Update on school construction given at breakfast

A back-to-school breakfast was held at Rivercrest High School for the employees of all campuses on Monday, Aug. 9, 1999 at 8:00 a.m. The breakfast was cooked and served by the Rivercrest cafeteria staff and Superintendent, Gary VanDeaver and Principals, Keith Brown, Bill Mabry and Kelly Stansell.

Following the meal Mr. Van Deaver called the meeting to order and gave the invocation. He welcomed everyone and stated that he hoped all were rested and ready for the challenges that would enter their doors on Thursday. Board member Charlie Hines was recognized as was Nancy Brown of the Talco and Bogata papers. Mr. Van Deaver stated that retirement had taken 90 years experience from the schools this year and those who replaced the retirees had big shoes to fill but he had every confidence that the new employees would make their own places at RHS. He turned the program over to Talco Principal, Kelly Stansell who announced changes at Talco School Kristi Clemmons will be a 5th grade teacher this year, Kathy Brown will be the Pre-Kindergarten teacher, Staci Hinton will move to the 4th grade and Mrs. Stansell welcomed Keith Darnell who actually began work in the middle of last year as a Talco custodian. Principal, Bill Mabry announced changes at Bogata School, welcoming Kathie Williams, new custodian, Sarah Black and Marty Cartwright, new cafeteria workers, Brandon Oats new coach and Kathy Stringfellow new teacher. Principal, Keith Brown announced changes at Rivercrest High School, welcoming Clayton Taylor new band director, Karl Whitehurst, new coach-math teacher, Ginger Foster, new English teacher, Tammy Kuhlengel, new English teacher, Paula Speir new math teacher and Paula Yeatman new cafeteria worker.

Mr. Van Deaver returned and announced that this year the in-service designed by the legislature stated that

anyone on extracurricular activities with students must know CPR. He stated that all staff would be required to take CPR classes which were to begin at 10:00 am in the school auditorium with class work and films. In the afternoon each campuses staff were to take their certification test. The classes were to be taught to the staff by Allen's Medical Training Services. Mr. Van Deaver also announced that all staff were to attend a session on Sexual Harassment on Tuesday morning at Rivercrest.

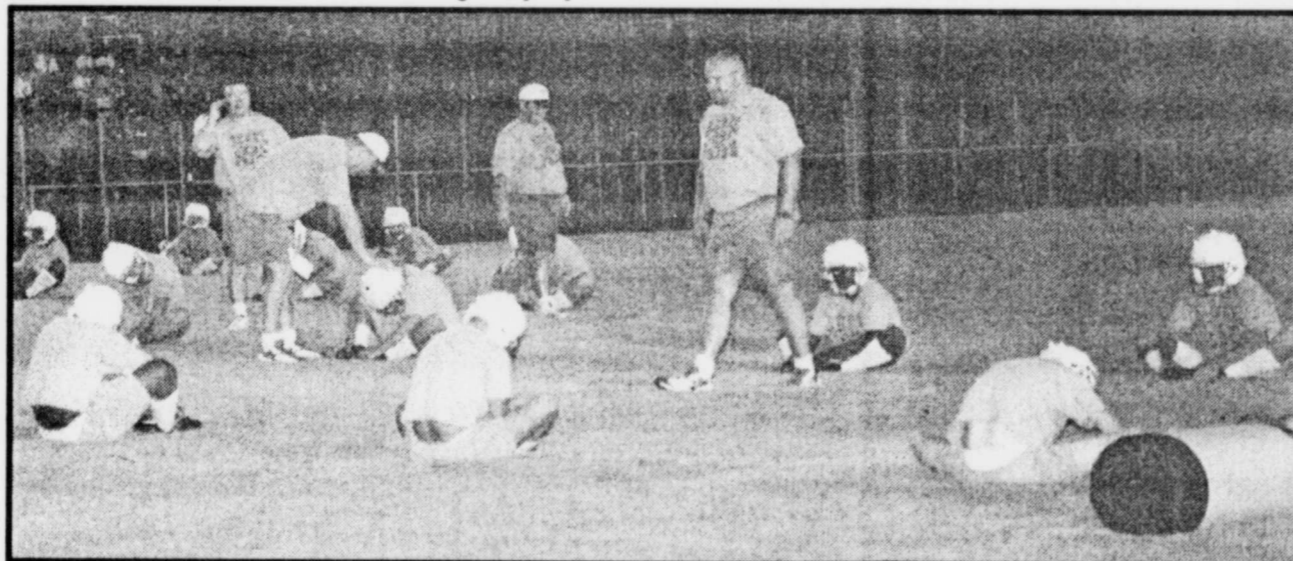
An up date on the school situation was given next by Mr. Van Deaver. He gave the group the facts on the EDA and IFA government programs which provide funds to schools for building. The school did not qualify for as much funding as was hoped for. Due to the blow to the taxpayers the new schools will be built in stages. Mr. Van Deaver stated that the hold up following the election and changes in state funding left the school unable to sell \$9 million in bonds but \$5.7 million were sold. What was hoped to have been accomplished in 1 or 2 years may now take 3 or 4 years to complete.

The plans are to construct an elementary school first which will hopefully be completed in 1 to 2 years. When the elementary students get into their new school the junior high students will all be sent to the Talco campus and the school will begin applying for funding to begin work and completion of a new junior high. It is expected to take 1 to 2 more years to complete this phase. While the new junior high will exist of 6th through 8th grade students it has not been decided if the 5th grade will move into the new elementary or stay at Talco for a while. Mr. Van Deaver asked for all the staff to help in the layout of the new buildings. Their input will be accepted and appreciated.

Mr. Van Deaver stated that he was glad to see the legal phase of the bond issue end and his only regrets were for the bad things that were said about good people and he felt those who

had been unjustly accused names should be cleared for all to see. He also stated that it troubled him to think that he unintentionally placed turmoil on anyone or anything. But he said, "This is not a time to continue to grind an axe or hold grudges it is a time to recommit to unity, reconcile differences, work for harmony and pull together for the fine school system we have". He praised the school board members for all their efforts and said he knew each member had the students and staff's welfare in mind when making their decisions. He told the group that he would be more than willing to answer any questions they might have now that the issue is settled. In the past he stated that he was unable to give direct answers on many occasions under the school lawyer's advice. In closing he again urged the group to go forward and continue to improve an already good school district.

Before dismissing Mr. Van Deaver told the staff that he hoped the \$3000 raise given by the state was enjoyed by all. He also announced the school will have two way radios on the buses this year. Last year during the tornado that destroyed DeKalb School, the schools had a bus of students on the road to Texarkana. There was no way the teachers could call the schools due to the calls being received by concerned parents which left both the parents and school unsure if the bus load of students and staff were safe. The new radios will help to insure the well-being of students and staff when they are on the road for various reasons. Both Ricky Moore, Bus Maintenance Director and Jerry Perry, Maintenance Coordinator will have a unit whenever a bus is out. Barbara Ward requested that a phone be put in the Bogata School cafeteria for the coming year. Mr. Van Deaver said her request would be looked into. Everyone was dismissed for a short break before beginning CPR Training.

RRValley Fair presents Ray Price in concert

Country music artist Ray Price of Nashville fame will be one of the headliners at the Red River Valley Fair on Monday night, August 23.

Ray Price was born in Perryville, Cherokee County, Texas on January 12, 1926. He worked on the family farm before leaving the rural East Texas area for Dallas as a teenager. Although he had cultivated an interest in music, the early days of World War II found him studying veterinary medicine at North Texas Agricultural College in Abilene. It wasn't long before he joined the Marines and was shipped out to serve in the Pacific.

In 1946 he resumed his studies, playing music on the side, most notably on Abilene's KRBC Hillbilly Circus radio show. Already billing himself, "The Cherokee Cowboy", he let veterinary studies take more and more of a back seat to his music. In 1949 he returned to Dallas and landed a spot on the prestigious Big D Jamboree. His first national exposure came when portions of the jamboree were broadcast over the CBS Radio Network.

Price also discovered Jim Beck's recording studio in Dallas. Beck was a brilliant electronics engineer who built much of his own equipment from scratch. The studio was so popular with the Columbia Studio in

the 1940's that it even briefly threatened Nashville as a country recording center.

In 1949, Price signed with the Nashville-based Bullet label and cut "Jealous Lies". Still he had little hint of what lay ahead. His reputation grew and in March of 1951 he signed with Columbia. Not long afterwards, he moved to Nashville. He became fast friends with Hank Williams and

Red River county considering prison, assisted living projects

Red River county is formulating studies for a proposed prison and a 48-unit assisted living complex which might be built locally.

The commissioners authorized Commercial Resources, LLC to formulate studies for these projects.

Wally Boersma with LLC investment company of Marshall, Texas, said 1,000 inmates would employ 230 to 270 full time jobs.

Commercial Resources would serve as project manager if the county decides to build the prison after a review of studies.

County Judge L.D. Williamson said that the money would come from investors, and the county would have

to liability to build the facility.

The county would own the operation and control it and receive revenue from it.

The commissioner approved a \$9,000 fund as a show of good faith. It may not be necessary to use it.

The prison, Judge Williamson says, would help the county's tax base.

Public hearings will be held concerning the matter.

There is also the possibility of building a 48-unit assisted living complex. This would employ from eight to 12 people locally and would provide a useful service to the area.

It is not the type of complex which would "take a dime from nursing homes" Boersma says.

One dies, two injured in wreck near Bogata

According to a report filed by DPS Officer Jim Trammell, a two vehicle accident on FM 909, 3.3 miles north of Bogata took the life of 32 year old Kathy Walker Ewing of Rt. 1, Bogata.

The accident occurred Sunday morning, August 8, at 7:50 a.m. Involved was a 1999 Dodge pickup truck driven by Ewing, and a 1994 Ford pickup driven by 18 year old

Jeffery Don Davidson of Bogata.

Davidson and a passenger in the Ewing vehicle (Margie Walker, Ms. Ewing's mother) sustained serious injuries and were transported to East Texas Medical in Clarksville.

The two vehicles collided head on on a curve in the road.

Charles are pending following further investigation and test results.

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Country Cooking

Our final installment from the Lamar County Extension Service on canning and making jams and jellies is proper preservation of Summer fruits. With the dry weather around, crops are dwindling, but local markets still offer fruits and vegetables in abundance.

The most enjoyable place to start your home canning is with fruits. Not only do they bring you the delicious, sweet flavors of summer, but fruits require simple boiling water processing. Start with the finest fruits you can find. Look over each piece carefully to make sure there are not soft spots, bruised or mold. Cut as desired.

Use only firm fruits naturally high in pectin. Select a mixture of about 3/4 ripe and 1/4 under-ripe fruit. Do not use commercially canned or frozen juices. Their pectin content is too low. Wash all fruits thoroughly before cooking. Crush soft fruits or berries; cut firmer fruits into small pieces. Using the peels and cores to add pectin to juice during cooking. Add water to fruits that require it. One pound of fruit should yield 1 cup of clear juice.

Wash and rinse all fruits thoroughly before cooking. Do not soak. For best flavor, use fully ripe fruit. Remove stems, skins and pits from fruit; cut into pieces and crush. For berries, remove stems and blossoms and crush. Seedy berries may be put through a sieve or food mill.

Fresh fruits and juices as well as commercially canned or frozen fruit juice can be used with commercially prepared powders or liquid pectin. The order of combining ingredients

depends on the type of pectin used. Complete directions for a variety of fruits are provided with packaged pectin. Jelly or jam made with added pectin requires less cooking and generally gives a larger yield. These products have more natural fruit flavors too. In addition, using added pectin eliminates the need to test hot jellies and jams to proper jelling. Adding 1/2 teaspoon butter or margarine with the juice and pectin will reduce foaming. However, these may cause off-flavor in long-term storage of jellies and jams.

Sweet spreads are a class of foods with many textures, flavors and colors. They consist of fruits preserved mostly of means of sugar and they are thickened or jellied to some extent. Fruit jelly is a semi-solid mixture of fruit juice and sugar that is clear and firm enough to hold its shape. Other spreads are made from crushed or ground fruit.

Jam also will hold its shape, but is less firm than jelly. Jam is made from crushed or chopped fruits and sugar. Jams made from a mixture of fruits are usually called conserves, especially when they include citrus fruits, nuts, raisins or coconut. Preserves are made of small, whole fruits for uniform-size pieces of fruits in a clear, thick, slightly jellied syrup. Marmalades are soft fruit jellies with small pieces of fruit or citrus peel evenly suspended in a transparent jelly. Fruit butters are made from fruit pulp cooked with sugar until thickened to spreadable consistency.

We hope you enjoy these recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

Apple Rings--spiced apple rings may be made by adding stick cinnamon, whole cloves or other whole spices, tied in a spice bag, to syrup during preparation. Remove bag before canning rings. Green food coloring may be substituted for red color. Use a variety of eating apples good for cooking to help maintain shape and texture.

Applesauce--spiced applesauce can be made by adding ground spices, such as cinnamon, nutmeg or allspice, to sauce during the last 5 minutes of cooking. For chunky sauce, core and peel apples before they are cooked. Coarsely crush half of coked apples with a potato masher; press remaining apples through a sieve or food mill. Combine crushed and sauced apples mixture and continue as for applesauce. Use a sweet variety eating apple, this may lessen the addition of more sugar.

Branded Peaches--peach brandy is used for this recipe and these are great for the upcoming holidays.

Branded Peaches--use white brandy for a clear syrup; however, any brandy will flavor the fruit.

Honey Spiced Peaches--uses honey for these delicious canned peaches.

Mixed Fruit--if fruit is to be used for salad or desert, leave in large pieces; cut fruit into small pieces for cocktails.

Pear Mincemeat--this is a fruit mincemeat and is great for those holiday pies and dishes!

Peach or Pear Chutney--a spicy sauce or relish great for topping many dishes.

Fruit Preservation Recipes

Apple Rings
10 pounds apples
4 cups sugar
4 cups water
red food coloring (optional)
Wash and core apples; do not peel. Slice apples into 1/4 inch thick rings. Treat to prevent darkening. Combine sugar and water in large pot. Add few drops of food coloring if desired. Bring syrup mixture to boil; boil five minutes. Remove from heat. Drain apple rings. Add rings to syrup and let stand 10 minutes. Bring mixture to boil; reduce heat; simmer 30 minutes. Remove mixture from heat and let stand until cool. Remove rings from syrup and allow syrup to boil. Pack rings in hot jars and remove air bubble; top with syrup and allow for head space. Process pints for 15 minutes and quarts 20 minutes in boiling water canner.

Applesauce
2-1/2 to 3-1/2 pounds apples per quart sugar (optional)
Wash, stem and quarter apples; do not core or peel. Cook apples until soft in a large covered sauce pot with just enough water to prevent sticking. Press apples and juice through a sieve or food mill to separate seeds and peel from pulp. Return apple pulp to saucepot. Add 1/4 cup sugar per pound of apples to taste, if desired. Bring applesauce to a boil; stirring to prevent sticking. Reduce heat; simmer 5 minutes, stirring to prevent sticking. Ladle sauce into hot jars and leave head space. Remove air bubbles. Process pints and quarts 20 minutes in boiling water canner.

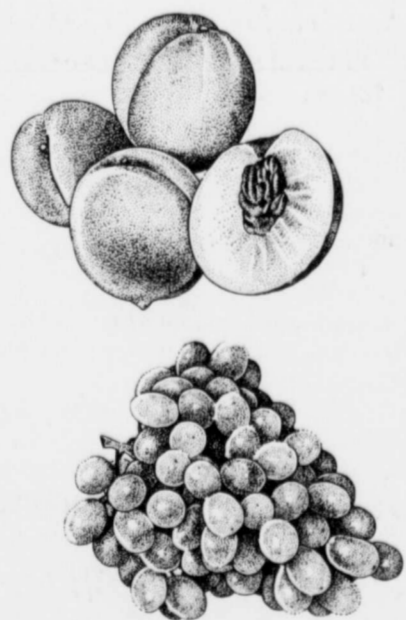
Branded Peaches
4 pounds small peaches
6 cups sugar-divided
1 teaspoon salt
1 quart water
3/4 cup peach brandy
Wash and peel peaches. Leave peaches whole. Treat to prevent darkening. Combine 3 cups sugar, salt and water in large pot; bring to boil. Drain peaches. Gently boil in syrup one layer at a time 6 minutes or until hot throughout. Peaches will darken if undercooked but do not cook until soft. Place peaches in deep bowl. Boil syrup 5 minutes; pour over peaches. Cover and let stand 12-18 hours in a cool place. Remove peaches from syrup. Add remaining 3 cups sugar to syrup. Remove peaches from syrup. Boil syrup. Pack peaches into hot jars and leave head space. Remove air bubbles. Process 10 minutes in boiling water canner.

Branded Pears
10 pounds pears
6 cups sugar
4 cups water
3 cups brandy
Wash, peel, halve and core pears. Combine sugar and water in large pot. Bring to boil. Cook pears in syrup one layer at a time until just tender; about 5 minutes. Place cooked pears in a large bowl; set aside. After all pears are cooked, continue cooking syrup until thickened, about 15 minutes. Remove from heat; add brandy. Pack pears into hot jars and leave head space. Ladle hot syrup over pears. Process 15 minutes in boiling water canner.

Honey Spiced Peaches
8 small peaches
1 cup sugar
4 cups water
2 cups honey
3 sticks cinnamon
3/4 teaspoon whole cloves
1-1/2 teaspoons whole all spice
Wash and peel peaches. Leave whole. Treat to prevent darkening. Combine sugar, water and honey in large pot. Cook until sugar dissolves. Drain peaches. Cook peaches one layer at a time in syrup three minutes or until hot throughout. Pack hot peaches in hot jars and leave head space. Add 1 cinnamon stick, 1/2 teaspoon all spice and 1/4 teaspoon cloves to each jar. Ladle hot syrup over peaches and leave head space. Remove air bubbles. Process 25 minutes in boiling water canner.

Pear Mincemeat
7 pounds Bartlett pears
1 lemon
2 pounds raisins
6-3/4 cups sugar
1 tablespoon cloves
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 tablespoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon allspice
1 teaspoon ginger
1 cup vinegar
Wash, quarter and core pears. Wash and cut lemon into quarters, removing seeds. Coarsely chop pears, lemon and raisins. Combine all ingredients in large pot. Bring mixture to boil over medium heat; reduce heat and simmer 40 minutes. Ladle hot mincemeat into hot jars and leave headspace. Remove air bubbles. Process 25 minutes in boiling water canner.

Peach or Pear Chutney
4 quarts finely chopped, peeled, pitted peaches or pears
2 tablespoons ginger
1 cup raisins
2 teaspoons salt
1 cup chopped onion
2-3 cups brown sugar
1/4 cup mustard seed
1 clove garlic-minced (optional)
1 hot red pepper-finely chopped
5 cups vinegar
Combine all ingredients in large pot. Cook slowly until thick about 40 minutes. Stir frequently to prevent sticking. Ladle hot chutney into hot jars. Leave head space. Process 10 minutes in boiling water canner.

FOOT NOTES



Athlete's Foot

Why is this fungus called athlete's foot? Perhaps because it may be picked up in locker room showers and floors. Also, a sweaty, damp foot in a dark shoe offers the warm moist climate in which fungi like to grow. This type of dermatophyte infection is characterized by burning, itching, oozing and peeling skin. 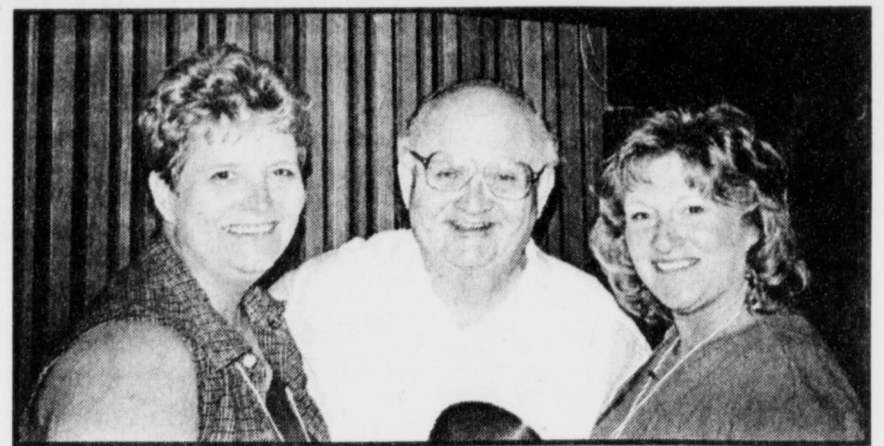

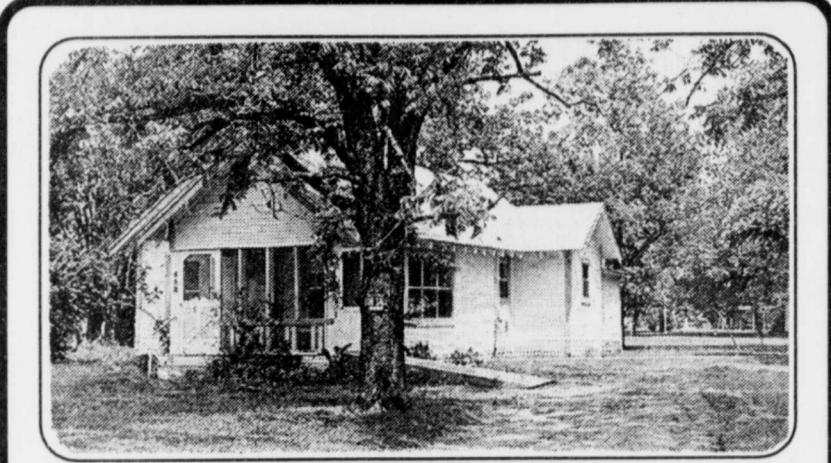

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Local teacher attends NASA Summer Institute

Leah Bull, Talco Junior High Science teacher, was one of 25 teachers selected from Texas and across the country that attended the Texas Space Grant Consortium's 10th Summer Institute for middle and secondary school teachers in Houston, Tx. the week of July 19-24.

With the landing of the NEAR satellite to orbit Asteroid 433 Eros this year and the February 7, 1999 launch of the STARDUST satellite to fly by three comet nuclei, the Summer Institute highlighted asteroids, meteors and comets. The Lunar and Planetary Institute in Houston was the host facility where the teachers received lectures and activities by scientist that specialize in astronomy. The teachers also met with astronaut

Jim Newman who has been on 3 shuttle missions.

The participants visited the Houston Museum of Natural Science Planetarium and attended a Star Party with Johnson Space Center Astronomical Society for the 30th anniversary of the lunar landing, the George Observatory for the Rendezvous with a Comet Mission and Star Party, and Space Center Houston for a tour of the facility. The teachers also visited the Johnson Space Center to view the

International Space Station mock-ups, Shuttle Simulators and the Neutral Buoyancy Lab where astronauts are trained for their missions. On Saturday the teachers enjoyed a relaxing day at Moody Gardens and the beach on Galveston Island.

The teachers were presented activities to bring back to the classroom, given presentations from scientists from LPI and NASA, and given handouts, posters, video tapes, CD-ROM's and other miscellaneous information to help them excite their students.

The institute is offered annually to excellent, innovative and enthusiastic teachers to help them get more NASA related materials in the classroom. Now, after attending the Institute the teachers are included in the LiftOff Alumni Association.

The Texas Space Grant Consortium (<http://www.tsgc.utexas.edu/tsgc/>) is a consortium of academic institution, aerospace companies, government agencies and non-profit organizations that supports space-related research, education and public outreach. It is a component of the National Space Grant College and Fellowship Program, which is administered by NASA.

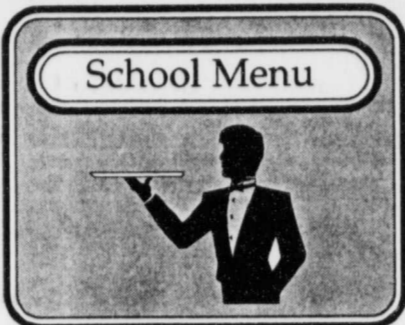

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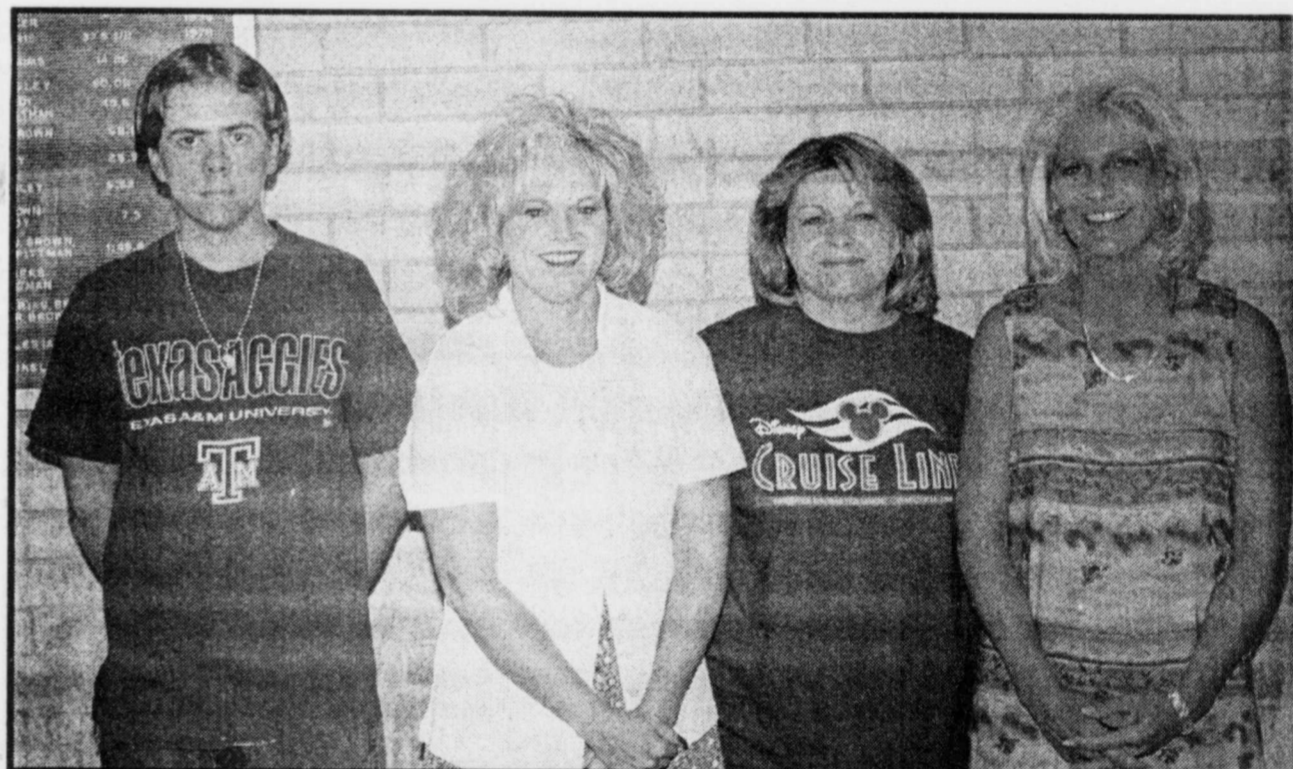

 Application: The City of Deport, P.O. Box 354-A, Deport, Texas 75435, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, (TNRCC) for a renewal of NPDES Permit No. TX0054721. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 183,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. 10741-001 will replace the existing NPDES Permit No. TX0054721 issued on April 10, 1993 and TNRCC Permit No. 10741-001.

The plant site is located approximately 1000 feet south of U.S. Highway 271 and 1400 feet west of the intersection of Farm to Market Road 1149 and U.S. Highway 271 in Lamar County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to Mustang Creek, thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are limited aquatic life uses for Mustang Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are high aquatic life uses and contact recreation.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

Public Comment/Public Meeting. A public meeting is intended for the taking of public comment, and is not a contested case hearing. 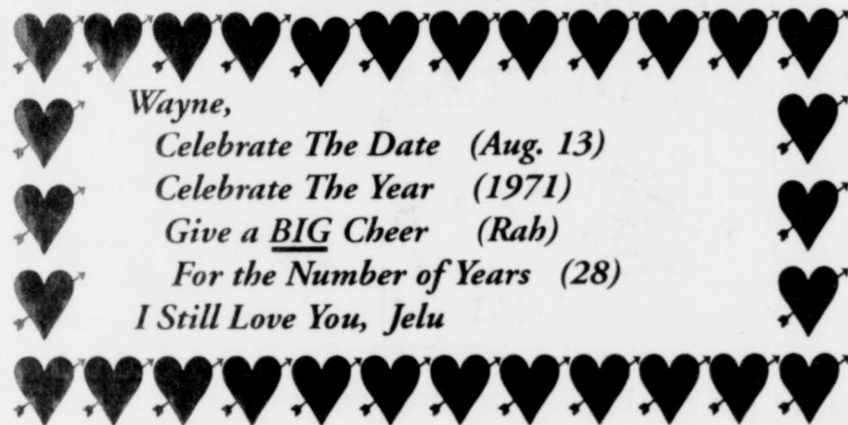
