

Prairiland Takes Third In UIL Competition

Prairiland High School took third place in overall points at the UIL competition when six schools met at North Lamar High School on Friday to vie for top spots in the District 13-AAA University Interscholastic League's district literary meet.

Taking First Place was Mt. Vernon High School and second went to North Lamar. 194 total points netted Mount Vernon the top slot. North Lamar, neck and neck with the Franklin County school throughout the meet, took second with 167 points. Prairiland followed with 123, officials said.

Students taking top slots in the Friday meet will participate in regional competition at East Texas State University April 24.

In the journalism events of Friday's meet the top three winners in Feature Writing were Terri Floyd of Mount Vernon High School, first; Tammy Stout of Prairiland, second; and Mike Bell of North Lamar High School, third.

Winners in the Newswriting division were Sheri Irby of Mount Vernon High School, first; Terry Carson of Winnsboro High School, second; and Casey Bailey of Prairiland High School, third. The Editorial Writing division winners were Sheri Irby, Mount Vernon, first; Dana Hallman, Winnsboro High School, second; and Tina Moore of Prairiland High School, third.

The top three winners in Headline Writing went to Jeff Pipkin of Mount Vernon High School, first; Nannette Hollingsworth of Mount Vernon High School, second; and Dana Blackburn of Prairiland High School, third.

Winners in Ready Writing category were Debra Rozell of Prairiland High School, first; Nora Many of Pittsburg High School, second; and Lance Brooks of

Clarksville High School, third. In Informative Speaking the top three winners were Lorie Kennedy of Prairiland High School, first; Norris Minter of Mount Vernon High School, second; and Craig Reynolds of North Lamar High School, third.

The top three winners in Persuasive Speaking were Mark Stretcher of Mount Vernon High School, first; T.J. Leonard of Prairiland High School, second; and Brian Brashier of North Lamar High School, third.

In the Number Sense Category, North Lamar students captured the top three places with Jeff Draper taking first; Duane Cuttrel, second; and Allen Carter, third. North Lamar students also swept the Calculator division, taking the top three places. Jeff Draper received first in this division, Allen Carter took second and Rob Smith, third.

Section II Poetry Interpretation winners were Debra Williams of Prairiland High School, first; Jon Mills of Winnsboro High School, second; and Karen Parsons of North Lamar High School, third.

The top three winners in the Science division were Jan Galbreath of Pittsburg High School, first; Tim Wilbanks of Pittsburg High School, second; and Steven Howlett of Clarksville High School, third.

Winners in the One-Act Play competition were North Lamar High School and Prairiland High School. Prairiland received 43 points for their play and North Lamar received 42. North Lamar captured the Best Actor trophy and Prairiland received the Best Actress trophy. Both schools had members in the All-Star cast.

The first and second places in Debate went to Mount Vernon and North Lamar.

Few Surprises In Area Elections

Though turn out for the area school board and city council elections was measured as light, few surprises were found in the results.

In the Prairiland I.S.D. races, in Blossom Place 2, incumbent Harold Morrison defeated Harry Bright, 119 to 110. In the Deport Place 3 race, Candidate Johnny Dawson, who ran unopposed,

received 189 votes. Unopposed in Cunningham Place 6, incumbent James McKnight received 185 votes.

In city elections, Blossom incumbent Mayor George Lemley was elected to a one year unexpired term with 36 votes. Unopposed for two year terms on the city council were Nathaniel McDaniel with 36 votes,

incumbent Thomas House with 34 votes, and Lynda Ann Thompson with 32 votes.

Deport city elections found Former City Secretary Walter A Gifford with 64 votes, incumbent John C

Randall with 52 votes, and John Lee Roach with 78 votes, elected to the Deport City Council. Don Neal, with 40 votes, was defeated for one of the three open council seats.

Highland Cemetary Needs Funds


The Prairiland 4-H Club will hold its next regular meeting on Monday, April 13 at 7:30 p.m.

Errors Are Avoidable


Many of the errors that delay tax return processing, slow refund checks, and inconvenience taxpayers are avoidable, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The most common math error on both forms last year was incorrectly reporting the tax table for their filing status, following the line for the wrong income level, and looking under the incorrect column for number of exemptions for that taxpayer.

Other common errors on tax returns are not using the peel-off label and instead

writing incorrect or illegible social security numbers, only one signature on a joint return, failure to attach W-2's, "Wage and Tax Statements," and failure to attach supporting forms and schedules.





East Texas Eating

By Margie Rice
Ah, the joys of tender, garden-fresh spinach! I like to whisk the first, still small, leaves through a gentle bath of faintly warm water, let them dry in a colander, and toss them with little leaves of Bibb lettuce and crisp red radishes slices. A few grinds of fresh pepper, a sprinkle of salt, and a light drizzle of home-made wine vinegar and oil dressing is the perfect dressing for this, spring's first garden salad.
Next, I like to steam the new spinach leaves just a minute—until they are cooked tender, and serve mounded with slices of hard cooked eggs.
This week, I've tried anew twist with the spinach—Spinach Quiche. It is an adaptation of a friend's Zucchini Quiche recipe and makes a marvelous luncheon or supper main dish. Or, cut in small wedges and serve as an hors'doeuvres.

just until tender and drained
2 Tbsp. parsley
1 green onion or 2 Tbsp. onion, chopped
1/2 cup bread crumbs
7 Tbsp. grated Swiss or Monterey Jack cheese
7 Tbsp. milk or cream
Freshly ground black pepper one third tsp. salt
1 egg, lightly beaten
1-7" pie crust, optional
spread bread crumbs in bottom of 7" pie pan.
Saute parsley and onion in oil until tender
Place the spinach on top of the bread crumbs.
Sprinkle the grated cheese over the spinach
Combine the milk or cream and the eggs and pour over the cheese.
Bake in a pre-heated 400 degree oven about 20 Minutes.

For a 10 inch quiche, increase the amounts to:
1/4 cup parsley
2 green onions or 1/4 cup onion, chopped
1 lb. spinach
2 Tbsp. oil
1/2 tsp. salt

Freshly ground black pepper
3/4 cup bread crumbs
3/4 cup grated Swiss or Monterey Jack cheese
3/4 cup milk or cream
2 eggs, lightly beaten

The quiche is puffy and lightly browned when it comes from the oven. That is the perfect time to whisk it to the table. It is as good, though not quite as pretty, after it waits a few minutes. Left-overs warm up nicely, too.
The quiche is supposed to be made in a pastry crust. It is almost as good without the crust—and sports fewer calories.


