I think my husband, dogs and cats were glad to see me, having grown a little tired of one another's company.

Of course, I didn't miss a few days of being without electricity, or the snowfall that turned the roads to slick disasters.

Still, everyone keeps glaring at me when I try to tell them about the balmy temperatures and good seafood. They seem to think I'm "rubbing it in".

I wouldn't do that, would I? Nahhh, of course not!

Ice Storm cripples area, causes deaths, creates havoc

Death and devastation have resulted from a massive ice storm that crippled this area, followed by a snow storm which also resulted in dangerous road conditions.

Christmas day freezing rain began to fall, coating the world in inches of ice, downing power and phone lines, leaving thousands without a way to keep warm or unable to get out because of downed trees and limbs.

Portions of Red River County lost water service as well.

Work crews from all over have poured into the area in an attempt to re-establish power, but the damage to trees has been so severe that for many it may be weeks before electricity is restored.

Propane distributors have worked around the clock, but supplies were running short before the roads cleared.

Candles, lantern batteries, propane bottles and other emergency items were quickly cleared from store shelves and residents buckled down to "make the best of it".

Friday night, Dec. 29th, a Lone Star man died in a propane explosion that leveled the house he was in.

Brit Phillips, age 49, had gone to a relative's house to light a water heater so he could bathe. The explosion leveled the house. Bogata and Clarksville Fire Departments responded to the scene after neighbors called to report the explosion.

Traffic accidents were numerous as the snow turned roads into icy pathways. A Kansas woman died after her vehicle plunged into White Oak Creek.

A number of house fires occurred for a variety of reasons.

Damage to trees is indescribable.

Pine forests have suffered damage so severe that timber crops for years to come may be completely lost.

Hardwoods are splintered, some trees were toppled whole, but scarcely a tree is left without damage.

Fences and barns were torn apart by falling trees and limbs, and many homes suffered serious damage from limbs. A number of vehicle were crushed by the weight of falling limbs and ice.

Red River, Lamar and Titus counties have been declared disaster areas and emergency services have been in full effect.

The dollar value of the devastation cannot be calculated at this time, but will undoubtedly range into the millions of dollars.

A prediction of warmer temperatures was a welcome change from freezing rain and snow.

Christmas Day storm shuts area down

On Christmas Day ice, sleet and rain hit the area leaving devastation in its wake. Ice laden tree limbs popped and cracked throughout the night falling on homes, cars and worst of all power lines.

At daylight on December 26 area residents awoke to cold homes, blocked roadways and tree limbs on everything. The nightmare continued through Thursday when the storm finally moved east. The rains and ice caused Sulphur and White Oak Rivers to leave their banks and flood Hwy. 271 N of Talco and FM. 1402 S. of Sugar Hill.

At the last report not all electric

service has been restored and some residents will have to wait up to 4 weeks more before power can be restored. Some of the worst hit were residents of Cuthand. Shelters have been opened for those in need and electric companies are doing all possible to restore service.

Editor's note: I think I speak for everyone when I say Thank You to those who have worked the long, cold and dangerous hours to clean roadways, restore electrical power and to the VFD and EMS service members who have been on hand to help during this emergency situation.

RR County offers emergency relief measures

All Red River County residents should be warned of people asking for and receiving money for work before work is started and never seeing them again. Residents should obtain at least two bids and check references of any contract work to be done.

Price gouging has been reported by some merchants selling goods at tremendous increases from a week ago due to the recent weather disaster. Anyone who has experienced those or is witness to should contact the Attorney General's Complaint Line at 1-800-337-3928.

There is no burn ban in effect for Red River County. Anyone wishing to burn limbs can do so.

Gas generators should not be plugged into your home breaker panel, as the electricity can be back fed to the power line and injure those who may be working and making repairs and when power is restored it can damage the generators. Reports have been received of line workers being injured due to these generators.

Watch for signs of cold exposure;

don't eat spoiled foods; guard against carbon monoxide poisoning; and for additional help or information call 903-427-2680 with an alternate contact at the County Judge's office at 903-427-2680.

Electric crews are working hard and as fast as they possibly can to restore electric power everywhere. Your patience and understanding will be appreciated.

On Tuesday, January 2, 2001, the Salvation Army began providing vouchers for qualified residents in assistance of propane and necessary items such as batteries, kerosene, etc. To receive a voucher, they must call Paul Askew with the Department of Human Services in Clarksville at 427-3874.

Public should contact their local churches, Rotary Clubs, Lions Club, etc. for assistance if needed.

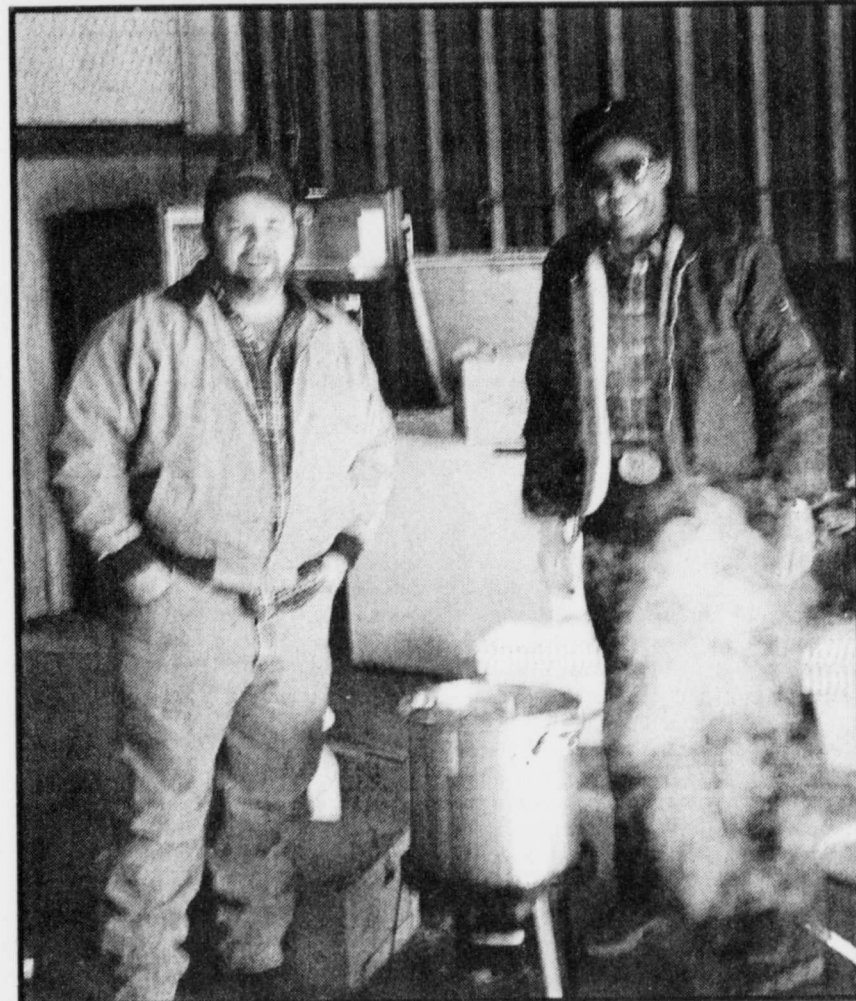

High water causes detour

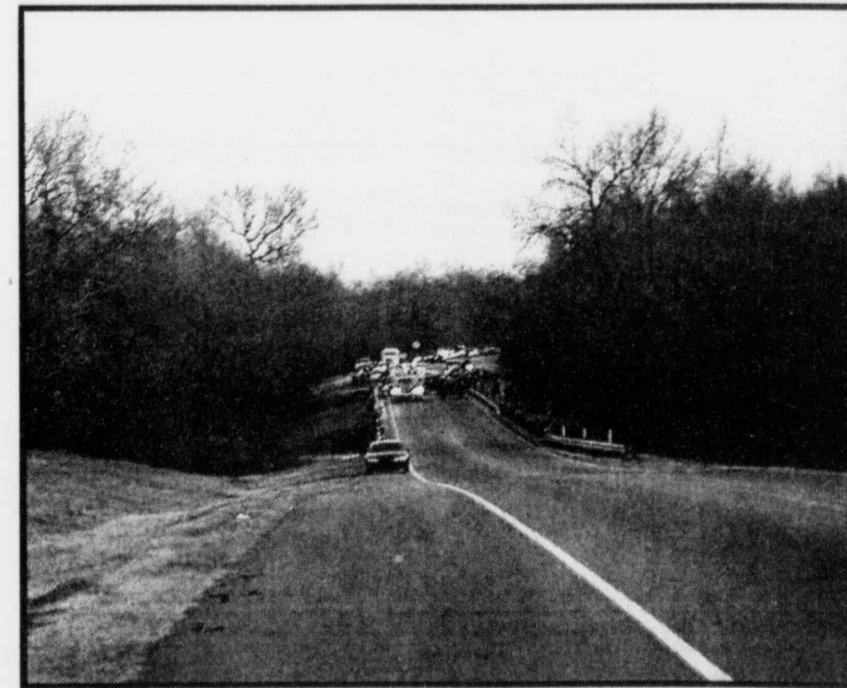
The Highway Department set up a road block and detour at the junction of Hwy. 271 and FM. 71 in Talco December 27, 2000 to re-route travelers going north due to high water.

The Sulphur River was riding a war horse and overflowed its banks flooding the highway including three of the bridges through the bottom area. A report said flood water rose 2

feet over the bridge roadways. On Friday the flood waters hit White Oak River forcing the closure of Fm. 1402 between Sugar Hill and Mt. Pleasant. For local residents the final days of December 2000 have offered almost every type of weather but newscast promise better weather in the first week of 2001.

Marvin Brit Phillips, age 49 of the Lone Star community, died Saturday, December 30.

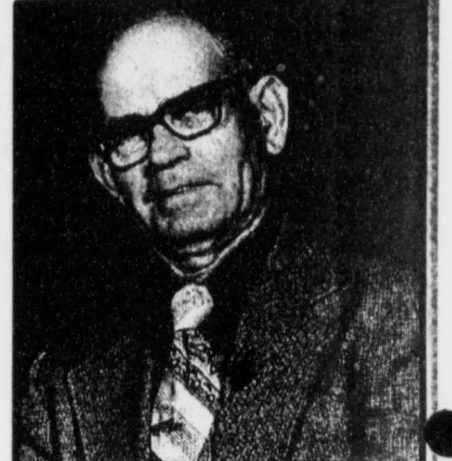

Gas Grill Stew

1 pound of ground beef
1 can whole kernel corn
1 can sliced carrots
1 can stewed tomatoes
1 can tomato sauce
3 cups large-chopped potatoes

Brown ground beef in iron skillet on hot grill with a small amount of diced onion and celery, remembering that the handle is very hot! Drain and pour into Dutch Oven. Add tomatoes and sauce, corn and carrots. Simmer for 30 minutes and add potatoes and cook until done.

Mesquite Grilled Nachos

1/2 pound browned ground beef or diced chicken
shredded cheese
nacho chips
chopped onions
refried beans

Form a large sheet of heavy-duty foil into pan and shape sides. Beans can be spread onto chips if desired. Sprinkle browned beef or chicken. Top with cheese. Slide onto heated grill for approximately five minutes or until cheese is melted.

Pan-fried Cornbread

2 cups cornmeal
1 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup milk
chopped jalapeno (optional)

Blend all ingredients well and drop by teaspoonfuls into hot oil in iron skillet heated on grill. Remember, handle is hot!

Hot Sauce -in-a-Jar

1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 diced onion
1 tablespoon oil
1 tablespoon vinegar
pinch of cilantro-optional

Pulse in blender or food processor for thirty seconds or consistency you desire. Pour into jar and refrigerate.

Greenhouse Gravy and Sausage

1 pound pork sausage
2 tablespoons flour
salt and pepper to taste
milk

Brown sausage in iron skillet until done. Drain. Pour off grease and leave enough to mix flour and salt and pepper. Add milk to thicken and watch handle of iron skillet, it gets hot!

Rivercrest ISD receives another high rating

The Texas Education agency recently released the accountability data for all schools across the state. The accountability system was developed as a method of informing the local district and the public of the performance of their school. Schools are measured on TAAS scores, attendance rates and other student performance indicators, as well as fiscal information on the school district. The Academic Excellence Indicator TAAS Scores

System (AEIS) is used to analyze the data and place the schools in a rating system which consists of four levels of performance. Districts receive an accreditation status of either Exemplary, Recognized, Academically Acceptable or Academically unacceptable. Campuses receive performance ratings of Exemplary, Recognized, Acceptable or Low-perform-

ing. The Rivercrest ISD received an accreditation rating of Recognized. Both the Rivercrest High School and Talco Elementary/Junior High campuses received performance ratings of Exemplary, while the Bogata Elementary/Junior High campus received a performance rating of Recognized. Proper mailbox installation is a must

Rural mailbox owners are asked to help ensure the safety of the traveling public by property installing and placing their mailboxes on the right-of-way. It is necessary that the community understand the importance of installing and placing mailboxes correctly on the state's right of way. The department furnishes free of charge, rural mailbox supports for all rural mailbox owners located on state maintained highways and also provides the specifications needed to install the boxes properly. There are a lot of custom made and very nice mailboxes that are not going to meet these guidelines. It is important that they use the guidelines we provide to help reduce serious injury to driver that may result from crashes.

Rural mailboxes are commercially manufactured to U.S. Postal Service specifications and are produced in sizes and are available in traditional and contemporary styles. In addition, the U.S. Postal Service does not allow the use of custom built rural mailboxes, provided that certain re-

quirements are met relative to the flag size, box size, strength and quality of construction. When installed with U.S. Postal Service traditional rural mailboxes have been found to react in a satisfactory manner when crash tested.

Guidelines specify that mailboxes shall be of light sheet metal or plastic construction conforming to the requirement of the U.S. Postal Service. Newspaper delivery boxes will be of light sheet metal or plastic construction of minimum dimensions suitable for holding a newspaper.

The use of a wooden connection between the mailbox and the support post is unacceptable. All mailbox supports and mounts are to be in accordance with Department standards. Mailboxes that do not conform may be determined to present a roadside hazard potential and may be refused for installation on state right of way by the department. To receive a mounting kit with standard guidelines and requirements, call your local TxDOT office.

PERMIT NO. 10741-001 APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. City of Deport, P.O. Box 354-A, Deport, Texas 75435, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. 10741-001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 183,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. 10741-001 will replace existing TPDES Permit No. 10741-001. This application was submitted to the TNRCC on July 7, 2000.

The facility is located approximately 1000 feet south of U.S. Highway 271, and 1400 feet west of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 1149 and U.S. Highway 271 in Lamar County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to Mustang Creek; thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for Mustang Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are high aquatic life uses and contact recreation.

The TNRCC executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director recommends issuance of this draft permit. The permit application, statement of basis/technical summary and executive director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Deport City Hall, 201 Main Street, Deport, Texas 75435.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public hearing about this application. The purpose of a public hearing is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. The TNRCC will hold a public hearing if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public hearing is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public hearing should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of the notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments were received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing. The TNRCC may act on this application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION: The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

MAILING LIST: In addition to submitting public comments, you may ask to be placed on a mailing list to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. Clarksville Chamber to host circus

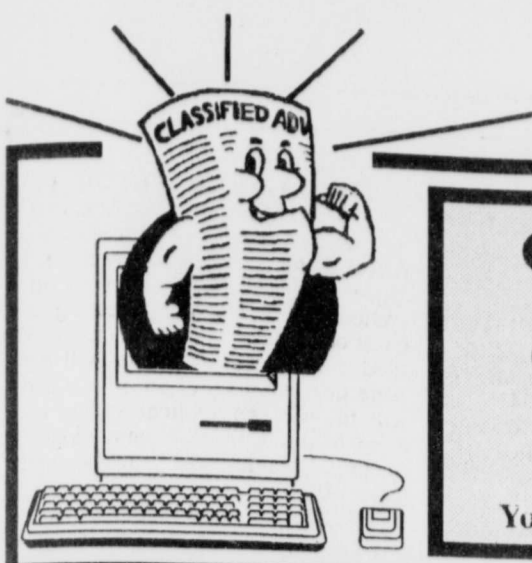
