Tornadoes, Hail, High Winds Torment Area

Night after night of intense thunder storms kept area residents tense as the storms spawned tornadoes and hail, along with high winds.

A small torando whipped from Blossom through Detroit and on across Red River County last Wednesday night, taking large trees and barn roofs, carports and mobile homes.

Unlike those tornadoes in other parts of Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas, no injuries have been reported, however.

Then, on Friday night, weather watchers and law enforcement officials began tracking a huge storm cell

that swept across Lamar, Red River and Titus counties.

Hail up to golf ball size was reported in areas around Pattonville and Blossom.

Tornadoes went through Pattonville, sucking up debris, roof shingles and downing numerous antennas and satellite receiver dishes.

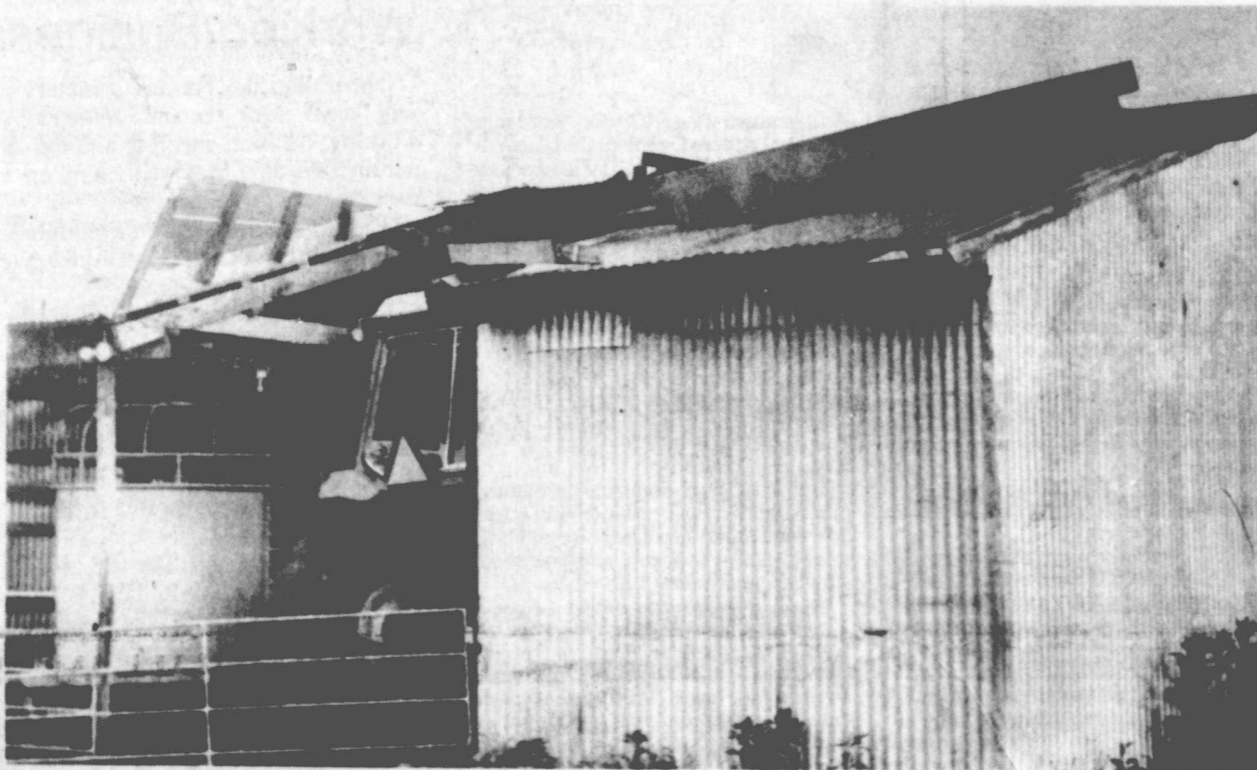
It swept down a creek just north of Pattonville, tearing the tops from dozens of trees, removing a tractor shed roof and barn roof, and even turning planters and other farm implements completely around, leaving the marks where they had previously

rested clearly visible.

The twister then continued into Red River County, doing damage in the Detroit area, and passing through the Bagwell and Dimple area where it again destroyed barns, mobile homes and trees.

Other areas had high winds and heavy, driving rain, but escaped the full force of the storm's damage.

Reports of rain range from half an inch to several inches, as farmers can only watch their newly planted crops anxiously as fields remain too muddy to do much more than wash out.

Statement of Intent to Change Rates

In accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, Texas-New Mexico Power Company announces the Company's intent to change rates for its entire Texas operations. The effective date of such change is May 17, 1991. All classes of customers will be affected by said proposed changes. The proposed rates will produce an increase in gross revenues to the Company over test year revenues adjusted for test year customer growth and weather and annualization of test year rate increases of \$35,836,827, or 9.63%. TNP is proposing an alternative rate base treatment for Unit 2 of TNP One, the second unit of the Company's generating facility located in Robertson County, Texas. Under this alternative, sale-leaseback treatment will be given to Unit 2, thereby including a lease payment in the cost of service, as opposed to traditional rate base treatment. If adopted, the sale-leaseback plan results in an increase in gross revenues of \$31,210,197, or an 8.38% increase over adjusted test year revenues during the first year of the plan. Texas-New Mexico Power Company provides electrical service to more than 165,011 customers located within the state of Texas.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin, Texas, and with all cities served by Texas-New Mexico Power Company which have retained original jurisdiction. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at each business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. Poppy Seed Cake

1 pkg Duncan Hines butter recipe (yellow)
1 pkg. pineapple cream jello pudding mix (instant)
5 eggs
1/2 cup Wesson oil
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1 teaspoon almond extract
1 table spoon poppy seed

Mix dry ingredients and add other ingredients. Mix for 7 minutes. Bake in greased and floured tube or bundt pan. Cook at 350 for 45 minutes or until done.

Sour Dough Biscuits

Dissolve 2 pkgs dry yeast in 1 cup lukewarm water.
Add: 2 cups lukewarm buttermilk; 3/4 cups wesson oil or any cooking oil; 2 tablespoons salt; 1/2 cup sugar or more if wanted sweeter; 4 teaspoons baking powder; 1/2 teaspoon soda; 6 or more cups of flour.

Mix into a stiff batter and turn out on floured board or paper. Knead lightly to a soft dough. Place in a greased large bowl, cover lightly with lid or saran wrap. Store in refrigerator. Roll out portions and cut out biscuits. Cook at once or let rise if higher biscuits are preferred.

May be kept in refrigerator a week at a time. Pinch off as needed and roll out or pinch off. Cinnamon and butter rolls are delicious made from this recipe.

Grandma Cookies

1 stick margarine
1 cup sugar
1 egg
2 tablespoons sweet milk
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon flavoring

Add enough flour to mix. Roll into balls on buttered cookie sheet. Mash flat using fork. Bake at 350 for about 8 minutes or until edges are light brown.

Chili

4 T. fat, melted
3 lbs. chili meat
3 T. flour
1 T. paprika
1/2 tsp. red pepper
1 #2 can tomatoes
1 large onion
2 large cloves garlic
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. black pepper
2 tsp. chili powder

Put into large pot. Add tomatoes, onion, garlic, salt, pepper and chili powder. Drain chili meat before adding to above. Cover with water and cook slowly 3 to 4 hours.

Beans and Rice

2 cups dry pinto beans, cook about 1 hour.
Brown 1 lb. hamburger or chili meat. Drain, add to beans. Chip up one onion. Add 4 good sized cloves garlic, salt to taste, 3 tablespoons chili powder, 2 teaspoons lemon pepper, 1 tablespoon all seasoning salt. Slow cook until soft. Serve over cooked rice.

Buffalo Chip Cookies

Blend 2 cups melted butter, 2 cups brown sugar, 2 cups white sugar. Stir in 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons vanilla. Sift and add 1 teaspoon salt, 4 cups flour, 2 teaspoons soda, 2 teaspoons baking powder. Mix in 2 cups oatmeal, 2 cups corn flakes, 1 pkg. chocolate chips, 1 cup pecans, 1 cup coconut. Bake 12 to 15 minutes at 350 on lightly greased baking sheet. Use ice cream scoop. Six per sheet.

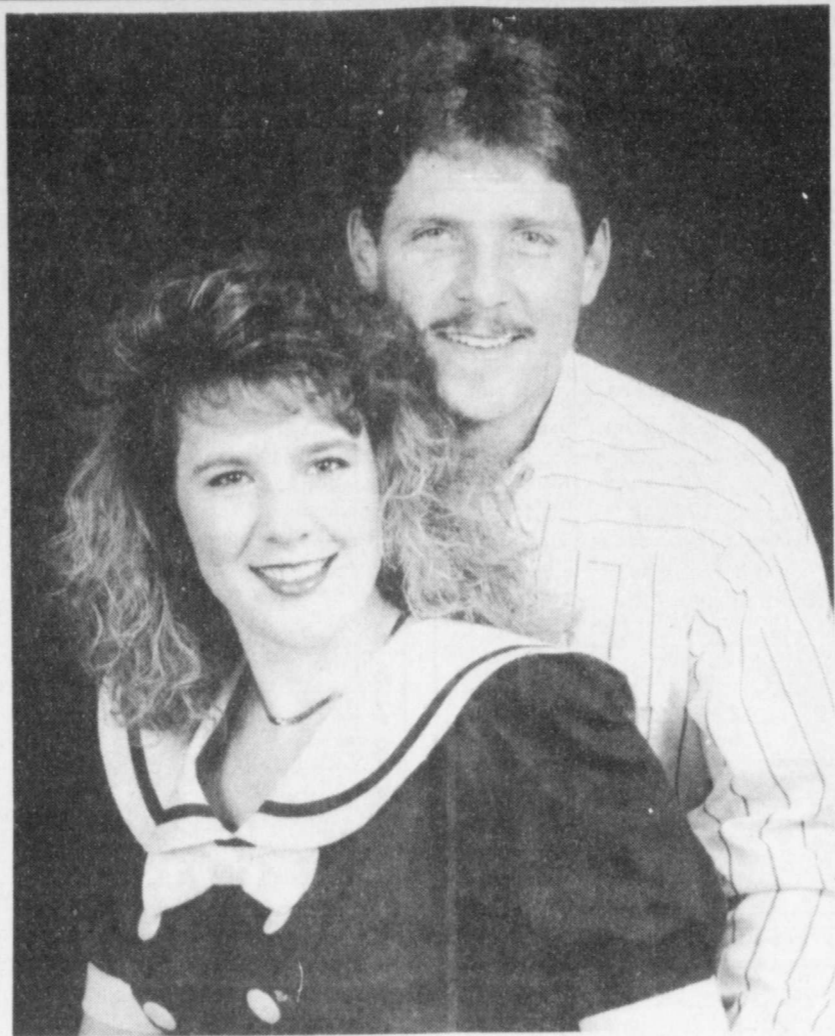

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Growing Turf in Shade Is Perennial Problem

Shade is desirable in the landscape, but it is the number one problem in growing turf grass. We constantly receive questions on this topic, so we checked with Texas A&M University for their latest thinking. The following comments are those of Dr. Richard Duble, turf grass specialist.

There are a lot of situations where you just cannot grow grass in the environment that you have. Environmental changes caused by shade have a major effect on grass. Reduced light, less extreme temperatures, increased humidity, restricted air movement, competition from trees, increased disease problems and shallow root systems are all products of shade.

Grass in shade has less ability to use nitrogen, less photosynthetic activity, less growth, less wear tolerance, more susceptibility to pre-emergent herbicides and less tolerance to cold.

The problem is not fertilizer or water, it is light. To grow turf in the shade, you must have a shade tolerant grass.

Bermuda and buffalo grass have little shade tolerance. San Augustine is probably the most shade tolerant warm season grass, followed by centipede and zoysia. Tall fescue, a cool season grass, will grow in moderate to heavy shade where San Augustine fails.

In many heavily shaded areas, it is best to use ground cover plants or other landscape materials rather than wasting time and money trying to go against nature.

Start with a grass variety suitable for shade, raise the mowing height, water deep and infrequently, apply nitrogen moderately in fall and spring and avoid high nitrogen applications in the summer.

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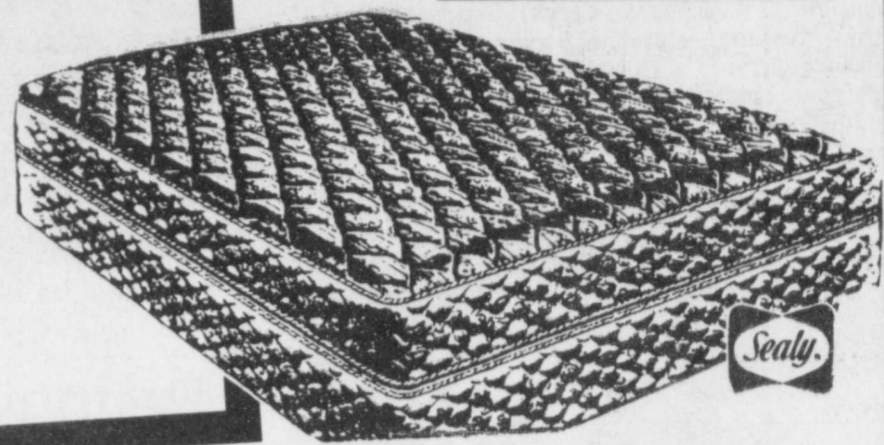

Social Security Notes

Many people know that wives and widows can get Social Security benefits when their husbands retire, become disabled or die. And men have these same benefit rights on their spouse's Social Security earnings. What may be less well known, however, is what happens if the marriage ends, what rights do divorced spouses have to Social Security benefits on their ex-spouses Social Security earnings?

A divorced spouse can get benefits on a former husband's or wife's Social Security record if the marriage lasted at least 10 years. The divorced spouse must be 62 or older and unmarried. The worker also must be at least 62. If they have been divorced two years or more, he or she can get benefits even if the worker is not retired.

People ask if the amount of benefits paid to their ex-spouse will reduce the amount of benefits paid to their current wife or husband. The

answer is no. Social Security figures benefits for an ex-spouse without regard to the amount paid to a current spouse.

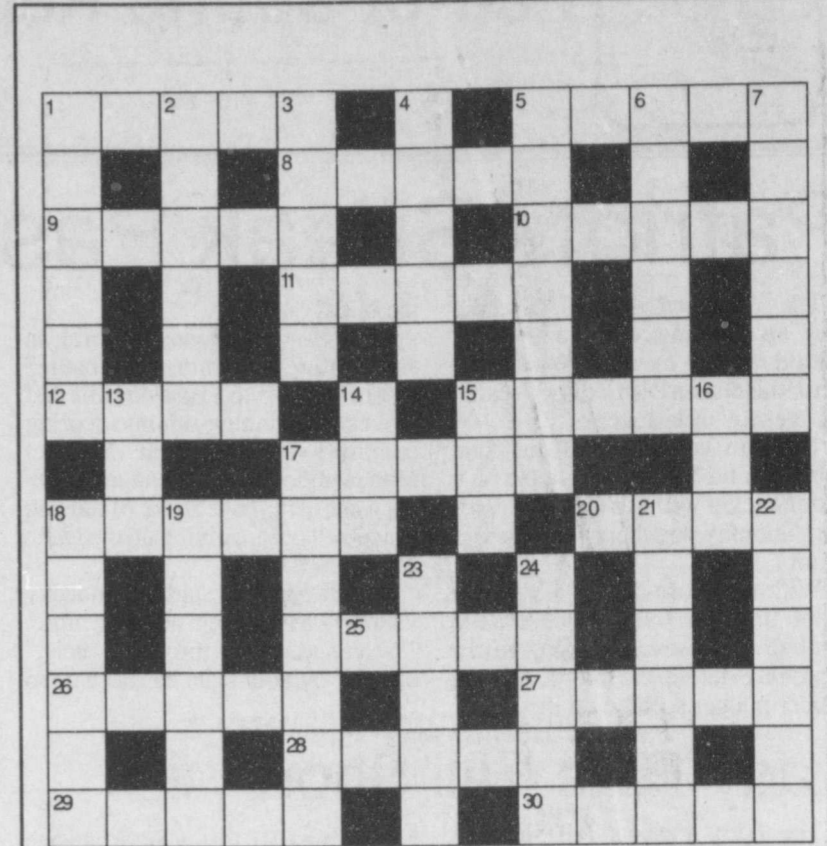
A new provision of the Social Security law affects women and men who married in good faith and later found out that their marriage was invalid. These people can qualify on the workers' SS record on the same basis as a legal spouse.

A person cannot receive spouse's benefit if he or she qualifies for a higher benefit on his or her own work under SS, nor can he or she receive both benefits. He or she will get the higher of the two. This is one of the reasons why men, with their generally higher earnings and thus higher benefits, are less likely than women to receive spouse's benefits.

The full amount of the SS benefit for a spouse is 50% of the workers' benefit.

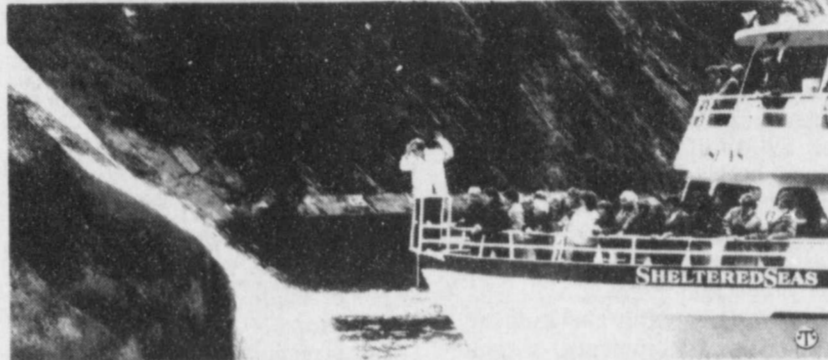

Sheltered Seas, Spectacular Sights



The Sheltered Seas maneuvers through a wonderland of Alaska's glacier-strewn tiny bays, narrow back channels, and waterfalls.

Along the rugged coastline of Southeast Alaska, threading the tapestry of its 1,000 offshore islands, runs a network of riverlike waterways known as the Inside Passage. First discovered by the Indians and later by Captain Cook and other English and Spanish explorers, these glacier-carved channels form a marine highway up the northwest coast of North America.

About a dozen years ago, several of the world's larger cruise lines discerned what John Muir had learned and written a century earlier: the Inside Passage is one of the most serene and beautiful waterways on earth.

Alaska became a popular cruise destination. Each year, almost 200,000 travelers sail there. For most of them, an Alaska cruise is much the same as a cruise in other parts of the world. The emphasis is on the nightclubs, discos, casinos, and elaborate dining for which the cruise industry is celebrated.

On the other hand, the Inside Passage as seen from a thousand-passenger cruise ship is not the same as what John Muir saw from his Indian canoe. And modern-day travelers who would like a closer view of these wilderness waterways have other options. One such option is the Sheltered Seas, a 90-passenger yacht that sails to places the big

cruise liners never see.

The small ship cruises only during daylight hours, transits Wrangell Narrows, visits Petersburg and LeConte Glacier, and sails to Sawyer Glacier at the head of Tracy Arm Fjord. Time is allowed for unscheduled stops to view wildlife, watch glaciers cave and—in general—take a more leisurely approach to Inside Passage cruising.

The Sheltered Seas approaches so close to icebergs that passengers can lean over the rail and touch them, and so close to waterfalls they can fill a pitcher with the cold, clear water. Wildlife seen from the small ship includes whales, porpoises, eagles, seals and sea lions. Sometimes bears and deer are seen.

The Sheltered Seas doesn't have state-rooms, a disco or a casino. Nights are spent in small towns off the beaten track. It does have two lounges, a galley, small bar, a wheel-house that's open to passengers, and two walkaround decks for viewing and photographing wildlife and scenery. The yacht takes three days to sail the 350 miles from Ketchikan to Juneau, a distance the larger ships travel in about 22 hours non-stop.

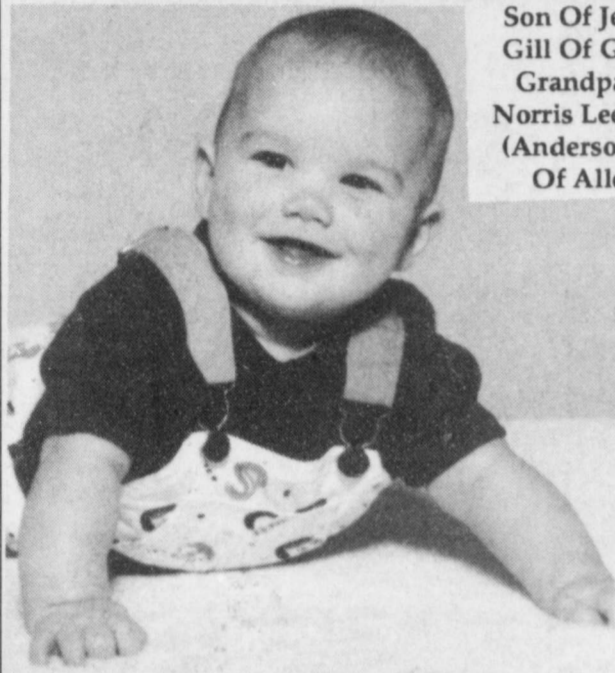

April Sales Tax Rebates Jump 24% From Last Year

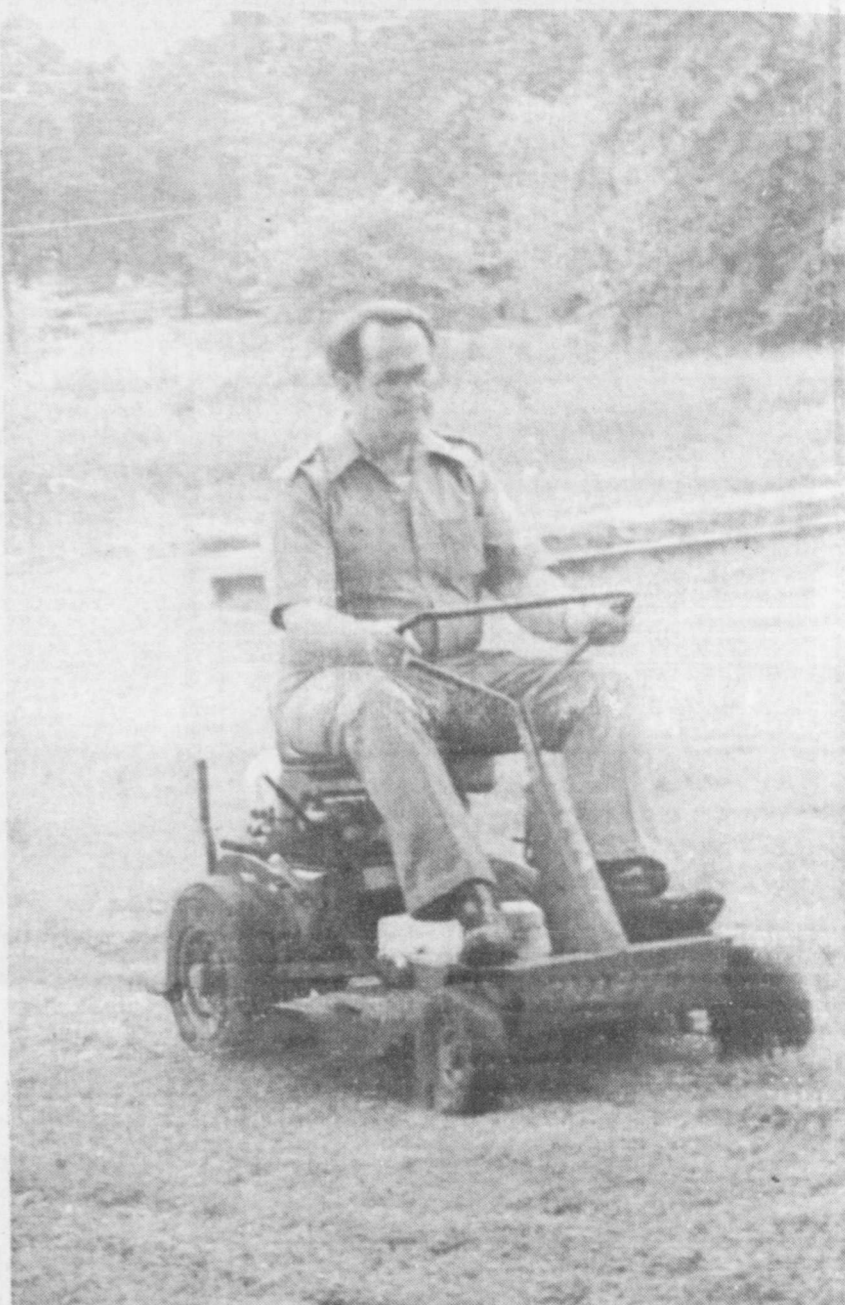
