## Prairiland Students Capture Honors At County Livestock Show

The Lamar County Livestock Show saw Prairiland FFA and 4-H members capture award after award this year.

Thursday and Friday, April 23-24 were the two days set aside for judging and trophy giving, but the whole event has been being prepared for all season.

After hours of cleaning, brushing, washing and careful feeding, after miles of walking and days of practice, the biggest show of the year finally arrived, and the Prairiland students were ready.

Although for the first time in eight years a Prairiland

student failed to capture the Grand Champion Steer award, grand champions and reserve champions were claimed for the local kids in almost every other category.

Prairiland Vocational Ag teacher Max Ballard stated that "the best animal definitely won, but we got a few changes in mind for next year."

Gina Malone was named Lamar County Livestock Show Queen.

Jeff Ballard, Prairiland FFA, took a lot of honors in the swine division. He had the female gilts grand champion and reserve champion awards as well as

the reserve champion barrow and finished first and second in the heavyweight division.

In the lamb show Susan Northam, Prairiland FFA, had the grand champion lamb in the market division. Susan also won the heavyweight market lamb division and Melody Hollan of Prairiland 4-H had the lightweight division trophy with Lanieca Gillie, also a member of Prairiland 4-H winning the second place.

Bennette Holland, a member of Prairiland 4-H had the grand champion broilers.

Roy Joynes of Prairiland

4-H captured top honors in the miscellaneous category of the show with his ducks.

Sabrina Long, Prairiland 4-H had the reserve champion dairy cow.

Randy Ballard of Prairiland won the showmanship award for the dairy show, Melody Holland of Prairiland 4-H won showmanship for the market lambs, Daniel Hart of Prairiland for the swine show.

In the horse show Shawn Taylor, Prairiland 4-H took grand champion gelding, the gelding four-years-old and under championship, and was high point exhibitor of

the horse show, winning the showmanship category.

Vickie Course placed second in gelding four and under.

Dana Blackburn, Prairiland 4-H won mare five-years old and over category. She also won second in showmanship, and Michelle Thomas of Deport placed third.

In the Senior Western Pleasure division Dana Blackburn was second, Dana Fults, Third, Robbie Fults won the Junior Western Pleasure.

Tickets are available from any FFA member or instructor.

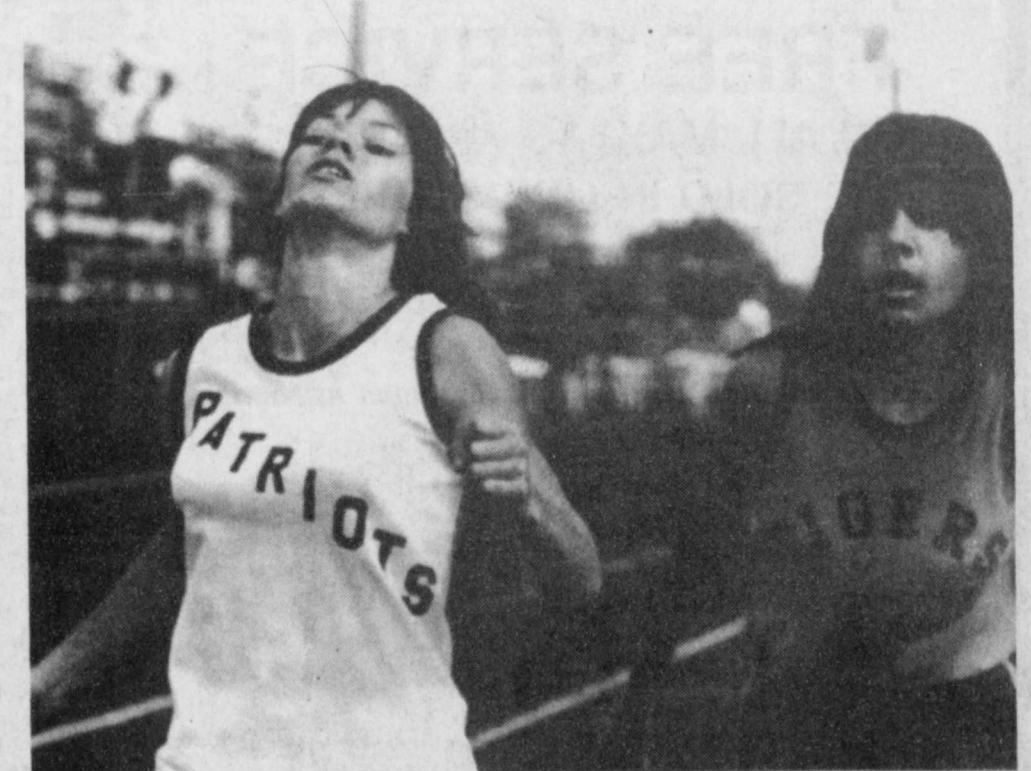
The featured speaker will

## Telephone Equipment To Be Installed

Representatives from Continental Telephone announced today that the installation of new switching equipment in the firm's Deport office is nearly complete. The new equipment, designed to simplify long distance calling for local residents, is scheduled for service on May 5.

The primary benefit of the new system will be the elimination of "circle digit" dialing. Customers will no longer need to dial their individual party digit, but will simply dial 1 + the number they are calling on

station-to-station long distance. Another new feature is TSPS, the telephone industry acronym for traffic service position system. A more common description is 0+ calling. This feature allows the customer to dial collect, person-to-person, and credit card calls directly themselves, instead of going through an operator as before. As the call is going through, the operator will come on the line and ask for any information necessary to complete the call. Bob Mark, Continental's

supervisor in charge of the new addition, stated that the project was progressing smoothly and on schedule. "Our initial testing has been good," Mark said, "and the routine problems encountered have been taken care of. I don't foresee any future problems and we'll be ready to go with the new system on the morning of May 5," Mark concluded. Shortly before the actual changeover to the new system, all Deport Customers will be mailed a letter fully explaining how to use the new system.

# Red River Co. Horse Show Scheduled May 9

The Annual Red River County 4-H Horse Show is scheduled for Saturday, May 9th.

The show will be conducted at the Bogata Rodeo Arena in Bogata, Texas. Registration will begin at 8:00 a.m. and the show will begin at 9:00 a.m. Trophies and Rosettes will be given through sixth place.

There will be Mare and gelding Halter classes, Showmanship and 12 performance events. There will be four age groups and a high point trophy will be given for each age group. Everyone is invited to attend.

At the show there will be

three age groups plus four, eight and under classes. One high point trophy will be given in each age group. First place will receive trophies, with second through sixth place receiving rosettes. Plaques and 18" rosettes will be given for Grand, and plaques and 12" rosettes will be given for Reserve. Contestants must enter showmanship to be eligible for high point.

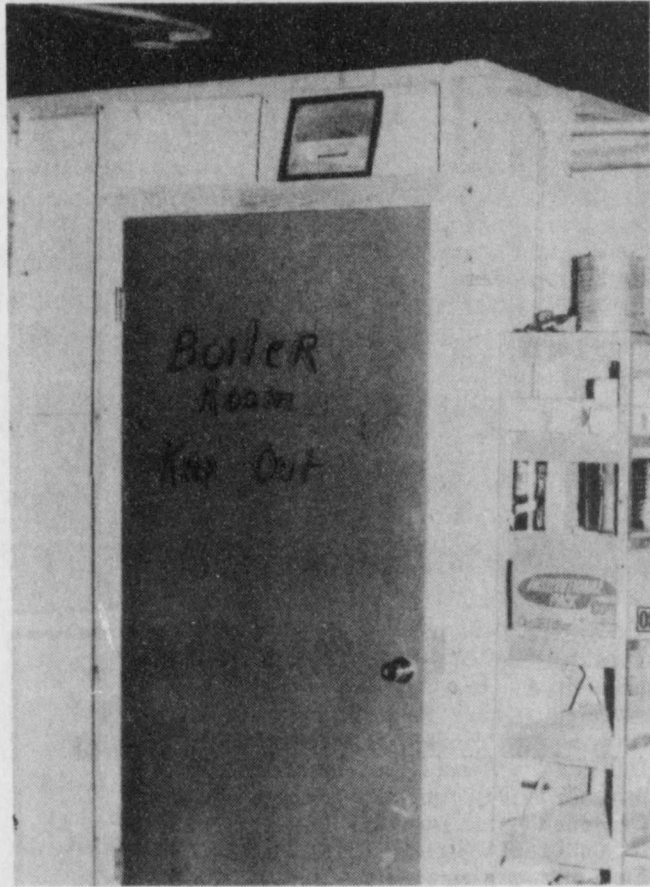

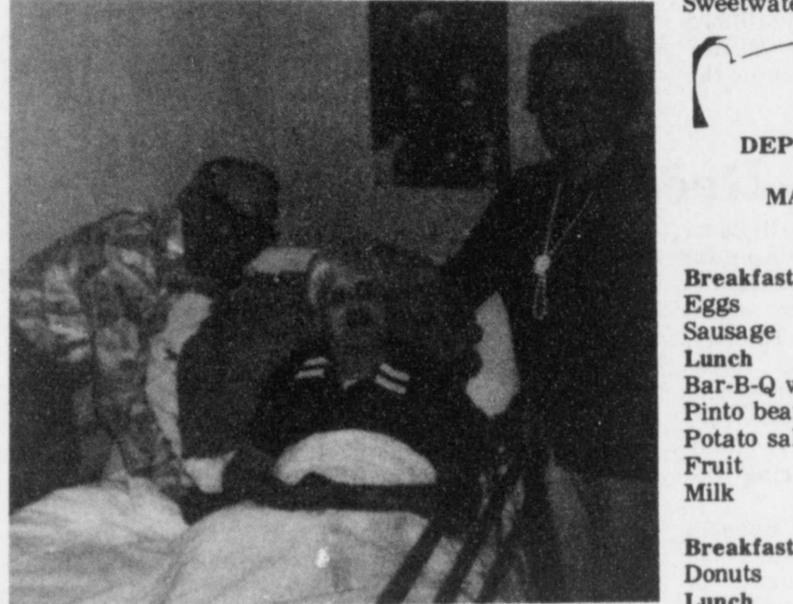

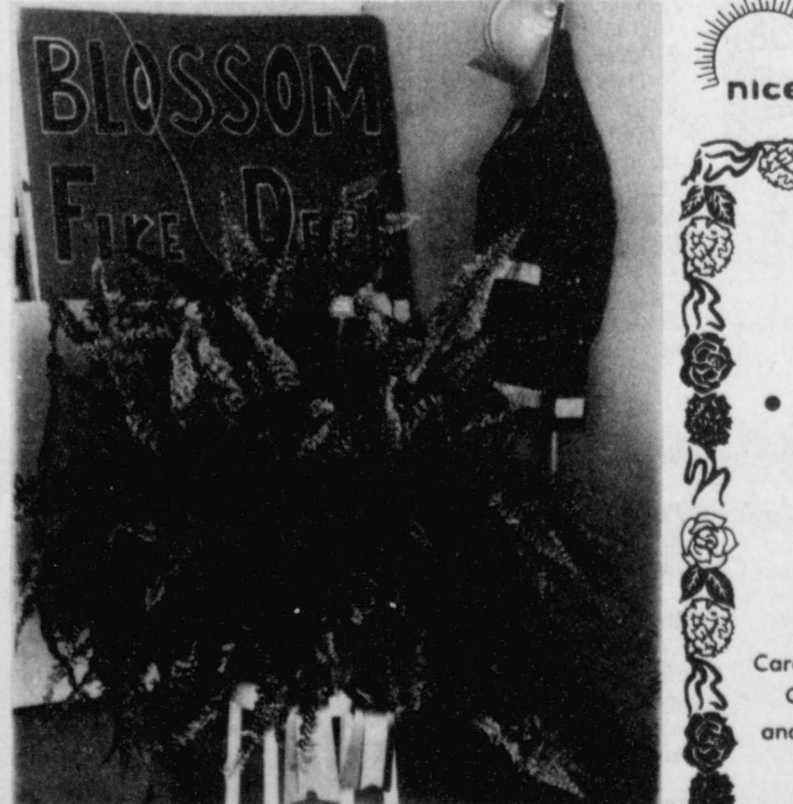

## Public Notice

An ordinance creating a user charge system for the treatment of domestic wastewater; establishing user classification charging for excessive strength wastewater; providing for the annual notification to wastewater treatment service charge of billing; providing for the annual review of operation and maintenance charges; requiring adequate record keeping; providing for charges on extraneous flows and toxic pollutant; taking precedence over inconsistent agreements; and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Deport, Texas as follows:

Section 1: A user classification is hereby established for all users of municipal wastewater facilities, as follows: User Classification Class A- Residential Users, Class B- Commercial Users.

Class A users shall include all residential type users including, but not limited to, residences, apartment units with individual meters, trailer court units with each trailer having an individual meter, duplexes, or any other service primarily intended for domestic or residential type use. The City may include small office buildings, churches and other low volume (similar to domestic volume) users in Class A.

Class B users shall include commercial users, such as, but not limited to, restaurants, cafes, car washes, schools, hospitals, nursing homes, offices, hotels, motels, laundries, grocery stores, department stores, apartments with a master meter, trailer court units with a master meter, etc., not included in Class A. In future, City may establish other user classifications, as necessary, to meet local, state, or federal regulations, or the general needs of the area.

Section 2: All users of municipal wastewater facilities shall be charged a minimum of \$4.50 per month for the first 1,500 gallons, plus a charge of \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons of metered water consumption for usage over 2,000 gallons. The water consumption per month to be billed for Class A users shall be to a maximum of 10,000 gallons in order not to account any water used during months for purposes such as lawn and garden watering from which water is not returned into the wastewater facilities. The water consumption per month to be billed for Class B users shall be the actual water consumption recorded each month for the purpose of water bill. In case of users not on a metered basis, the City shall establish an estimated water consumption based on a comparison of the non-metered user with a metered user of similar class.

Section 3: Review and Revision: The User Charge Ordinance shall be reviewed annually regarding the wastewater contribution of users and user classes, the total costs of the operation and maintenance of the treatment works, and the user charge system. The charges for users or user classes shall be revised to accomplish the following: (1) maintain the proportionate treatment costs among users and user classes; (2) generate sufficient revenue to pay the total operation and maintenance costs necessary to the proper operation and maintenance (including replacement) of the treatment works; (3) apply excess revenues collected from a class of users to the costs of operation and maintenance attributable to that class for the next year; and the rates shall be adjusted accordingly.

Section 4: Toxic Pollutants and Excessive Strength Charges Each user that discharges any toxic pollutants which cause an increase in the cost of managing the effluent or the sludge of the treatment works shall pay for such increased costs. For any user, when the BOD exceeds 300 mg-l, or the suspended solids exceeds 300 mg-l, or when other pollutant concentrations exceed the range of normal domestic sewage, a surcharge shall be added to the basic charge. This surcharge shall be calculated by the following formula:  $Cs \cdot Bc(B) + Sc(S) + Pc(P) \cdot Vu$  (Based on Model No. 2, 40 CFR 35, Appendix B). Symbols and Definitions: C- surcharge for wastewaters of excessive strength, Bc-O&M cost for treatment of a unit of biochemical oxygen demand (BOD); B- concentration of BOD from a user above a base level, Sc-O&M cost for treatment of a unit of suspended solids from a user above a base level, Pc-O&M cost for treatment of a unit of any pollutant, P-concentration of any pollutant from a user above a base level, and Vu-volume contribution from a user per unit of time.

Section 5: Notification: Each user shall be notified at least annually, in conjunction with the regular bill of the sewer user rate and the portion of the user charges which are attributable to wastewater treatment services. Costs shall be broken down to show the operation and maintenance costs attributable to that user.

Section 6: Charges for Extraneous Flows: The costs of operation and maintenance for all flows not directly attributable to users (such as infiltration-inflow) shall be distributed among users on the same basis as operation and maintenance charges.

Section 7: Records: A record keeping system shall be established and maintained by the City to document compliance with federal regulations pertaining to the user charge ordinance.

Section 8: Validity: all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. The invalidity of any section, clause, sentence or provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other part of this ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid part of parts. The user charge system shall take precedence over any terms or conditions of agreements or contracts between the City of Deport and any of the users which are inconsistent with applicable federal regulations regarding user charge system.

Section 9: Billing: users will be billed on a monthly basis with payment due ten (10) days after the date of billing. Users on metered water service will be billed on the same notice as water charges and will be designated as separate entry. Users of the wastewater system not on metered water service will be billed monthly on an individual notice for wastewater service at the rate established by the City. Users with delinquent accounts of fifteen (15) days will be notified in writing by the City that water and/or wastewater services will be terminated unless the account is paid in full. The City will utilize its law enforcement divisions required in the control and management of the user charge system.

Section 10: Ordinance in Force: an immediate necessity existing for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety, AN EMERGENCY is hereby declared to exist by reason of which this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication. Passed and adopted by the City Council of the City of Deport, Texas on the 13 day of April, 1981.

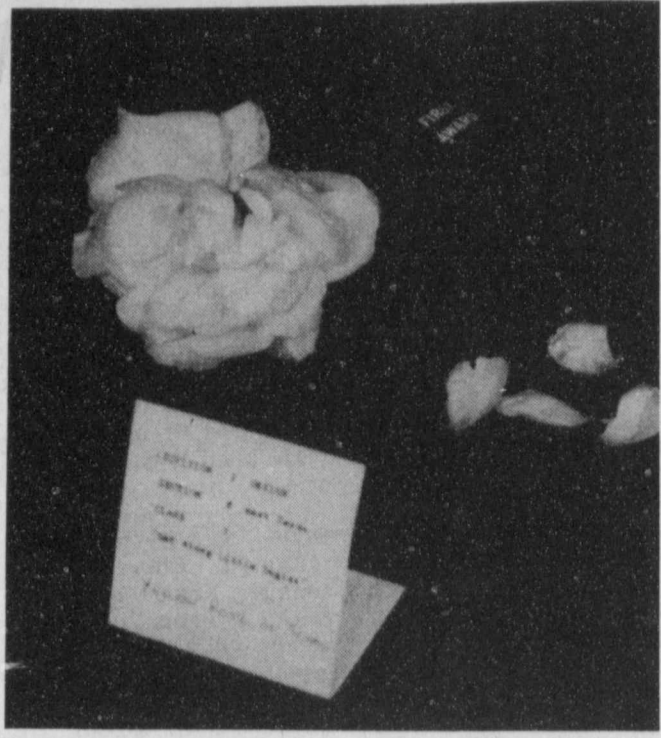

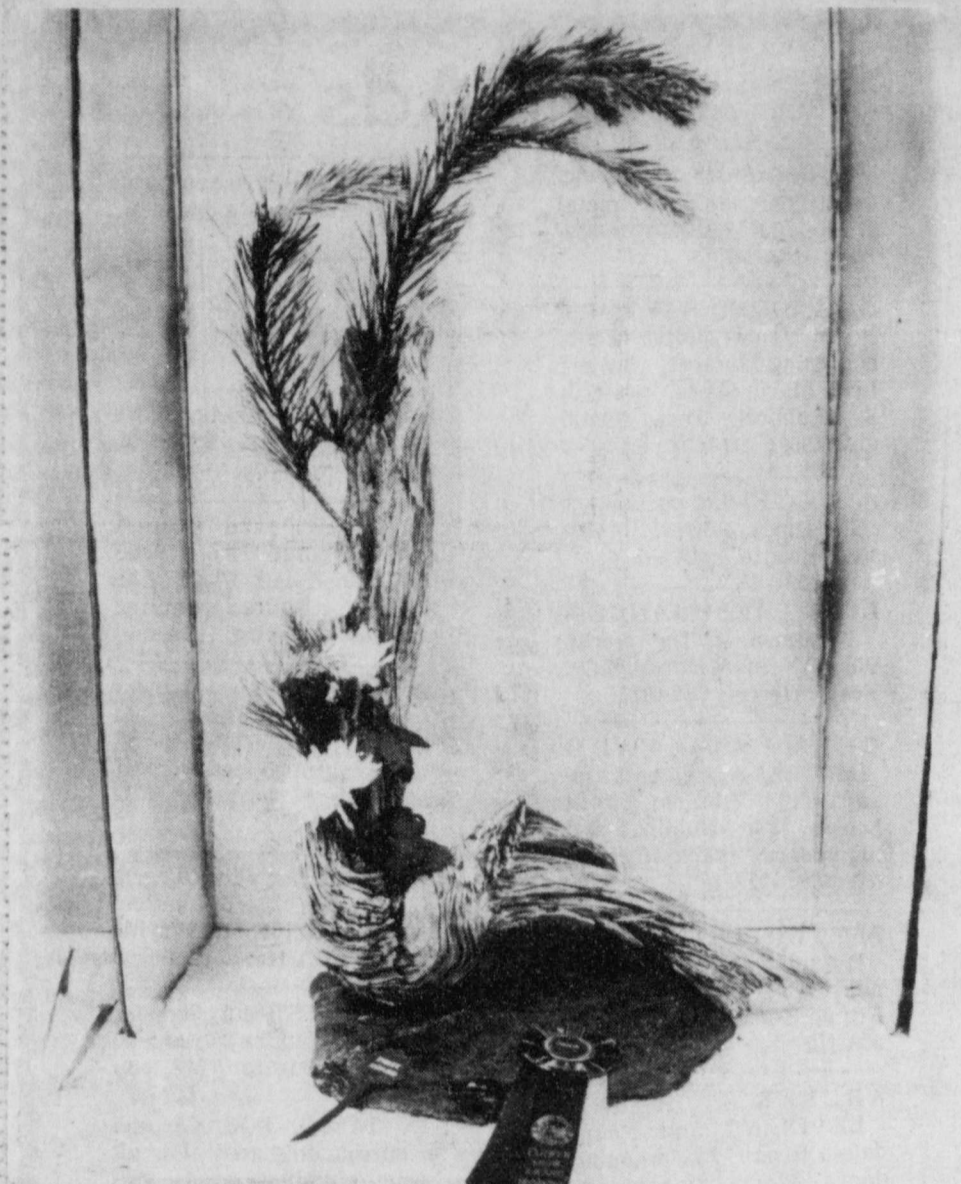
