School Board Decides On Coaching

The prairiland School Board met in regular session last Monday, April 6, and handled several items on the agenda.

Johnny Hatcher was hired as a teacher in the Prairiland School system but was not rehired as a coach.

Hatcher had been coaching the Prairiland Varsity Girls basketball team. That position is currently open, and no assignment to the coaching position has been made as yet.

The newly elected board members were installed, and officers were elected.

Ernest Stinson was elected as president of the board again, with Bobby Kennedy to serve as vice president

and Harold Morrison as secretary.

The school board also

changed the date of their regular meetings from the first Monday in each month

to the second Monday in each month. They adopted a resolution

to participate in Lamar County's Single Appraisal District.

They also set the date for the equalization board to meet. The board will meet June 26 from 8 a.m. until 4

p.m. at the Prairiland Administration building. Anyone wishing to meet with the board should contact the tax office prior to that date for an appointment and information.

Pick-Up Trash Must Be Bagged

The City of Deport will no longer pick up any trash if it is not in a plastic garbage bag.

The new rule will take effect immediately, and if trash set out on Wednesdays in not in a plastic bag, it will be left at the curb.

There is not supposed to be any garbage of foodstuffs in

the bags, if there is, it will not be picked up.

The City of Deport is now using a new type of garbage pickup and loose trash makes them unsanitary. They ask the cooperation of all citizens in this matter.

Council Makes Several Decisions

At a regular meeting of the Deport City Council all members were present, as well as the newly elected council members, who were installed at the last of the meeting.

A visitor, Rev. Jim Munston of the Faith Baptist Church of Deport, was present to inquire as to running water and sewer lines to their new church, which is currently

under construction.

Munston asked questions as to whose responsibility it was to run the lines across the property of Dwayne Rhodes. Rhodes had already given permission for the lines to cross his property. Munston also wanted to know what size lines and other information concerning the project.

There is not enough fall to hook onto the lines at the

front of the lot, and water and sewer will have to go 410 feet to the church.

The council decided that it was not the responsibility of the city to pay for the lines across Rhodes' property.

Munston also wanted to know if the city would loan them their back hoe, but the motion carried that any such use would require payment appropriate to such work. The council voted to pay the light bill for the lights at the Little League Ball Park for little league games, but not for other uses. A discussion as to fees for the use of the ball park on softball tournaments and similar uses was discussed.

Action was taken concerning an amendment to be sent to the Department of Water Resources regarding User Charges Systems.

Dr. Glover was appointed as City Health Officer, subject to his acceptance of

the position. Neil Wolf, owner of the local cafe, was present to request that since she is already paying for a dumpster and pickup, that she have the \$2.50 monthly charge for trash pickup removed from her water bill.

Council approved a motion stating that any business or residence which had a commercial dumpster and was already paying such charges would not have to pay additionally.

A bid of \$1,501 for both lots the city has for sale by John Lee Roach was turned down, and a bid by Earnest McCarty of \$501 for the single lot on the east side of town was accepted.

The council also voted to pay the \$40.38 in taxes the city owed Red River County, and the meeting was closed.

Deport Scouts Trying To Replace Equipment

The newly formed Deport Boy Scout troop is doing odd jobs in the community for a small fee in order to raise money to supply the troop.

There was no troop last year, and camping equipment which belonged to the scouts and was stored in the Fire Department has disappeared. The equipment was valued at \$700.

The troop is also inviting any boy interested in scouting to contact them and

join the scouts for fun and learning experiences.

False Alarms

Two False Alarm calls, both turned in as a fire at Frank Rhoades Grocery in Deport, are not as amusing as someone apparently thinks.

The first call came in on a Thursday night, and the caller sounded like a child. Unable to find any fire the firemen were concerned that the fire might be at the Rhoades residence, and waited while City Marshal Bud Nobles drove the several miles out to the Rhoades home to check it.

They finally went back to the station, where they had to put up the trucks.

On Tuesday night, a little earlier than the first time, someone sounding like a child again called in that there was a fire at Rhoades Grocery. Again there was no fire.

If the caller is a child, perhaps they need to be told that false alarms are not funny. Firemen could be seriously delayed from going to a real fire while answering a false call.

The trouble the firemen go to, interrupting their lives to answer the siren, and the expense of taking the trucks out and then having to restore them to complete readiness, should also be considered.

Another factor is that there are serious penalties for giving false alarms and tracing calls such as that is not difficult.

Whoever is doing should be advised to stop, before a true problem is created

Deport, Bogata Papers Win Awards

The Bogata News took second place in the News Story contest and fourth place in Sports coverage Saturday in the annual newspaper contest sponsored by North and East Texas Press Association.

The Deport Times won third place in Sports coverage.

The winning entry for The Bogata News was a story by Pat Wright in the Jan. 24, 1980 issue entitled, "Hammer Wielding Grandmother Terrifies Robbers." The story concerned an attempted forced entry into the home of Mrs. Emmie Kidd of the Rosalie Community. Judges comments were, "Lead paragraph appropriate, but a bit long. Story holds readers attention. Story concise, to the point."

The Deport Times third place in Sports coverage was awarded for the work of Casey Bailey, Nanalee Nichols and Richard Naylor for coverage of Prairiland sports. Judges comments

were, "Casey Bailey, Nanalee Nichols and Richard Naylor of The Deport Times get more front page sports space than any other writers. Their stories are not a play-by-play account, but adequately cover the event. Some good photo shots.

The fourth place in Sports coverage for The Bogata News was awarded for the coverage of the Rivercrest Rebelettes in the State Basketball Tournament in 1980 and for coverage of Rebel football. Two stories entered were written by Mary Fortner, accompanied by pictures by Bob and Pat Wright. The third entry was written by Scotti Wood on the game between the Rebels and Mt. Vernon, with photos by Bob Wright. Judges' comments were, "...there are many good stories that the big city papers don't care about....The Rivercrest Rebelettes of the two towns' school get as good of coverage from her as she gives the boys varsity teams."

Although neither John Hood's column nor Nanalee Nichols' column won an award, judges comments were favorable: "John Hood has a nice way of informing people on historical sidelights. Needs more identifiable display, such as standing head and/or same page placement."

About "Nichols Worth," judges said, "Nanalee Nichols did a good job on how a few words will do the job. Nichols presents a nice light batch of good news. Liked the standing head and the title of the column."

Judges for the contest were members of the Arizona Press Association. There are 33 daily newspapers and 64 weekly newspapers which are members of the North and East Texas Press Association.

Awards were made at the annual convention, held this year in Nacogdoches at the Fredonia Inn. North and East Texas Press will meet in Paris in April, 1982.

Cathy Lemley Wins Scholarship Award

Cathy Lemley of Blossom and Maidie Barr of Paris received the William A. Owens and Rebecca Fitch scholarship awards at the annual creative writing and art program Friday, April 3, at Paris Junior College. The program, sponsored by the PJC communications division and art department, is designed to give recognition and cash awards to students in categories of creative writing and art, explained Tony Clark of the PJC English faculty.

This year the program was held on Friday afternoon, and a reception for award winners was given Friday evening followed by the Sulphur River Poetry Revival, a poetry-reading session by Northeast Texas area poets, Clark and Charles Embry, Brenda Bell and Jim Reynolds of East Texas State University. The poetry revival was planned to give students an opportunity to hear original creations read by the authors.

The Owens award, which is based on overall excellence in writing, honors

the former PJC student who is an author in New York, and the Fitch scholarship is given to an outstanding art student in memory of Mrs. Fitch, longtime art instructor at PJC. The awards were presented Friday by Dwight Chaney, dean of general academic instruction at PJC.

Miss Lemley, a graduate of Prairiland High School, also won first prize in the Texas literature category for her work, "The East Texas Oil Boom and My Grandparents." 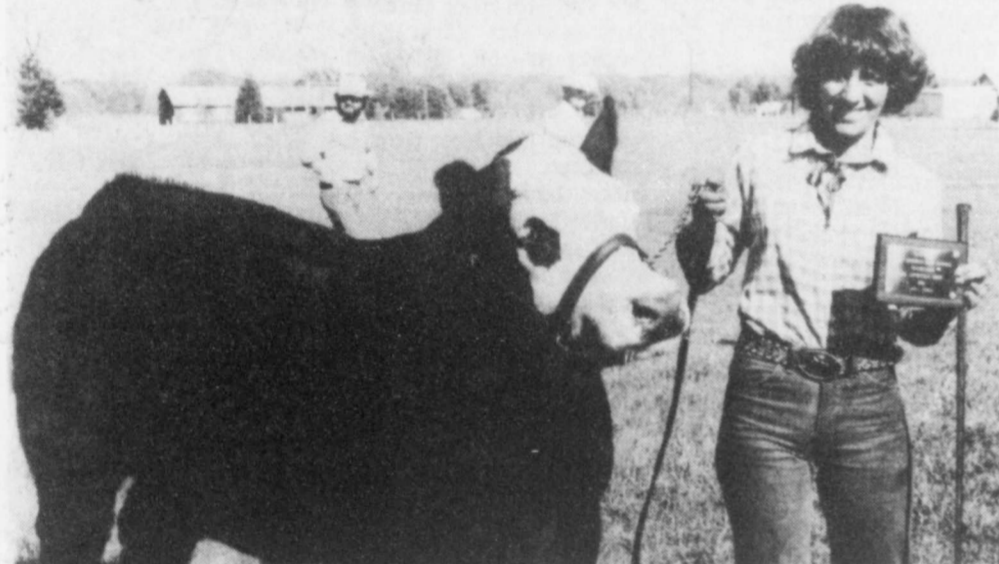

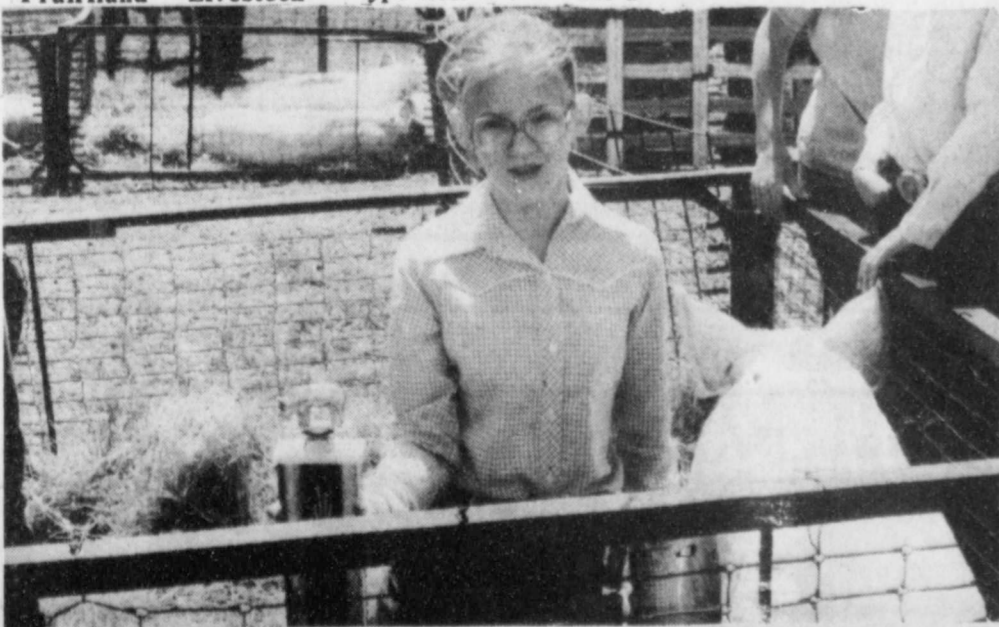
