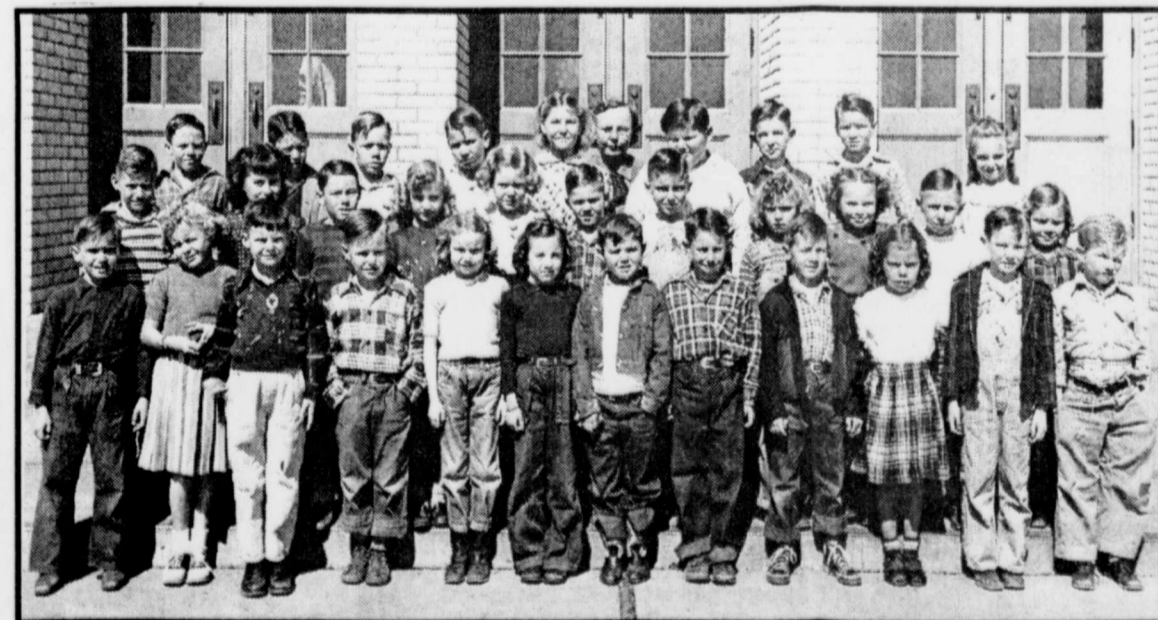

Since next week is Thanksgiving...can you believe it, already!.....we are doing some recipes this week on dressings. There are lots of different types of dressing recipes and depending on what part of the country you live in, depends on the type of dressing that your family is used to.

Well, this week I will give you an opportunity to slide off that path of the plain ole' dressing recipe and taste or conjure up a new taste in this area. Fruits and vegetables make for a sweet and flavorful addition to dressings. Folks use anything from figs, apples and cherries to cranberries, apples, prunes and other dried and fresh fruits.

Creole Cornbread Stuffing

- 13x9 pan baked crumbled cornbread
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 2 teaspoons ground white pepper
- 2 teaspoons ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons cayenne pepper
- 2 teaspoons onion powder
- 4 teaspoons dried oregano
- 2 teaspoons dried thyme
- 6 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 cup minced onion
- 1 cup chopped green onions
- 1 cup chopped parsley
- 2 cups chopped red bell pepper
- 2 green chili peppers-chopped
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon red pepper sauce
- 2 cups evaporated milk
- 7 eggs-beaten

In small bowl combine salt, peppers and spices. In another bowl combine minced onions, parsley, peppers and garlic. Melt 1 cup butter and add spices and cook a few minutes. Add vegetables and cook 5 minutes; do not allow to turn brown. Add broth and tabasco sauce. Stir and cook 5 minutes more. Crumble cornbread into skillet and mix. A Remove from heat and add milk and eggs. Stir well after each egg and return to low heat and cook; stirring for about 2 minutes. Remove bay leaves. Bake at 375 until golden brown. Yields 10 servings.

Oyster Dressing

- 2 cups wild rice
 - 1/2 pound pork sausage
 - 1 bunch green onions-chopped
 - 3 stalks celery-chopped
 - 1 pint oyster-reserve liquid
 - 2 tablespoons parsley-chopped
 - salt to taste
 - ground black pepper to taste
 - pinch paprika
- Cook rice in salted water until done. Place in shallow pan and place in preheated 275 degree oven to dry out a few minutes. Sauté pork in skillet and drain off all but 2 tablespoons grease. Sauté onions and celery in grease. Add into this a small amount of oyster water from drained oysters if onions and celery get too dry. Add oysters to remaining liquid. Cook 7-10 minutes until oysters begin to curl on edges. Drain in colander. Combine oyster mixture, rice, sausage, parsley and seasonings to taste. Bake at 350 degrees until heated thru.



Apple-Sausage-Dried Cranberry Dressing

- 1-1/2 cups cubed whole wheat bread
- 3-3/4 cups white bread crumbs
- 16 ounces bulk turkey sausage
- 1 cup diced onion
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 2-1/2 teaspoons dried sage
- 1-1/2 teaspoons dried rosemary
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 medium Golden Delicious apple- pare, core & peel
- 3/4 cup dried cranberries
- 1/3 cup chopped parsley
- 1 cooked cut up chicken liver
- 3/4 cup turkey stock
- 4 tablespoon unsalted butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake bread cubes until golden brown; cool. In large skillet brown sausage with onions; breaking up sausage. Add celery, and spices and cook 2 minutes while stirring. Add sausage mixture to bread and chopped apples, dried cranberries, parsley and liver. Toss mixture well and drizzle the broth and butter over mixture; toss well and allow stuffing to cool completely. Makes 8 servings.

Wild Mushroom Stuffing

- 2 cups hot water
- 1 ounce dried porcini mushrooms
- 1-3/4 pounds egg bread-trim crust
- 1/4 cup + 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 3 leeks-chop
- 1 cup shallots-chop
- 1-1/4 pound crimini mushrooms-sliced
- 1/2 pound shiitake mushrooms-sliced
- 2 cups chopped celery
- 1 cup chopped parsley
- 1 cup dry roasted hazelnuts-chop
- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh thyme
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh sage
- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup chicken stock
- salt to taste
- ground black pepper to taste

Combine water and porcini mushrooms; let stand until mushrooms are soft; about 30 minutes. Drain; reserve liquid dry and chop. Preheat oven to 325 and brown bread cubes until golden brown; cool. Melt butter in heavy Dutch oven and add leeks, shallots, crimini and shiitake mushrooms. Sauté until tender and golden about 15 minutes. Mix in celery and porcini mushrooms and saute for another 5 minutes. Transfer mixture to the bowl with bread cubes. Mix in parsley, hazelnuts, thyme and sage. Season with salt and pepper to taste and stir in beaten eggs. In preheated 325 oven place in buttered 15x10x2 casserole dish and cover with foil and bake until top is crisp.

While the new subsidiary of

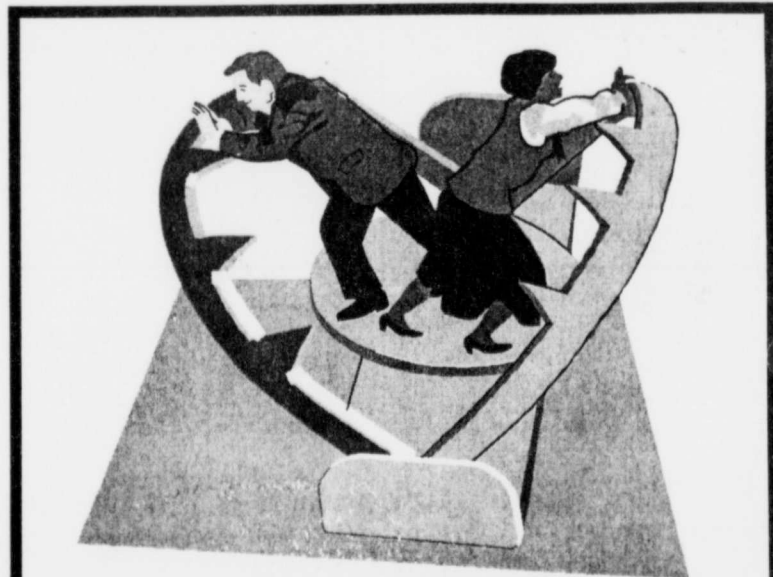

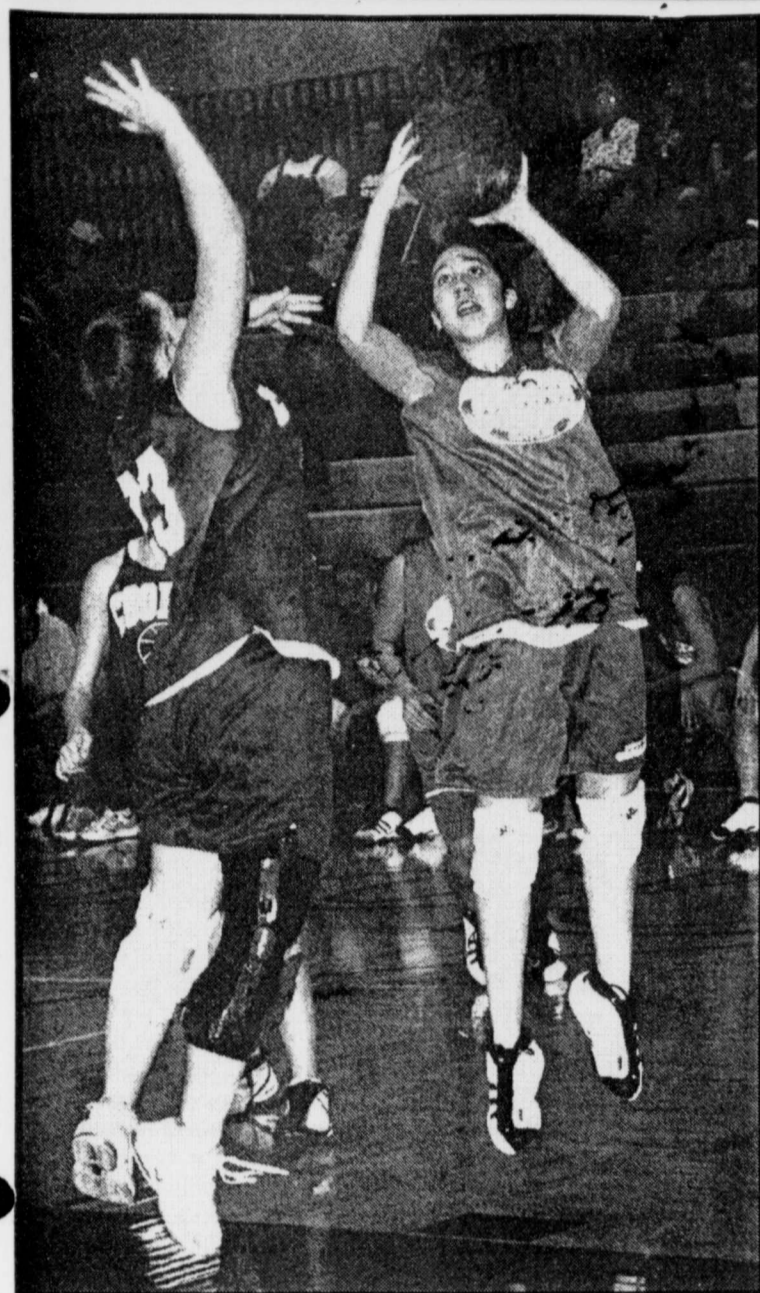

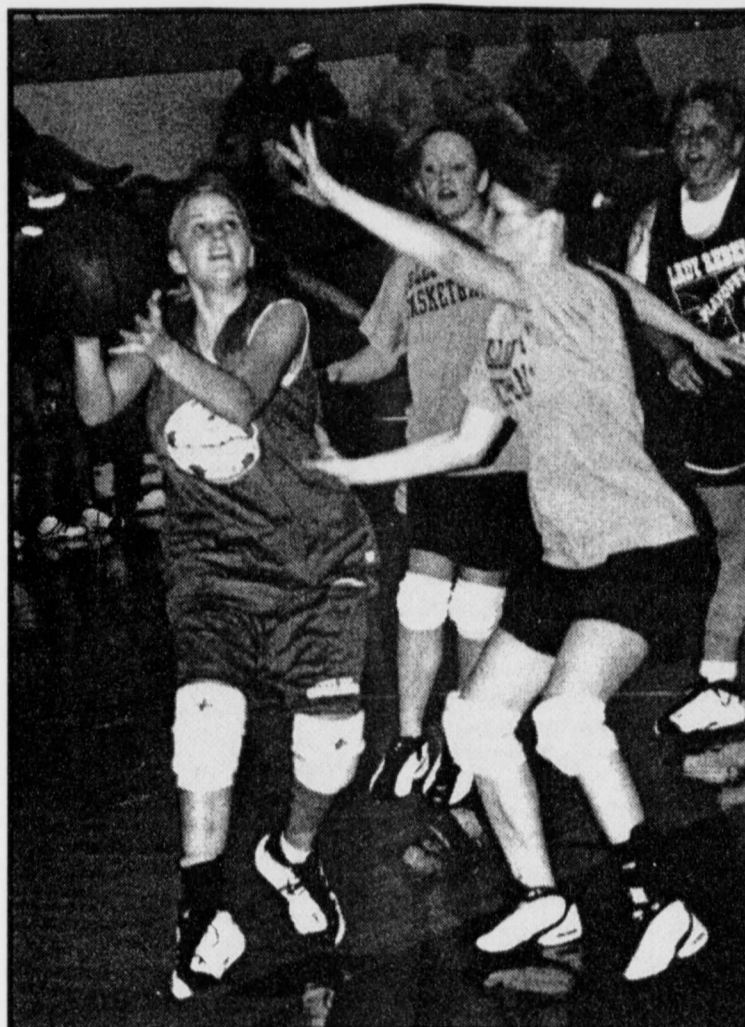

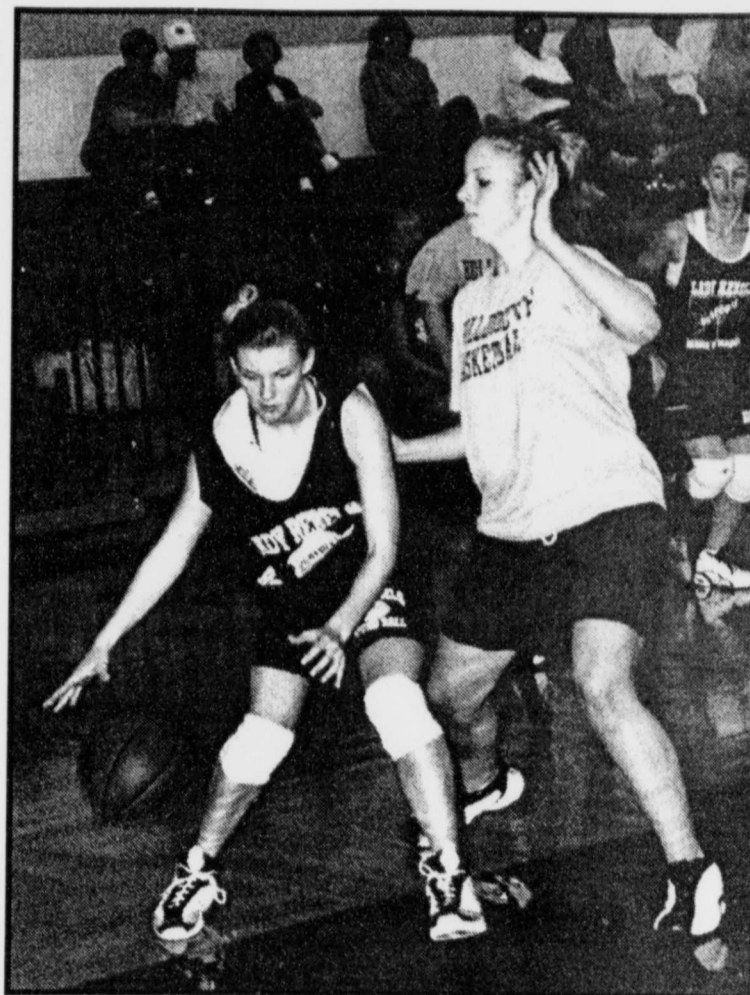

Council hires company to collect old water bills

The Bogata City Council met in regular session Monday, November 12 at the Community Center with Mayor Randy Kennedy, all councilmembers and thirteen citizens present. After the invocation by the Mayor, council heard from Lanny buck of KSA Engineers, Inc., concerning the status of the sewer grant. Council also heard from a citizen regarding some dead trees in her neighbor's yard. Minutes of previous meetings were approved, as well as bills and final water bill accounts. Police Chief Clegg gave his report that included two minor accidents, one major accident, two drug raids, 31 citations, five warnings, four burglaries, one stolen car, four arrests and a welfare concern. He reported a successful Halloween with no problems.

Fire Marshal Wayne Martin gave his report that included eight medical calls, one major vehicle accident and one weather watch.

Water Superintendent Wendell Davis reported 83 work orders in the past month, including eight leaks, one fire hydrant replaced and two more scheduled to be replaced. Thirty tons of oil sand used to patch 2nd SW and Douglas Street, the dump truck has been repaired, 5 dogs and one cat picked up, and 22 pickups for fall clean-up. The land donated by John P. Cooper will be surveyed soon and David Rozell will help with corners and prisoners will help build the fence.

Council voted to approve an ordinance to prohibit the keeping of dangerous wild animals in the City of Bogata. After the Mayor read a letter from Councilman Roland Screws stating that he cannot serve on the Red River Appraisal Board of Directors due to personal and health reasons, the council voted to appoint Councilman Brian Strickland to fill the unexpired term ending December 31, 2001 and a two year term beginning January 1, 2002, through December 31, 2003.

Council voted not to increase the water meter deposit and voted unanimously to engage American Municipal Services Corporation of Carrollton to collect old water bills for the City. They voted to submit Mike Garretson and Kay Neading's names to be considered as possible appointments to Red River Appraisal Review board to serve terms beginning January 1, 2002 through December 31, 2003.

A resolution was approved to adopt Section 504 grievance procedures and to designate the Mayor as Section 504 coordinator to receive and investigate complaints alleging discrimination by reason of disability. An ordinance to allow the City's former Texas Municipal Retirement System members to "buy back" credit in TMRS was not approved. Council approved a quotation from INSCO to relocate the flowmeter at the sewer plant at a cost of \$8,000 and \$8,570.

Council discussed the condition of the park bathrooms, but took no action. Water Superintendent reported that the community service workers have painted and cleaned them. Police will check them periodically during the day.

An Executive Session was held from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. to discuss the controlled substance and alcohol abuse policy. After reconvening in regular session, the council voted unanimously to adopt the policy as per changes made, which will be in effect as of January 1, 2002. All employees will be randomly tested and all employees and the VFD members will be tested if they are involved in a vehicle accident.

Councilman Lewis announced that the Fire Department members will have their Christmas dinner on December 8 at 5 p.m. at the Fish Fry in Paris. They will also have training on a house fire Saturday, November 17 at 1 p.m. on 3rd NE.

The meeting adjourned.

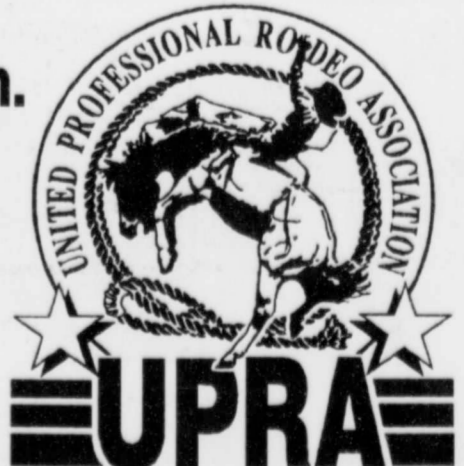

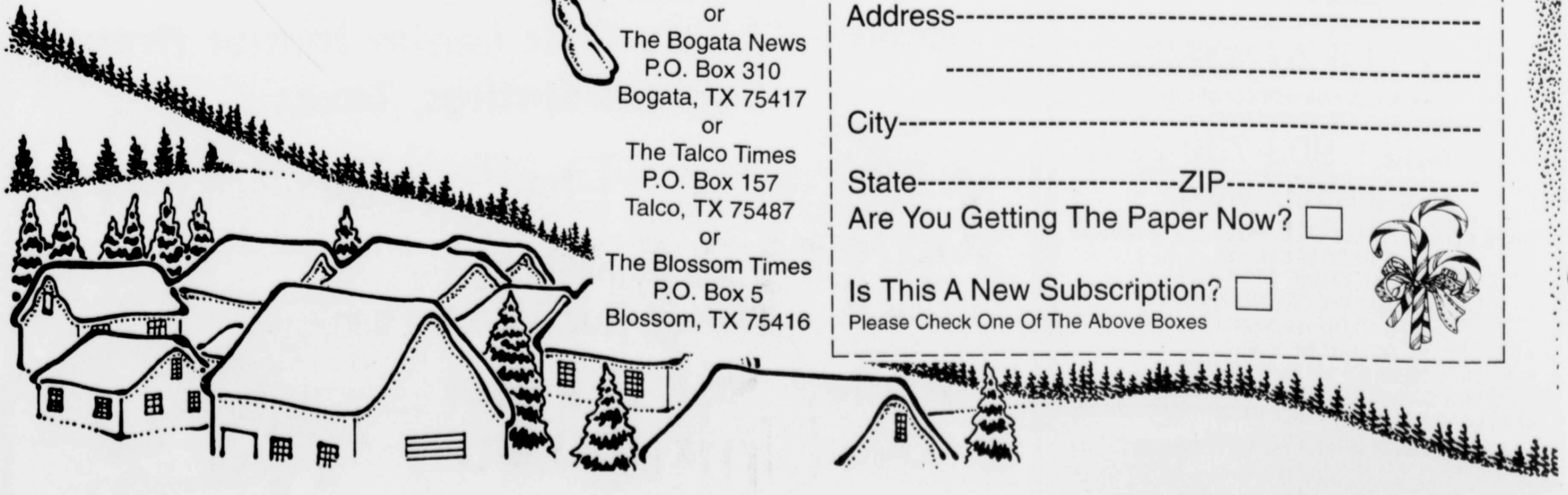

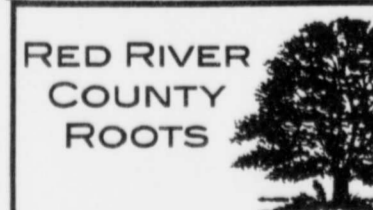
