Changing Bandages

In a recent Fire Talk magazine there was an article written by George Burk entitled "Who's Changed Your Bandages".

It was so good that I thought I would share portions of it with you.

Mr. Burk recalled that he was the only survivor of a plane crash years ago in California.

A rancher found him, rolling on the ground, on fire. With nothing else on hand, the rancher threw dirt on Burk until he was extinguished, then got him help. Burk then spent 89 days in Intensive Care and 18 months in the hospital at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio. On 10 occasions, his family was told his demise was only hours away.

Thirty years later Burk was waiting to catch a plane in New York on his way home to Phoenix when he was approached by a woman who asked him "are you Captain George Burk, by any chance".

She was one of the nurses who had changed his bandages, over and over during those terrible days in ICU.

Burk continues about those people who we never really know, but they "change our bandages", making a difference in our lives.

That set me to thinking about those who have "changed my bandages, figuratively if not literally over the years.

There is the nurse whose name I shall probably never know in the recovery room after my first knee replacement. Upon coming to, I experienced pain beyond anything I knew existed. I can remember this nurse cradling my head and crooning to me "We're getting you help, honey, just hang on, it's going to be better in just a minute". Shortly afterwards, it was better. And, five months later, when I went back for the other knee, this same woman took my hand and said "I promise you aren't going to hurt this time nearly as bad, we told your doctor about it and he's taken care of it". Again, she was right. But I don't know who she was, I just know she "changed my bandages".

One day things were so grim here at the office, and it seemed that there was no ray of light. My family had problems, the paper had problems and things were just awful. And, a young woman came in, put her arms around me and asked why I was so stressed. After listening for a moment she calmly said "You'll be on my prayer list tonight, your family too." Without further ado, she dropped a kiss on my head and unselfconsciously left. She "changed my bandages" in a way she will never fully appreciate.

There are so many people in the world who step in to help us, whether it is their job, or just their nature. I have a long list of those "bandage changers" who have made a difference in my life. Some of them good friends, some of them people I barely know and others people I will never see again.

Dedication, kindness, commitment, LOVE, characterizes all of these people. They are so special.

Prairiland Bond issue passes, incumbents returned to board positions

Prairiland ISD voters turned out Saturday and voted for the proposed bond issue that will result in the construction of a new high school and additions at the Blossom and Deport Campuses, and returned incumbents Board of Trustee members to their positions.

The totals were as follows: Place 2, Michael Sessums, Blossom 152, Liz Irwin 144, Earl Unruh, 68; Deport: Sessums, 48, Irwin 50, Unruh 23; Pattonville: Sessums 62, Irwin 38, Unruh 39; Cunningham: Sessums 32, Irwin 18, Unruh 7; Early Votes: Sessums 57, Irwin 27, Unruh 16.

Totals were Sessums 351, Irwin 277 and Unruh 153.

Place 3, David Basinger: Blossom 126, Tracy Crawford 223;

Deport: Basinger 112, Crawford 18; Pattonville Basinger 110, Crawford, 30; Cunningham Basinger 47, Crawford 10; Early Votes, Basinger, 68; Crawford 33.

Totals for Place 3 were: Basinger 463, Crawford 314.

Place 6: Kerry Murdock; Blossom 45, Johnny Patterson 77, Harold Morrison 178, Charles Gilbert 51; Deport Murdock, 21, Patterson 65, Morrison, 16, Gilbert 22. Pattonville: Murdock 57, Patterson, 44, Morrison 21 and Gilbert 21. Cunningham, Murdock 3, Patterson 25, Morrison 5, Gilbert 27. Early votes: Murdock, 13, Patterson, 47, Morrison, 31, Gilbert 11. Totals for Place 6 were: Murdock, 139, Patterson 258, Morrison 251 and Gilbert 132.

Place 7: Shad Day: Blossom 87,

Willie Crossland 64, Tony Bowden 169, Wesley Davis 37. Deport: Day 99, Crossland 12, Bowden 9, Davis 12. Pattonville: Day 48, Crossland 29, Bowden 19, Davis 44. Cunningham: Day 36, Crossland 3, Bowden 4, Davis 15. Early Votes: Day 44, Crossland 13, Bowden 25, Davis 19. Totals for Place 7 were: Day 314, Crossland 121, Bowden 226 and Davis 127.

The Bond Election totals were as follows: For Blossom, 159; Against 193. Deport For 72, against 56. Pattonville For 89, against 55, Cunningham For 40, against, 21. Early votes: For 76, against 25.

This resulted in the bond issue passing with a total of 436 for and 350 against.

City of Deport has new mayor, council member

The City of Deport saw one of the largest election turn outs in many years as Gilbert Arriaga challenged longtime Mayor Charles Foster for the mayoral position.

Arriaga won the election with 86 votes to Foster's 65.

Two council positions were filled without challengers.

Longtime councilman Duane Glover was returned to office, and newcomer Crystal Foulse was elected.

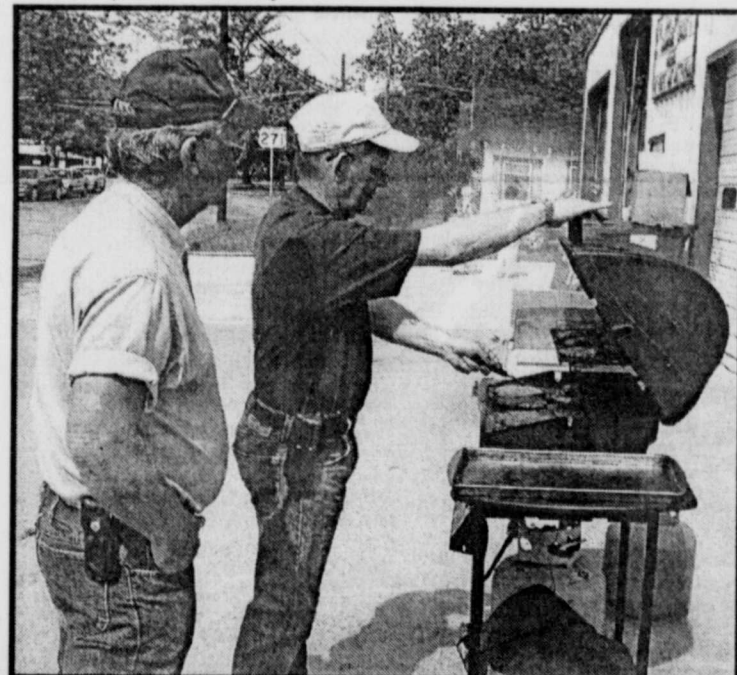

Children under 3 eat free with an adult.

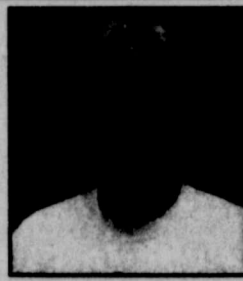

Chocolate Dipped Almond Cookies
18 ounce package of sugar cookie bar dough
1/2 cup chopped almonds
6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate morsels
Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Combine dough and almonds in medium bowl. Refrigerate 15 minutes for easier handling. Shape cookie dough into 1-1/2 inch balls; place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake for 15-17 minutes or until golden brown around edges. Cool on baking sheets on wire racks for 2 minutes; remove to wire racks and cool completely. Line baking sheets with waxed paper. Microwave morsels on HI for 1 minute; stir. Microwave at additional 10-20 second intervals and stir until smooth. Dip cookie halfway into chocolate and shake off excess. Place on prepared baking sheets and refrigerate 15 minutes or until coating is set.

Chocolate Swirl Bundt Cake
1 yellow cake mix
4 large eggs
3/4 cup sour cream
1/2 cup vegetable oil
1/4 cup water
3 packets (1 ounce each) unsweetened chocolate flavored Choco Bake powdered sugar
Preheat oven to 375 degrees and grease 10-cup Bundt pan. Combine cake mix, eggs, sour cream, vegetable oil and water in large mixer bowl. Beat at low speed until moistened. Beat on high speed for 2 minutes. Place 1-1/2 cups batter in medium bowl; stir in Choco Bake. Alternately spoon batters into prepared pan and begin and end with yellow batter. Bake 35-45 minutes or until wooden spoon inserted in cake comes out clean. Cool in pan for 20 minutes and invert onto wire rack to cool completely. Dust with powdered sugar before serving.

White Lemony Cheesecake
Crust: 6 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1-1/4 cup all purpose flour
1 large egg yolk
1/8 teaspoon salt
Cheesecake:
2-6 oz boxes White Baking Bars
1/2 cup heavy whipping cream
2 packages cream cheese-softened
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 large egg whites
1 large egg
For crust-preheat oven to 350 degrees and lightly grease 9-inch springform pan. Beat butter in small bowl until creamy. Beat in flour, egg yolk and salt. Press mixture into bottom and up one inch of sides of pan.

Chocolate Angel Food Cake
1 package angel food cake mix
1/2 cup baking cocoa
powdered sugar
strawberries are optional
Combine cake mix with cocoa in large mixer. Prepare and bake according to directions. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and top with strawberries.
Sugar Cookie Fruit Tart
1 package sugar cookie bar dough
1 package cream cheese-softened
1/3 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1-1/2 cups fruit-your choice
Preheat oven to 325 degrees and grease bottom of 9-inch fluted tart pan with removable bottom. Press cookie dough evenly into prepared pan. Bake for 22-27 minutes or until lightly golden brown. Cool completely. Beat cream cheese, sugar and vanilla in bowl until smooth. Spread evenly over cooled cookie crust to within 1/2 inch of edge. Arrange your choices of fruits on top of cream cheese mixture. Refrigerate for 1 hour. Remove rim of pan and slice into wedges.
Orange Brunch Muffins
3 cups all-purpose baking mix
3/4 cup all purpose flour
2/3 cup granulated sugar
2 large eggs-lightly beaten
1/2 cup plain yogurt
1/2 cup orange juice
1 tablespoon grated orange peel
2 C. white chocolate morsels-divided
1/2 cup chopped macadamian nuts or walnuts
Preheat oven to 375 degrees and grease or paper-line 18 muffin cups. Combine baking mix, flour and sugar in large bowl. Add eggs, yogurt, juice and orange peel; stir just until blended. Stir in 1-1/3 cups morsels. Spoon into prepared muffin cups, filling 3/4 full. Sprinkle with nuts. Bake 18-22 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans for 10 minutes; remove to wire racks to cool slightly. Microwave remaining morsels in small, heavy-duty bag on medium-high for 1 minute; knead. Microwave at 10-20 second intervals, kneading until smooth. Cut tiny corner from bag and squeeze to drizzle over muffins. Serve warm.

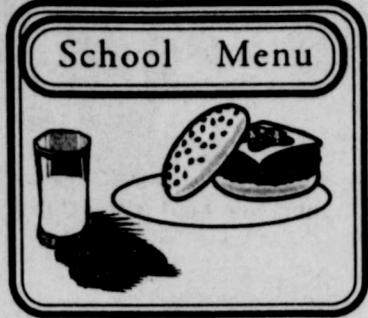



**Tomorrow Fund
deadline is May 24**

State Representative Mark Homer reported that the deadline for the current enrollment period in the Texas Tomorrow Fund is May 24. Texas parents have less than one month left to lock in the future cost of their children's tuition at this year's prices for Texas colleges and universities. The Texas legislature created the fully guaranteed prepaid tuition program to enable families to secure a child's future college education costs, regardless of what happens to the cost of tuition, enrollees are guaranteed that their full tuition and required fees are paid. The Texas Tomorrow Fund allows parents to enroll their children at any age. Regardless of when their child will enter college, parents pay today's cost of a college education. The younger a

child is enrolled the lower the payments will be. For example, for a newborn, a four year college plan costs \$15,131 as a one time payment or \$132 a month until high school graduation. Families can purchase contracts for public and private four year universities and junior and community colleges. They have the choice of buying contracts covering tuition from one to five years and have several payment options including annual or monthly payments, automatic bank drafts of payroll deductions. **Zero tolerance presentation
made at Prairiland May 8**

A presentation on underage drinking was presented at Prairiland High School on May 8, sponsored by the Kids Safety Society Coalition through the Northeast Texas Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. Speaker was Darla Barr, Game Warden with the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife. Ms. Barr showed the video "Wrecked: Life and Death on the Road." The video strives to educate young drivers about the importance of responsible driving habits. Young people talk about choices they made in life and the tragic consequences. Following the video, Ms. Barr talked to students about the Texas underage drinking laws and what could happen when bad choices are made. Ink pens with the "party clean" message were given to the students as well as pamphlets "Drinking and Driving: How to Save a Friend's Life (and your own)" and "Here's The Law". The program covered Texas' zero tolerance law, where minors can face a fine of up to \$500, a mandatory alcohol awareness course, community service and a 30-day suspension of their license. A third offense could see a fine of

\$250-\$2,000, confinement in jail for up to 180 days and automatic suspension of their license. Adults can be fined up to \$4,000 and/or 1 year in jail for making alcohol available to a minor. Prairiland High School will host their prom on May 11. Parents are reminded to set ground rules and the consequences for violating them with your teen before prom night. No parent wants to be awakened by a late night call or a visit by a law enforcement officer telling you your child has been involved in an accident, or appear in court with your child to defend a DWI. Underage drinking can be a deadly choice. There aren't always second chances. In Texas, traffic accidents in the 15-20 age group for 2000, totaling 635 accidents: in the .00 BAC (blood alcohol content) numbered 338; BAC of .01-.09 numbered 90; BAC .10+ numbered 207. Total killed in alcohol-related crashes numbered 297, which was 46.8% of the total number of crashes for that age group. Statistics for deaths on prom/graduation weekend are below. Statistics run from 6 p.m. Friday to 5:59 p.m. Sunday.
