35 traffic fatalities reported through July 4th

Thirty-five traffic fatalities in 27 crashes during the July 4th holiday had been reported to the Texas Department of Public Safety by 3 p.m. Monday. The 54-hour Operation Motorcade period began at 6 p.m. Friday and ended at midnight Sunday.

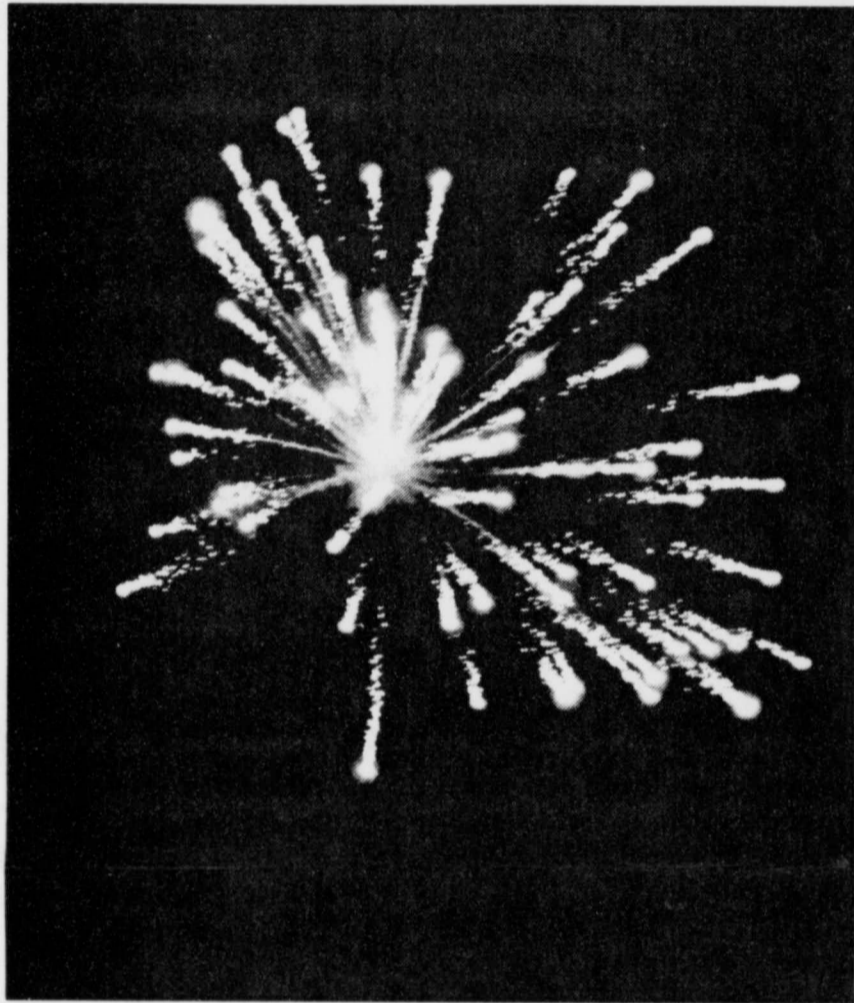
DPS has estimated that as many as 31 people could die in traffic crashes during the 4th of July holiday.

Crashes were reported in the following counties: Angelina, Bell, Brazoria, Brazos, Cameron, Coryell,

Crockett, Dallam, Denton, Galveston, Glasscock, Guadalupe, Harris, Henderson, Hidalgo, Hunt, Lamar, Lubbock, Montgomery, Scurry, Shelby, Sterling, Swisher and Tarrant.

The 27 crashes also resulted in 29 injuries. 23 people were wearing seatbelts and 26 were not. 8 people were involved in situations where seatbelts were not applicable. It is not known whether 7 of the people were wearing seatbelts.

3 of the crashes involved alcohol.

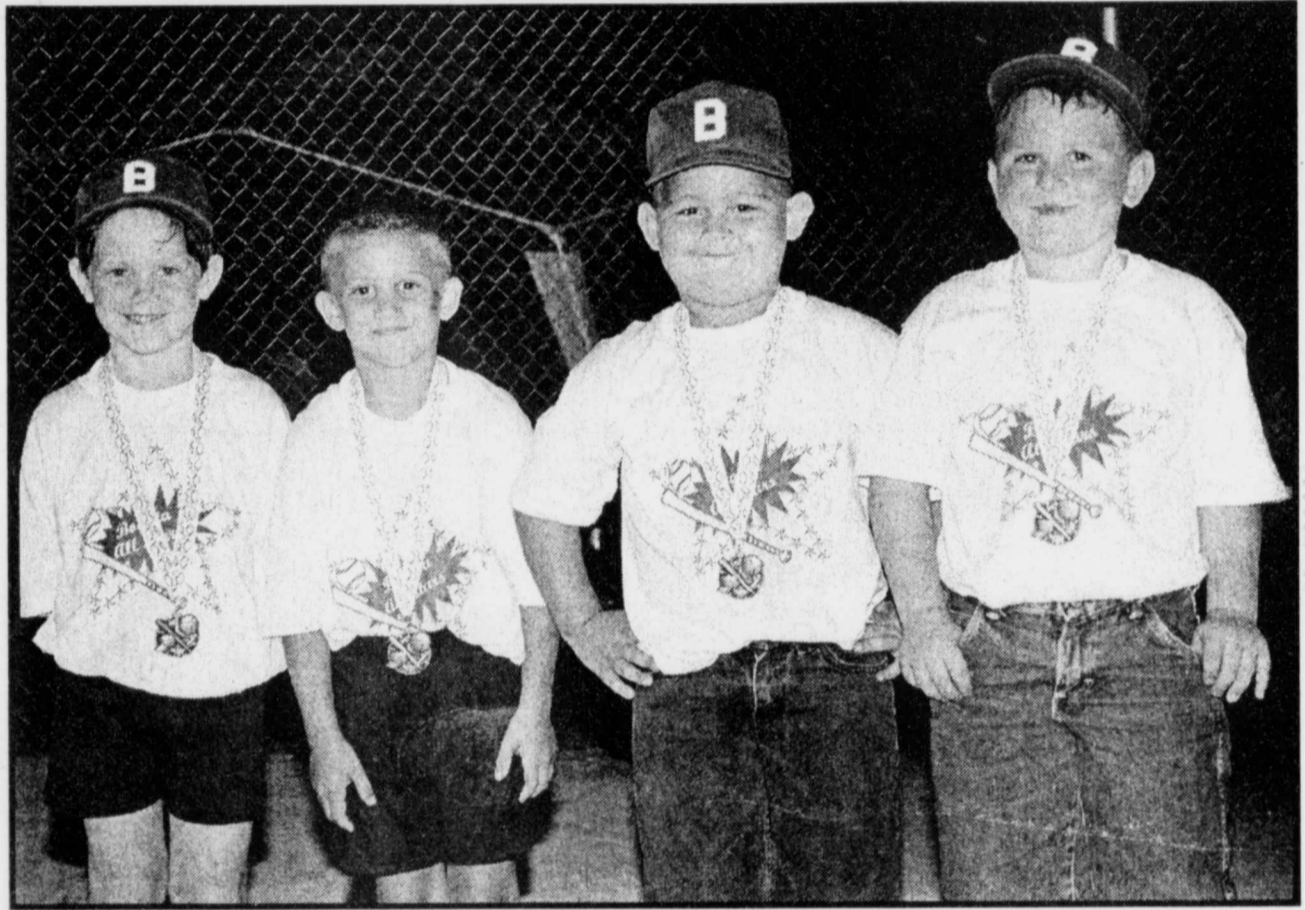

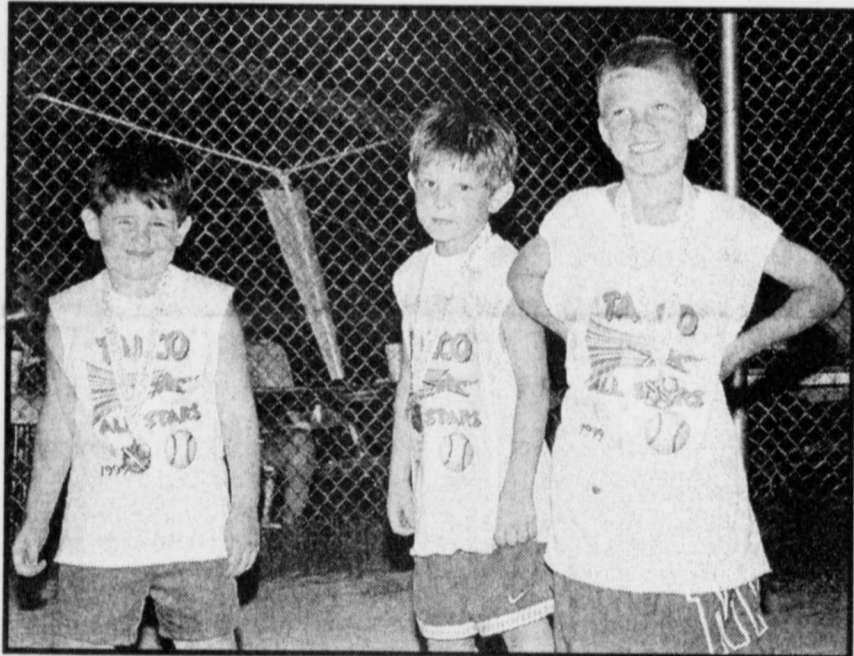

Country Cooking

This time of the year is one of my favorite times because of peaches. . . I just love peaches! As my husband and I peeled, sliced and prepared peaches for jelly on Sunday afternoon, he asked the question, "How were peaches preserved before Sure-Jell?"

When you read the recipe below, you will see that more sugar is used and it takes a lot more time than five minutes to prepare it and has to be stirred almost constantly to keep it from sticking.

Also, did you know that peaches came to us from China, not Georgia, over 4,000 years ago! The trees were spread throughout Europe by the Romans. Spanish explorers brought the peach to the Americas as early as the 1500's and the English colonists also brought peaches in the 1600's. The United States is the world's leading producer of peaches. Many peach trees are planted in commercial orchards and some are cultivated in gardens as ornamentals.

Georgia is not even the leading peach-growing state, California is with over 30,938,000 bushels annually. South Carolina is second with 7,396,000 bushels. Pennsylvania is third with 2,604,000 bushels annually. Georgia is fourth with 2,500,000 bushels and New Jersey harvests 1,510,000 bushels.

Peaches ripen from early summer to fall with some as late as October. Perhaps the best-known peach is the Elberta. They are freestone which means they can be cut from the seed with ease. Other well-known varieties are J.H. Hale and Golden Jubilee. Some clingstone varieties are Fortuna, Paloro, Johnson, Guame and Sims.

Did you know that nectarines are similar to peaches and not really an orange? They are essentially alike, except for the skin and the trees are identical.

The following recipes are some on peaches and came from an old recipe book entitled, "Timely Tasteful Tales from the Red River Valley 1800-1986". We hope you enjoy them and we will see you in the kitchen!

Peach Pickles-not anything better than spicy, pickled peaches..delicious!

Easy Peach Cobbler-this recipe makes it's own crust!

Golden Peach Cobbler-this one can be used with store-bought crust or make your own!

Old-Fashioned Peach Preserves-here's that recipe that takes the place of Sure-Jell!

Peach Cobbler-another recipe for this old-time favorite!

Peach Honey-this is delicious over ice cream, cakes, etc.!

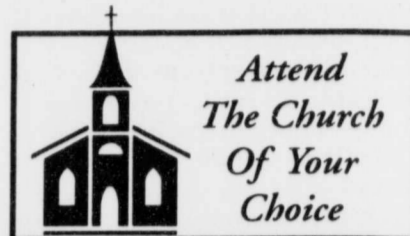

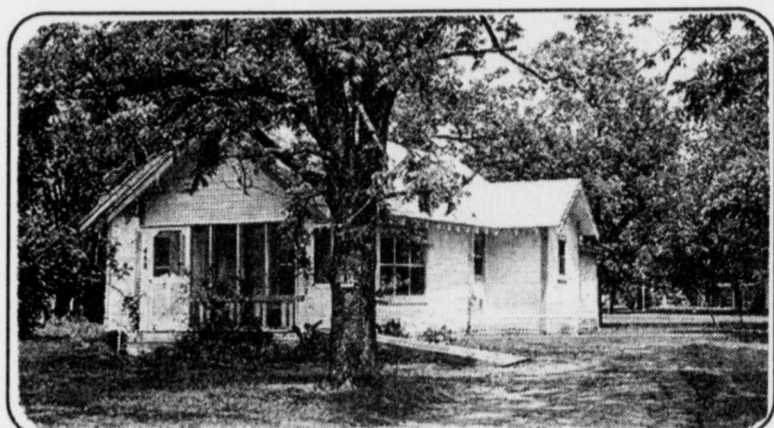

<p>Peach Pickles</p> <p>freestone peaches cloves sugar vinegar</p> <p>Use freestone peaches not fully ripe. They are just as good as clingstones and far easier to eat. Peel fruit and stick three to four cloves in each one. To ten pounds of fruit, use five pounds of sugar and one quart of vinegar. Cook together until straw can be stuck in fruit. Remove peaches and cook syrup until thick or heat syrup and pour over fruit for three consecutive days.</p> <p>Easy Peach Cobbler</p> <p>1 cup flour 1 cup sugar 1 cup milk 3 teaspoons baking soda 1 stick oleo 2 cups prepared peaches</p> <p>Combine all ingredients except oleo and peaches. Place mixture in dish and pour melted oleo over batter. Pour peaches over this and bake in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes.</p> <p>Golden Peach Cobbler</p> <p>4 cups prepared peaches 1 cup peach marmalade 2 pie crust 2 tablespoons cornstarch 1/2 cup sugar 2 tablespoons white Karo syrup 2 teaspoons brandy extract</p> <p>Peel and slice peaches. Combine cornstarch, marmalade, sugar, syrup and mix well. Add brandy extract. Roll out crust thicker than usual. Cut into one inch strips. Turn peach slices into 1-1/2 quart shallow baking dish. Pour peach mixture over fruit and top with lattice of pastry strips. Bake at 450 degrees for 30 minutes.</p>	<p>Old-Fashioned Peach Preserves</p> <p>9 cups sliced peaches 3/4 cups water 6 cups sugar</p> <p>Stir peaches and water slowly until they boil; then stir constantly. Add sugar and cook faster. Cook liquid away; about 30-45 minutes; then set off and test. Pour into shallow dish pan for 24 hours. If not cooked enough, place back on stove and cook more. After setting overnight, you can tell how stiff preserves will be. They will soak up some of the liquid overnight. They can be cold packed with paraffin or heated up and sealed with lids.</p> <p>Peach Cobbler</p> <p>1/2 stick butter 16 ounce can peaches 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup self-rising flour 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup milk 1/4 cup evaporated milk 1 teaspoon vanilla</p> <p>Melt butter in baking dish. Warm peaches and 1/2 cup sugar. Combine flour, 1/2 cup sugar, milks and vanilla. Pour flour mixture in baking dish. Add peaches. Let rise. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.</p> <p>Peach Honey</p> <p>6-7 cups sliced peaches 5 cups sugar</p> <p>Blend in blender. Cook 5 minutes at a rolling boil. Refrigerate.</p>

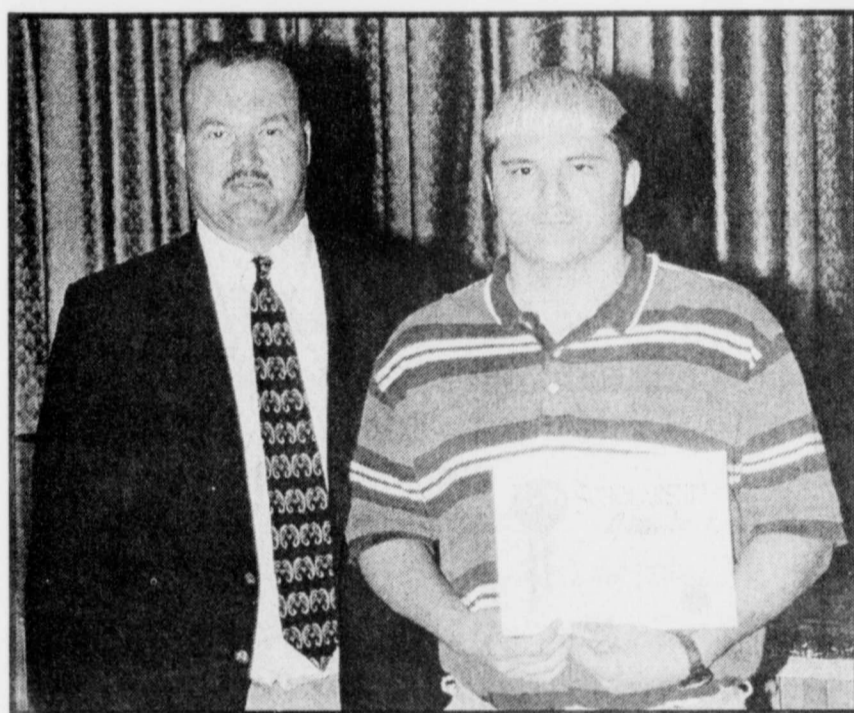

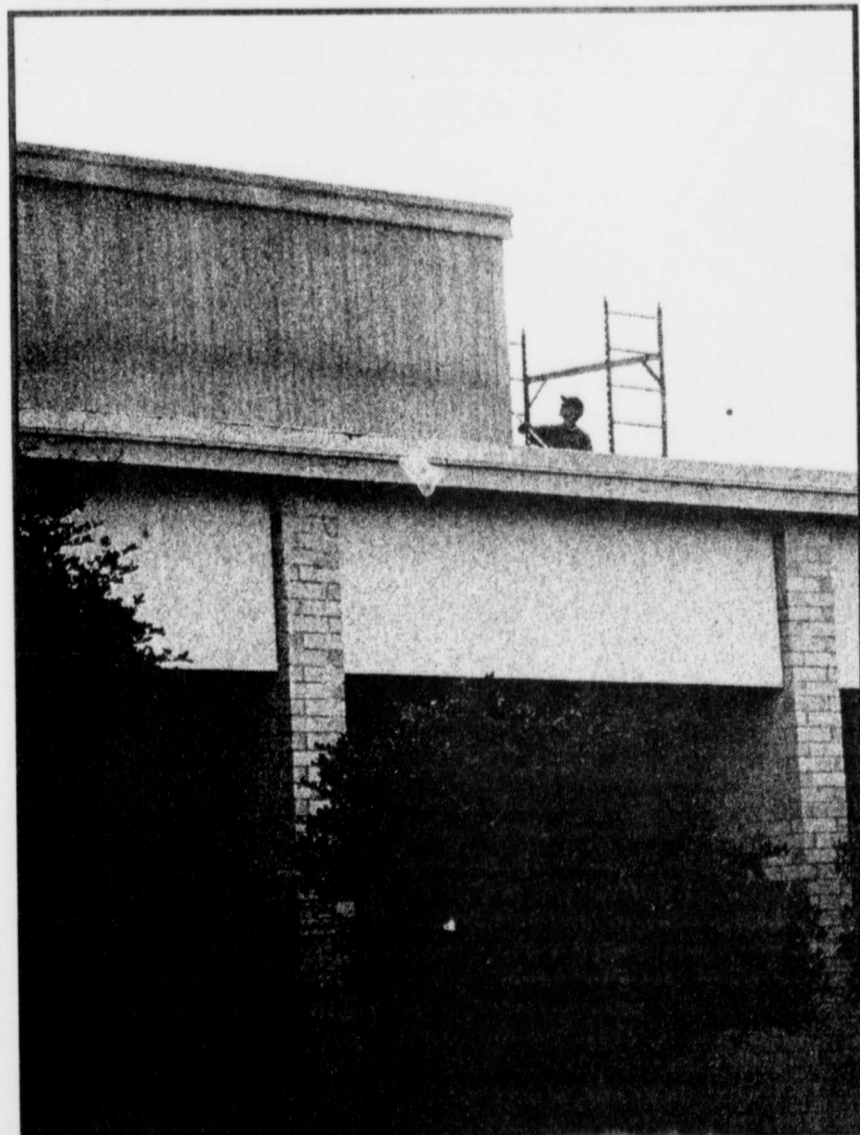

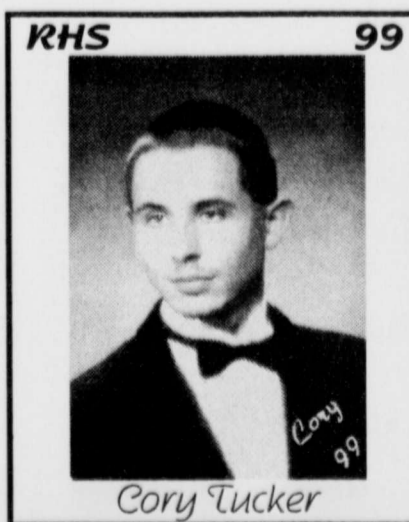

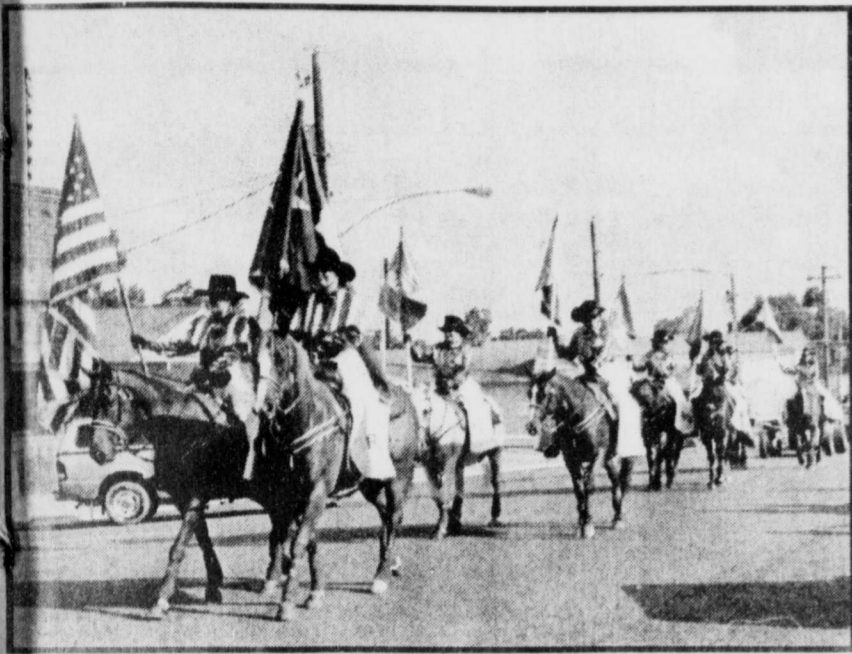

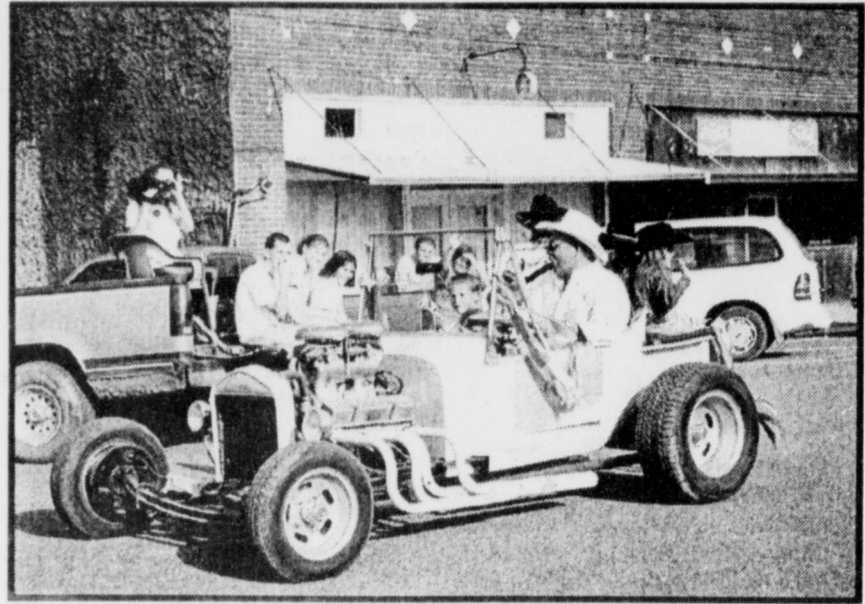

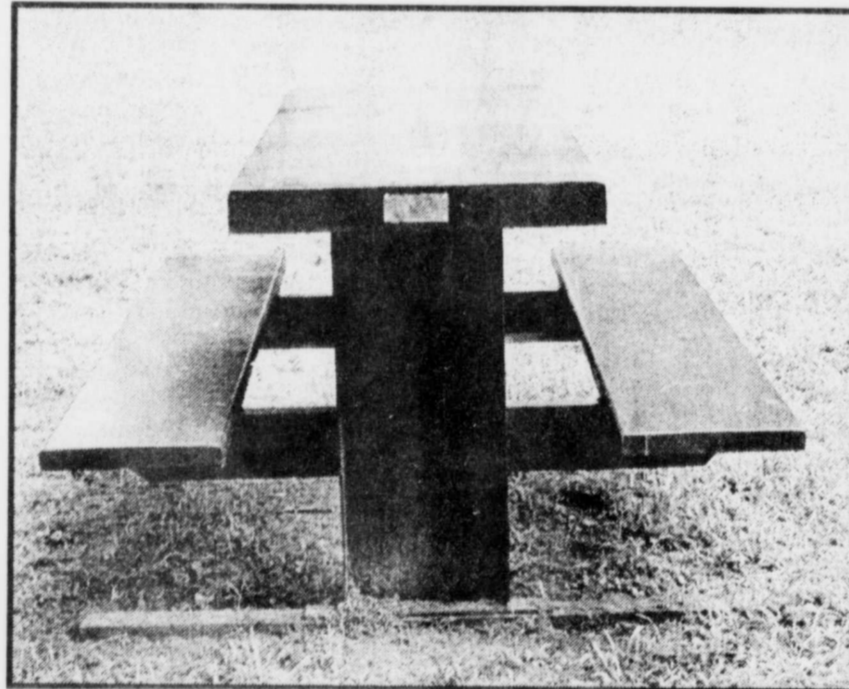

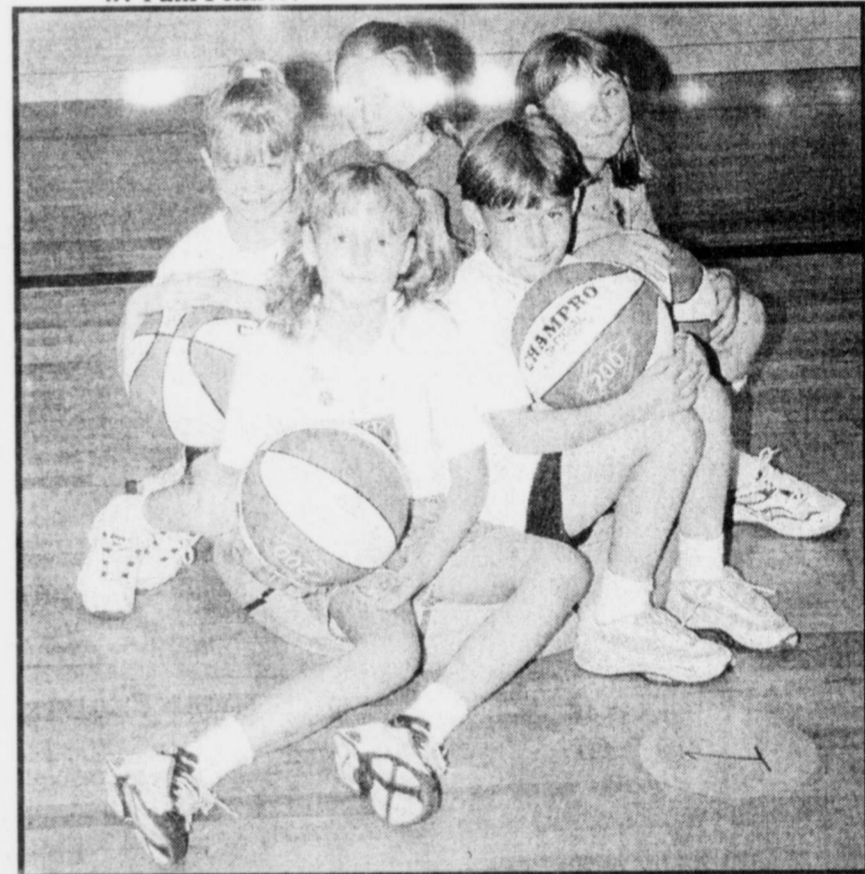

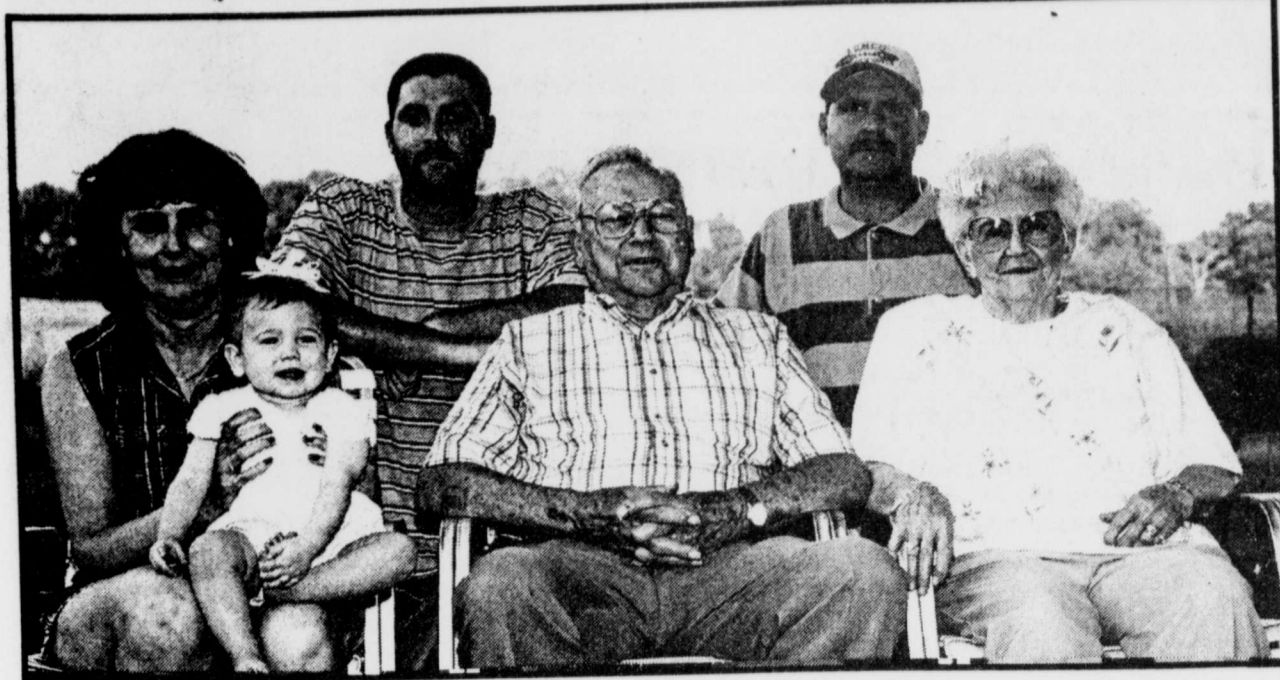

In reading Ruth the third chapter, verses one through three, something interesting can be seen in how men and women treat one another before marriage. Naomi is trying to get Ruth a husband. Boaz is the man, whom the sights are upon. Therefore, Naomi gives counsel how Ruth might win the heart of this man-Boaz. Her advice is this: "Wash thyself (that is, take a bath-clean yourself up-B.H.)...anoint thee (that is, put on some perfume, try to smell your best-B.H.)...put thy raiment upon thee (that is, dress nice-dress to impress-put on your best dress-B.H.)...make not thyself known unto the man, until he shall have done eating and drinking (the way to a man's heart is through is stomach-make sure he eats before you approach him, he'll be more receptive-B.H.)."

Didn't we do similarly when dating our prospective mates? Didn't we try to look nice? Didn't we dine out and feed them well? Didn't we open the door of the car, men? Didn't we do all that we could to win them over? What happened? Women, who would once never want their prospective husbands to see them without their hair being done, now go around the house not dressed well. Men, who once kept themselves fit, now allow themselves to become unhealthy looking and overweight. Women, who once cooked their best for their man, now habitually serve fast food and T.V. dinners if they cook at all. Men, who used to say "I love you," or "You look beautiful" now haven't a kind word to say and are never complimentary of their wife. Men, who used to take their prospective wife out on a date, now haven't got the time or the gumption to do so, they just want to stay home and watch the Braves.....and we wonder why loves dies. Brethren, a good rule of thumb is however much effort it took to make him or her happy before marriage, it'll likely take the same after marriage. Women (and men) should strive to dress attractively (Prov. 31:22). They should speak words of kindness to one another (Prov. 31:26, 28; Prov. 18:24a). Instead of wanting to be served, we should serve one another (Matt. 7:12; Eph. 5:25-ff; Matt. 23:11). We should talk and especially listen one to another (James 1:19). Remember how you used to hang on his or her every word-listening intently (Song of Solomon 4:3b). We should compliment one another (Prov. 31:28). We should remember that God has given us a wonderful body (Psalm 139:14), and we should take care of it (Eph. 5:28-29; Prov. 25:16)...God didn't say that bodily exercise profited nothing (I Timothy 4:8). Women should work in the home (Titus 2:5), striving to make the home an attractive place to be.

My friends, if we would show our spouses the respect we did prior to marriage; and if we would strive to win each other again, serving one another, instead of seeking to be served; much marital difficulty could be undone, and perhaps avoided. Read Ruth 3:1-3!

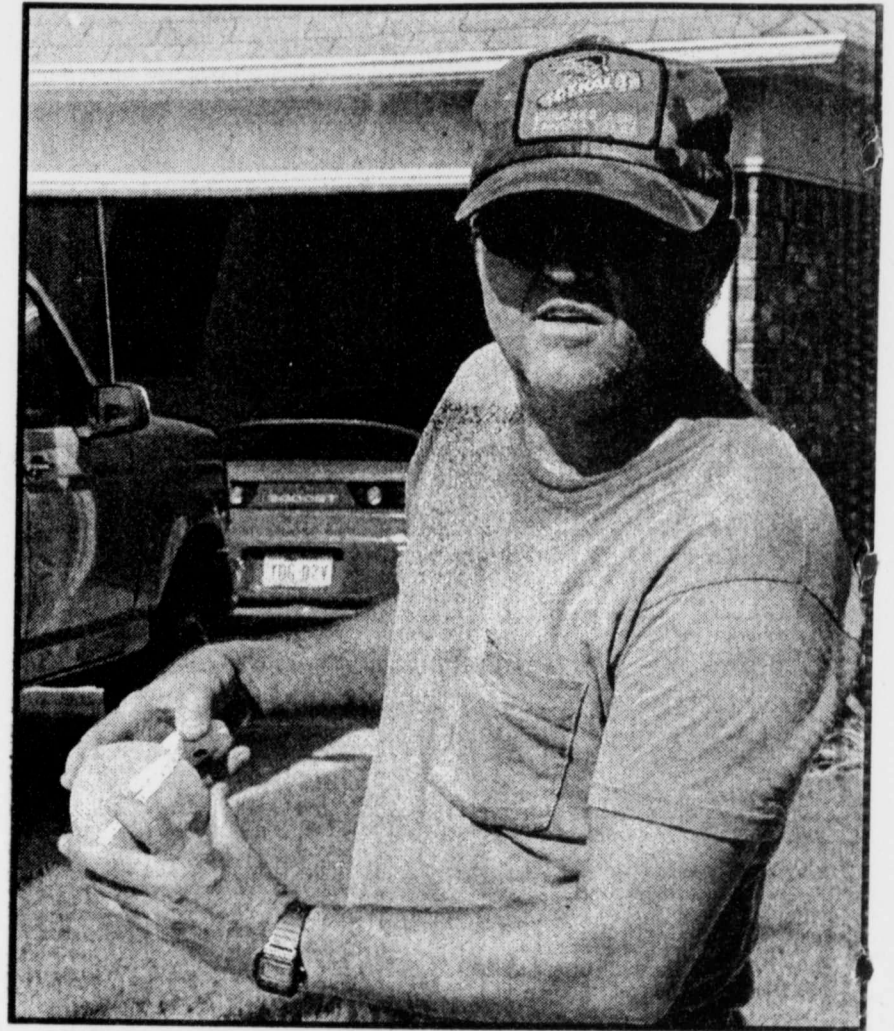
