CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

Rivercrest Suffers Defeat

"Perhaps it was the band", quipped Rivercrest Rebel Coach Terry Tidens, as he attempted to explain the 41-13 shelling of his charges by a Mt. Vernon Purple Tiger squad which by all prognosticators was not that much better than his Rebel squad. The Rebel mentor was referring to the appearance at the game by the Southern Methodist University marching band, whose performance delighted the large crowd.

The Rebels lack of concentration was evident throughout, as they continually hurt themselves with costly mistakes. Fumbling the pigskin seven times, the Rebels lost five to the Tigers; four Tiger recoveries were converted to touchdowns. Other costly Rebel miscues included the failure to field a free ball on a kick-off, and a pass interference call (although

questionable), on a fourth down and eight situation late in the first half, which gave the Tigers a first and goal at the Rebel two, and permitted them to score their third touchdown, to take a 20-7 halftime lead.

"Hopefully, we got our quota of fumbles for the season in one game," said a melancholy Giddens. "We did learn what a mental letdown will lead to; as a result this game will help us in the remainder of the season."

Despite the lopsided score, there were some noteworthy aspects of the Rebel play. Chief of these was the 82-yard kick-off return by junior Jeremy Abshire mid-way through the second period. The agile sprinter spotted a crack created by the blocking of his teammates, squeezed through it and raced the distance untouched. David Stansell added the extra point, to bring the Rebels back into the contest, trail-

ing by only one touchdown.

The Rebels only other score came long after the outcome of the game had been determined, late in the final stanza. The sustained drive of 80 yards was spearheaded by three completed passes. The Rebel ground game was not effective, as all rushers combined for a total of only 106 yards.

An eleven yard slant-in pass from quarterback Bradley Woods to junior split-end Clint Tidwell, was followed by the halfback option pass from sophomore Shane Beers to Woods, good for 15 yards.

Fullback Marcus Savage added another 22 yards on the drive with three carries. Woods then found sophomore tight-end Jeff Bagley on a 19-yarder to the Tiger 11. After Beers eight yard run, Woods drilled from the three, with 1:40 left to play in the game. Game statistics reveal the Rebels' fruitlessness. The Rebels had only four first downs for the night, the initial one coming mid-way through the third period. Total offense was a total of 296 yards. The Tigers had a total of 296 yards.

Giddens had praise for his offensive line play. "They made the holes, but our backs didn't hit them," he said. Giddens singled out junior Joe Webb and senior Chad Parrish for their blocking. "Our defense was on the field too long," added Giddens. "They were able to wear us down."

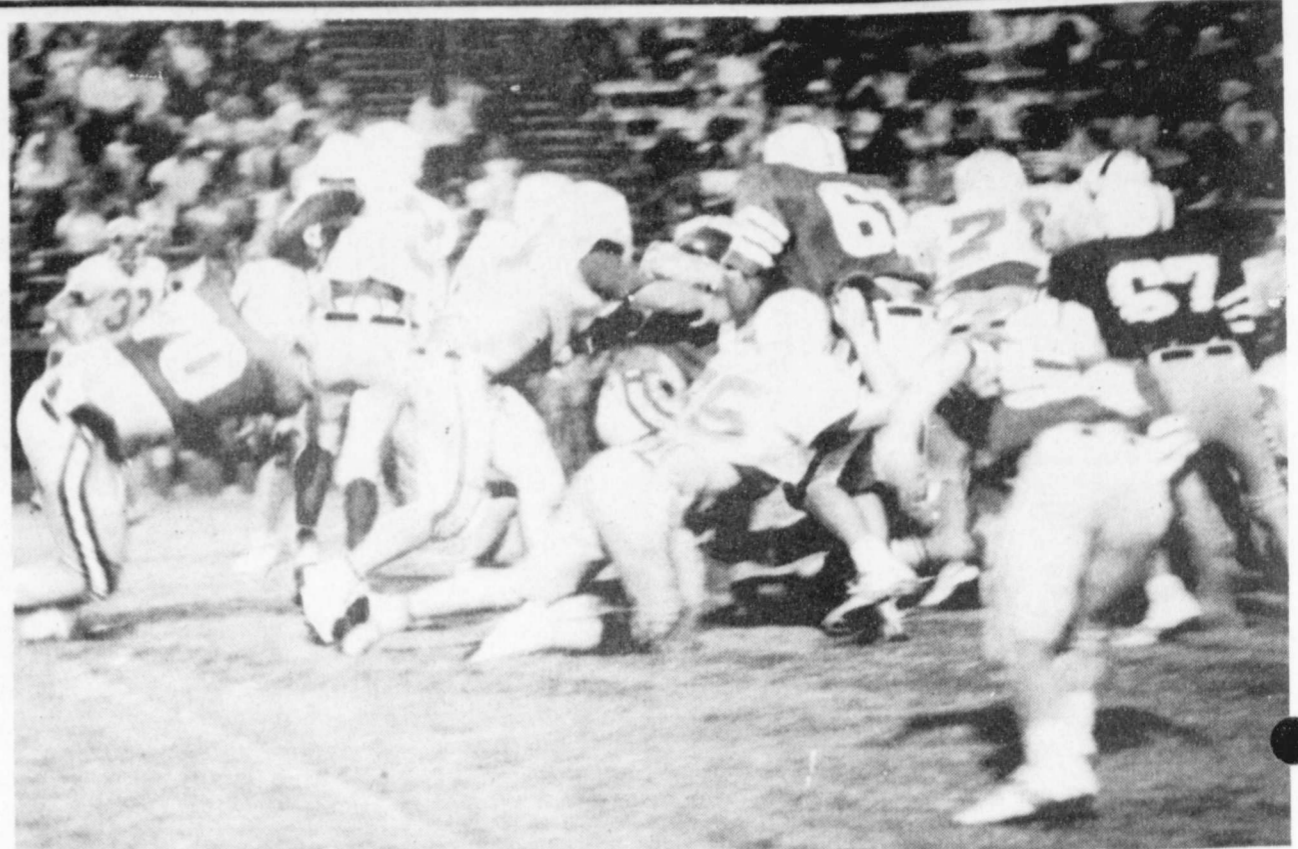
Asked about injuries, Giddens remarked, "Our pride was hurt the most." Physical injuries from the game include a severely twisted ankle to cornerback Justin Roach, which may impede his play this week. Also, Scooter Brown is still hampered by a toe injury, but he is available for limited action.

The Rebels, now 0-3 on the season, will travel to Maud on Friday night, to face a highly ranked Class A squad. Maud lost to Redwater last week 32-0, but were without the services of their leading rusher and linebacker. Game time is 8 p.m.

The Junior High and Varsity Rebels will play at home on Thursday night. Last week, the JV unit lost a squeaker to Mt. Vernon, 8-6.

The Rebel Athletic Booster Club will sponsor a free watermelon cutting between the junior high and junior varsity game Thursday night. All fans are invited to attend. At this time, memberships in the club, which support all athletic activities in the district, will be available. Cost of membership is \$3.00 per person.

The Junior High game Thursday night ended in a 18-8 score with Mt. Vernon winning the game.

Beef Tour Announced

The Extension Beef Committees of Delta, Lamar and Red River Counties will be sponsoring a day long tour Tuesday, October 18. The tour will consist of all beef and wildlife operations on the Broseco Ranch.

The Broseco Ranch consists of some 44,000 acres near Omaha. The ranch is primarily a cow-calf operation, maintaining around 5,500 mother cows annually. Tour stops

will include sorting, working facilities, cattle and other topics. The

Broseco also has a very modern intensive grazing system and its second year on part of the place as well as a sizable wildlife program.

Tour participants will travel by chartered bus leaving from Paris and stopping at Bogata enroute to the tour site. The cost of the tour to include a noon meal will be approximately \$15. 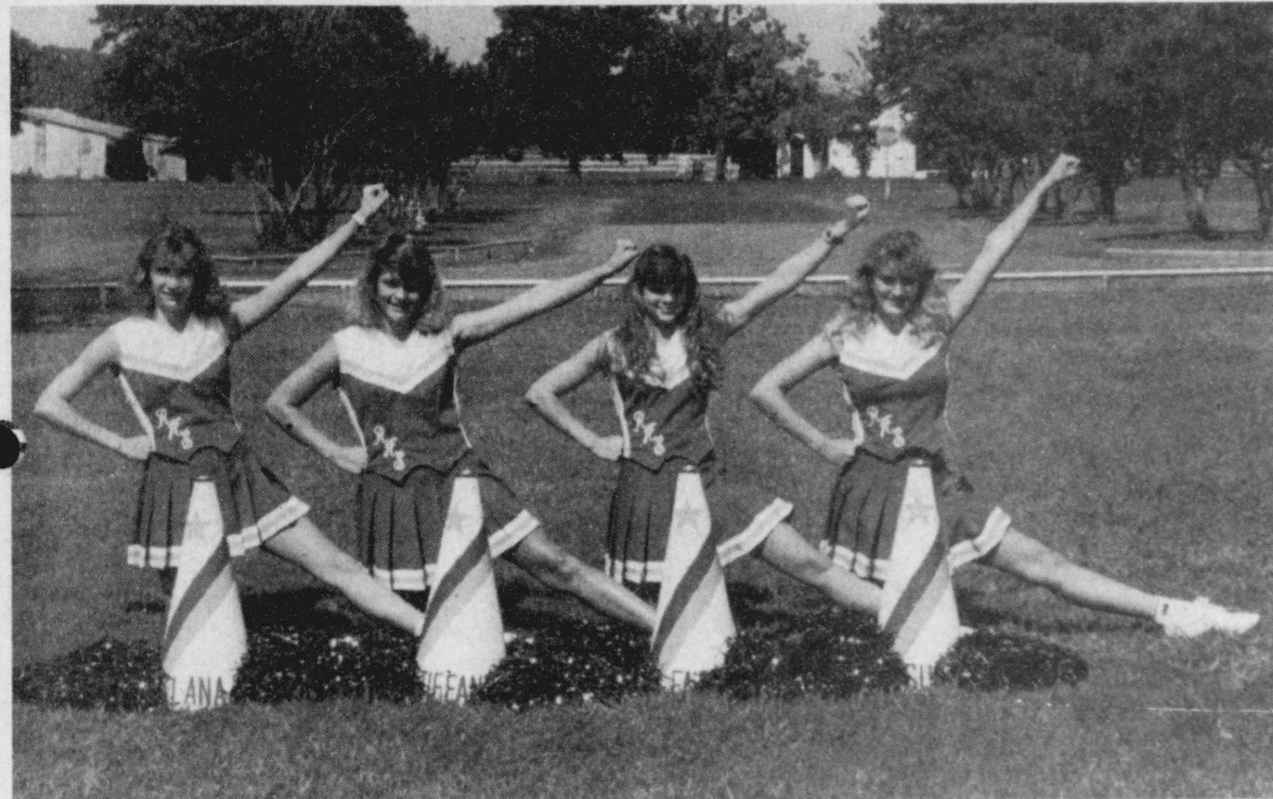

and blue map of Texas surrounded with bluebonnets. After dinner the family gave them a send-off.

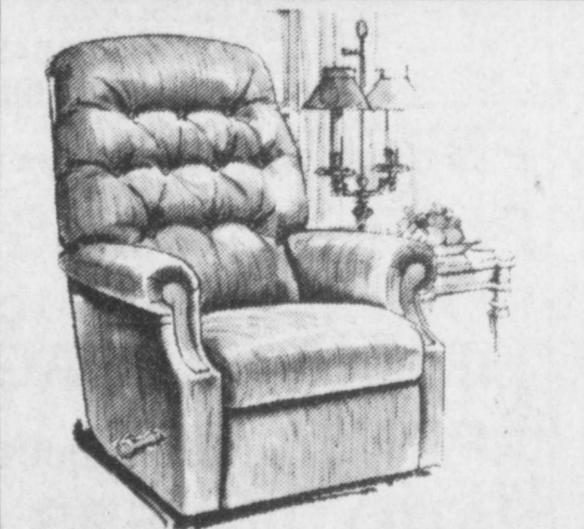
