At least, there are some gaps in my life that have been created by a failure to join the parade marching on the leading edge of latest advances.

It seems that when "most" of the world has something any thought of the part of the world that doesn't have it vanishes.

What the heck am I talking about?

Example: At our offices we don't have touch tone phones. We have old fashioned, heavy plastic, run-over-'em-with-a-truck-and-they'll-still-work phones.

I see no reason to change. They work really great. They ring instead of making bizarre chirping or pinging noises....and they are very inexpensive.

But more and more when we call a company to place an order or inquire about something we come across a recording that sounds something like this: "Thank you for calling _____ Corporation. If you wish sales, press 1; if you wish service, press two; if you want marketing, press three".... Finally, at the end of the conversation it will continue on with "and if you are dialing from a rotary phone, please hold".

The tone of the recording lends a certain touch of scorn to the words "rotary phone" as if someone who is still dialing from such an outmoded instrument might be a lower life form.

Another example, everything we get in, whether it be questionnaire, application form or what, asks for our fax number.

Fax machines are great. They also cost money (like switching over to touch tone phones).

And while we are willing to invest substantial dollars in an excellent desk top computer system, that seems justifiable. Having a fax machine doesn't. Yet everyone at trade shows, everyone in big business seems to think life doesn't go on without a fax machine. They can't understand that we don't want one just for the sake of having one!

On the home front things are much the same.

One of the primary complaints I have is that glasses and dishes are no longer designed so that they can be hand washed easily.

While those pretty smaller-at-the-top than bottom-shaped glasses are frequently gorgeous...they can't be easily washed.

The reason for this is the dishwasher. It cleans em up just dandy no matter what shape!

But I don't have a dishwasher. Again, they cost money, and there are only two in our household...so why do I really need one?

The list goes on and on. Those without VCR's are stared out. (Yes, we do have those, I'm married to a movie-holic).

Food processors, stereos, alarm systems, there's a world of stuff that it seems that "most" people have. But there are still lots of us out here that don't have them. And somehow, advertising and media conspires to make us think there's a little something wrong about that.

But there isn't, you know. No, we simply remember the old, conservative adages we were taught. Those that remind us that if it still does a good job, there is no need to change just for the sake of change.

Those that say a "penny saved is a penny earned".

Frankly, I don't worry a whole lot about a lack of being on the leading edge in what's new.

I'd rather pick and choose those advances that are useful, necessary and truly worthwhile. Those will vary from person to person, business to business, family to family.

But I like to think most of the folks around here do just that, use technology for it's help, not just to be "keeping up with the Jones".

Prairiland FFA Teaches Valuable Skills

This is National FFA Week across the nation. All across the country, Future Farmers of America are observing "their" week and Prairiland FFA is no different.

A trip to the Prairiland Ag Shop and classroom complex reveals just how important and successful the program is.

There are 234 members in the program this year, which features an ag mechanics class, a co-op program and Ag I, II, III and IV.

In the courses they take, they learn skills which will last them through their entire lives.

The Ag Co-op now has 24 participants. FFA instructor Bobby Winters says, "Under the new curriculum, students are able to specialize more than they could before. As instructors, we like the new system. It has increased our paperwork somewhat, but our numbers are up and I believe we can teach better."

Under the new curriculum, students study a variety of subjects in a more specialized manner. One semester is devoted to each subject,

allowing students to "customize" their education, and to develop more completely in their particular area of interest than the old "blanket" courses did.

Learning to build a small shop, rockerless rocking chairs, barbecue grills, entire stock trailers, or even a simple potato bin or birdhouse establishes carpentry skills that will be with the students forever. The knowledge of power tools, the ability to measure, calculate and plan can be applied to almost any project, from building a house to rewiring a porch! Basic knowledge of electricity and wiring serves young men and women well in a society so dependent upon electrical appliances.

Painting, welding, planning and the cost of livestock projects, feed costs, amount of feed used, all these skills are everyday knowledge that is invaluable.

Besides the knowledge of breed histories, bookkeeping, biology and the world of other useful information that the students learn, they also strengthen their ability to function in

a competitive world.

They learn speaking skills, compete in livestock shows, which do much to improve confidence and self-esteem.

The young adults put on their own livestock show in April, along with a stew cookoff and meal, auction (which features items have made) and pig wrestling. The proceeds from these activities pay for the chapter's expenses.

FFA is overall a comprehensive, interesting and learning experience.

At the shop, the radio may be blaring, there may be a lot of laughter and eagerness, but their hands and minds are always very busy....creating, their minds are stimulated. Future Farmers is not just for those who are considering a life in the agricultural field, it is for any young person who wants to improve his life....to function at a high level in life....to be self-sustaining, confident and a well-rounded human being.

FFA, and all those who assist or participate, deserve a big "Well Done" in this, their week.

U.I.L. Passes Judgment On Basketball Incident

An unfortunate incident at a February 6 basketball game between Prairiland varsity boys and Quitman varsity boys has resulted in the game being forfeited by Prairiland, and the Executive Committee of U.I.L. District 13-AAA meeting.

The reason that the game was discontinued and forfeited was that school officials mutually felt that a continuation of the contest could result in further incidents.

This action occurred after a fight between a Prairiland player and a Quitman player erupted, and a few fans from each school came onto the court.

The results of the U.I.L. District 13-AAA Executive Committee, which is made up of the superintendent of each of the member schools, were as follows.

"Both Prairiland and Quitman officials are to be commended for their prompt response and efforts to keep the incident of Tuesday, February 6,

1990 from getting further out of hand.

"Motion by Rains seconded by Mt. Vernon that Trevor Upchurch of Prairiland be suspended for all of the remainder of basketball season and placed on probation for the remainder of his U.I.L. career.

"All other uniformed participants in the game between Quitman and Prairiland are officially reprimanded and placed on probation for the remainder of the school year in all U.I.L. events.

"All District 13-AAA participants in U.I.L. events for the remainder of the year will be suspended from any U.I.L. activity in which they instigate or participate in a fight or conflict of any type or kind that disrupts the decorum of the contest or violates U.I.L. rules.

"Prairiland and Quitman abstained under U.I.L. rules. Motion passed unanimously by Rains, Mineola, Mt. Vernon and Winsboro voted "aye".

These actions have been sent to the U.I.L., who has final disposition in this matter.

Prairiland High School Principal, Dr. Gary W. Ballard, in a letter to Dr. Bill Stamps, U.I.L. Investigative Office, U.I.L. Conduct, said: "The events leading up to the fight are not always crystal clear, but from my vantage point and after viewing the video of the game, I feel that the fight resulted from excess "mouthing" which the referees failed to control. However, the referees cannot be blamed for a player hitting another player."

He continued, "For the seven years which I have served as Principal at Prairiland, we as administrators, coaches, players and fans have worked diligently to foster good sportsmanship and friendly relationships with opponents. We cannot allow one or any number of players or fans to destroy that reputation."

Gunshots, "Flasher" Incidents Marr Saturday

Two separate incidents marred the weekend in Deport. The first involved random shooting on Main Street, the second a young man who visited a number of businesses in a pair of "see through" shorts.

Citizens report hearing what sounded like shots at about 1 a.m. on the morning of Saturday, February 10. Upon arrival at their businesses Saturday morning, it was discovered that The Cabinet Shop, Deport Variety, City Drug Store and Deport Florist had bullet holes in door frames or above windows. A glass at the cabinet shop was broken out.

At three locations that same morning, a young man, described as wearing shorts so thin that they consti-

tuted almost complete exposure, entered businesses and either made improper suggestions to the women, or simply stood around until asked to leave.

He left in a small sized pickup truck. Several of the women in the stores reported the incidents to Constable Randy Boren or the Lamar County Sheriff's Office.

It was reported that a similar incident took place at a Reno convenience store later that same afternoon, and a license tag number obtained at that time.

Law enforcement officials are currently investigating the cases.

City Council Decides On House Numbering,

The Deport City Council decided in their regular Monday night meeting to turn over the house numbering for homes in Deport to the Deport Community Service Club.

A motion was made and passed to have the numbers a minimum of four inches, no smaller. The numbering on the houses will be necessary when the city goes on the 911 emergency system, and will also be attractive and helpful to others.

The Deport Community Service Club is planning on putting up the numbers as a fund raising project.

In other business the motion was made and passed to hire McClanahan and Holmes to do the audit.

It was decided that the Lamar

County Health Department will be used as the as the city's health officer.

In other action it was decided that a gate will be purchased for the Jeffs Lake north of Deport, and it was mentioned that people will still need to obtain fishing permits to fish on the lake.

It was decided that the City Hall must be re-roofed.

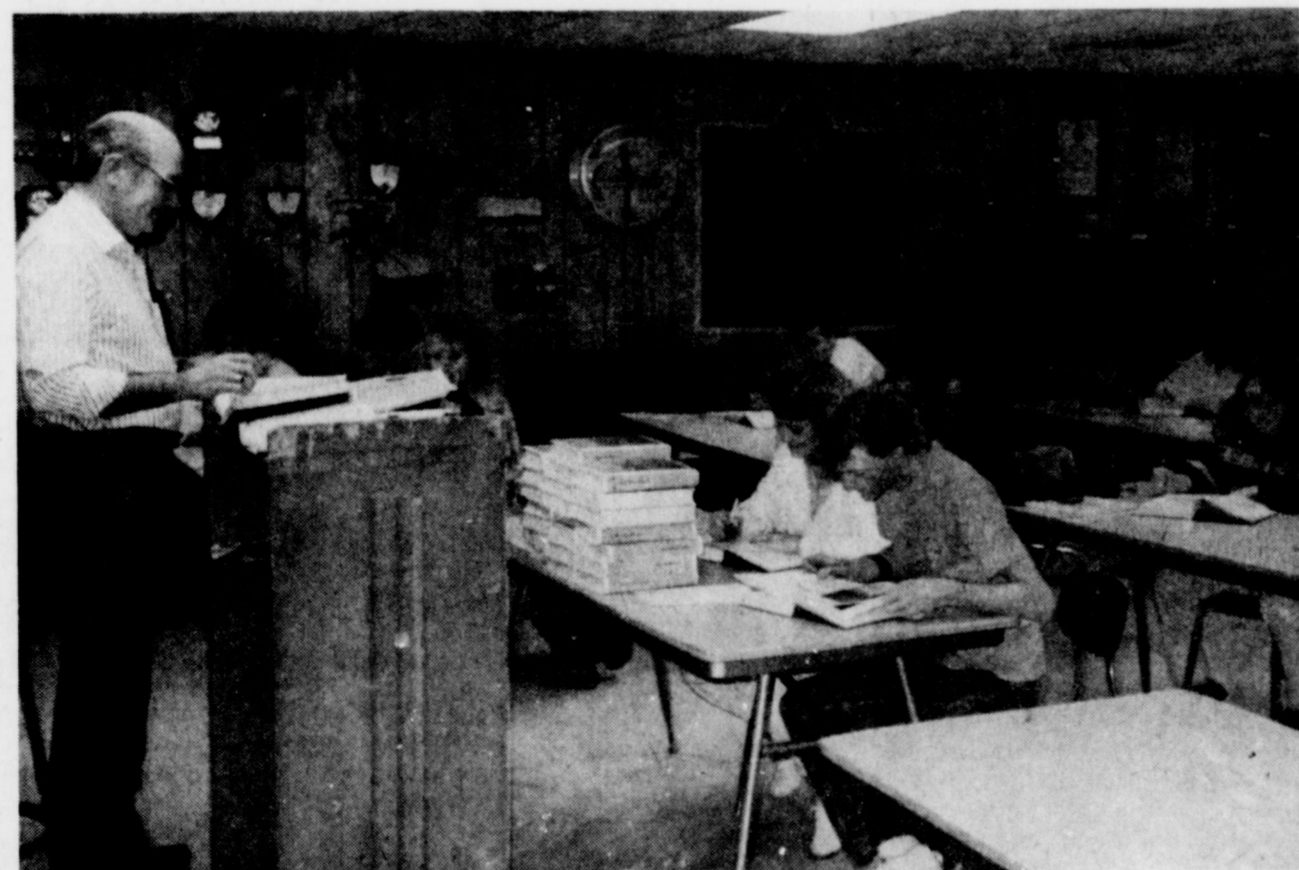
An election was called for council members Duane Glover, Eric Pearson and Mayor Foster's positions.

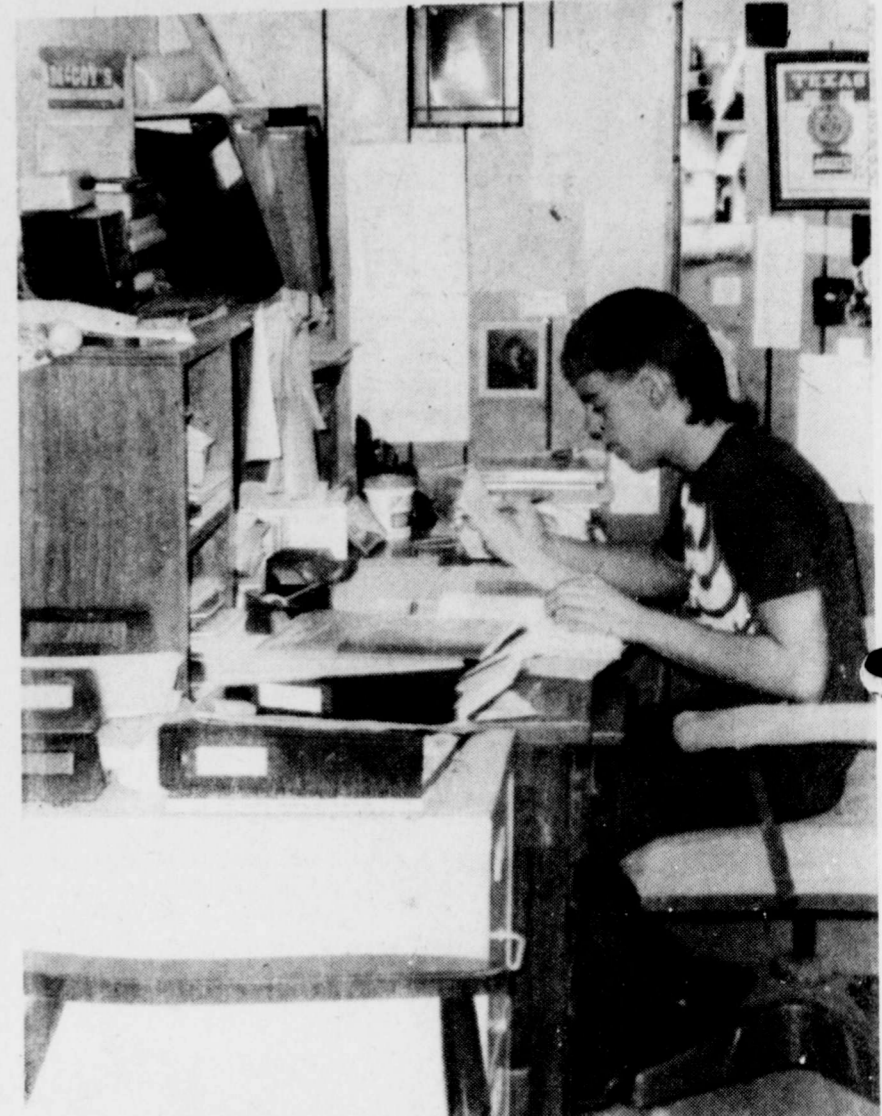

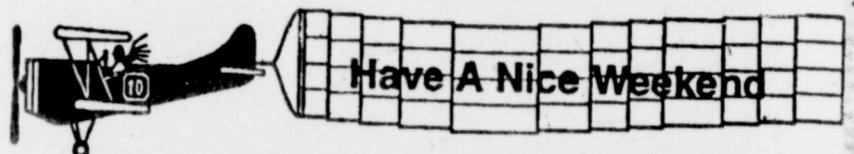

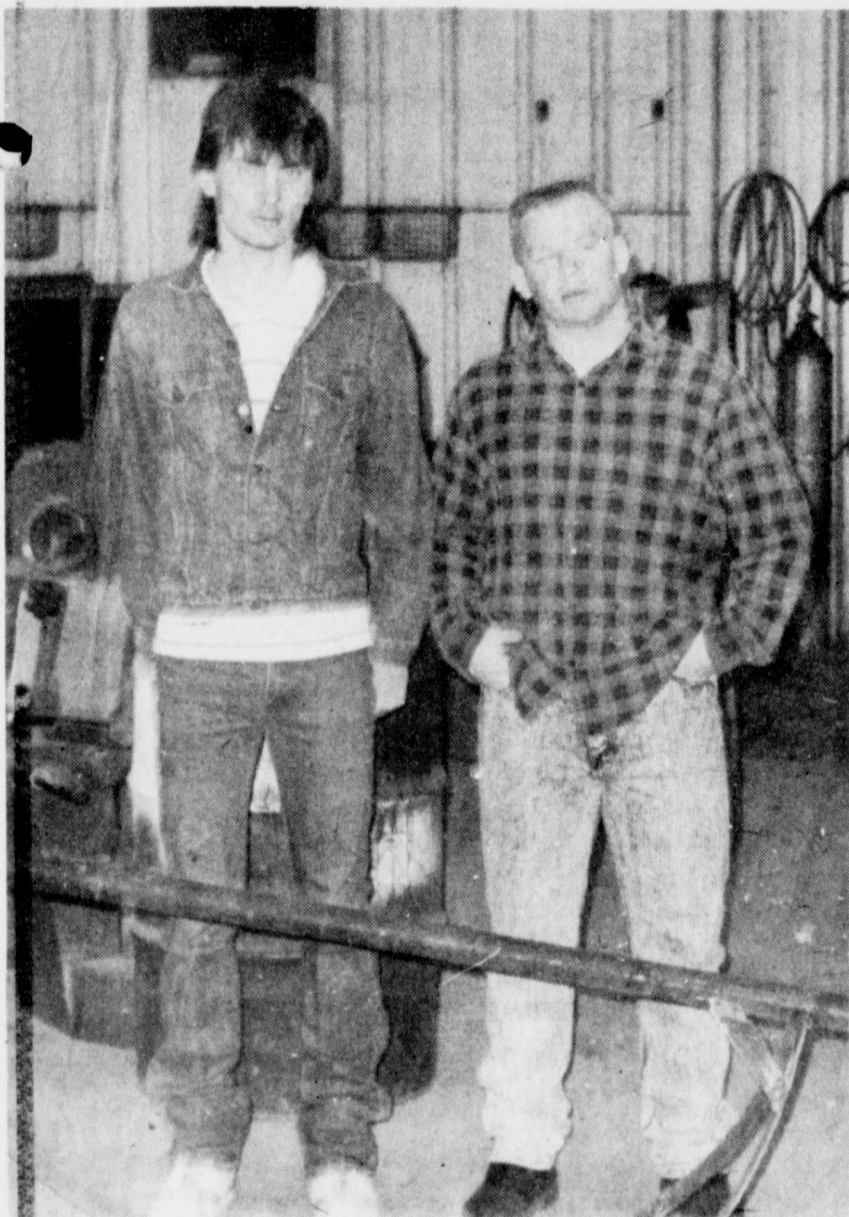

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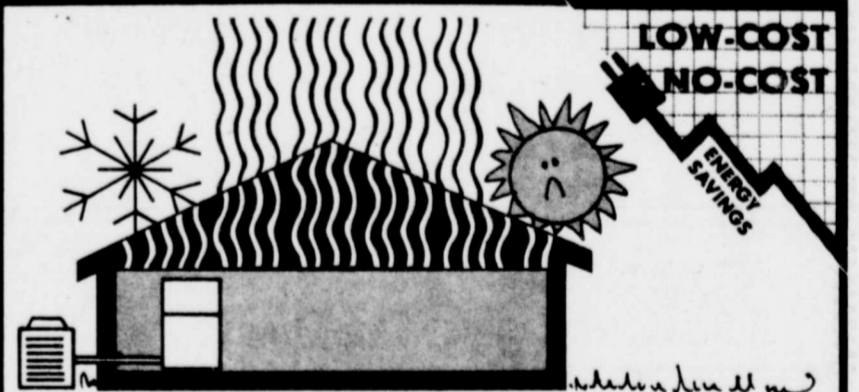
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PJC Education Classes Offered

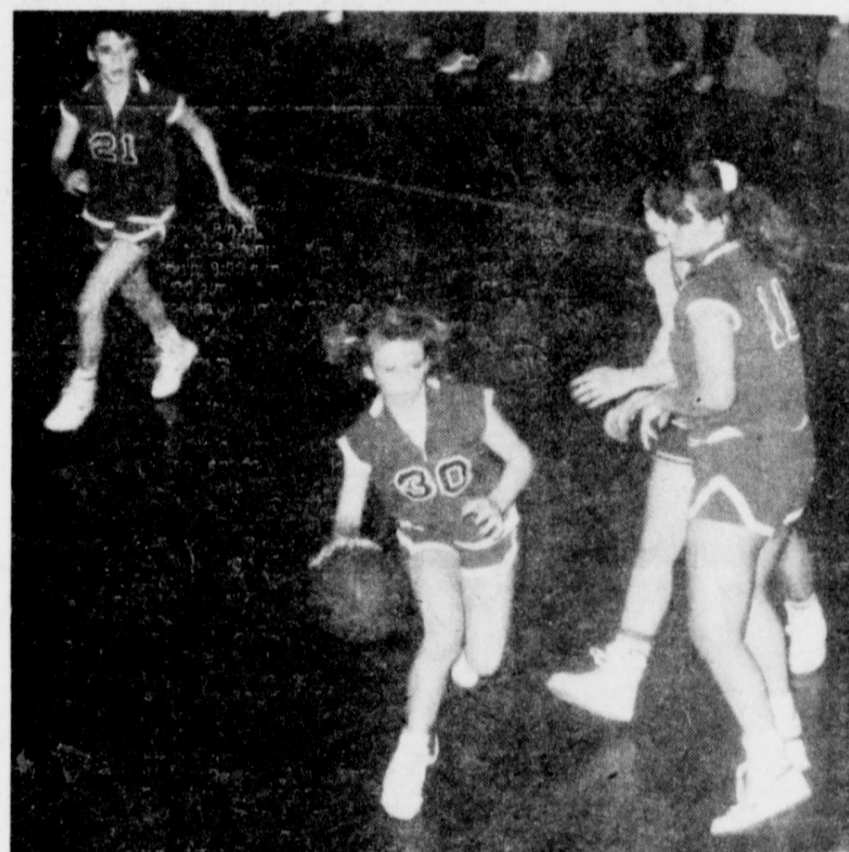
