

The German's used early with a 2% discount provid- massed infantry attacks in the drive at the center of the French lines, rough terrain preventing free use of tanks and motorized equipment. The French Wednesday night reported their lines holding firm, though admitting that some German tanks may have filtered thru. The Germans also continued attacks on the French coast at Le-Harve and Roeun.

The week has seen the British Navy rescue 338,000 English and French troops from the German trap at Dunkirk. The soldiers were the remnants of the defeated allied army in Flanders. Though the allies suffered a crushing defeat with loss of valuable territory, the withdrawal under fire of the trapped troops was considered a military miracle.

Preparing for the drive on France, the Germans sent 300 bombfrom the raid amounting to about 250. Retaliatory bombings by the French scored several German







Allow this to remain for at heads of the chickens, apply 1 part least 12 hours. Better results can be obtained by moistening the area of the ant bed with water, just prior to the treatment. Perform the treatment when most of the ants are under ground-this will be most likely in the late afternoon or about mid-

House ants can be controlled also with Carbon Bi-Sulphide if the nest can be found. This can usually be found by following back and forth the line of workers as they come and go from food. Scattering salt freely about the chicken house, then wetting thoroughly is also good. Do not allow fowls to eat the salt as turn a tub or large bucket, that is it is poisonous to them. 


