begin at 11:30 a.m., and finals in the track events will start at 3:30 p.m.

Schools involved include Mt. Vernon, Prairiland, Clarksville, Pittsburg, North Lamar, and Winnsboro.

Also competing in the contest from Prairiland High School was Charlotte VanDeaver, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon VanDeaver of Deport.

Weekly Agricultural Update

Spring is traditionally the time of year that people become more concerned with insects and plant diseases. James Chandler, area forestry specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that pine tip moths are beginning to appear in Christmas tree plantations and urges producers to keep a close

watch and apply insecticides at the appropriate time. Dr. George Philley, Extension area plant pathologist, says that now is the time to start spraying roses for diseases. A regular spray schedule should be maintained on roses to prevent severe damage by diseases. Several fungicides are approved for

this purpose. It now appears that a good peach crop is being set in East Texas orchards. Philley urges producers, whether small or large, to maintain a strict spray schedule for both diseases and insects that attack peaches. If the good crop is to be kept on the trees, a regular spraying program must be carried out.

Lenna Furgerson Met Challenges Of Life

Many people in this area know Lenna Furgerson, and her husband Tom Furgerson.

Those who don't, should. Of course that opportunity is somewhat limited now, as Lenna and Tom live in Gainesville, Florida now. However, those from around here who attended the

Deport Homecoming in July last year had the opportunity to renew acquaintance with her.

Lenna had polio when only an infant. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cube Shuman, was born in Red River County, just east of Deport on a small ranch.

After the bout with polio she had to be tied into her high chair because she couldn't sit up, but slowly with the help of parents who refused to let her think she could not do something, she learned, and grew, and conquered her disability.

Recently she was featured by a Florida paper as a profile in the Easter Seal campaign.

She also is active in trying to see that barriers against the handicapped are removed from restaurants, stores and other business places.

She says that "When you

come up against a six inch curb, brother, that's it".

Not many curbs, or anything else have slowed her down though. Tom created a platform with rollers on it, and at home she scoots around the house on it rather than the cumbersome wheel chair.

She keeps their six-room house, cooking cleaning and doing what she likes to do. She recalls that her father once promised to whip her if she ever used her condition to get sympathy.

Her mother ran the hotel in Deport, once located just west of the Elementary School, but now torn down. Her early training, from her parents and the area folks, left her feeling that life was a challenge to be met, not run from. She has proved that such a challenge can be met, handled and stored away.

Pride and courage played a part in Lenna's conquest over a handicap. Pride and

courage she learned from the beginning, here, in this area. Lenna is a remarkable woman, and part of that comes from her roots, which are firmly planted in East Texas.

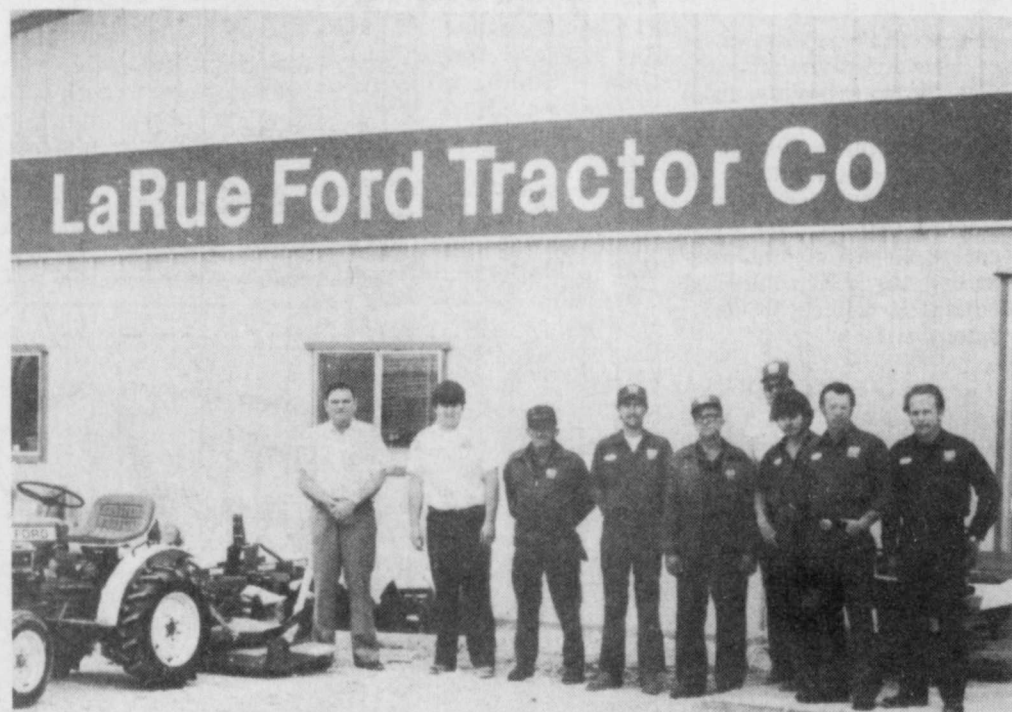
Miss Crawford of Deport earned the only points made by that team in the 800 meter run with a third place finish.

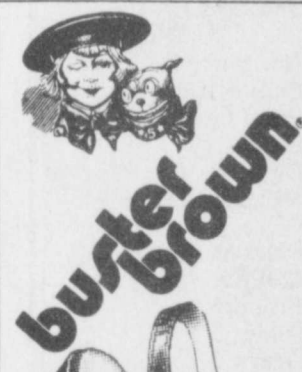

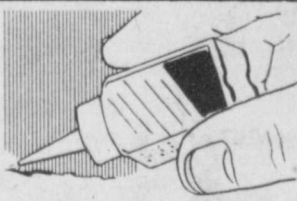

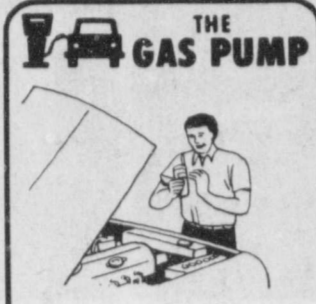

Positive Parenting Course Begins April 7

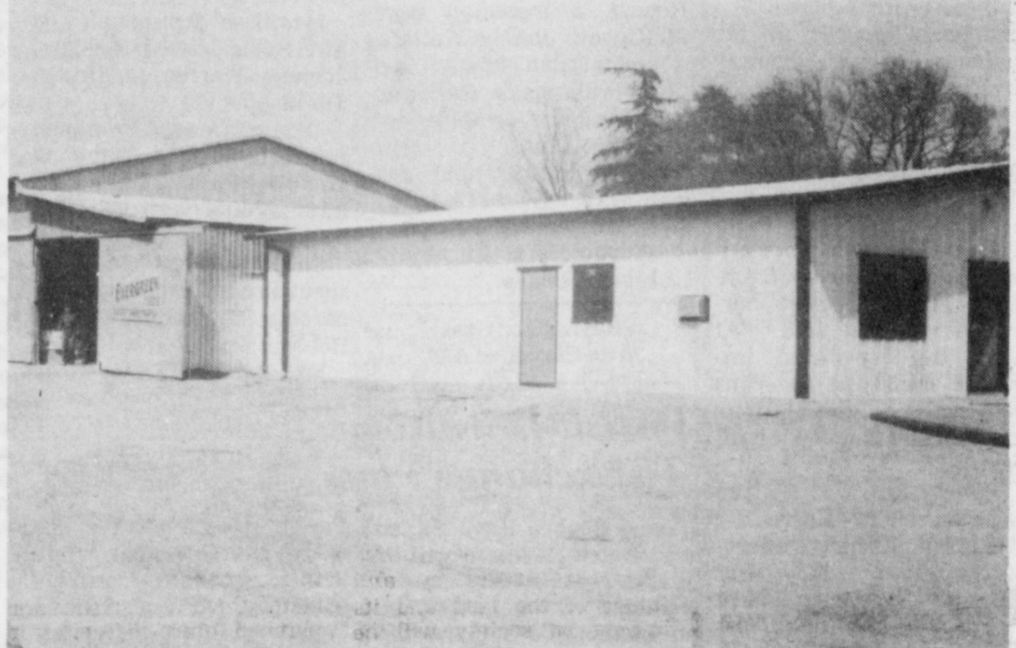
