"Why? You may well ask. Because then they could be color coordinated and matched to everyone's specific decor and we wouldn't have to take them down anymore!"

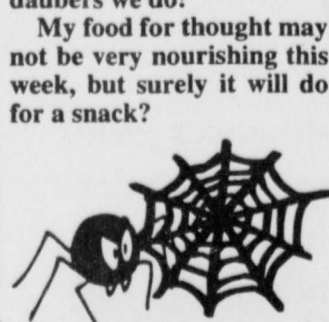
See, in my bedroom the spiders could spin in warm yellow tones, or green, and they wouldn't even show up!

Deport council deals with several problems

Mayor Pro Tem Mike Francies told Alan Vanderburg of Hayter Engineering Monday night that Beville Streets isn't repaired to the same condition it was before sewer line work was done.

Visitors and other council members agreed with Francies and stated that North Jeffus is just as bad. The streets had to be torn up in order to install new water mains or sewer lines and the contract states that the street surface would be compacted and raised to the same height as the rest of the street, Vanderburg said. Francies responded that is obvious that the area dug up for the main lines is lower than the rest of the street. "It will hold water this winter and break the surface up" he stated.

John Roach echoed Francies assessment.

A committee was formed to ride over the streets in question to determine what can be done about the situation. Council agreed to pay Barney Bray construction \$97,555.37 on work that has been completed. Council will hold back \$70,000 on the project.

Willis Creek project was determined to be on private property and a decision on what can be done about the flooding in that area cannot be made at this time, stated Councilman Roach. "We don't know what can be done right now" Roach told Terry

Glasgow. Terry Glasgow asked if Hale Street, which has been closed for years, be graveled in order to make his trailer home more accessible for his vehicles. No action was taken, but the council agreed to look into the matter.

Council agreed to give Max Doyle of Detroit a little more time to tear down the vacant buildings at the North end of Main Street. If Doyle can't get to the project soon, the council agreed to seek someone else to do the work.

Clean Up Day has been set for October 19th and 20th. Property owners who have not cleaned up their property after letters have been sent out can be turned over to the County Sheriff's department to be enforced. No action was taken at the present item.

Council agreed to assist property owners on College Street to bury debris from a burned house. The house was one of the properties in the city to be cleaned up.

The Council discussed putting a restraining order on some irate citizens complaining about the leash law being enforced in the city limits.

Council agreed to waive \$3,000 of a payment in lieu of taxes from the Deport Housing authority for 2001.

Council adjourned into executive session to discuss the city's audit.

Everyone is invited to attend the Halesboro-Morris Chapel Homecoming on Saturday, October 13. The group will meet at the Morris Chapel Community Building.

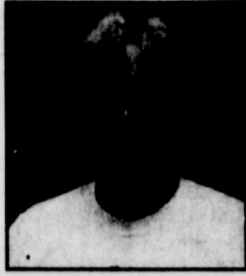

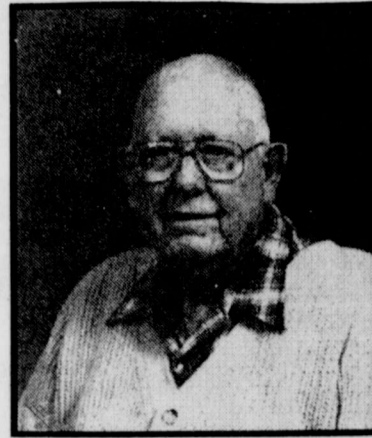

Mrs. Edith Oma McKinney, age 99, formerly of Rosalie, died Friday, October 5 in Red River Healthcare Center, Bogata.

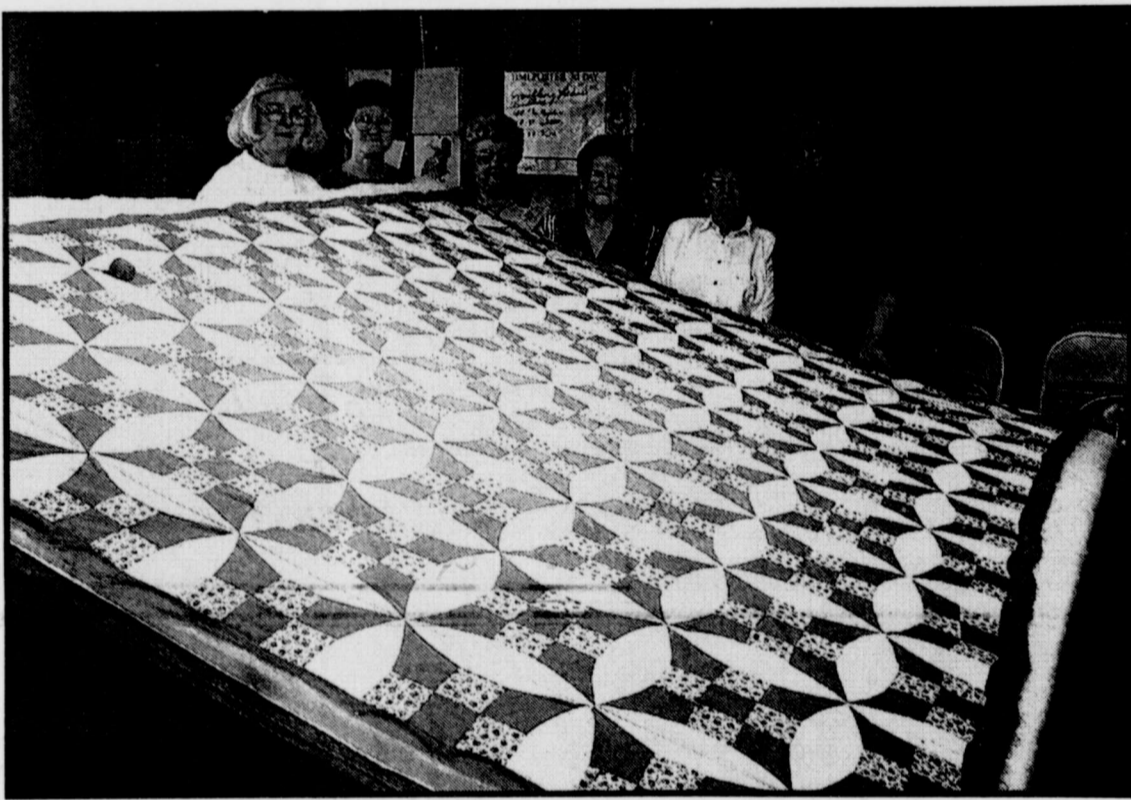

Easy Jelly Roll Betty Swindle
4 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
Line cookie sheet with waxed paper or aluminum foil. Heat oven to 400. Beat eggs until foamy, add sugar and beat until dissolved. Add Flour which has been mixed with baking powder. Beat and add vanilla. Spread on cookie sheet and bake 8 minutes. Turn out on tea towel and remove waxed paper or foil. Roll up in tea towel. Let cool and fill with jelly- I used plum or apricot- Roll back up and slice and serve.

Squash Casserole Rhonda Cronin
6 to 7 medium yellow squash-sliced in chunks
1 large onion-chopped
1 cup celery chopped
1 cup green pepper chopped
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 cup condensed milk
1/2 cup water
1 stick butter
2 cups cubed Velveeta
1/2 cup herb seasoning
grated cheese
Boil squash until tender. Do not overcook.
Drain the above and add: soup, condensed milk, water and butter. Stir until blended with vegetables. Add: Velveeta, herb seasoned stuffing mix. Pour into buttered casserole dish. Sprinkle top with additional stuffing mix and bake at 350 for 30 to 40 minutes. Sprinkle with grated cheese during last 10 minutes of cooking.

Cold Soap Dell Garrett
1 can of Lye
1 quart of clear water
1/2 gallon clear grease(cheap cooking oil)
1 cup ammonia
2 tablespoons of Borax
In a big crock bowl mix water and lye until lye is dissolved. Mix grease, ammonia and Borax in an enameled pan. Slowly stir in lye

and water mixture. Stir until it begins to thicken, about 20 minutes or so. Then pour into mold. I use a big glass baking dish. Let sit until soap begins to get firm. Score it with a fork or other utensil to give it a bit of a pattern. Cut into squares. Let set completely then take out of the mold and store. This is wonderful mild soap. You could add a few drops of your favorite perfume to make it smell good.

Cornbread Salad Ruby Ross
1 package of corn bread mix
1 medium onion
1 green bell pepper
1/2 cup of mayonnaise
2 tablespoons of mustard
salt and pepper to taste.
Prepare the corn bread mix according to package directions. Crumble and add all other ingredients. Just before you serve it cut up 1 ripe tomato over the top of the salad.

Enchiladas Charlotte Yoakum
1 pound ground beef-cooked and drained
1 large onion chopped
1 can chopped black olives
1 large package shredded Jack or Cheddar cheese
14 corn tortillas
2 cans enchilada sauce, mild or hot
Soften corn tortillas in small amount of oil. Cover bottom of large long glass dish. Fill each tortilla with meat, onion olive and cheese. Don't overstuff! Roll up and fasten with toothpick. Heat sauce in pan until just warm. Pour over enchiladas and cover with cheese. Bake at 350 till hot all the way thru.

Old Fashion Buttermilk Pie Betty Swindle
3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 cup buttermilk
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/4 cup melted butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons flour
Mix all together. Bake in unbaked pie shell at 350 until set.

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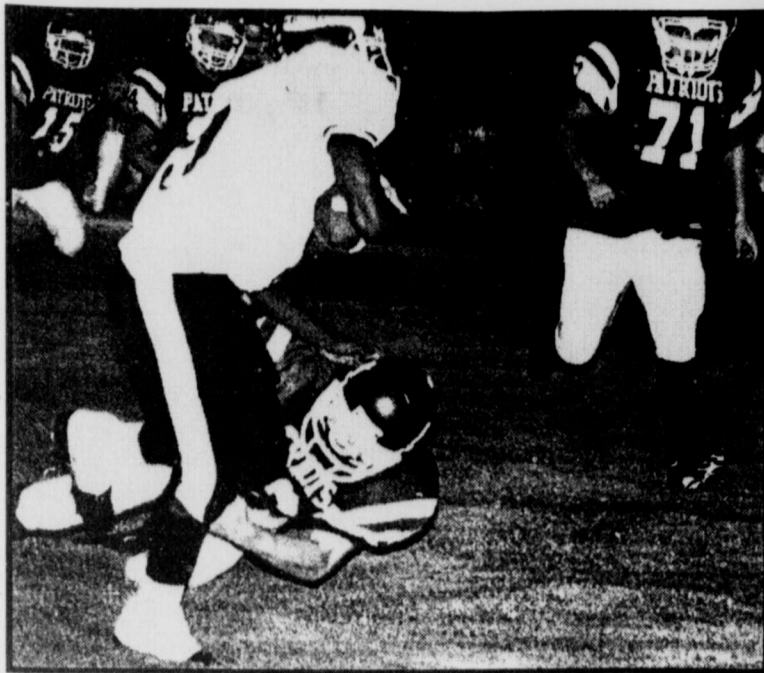
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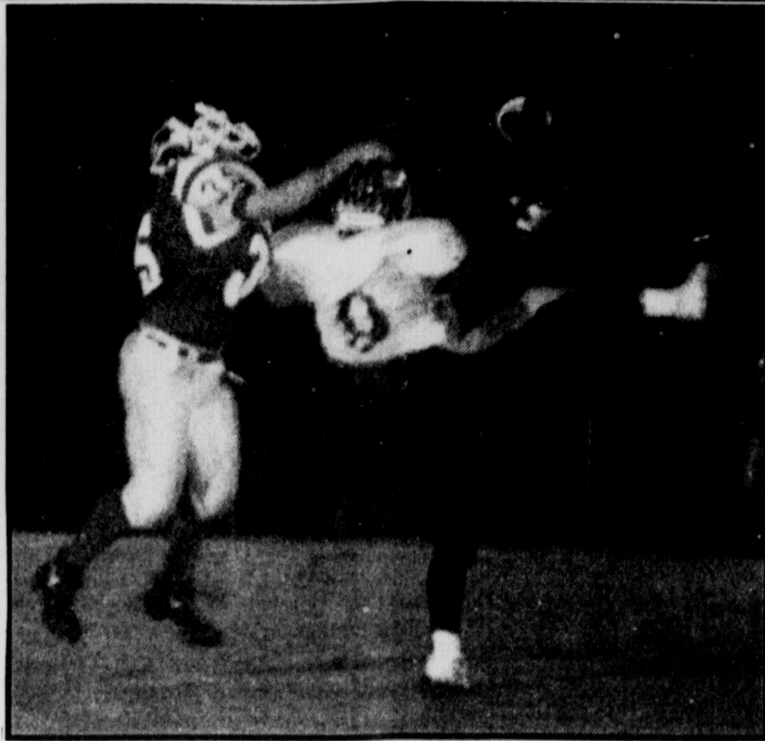
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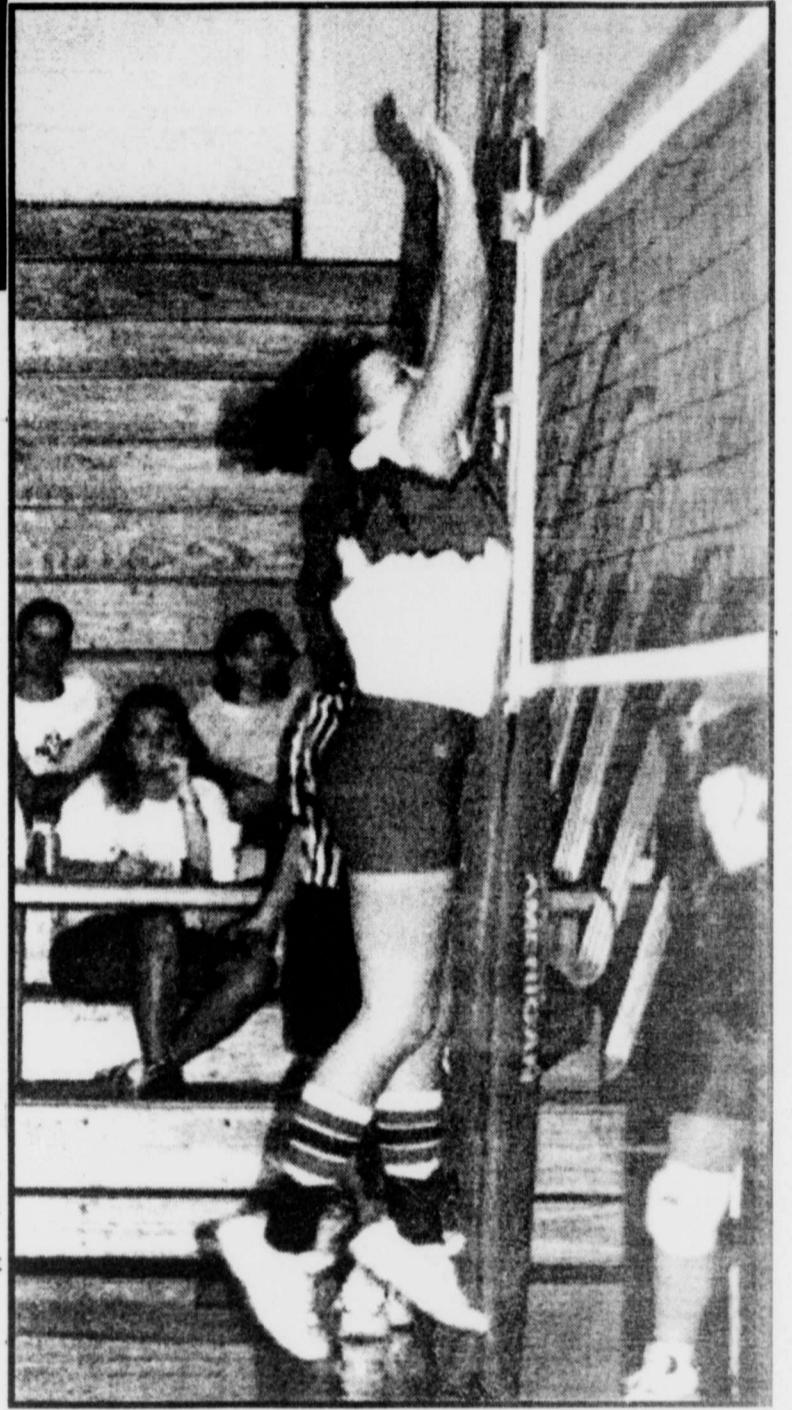

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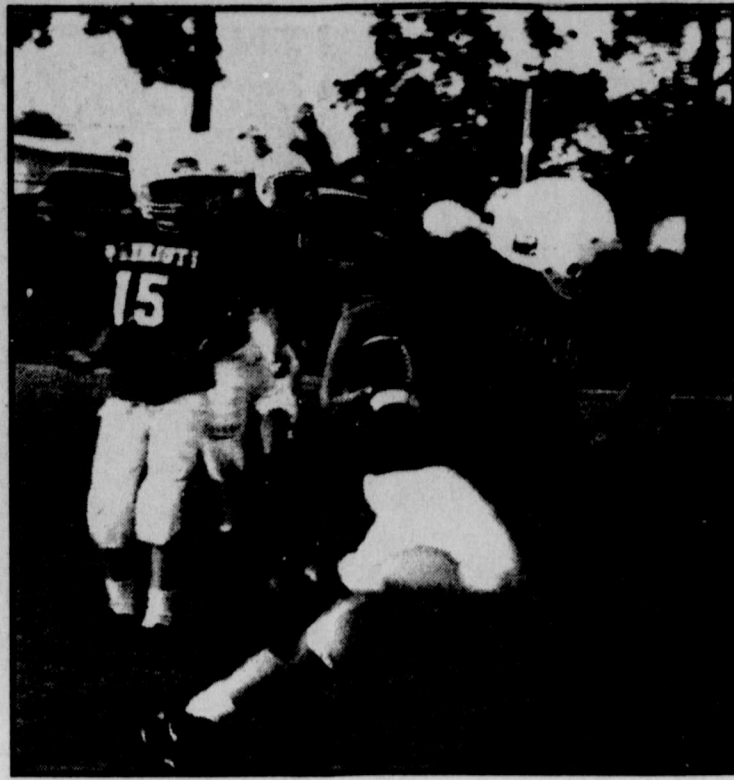

It is the same, but it is not. Has it been over thirty years ago when we got up early eager to board the big yellow school bus with the destination of Dallas-the State Fair of Texas?

The Automobile Building Show I strolled through in the late sixties now has "those cars of the future" all over the place. The Midway is grander,

cleaner and safer than ever. And no, one still cannot knock over those milk bottles to win a prize. The old, wooden roller coaster is gone, but the sky reaching Texas Star ferris wheel takes your breath away. The Cotton Bowl still hosts the football faithful. Step inside the exhibit buildings and you still find seekers of blue ribbons for jellies, quilts, photos and such. Yeah, though Texas has changed, kids still work hard in the barns for the grand champion steers, broilers, hogs, rabbits and other forms of four-legged friends.

A trip to the fair still can include the "musts" of longtime traditions. The ponies of the Carousel ride continue to prance round and round. My later Uncle Charlie and Aunt Paralee Short for years were "painters and keepers" of the famous carousel which is now placed in an honored, covered building. You can still enjoy Fletcher's Corn Dogs, (\$3 each) a turkey leg, corn on the cob, or an ice cream bar rolled in chocolate and nuts. Big Tex continues to stand proudly in his size seventy boots, but he is not the same. He has a huge red, white and blue ribbon on his shirt remembering September 11th.

If Uncle Charlie and Aunt Paralee were here today with those yellow buses full of kids rolling into the fair for fun and to experience their carousel, I know they would be saddened about why that ribbon is on the shirt of Big Tex. The fair, it is still the same, but it is not.

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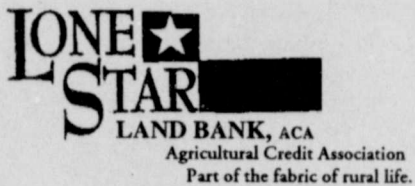

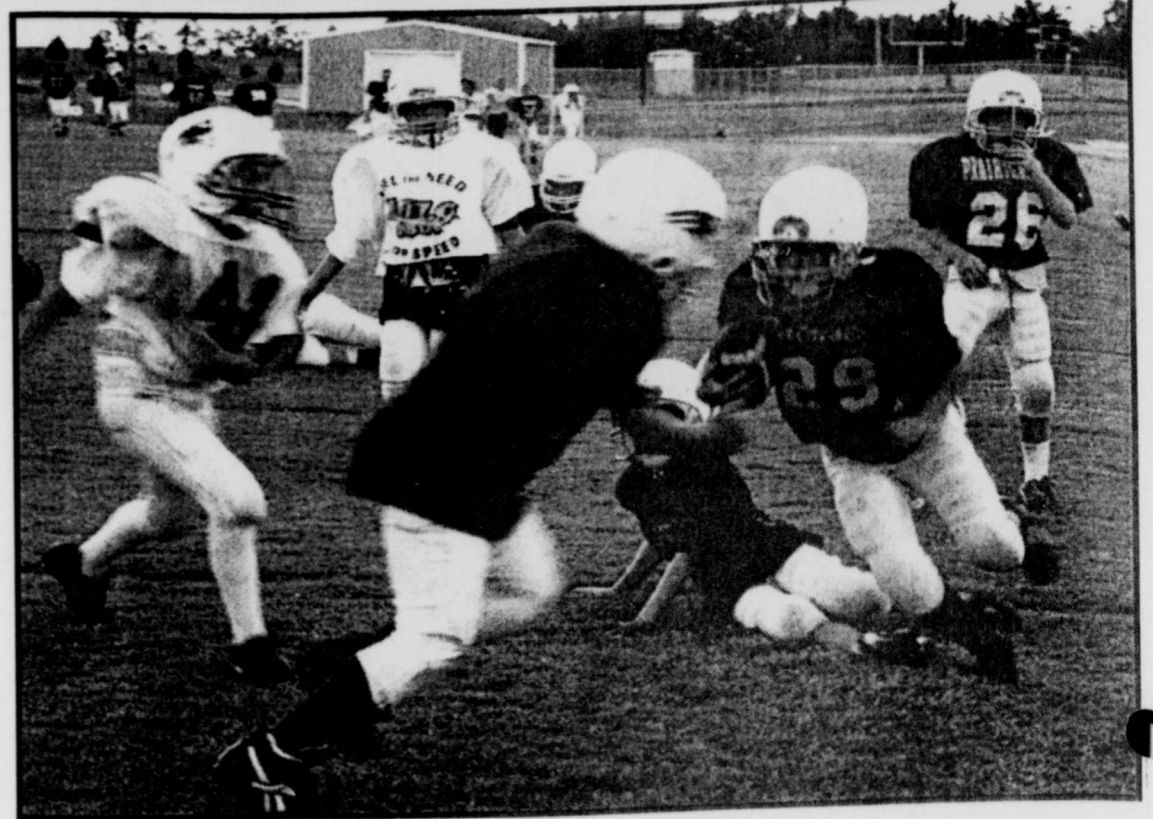
I believe that clear thinking and clear statement, accuracy, and fairness, are fundamental to good journalism.

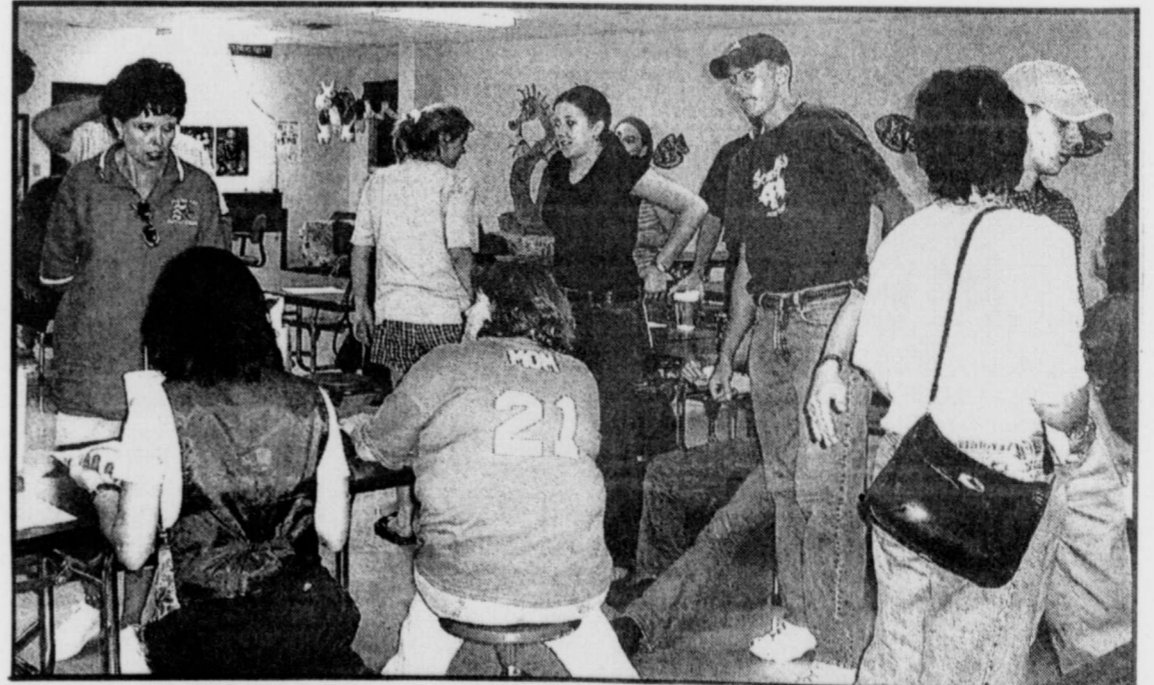

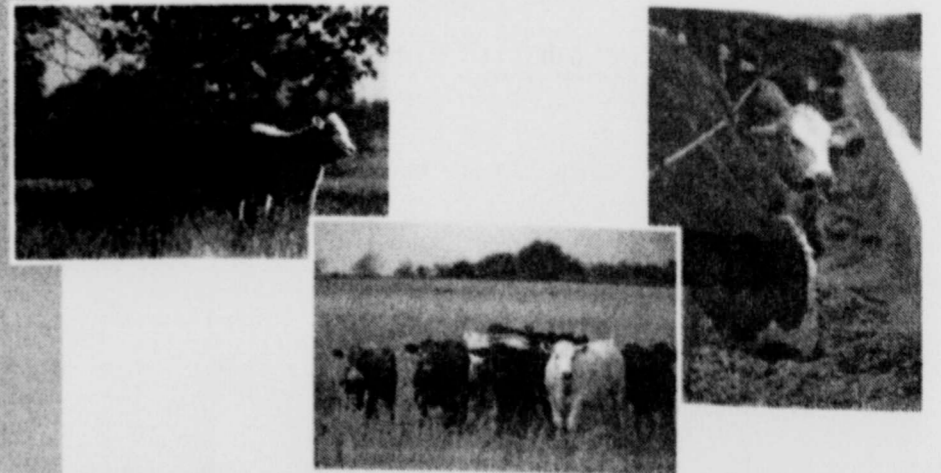

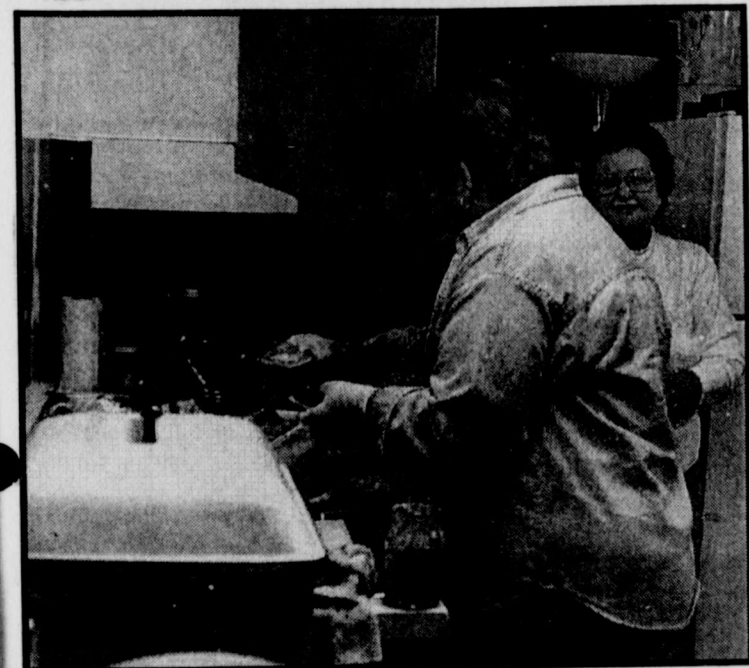

Deport turned down for FEMA grants, requests far outnumber funds

Deport Volunteer Fire Department has been turned down by Federal Emergency Management (FEMA) for grant money for equipment and personal protective equipment.

City Fire marshal Thomas Nichols received the notification last month. The Deport Volunteers applied for a grant for bunker gear and another grant for a support vehicle.

Both grants were denied in a letter addressed to Nichols stating the Federal Emergency management Agency had received applications from over 19,000

fire departments nationwide. Half of the 19,000 departments applied for grants in two categories, totaling over 30,000 requests for funding.

The Assistance to Firefighters Grant program was appropriated \$100 million in funds for this year. The requests for assistance totalled just under \$3 billion!

The letter closed with an apology from acting U.S. Fire Administrator Kenneth O. Burris, Jr. for not being able to fund the Department's needs, stated Nichols

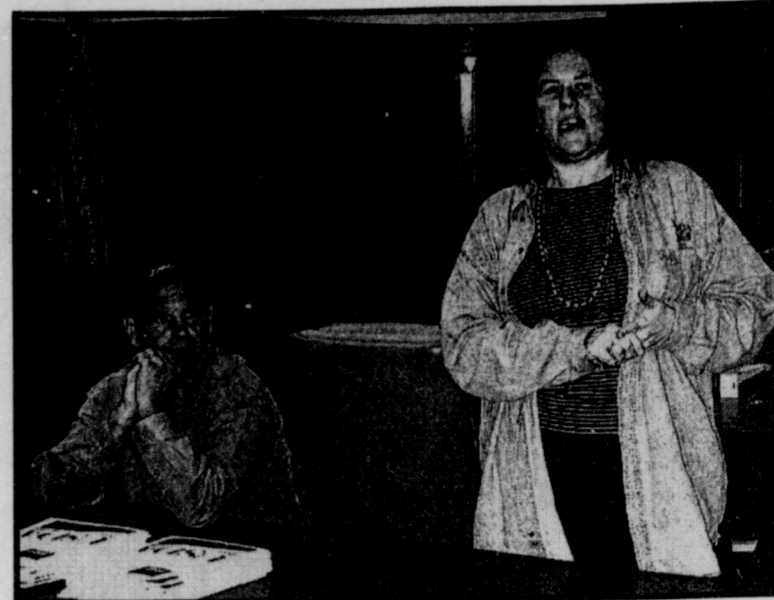

office. If unable to contact local authorities, citizens also can call the roadside assistance line, 1-800-525-5555, and DPS will assist you in contacting the appropriate authorities.

"We have no specific information related to attempted thefts, but are asking plane owners to check on their aircraft more often than they have in the past, simply as a precautionary measure," said DPS Director Thomas A. Davis Jr.
