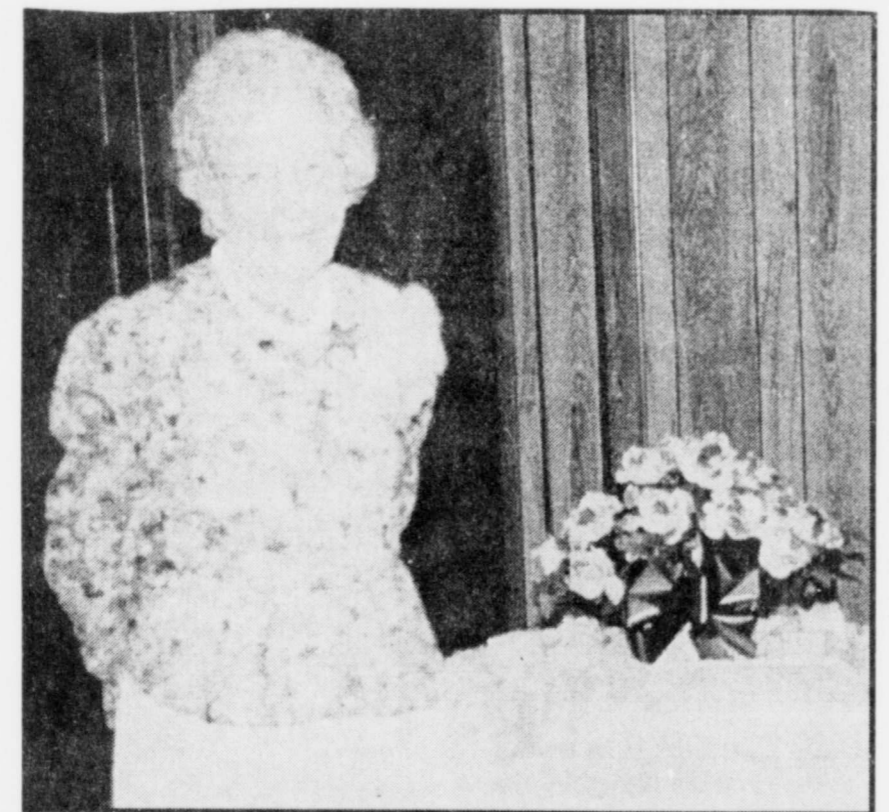
Trafficking clean-up continues

Efforts to clean up drug trafficking in Red River County continued with the arrest of a 52-year old man in northern Red River County on Sunday, October 10.
Following a routine traffic stop on FM195, Deputy Rick Teer became suspicious after talking with the driver and obtained consent to search the vehicle.
During the search, a container partially filled with methamphetamine,

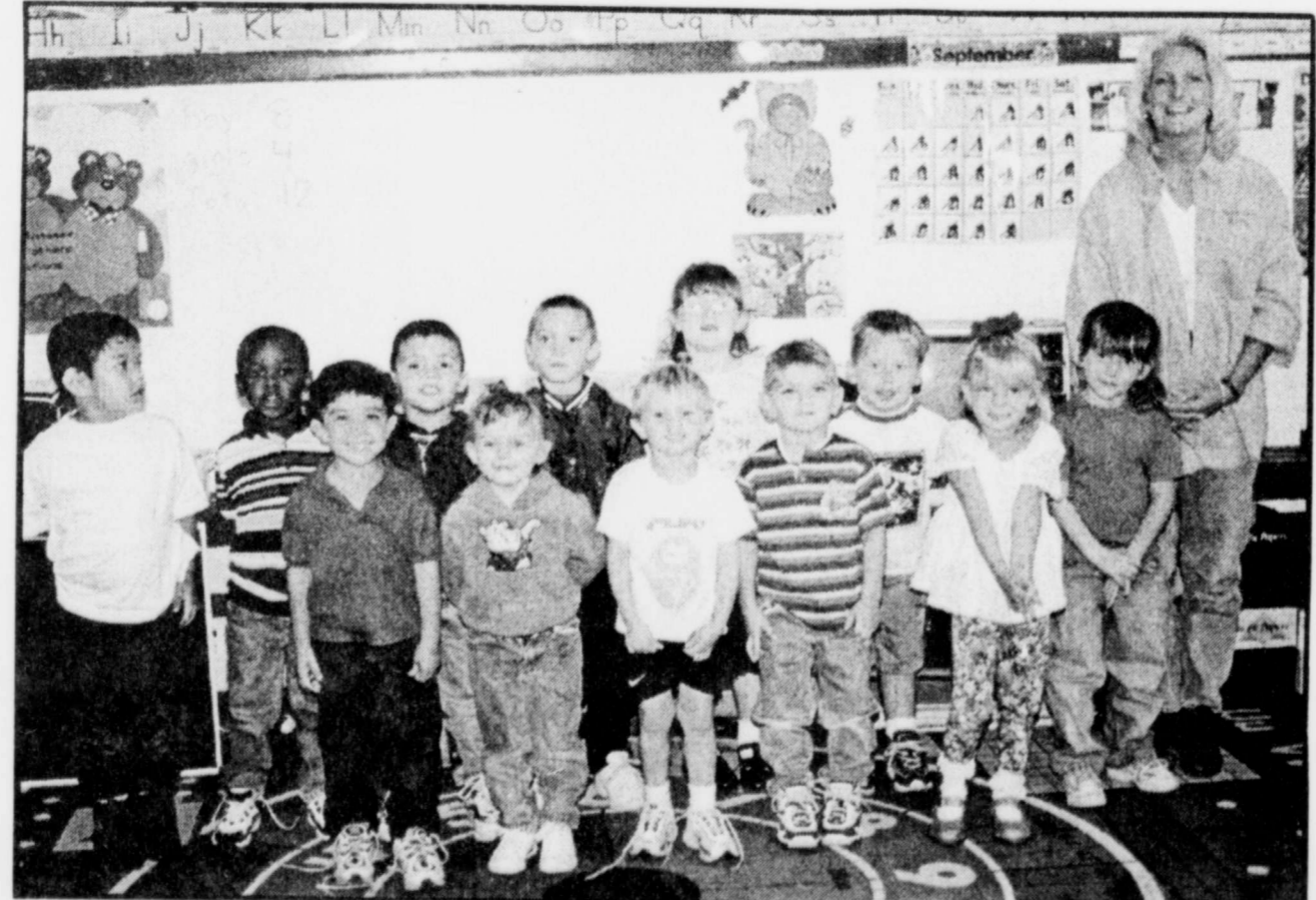
approximately \$7,500.00 in cash and other drug paraphernalia were seized.
Arrested was Albert Duane Edwards of Honey Grove for possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance, a second degree felony. Edwards is now in Red River County Jail and bond has been set at \$100,000.00.
Information from the arrest has led to the seizure of two methamphetamine labs in another state.

Monster Eye Meatballs and Berry Scary Sauce with Spooky Spaghetti

Meatballs:
1-1/2 pound lean ground beef
1 cup -Minute Oats
2 eggs-beaten
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
36 toothpicks
36 green olives

Sauce:
1 can whole berry cranberry sauce
1 cup catsup
1 cup prepared barbecue sauce
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 package spaghetti-prepared according to directions

To prepare meatballs, combine ingredients for meatballs and shape into 1-inch meatballs. Brown over medium heat; stirring frequently; drain and set aside. Combine sauce ingredients and bring to boil; stirring frequently. Add meatballs to sauce and simmer for 15-20 minutes. Attach one olive to eat meatball with toothpick and repeat for each "eyeball". Arrange on top of spaghetti. Makes 36.

Ghouls and Goblins Fruited Stew

Topping:
3/4 cup honey
1/3 cup vegetable oil
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
4 cups 3-Minute Oats
3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 cup raisins-optional

Fruited Stew:
1 cup sliced bananas
1 cup sliced apples
1 cup grapes
1 cup sliced peaches
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

To prepare topping; preheat oven to 350 degrees. On stovetop in a small saucepan, bring 1/2 cup water to boil. Add honey, oil and vanilla; mix well. Remove from heat. Combine oats and cinnamon in a large bowl; gradually add honey mixture, stirring until oats are well coated. Place oat mixture in ungreased 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan; bake 15 minutes. Remove from oven; stir well. Reduce heat to 275 degrees. Bake 1-1/2 hours or until toasted and crisp, stirring every 15 minutes. Cool, toss with raisins and set aside. To prepare stew; combine fruit and toss with cinnamon. Divide evenly among eight custard cups or small bowls and top with oatmeal topping. Makes 8 servings.

Hair 'Em Scare 'Em Cookies

1 cup vegetable shortening
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
3 cups 3-Minute oats
assorted candy and icings

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease cookie sheet. Beat shortening and sugars well until creamy. Add eggs and vanilla; mix well. Combine flour, baking soda and salt. Add to shortening mixture; mix well. Stir in oats; mix well. Using rounded teaspoons, roll into balls. Place 3 inches apart on prepared cookie sheet and flatten slightly. Bake 10-12 minutes or until golden brown on bottom. Let stand 3 minutes before moving to racks to cool.

Pumpkin Patch Brownies

3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup margarine or butter-softened
1/2 cup peanut butter
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
1 cup 3-Minute oats
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/3 cup cocoa powder
1 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
24 pumpkin candies
green icing (see vines and leaves)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease or paper line 24 muffin cups. Beat sugars, margarine and peanut butter in large bowl until creamy. Beat in eggs and vanilla until well blended. Combine oats, flour, cocoa and baking soda in separate bowl; gradually add to peanut mixture and stir until well blended. Stir in chocolate chips. Divide evenly into muffin cups; bake 18-20 minutes and cool completely. Decorate with candy and green icing to resemble pumpkin patch.



Ghost Pinwheels

3 cups biscuit mix
3 tablespoons chopped fresh basil leaves
1 cup skim milk
3 tablespoons prepared Caesar salad dressing
3/4 cup freshly grated mozzarella cheese
garlic salt
1/2 jar prepared spaghetti sauce

In large bowl, stir together biscuit mix, basil and milk to form stiff dough. Turn out onto surface dusted with additional biscuit mix; knead ten times. Roll dough into a 12 x 9 inch rectangle about 1/4 inch thick. Spread with salad dressing and sprinkle with cheese. Beginning with long side, roll up one half of dough toward the center. Roll the other half toward center. Cut down the center to make 2 rolls. Cut each roll into 12 slices; place on baking sheet coated with cooking spray. Sprinkle tops with slices of garlic salt. Bake at 400 degrees for 12-14 minutes until golden brown. Heat sauce and use for dipping or topping.

Graveyard Mist Brownies

2 cups biscuit mix
1-3/4 cups sugar-divided
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
2 large eggs-beaten
1 can pumpkin
3/4 cup vegetable or canola oil
1/2 package cream cheese

In large mixer bowl, combine biscuit mix, 1-1/2 cups of the sugar, cinnamon and cloves. In another bowl, stir together eggs, pumpkin and oil; add to dry ingredients. Beat until thoroughly combined. Spread batter in ungreased 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan. In small bowl, microwave cream cheese on HI for 20 seconds; stir in remaining 1/4 cup sugar. Place in a heavy-duty resealable plastic bag and cut off 1/4 inch from one corner. Pipe onto pumpkin batter, making 5 crosswise lines from one long side of the pan to the other. Drag a wooden pick or knife through all lines from one short side to the other. Repeat at 1-inch intervals, dragging the pick in the opposite direction each time, to make decorative design. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-27 minutes or until pick inserted comes out clean.

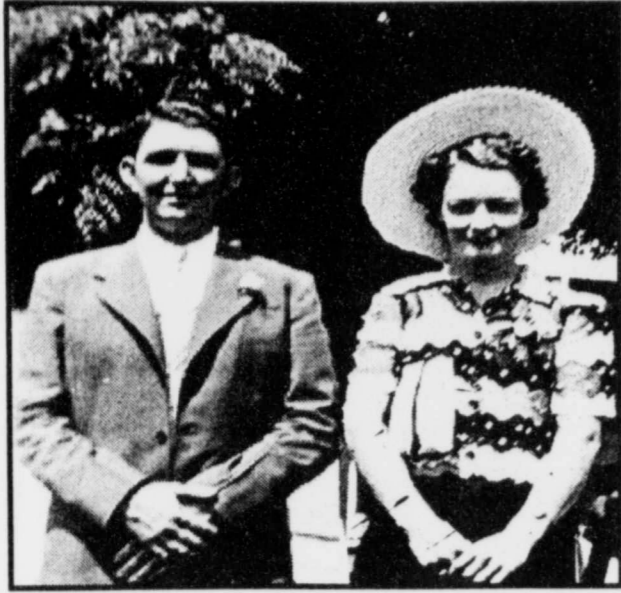

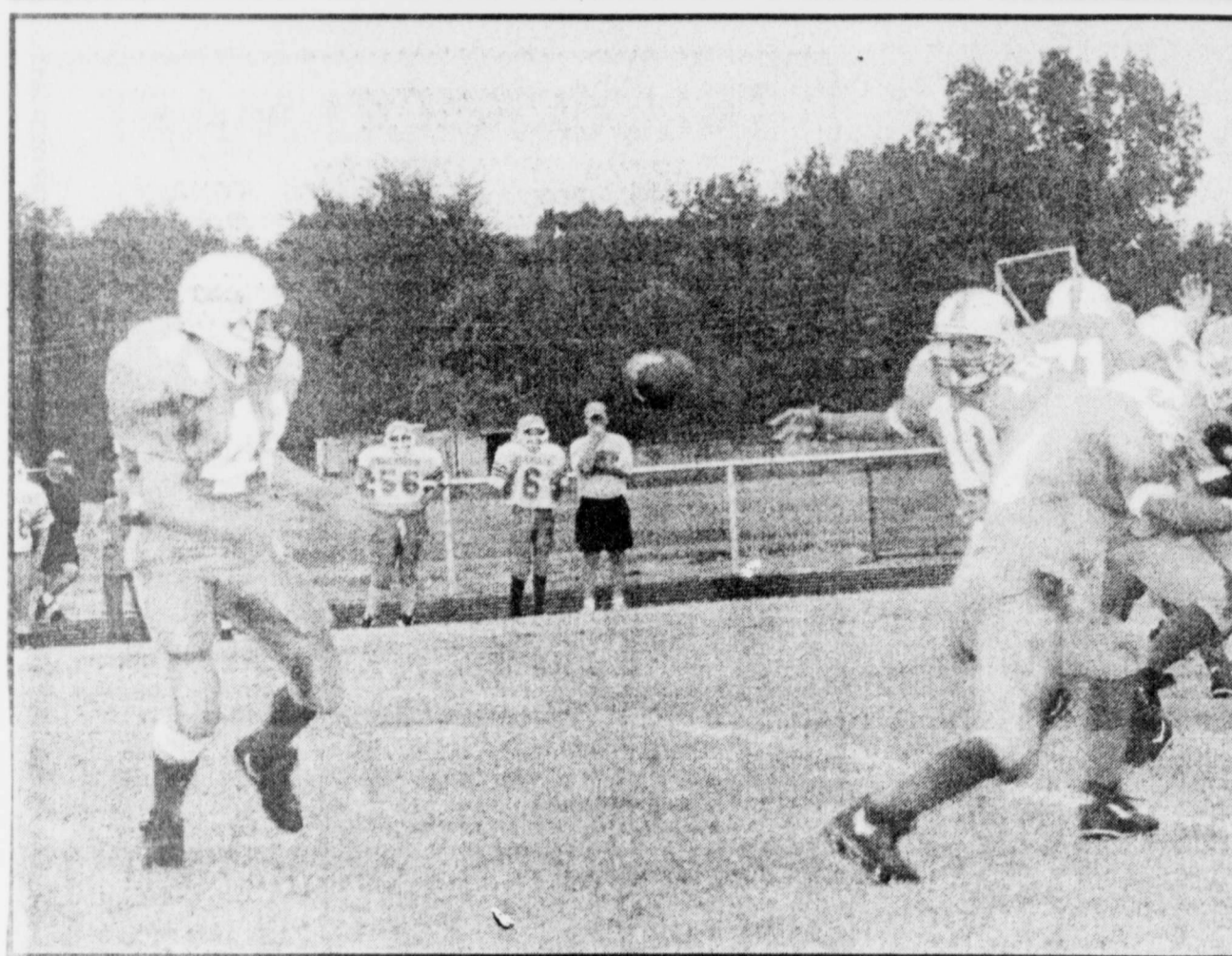

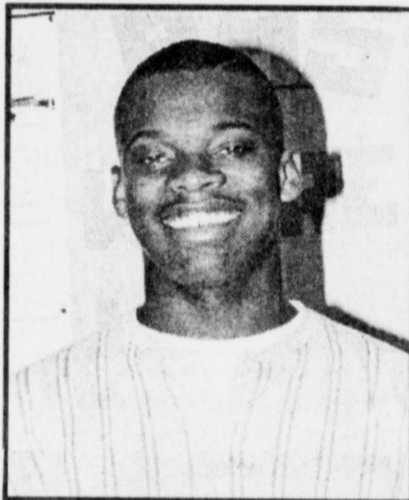

by those who stepped up to take the places of the lost players.

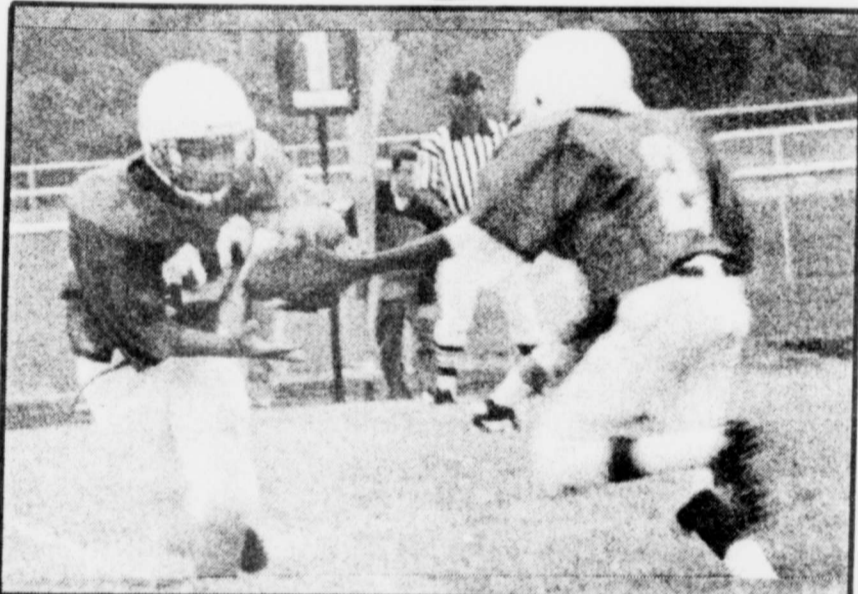

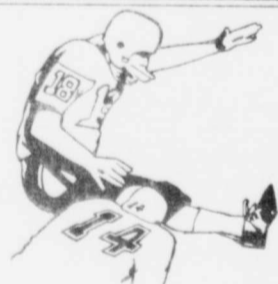

In May he was one of 12,000 participants in the battle held in Mansfield, La.

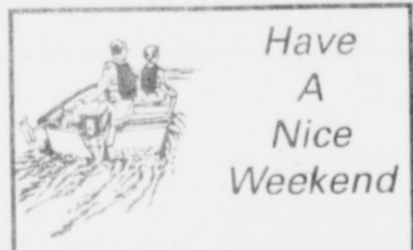

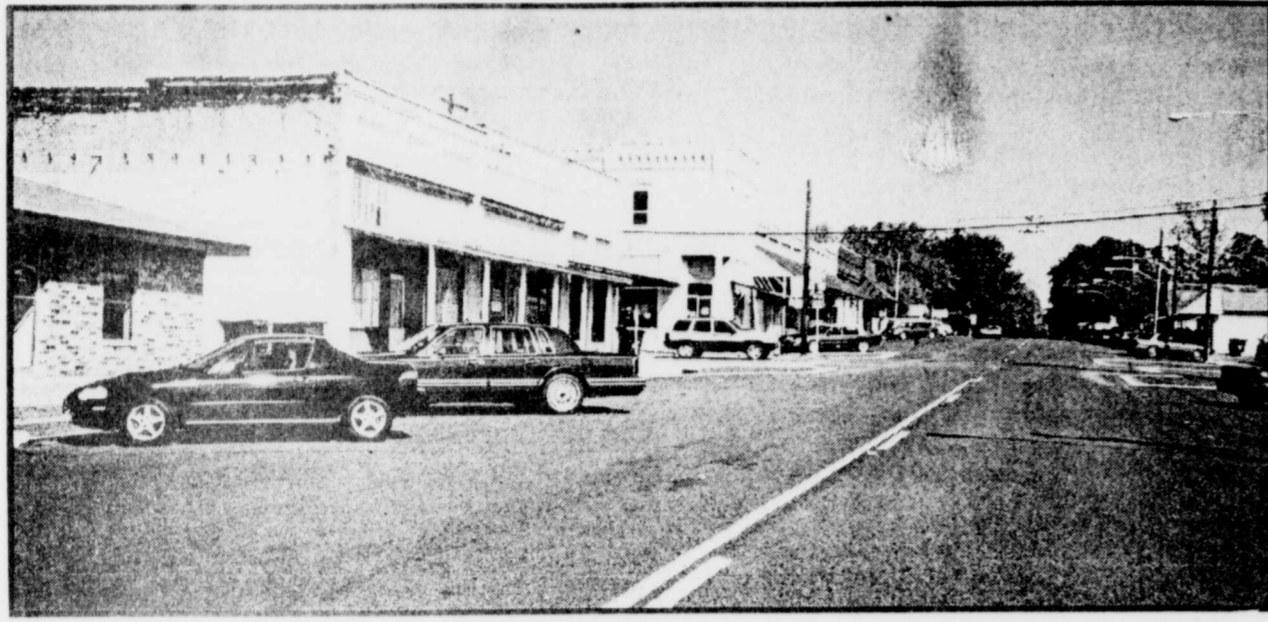

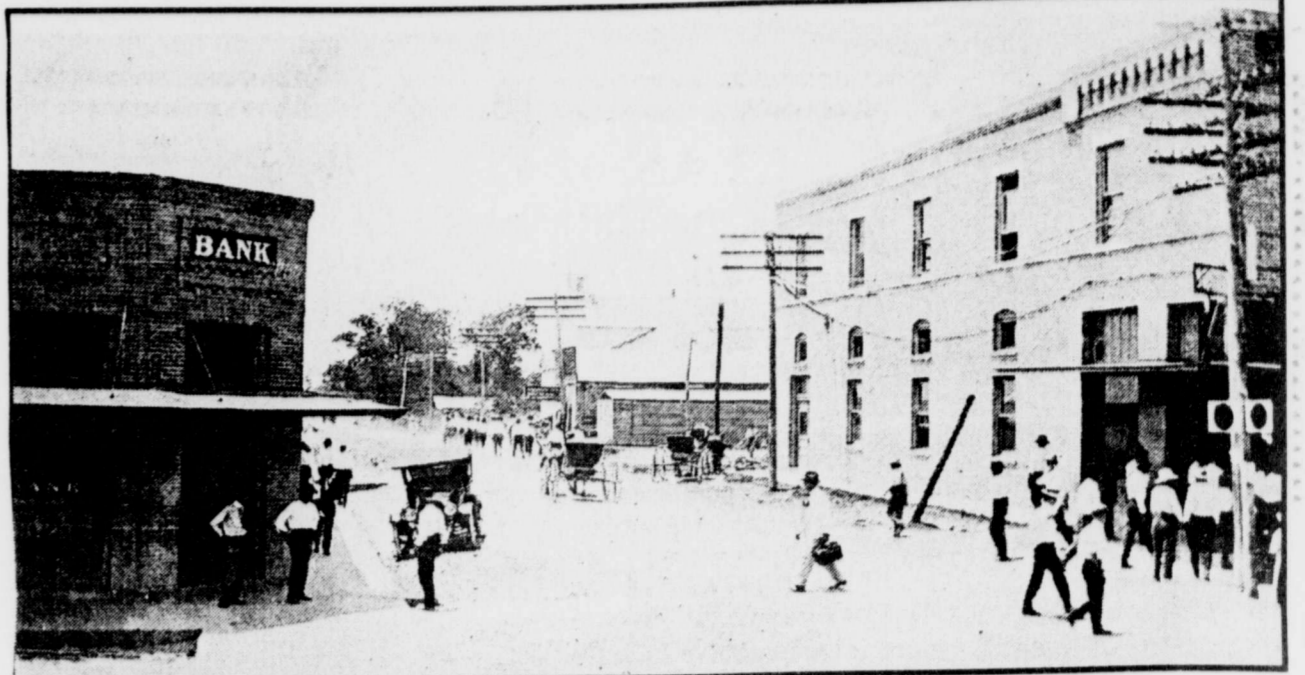

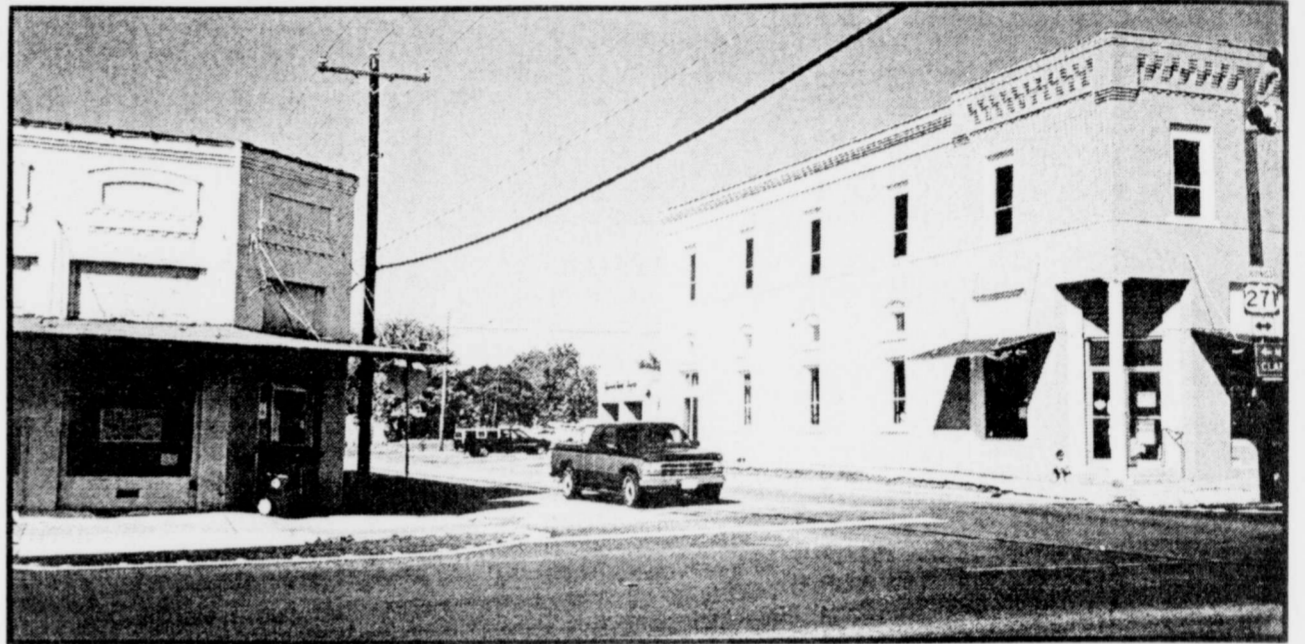
A PRESENT VIEW-of downtown Bogata looking north shows today's latest model cars but much less activity.

Bogata, Past and Present

I would like to begin this story with a coincidence since I am not a believer in ESP. Last week my co-worker, Mike Francis, and I were talking about all the very interesting stories people have right here under our noses and how we should do more to share these interesting people and stories in the paper. Low and behold I received a call from a young lady who had found some interesting pictures in her aunt's things and she asked if I'd be interested in printing them since they were of Bogata's main street over a long period of years. Of course, I jumped at the chance, keeping in mind our discussion earlier in the week. So remember if you can and envy if you cannot.

Rebecca Taylor brought photos to the Bogata News office that will bring back memories for many and make others wish they had been a part of the eras. Rebecca's great x 4 grandparents helped found Bogata. Their names were William and Mary Humphreys. In 1836 they and their young children were waiting in Mississippi the outcome of the Texas Revolutionary War with Mexico. When they heard of Santa Ana's defeat, they packed up the wagon and headed to Texas. They stopped on the Blossom Prairie around the creek that runs through the current Bogata Community Center. The village gradually grew and was called Maple Springs

until the 1880's when the request for a Federal Post Office revealed another Texas town named Maple Springs.

Rebecca's aunt, Edna Howison, who was a historian and genealogist, told her that the Post Master, Fred Homer, chose the town's new name. He threw open an Atlas, closed his eyes, pointed his finger and hit Bogata, Colombia. Since no one knew Spanish the name was misspelled and was pronounced incorrectly.

Rebecca has listened and learned from her relatives and says she feels she knows family members well that she never met. She has also collected items that belonged to these long ago relatives. Some of her prized possessions include a one armed man's knife and fork; a curved rocking blade with a handle on one end and fork tines on the other. It belonged to her Grandfather Clatterback, who built a cotton gin in the 1880's and got his arm chewed off in the machinery on opening day.

Another grandfather, Neil Howison, made his way to Bogata in the 1870's with lumps on his head from a fist fight. He had tried to help a fellow store clerk and got beaten up himself. He was a young Virginia farmer and planned to try his hand at cowboying in West Texas. 12 months later he returned to Bogata and reported cowboying was the worst job

he had ever had. He did stop in Dallas on his way home and wrote the women there were fast and trashy and he could not beat them off with a stick.

Rebecca discovered the "downtown photos" in a 1900's family album, along with some hilarious photos of her aunt and cousins at the cemetery. She thought it would be fun to match the photo with present day ones from the same viewpoint. A lot has remained the same over 100 years. Sadly, Mrs. Anna's, a mission-styled brick hotel, the Hotel Maple, is no longer on the Main Street. Mrs. Anna Patterson was the owner/operator. She was the wife of Sam Patterson. The hotel was built in 1912. It stood where the Methodist Church fellowship hall is presently. Anna was Rebecca's 3x great aunt by marriage. The new photos note a decrease in pedestrians but the present day ones were taken on Sunday morning to lessen the chance of getting flattened in traffic.

Rebecca has worked at the Caldwell Zoo in Tyler for 15 years and plans to move home to Bogata when she retires. She is the daughter of Anne Randolph and the granddaughter of Frances and the late Paul Griffin all of Bogata. I thank Rebecca for sharing her photos and time and I hope everyone enjoys the stories and look back as much as I did.

How to give a cat a pill!

Pat DeWitt of Irving sent this in, and we enjoyed it so much we wanted to share it with our readers.

HOW TO GIVE A CAT A PILL.
 Pick cat up and cradle it in the crook of your left arm as if holding a baby. Position right forefinger and thumb on either side of cat's mouth and gently apply pressure to cheeks while holding pill in right hand. As cat opens mouth pop pill into mouth. Allow cat to close mouth and swallow.

Retrieve pill from floor and cat from behind sofa. Cradle cat in left arm and repeat process.

Retrieve cat from bedroom and throw away soggy pill.

Take new pill from foil wrap, cradle cat in left arm, holding rear paws tightly with left hand. Force jaws open and push pill to back of mouth with right forefinger. Hold mouth shut for a count of ten.

Retrieve pill from goldfish bowl and cat from top of wardrobe. Call spouse in from garden.

Kneel on floor with cat wedged firmly between knees, hold front and rear paws. Ignore low growls emitted by cat. Get spouse to hold head firmly with one hand while forcing wooden ruler into mouth. Drop pill down ruler, rub cat's throat vigorously.

Retrieve cat from curtain rod, get another pill. Make note to buy new ruler and repair curtains. Carefully sweep Hummell figurines from hearth and set aside to glue back together.

Wrap cat in large towel and get spouse to lie on cat with head just

visible from below armpit. Put pill in end of drinking straw, force mouth open with pencil and blow pill down drinking straw.

Check label to make sure pill is not harmful to humans, drink glass of water to take taste away. Apply band-aid to spouse's forearm and remove blood from carpet with cold water.

Retrieve cat from neighbor's shed. Get another pill. Place cat in cupboard and close door onto neck to leave head showing. Force mouth open with dessert spoon. Flick pill down throat with elastic band.

Fetch screwdriver from garage and put door back on hinges. Apply cold compress to cheek and check records for date of last tetanus shot. Throw T-shirt away and fetch new one from bedroom.

Call fire department to retrieve cat from tree across the road. Apologize to neighbor who crashed into fence while swerving to avoid cat. Take last pill from foil-wrap.

Tie cat's front paws to rear paws with twine and bind tightly to leg of dining table, find heavy duty pruning gloves from shed, force cat's mouth open with small pair of pliers. Push pill into mouth followed by piece of steak. Hold head vertically and pour pint of water down cat's throat to wash pill down.

Get spouse to drive you to emergency room. Sit quietly while doctor stitches fingers and forearm and removes pill remnants from right eye. Stop at furniture shop to order table on way home.

Decide cat didn't need that pill anyway. How sick can this cat be? Treat yourself to a large, medicinal gin and tonic!
