December 6 date set for "Christmas Parade of Homes"

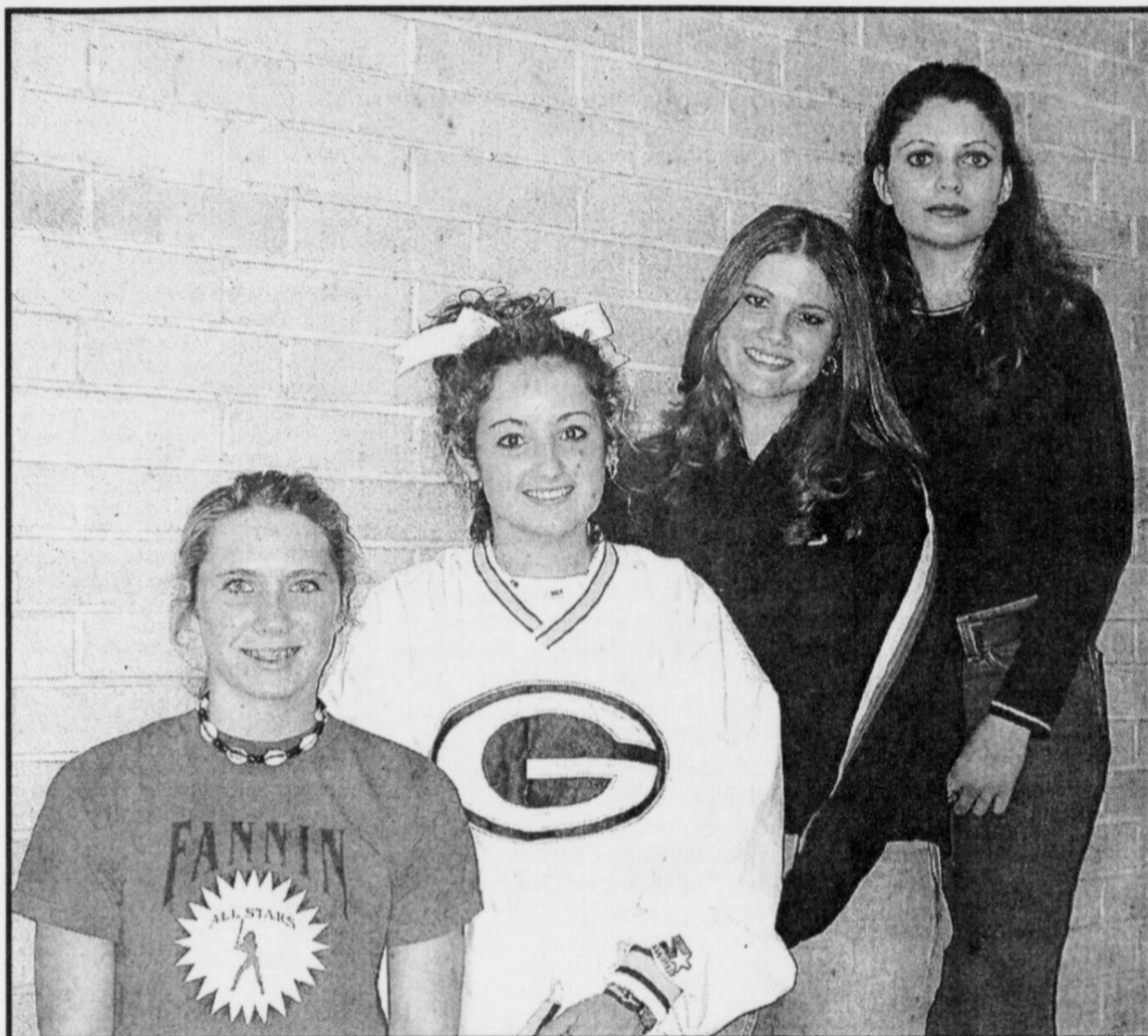
The Bogata Missionary Baptist Church has set December 6, 2001 for the date of the annual "Christmas Parade of Homes".

Cherry Pecan Bread-Ricardo Cantera
2 cups all purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup buttermilk or sour milk
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup chopped maraschino cherries
In bowl thoroughly stir together flour, soda and 1/2 teaspoon salt; set aside. In large mixer bowl cream together sugar, butter, eggs and vanilla until light and fluffy. Add flour mixture and buttermilk alternately to creamed mixture. Beat just till blended after each addition. Fold in nuts and cherries. Turn batter into lightly greased 9x5x3 loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 55-60 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Remove and cool. May be glazed with confectioner's sugar.

Chocolate Ice Cream Roll-Taylor Mauldin
3/4 cup all purpose flour
1/4 cup cocoa
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 eggs
1 cup sugar
1/3 cup water
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 package tascos seasoning mix
1 pint ice cream
Heat oven to 375 degrees; line jelly roll pan with aluminum foil or waxed paper; grease. Mix flour, cocoa, baking powder and salt; reserve. Beat eggs in small bowl on high speed until very thick and lemon colored, 3-5 minutes. Pour eggs into large mixer bowl; gradually beat in granulated sugar. On low speed, blend in water and vanilla. Gradually add flour mixture, beating until smooth. Pour into pan, spreading batter to corners. Bake until toothpick inserted comes out clean. Loosen cake from edges of pan; invert on towel sprinkled with powdered sugar. Carefully remove foil; trim stiff edges from cake if necessary. While hot, roll cake and towel from narrow end. Cool; unroll cake and remove towel. Soften ice cream slightly. Quickly spread over cake. Roll up and place, seam side down, on piece of aluminum foil. Wrap and freeze at least four hours. Fifteen minutes before serving unwrap and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Granny Jane's Mac and Cheese-Cody Flatt
1 pound sharp Cheddar cheese-cubed
1 can milk
1 pound dry macaroni
2 eggs-sparated
3/4 cup water
salt to taste
bread crumbs-optional
Boil macaroni until tender; drain. Melt cheese with milk; add egg yolks. Beat egg whites until fluffy and light. Gently fold in melted cheese. Place macaroni and cheese mixture in buttered baking dish. Add about 3/4 cup water and salt. Sprinkle with crumbs on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes until thick and golden brown.

Darren's People Chow-Darren Lane
1 box Rice Chex
1 stick butter
3/4 cup peanut butter
1 package chocolate chips
powdered sugar
Melt butter, peanut butter and chocolate chips. Mix in with Rice Chex. Drop in bag of powdered sugar and shake. Lay on wax paper to separate and cool.

Taco Casserole-Ashley Outland
1 pound ground beef
1 cup chopped onion
2 cloves garlic-finely chopped
1 cup water
1/2 cup taco sauce
4 ounces diced green chilis
1/2 cup sliced ripe olives
1 package taco seasoning mix
1 package tascos shells-broken
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
chopped green onions-optional
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Cook beef, onion and garlic until browned; drain. Stir in water, taco sauce, chilis, 1/4 cup olives and seasoning mix. Cook over low heat 3-4 minutes. Layer half of broken taco shells on bottom of greased 12x8 casserole dish. Cover with half of meat sauce; sprinkle with 1 cup cheese. Repeat layers. Bake 20-25 minutes or until bubbly and cheese is melted. Top with remaining olives, tomatoes and green onions.

No-Bake Holiday Fruit Cake
16 oz package graham crackers-crushed
6 oz container candied red cherries-chopped
6 oz container green cherries-chopped
6 oz container candied pineapple-chopped
1/2 cups chopped pecans
2 cans Eagle Brand Milk
Line 9x5 loaf pans with plastic wrap; allow wrap to hang over edge. In large bowl, combine crackers, red and green cherries, pineapple, pecans and milk; using hands, mix thoroughly. Place mixture into lined pan and cover well. Freeze for at least 8 hours or overnight before serving. Remove wrap and slice when ready for serving. Store any remaining in freezer.

Coconut Custard Pie
19-inch unbaked pie shell
1 cup flaked coconut
3 eggs
1 can Eagle Brand Milk
1-1/4 cups hot water
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
Preheat oven to 425 degrees; toast 1/2 cup coconut; set aside. Bake pastry shell 8 minutes; cool slightly. In medium bowl, beat eggs, milk, water, vanilla, salt and nutmeg; mix well. Stir in remaining 1/2 cup coconut. Pour into pastry shell. Sprinkle with toasted coconut. Bake 10 minutes. Reduce oven to 350 degrees and bake 25 minutes to 30 minutes longer or until knife inserted comes out clean. Cool.

Creamy Lemon Pie
3 egg yolks
1 can Eagle Brand Milk
1/2 cup Real Lemon juice
2-3 drops food coloring-optional
1 baked pastry shell or graham cracker crust
whipped topping
Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Beat egg yolks in medium-sized bowl. Gradually beat in milk and lemon juice. Stir in food coloring if desired. Pour into pastry shell and bake 30-35 minutes or until set. Remove and cool for 1 hour. Chill at least three hours. Top with whipped topping.

from dark until 9:30 each evening, except on rainy nights.

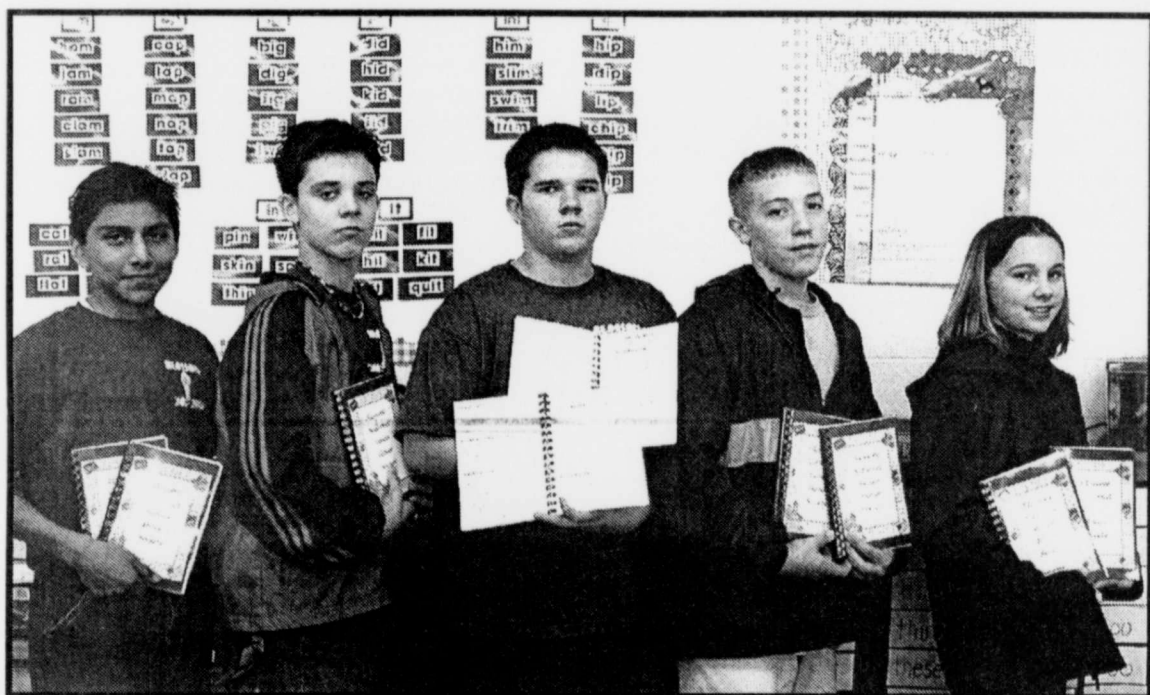
Admission is free but donations to help defray the cost of electricity and labor will be accepted.

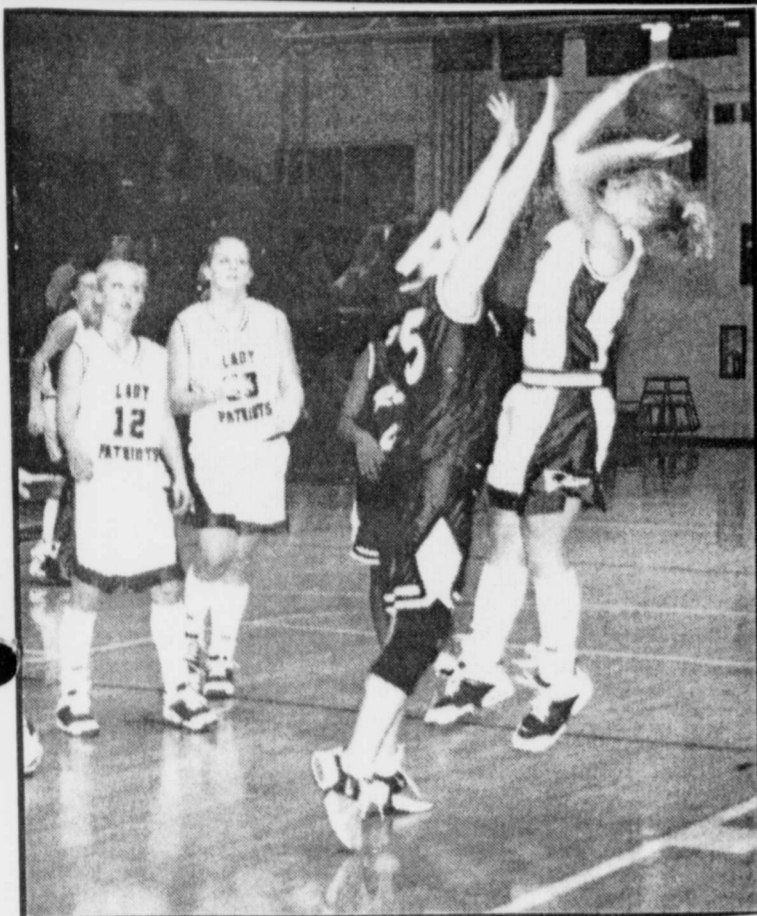

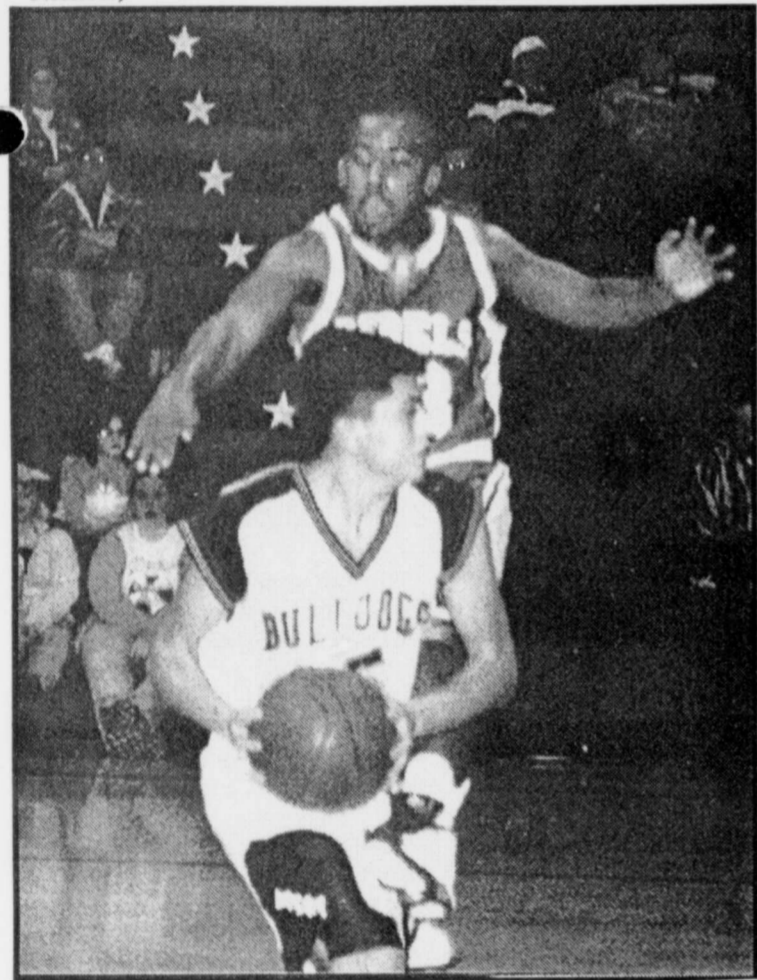

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LEC merger still important says board and management

The management and board of Lamar County Electric Cooperative say the merger of the co-op with Cap Rock Energy is more important than ever. There will soon be a deregulated marketplace for electric utilities in Texas. What does this mean for small companies like Lamar Electric Co-op?

Many experts believe a utility must be a certain size to be able to survive in such a market. The large investor-owned utilities will have little interest in serving customers in rural areas - they learned long ago that rural areas were much too expensive to serve compared to the mass meters of urban areas. It is expected that many small co-ops will not survive in a deregulated marketplace, and the members of those cooperatives will end up paying increased costs for electricity, with a marked downgrade in reliability and quality of service.

The board and management of Cap Rock have been planning for years for the coming deregulation. Size is protection, and several small co-ops have joined Cap Rock in its fight for survival. The LEC board has shown wisdom in foreseeing the same future and deciding chance of survival is much better in a bigger organization.

What will happen to your capital credits if this merger does not occur? Capital credits have always been returned to the membership at the discretion of the board of directors and cooperative's bankers. In those years when the co-op made a profit, allocations were paid. In most cases, the pay-

ments were for small allocations up to 20 years in the past. If a co-op does not survive deregulation, those capital credits will never be paid. They will be eaten up by increasing need for operating capital.

Why should Cap Rock become a public stock company? First, Cap Rock is giving co-op members an opportunity to realize a return of those capital credits - either as a discounted lump sum, 100% reimbursement on electric bills or by receiving stock in Cap Rock Energy Corporation. Most Cap Rock customers have already received cash or electric bill credit. A total of \$2,187,583 has been disbursed in lump-sum payments and \$6,739,931 has been returned in electric bill credits. Cap Rock's members believed strongly in Cap Rock and many opted for stock. They have elected to receive stock worth in excess of \$13 million, representing almost 27,000 accounts. It is expected that stock certificates will be issued early in December.

A stock company structure will provide flexibility in financing, with capital to modernize and grow the business. Our goal has always been to have Cap Rock's stock in the hands of local investors - those who were members of our electric co-ops. It gives value to your capital credits. It provides a stock certificate that has value, instead of a promise of capital credits that may never be paid.

The challenges faced by electric cooperatives today are very similar to those of the thrift industry 20-plus years ago. They've operated for years in a

comfortable, protected environment, just like the thrifts in the 1970s. Now they're about to face competition for the first time. Unless they prepare themselves for change, unless they take the necessary steps to compete, they probably won't make it. The biggest prerequisite for survival is size, which provides opportunity to lower costs and provide additional work force when needed, such as during the terrible ice storm of last December.

Becoming part of a public stock company gives you more control of your destiny. Under the community-offering concept, together we have a better chance to maintain control of our companies, while securing capital to expand our infrastructure and survive.

The electric cooperative movement began with citizens banding together for mutual gain. In the 21st century, we are doing the same thing. We are taking what is best in the cooperative philosophy and combining it with the advantages of a public stock company. The result will be a public stock company that is operated much like a cooperative. You will continue to receive the same excellent service, and the Agreement to Combine ensures your rates will remain competitive.

The merger with Cap Rock is important to all LEC members. Returning proxies during the current board election is also important. It is important that LEC remain a strong, viable entity. It is probable that the merger with Cap Rock is the final opportunity for the co-op to enter a deregulated marketplace as part of a larger organization.
