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Pros & cons presented at Marvin Nichols Reservoir meeting

Marvin Nichols Reservoir is the future of economic development in Northeast Texas, a Sulphur River Basin Authority official told an audience Monday night in Clarksville.

"Marvin Nichols Reservoir is the Northeast Texas economic driver," SRBA President Mike Huddleston said in opening a powerpoint presentation at City Hall.

To other area residents, though, the lake will wipe out family farms, flood an environmentally sensitive area and ultimately cause an increase in property taxes.

Those divergent ideas, an expanding economic or destruction of a way of life, have been argued in other meetings and before state planners in Austin. But Monday night's pro-lake meeting followed a gathering of opponents the Friday before and marked the first time pro-lake and anti-lake forces placed their ideas so close together.

As reported in state water plans, the Marvin Nichols Reservoir will flood about 62,000 acres along the Sulphur River. Almost all the flooded area will be in Red River County.

"We believe the lake will flood about 10% of Red River County," lake opponent Max Shumake of DeKalb said at the Friday meeting at the American Legion Post in Clarksville. With that much land taken from the county's tax base, other landowners will see an increase in property tax rates, Shumake said. Shumake owns about 500 acres in the Red River County area of the Sulphur River. All of his land will be under water when the lake is completed, he said.

Huddleston says other land in Red River County will increase in value once the benefits of the reservoir are realized.

Mitigation land will take even more acreage, both sides say. For each acre of land flooded, a certain amount of land must be set aside for wildlife use. Figures vary on the amount of matching land. Huddleston said the SRBA hopes for a one-to-one mitigation; others have suggested as much as an eight-to-one offset.

According to present plans, the Dallas area will receive 80% of the water pumped from Marvin Nichols. The remaining 20% of the water will be shared by the 19 counties that make up the Northeast Texas water planning group. Huddleston estimated total cost at \$1.7 billion, but as with almost all aspects of the lake, opponents disagree. Jim Presley with an environmental group in Texarkana says the cost could go as high as \$5 billion.

Huddleston on Monday made clear he has no use for organized environmentalists.

"These people make a living coming into a community and getting people upset," he said. "They are using you, the local people."

Huddleston also spoke of "so much spin" by lake opponents, calling some remarks "rumors and falsehoods."

"Let's get out on the table, the truth," he said.

Presley and others say the river authority from its inception began a plan of spinning the truth.

"The Northeast Texas water planning organization represents special interest groups," Presley said at Friday night's meeting. "Most of the people are left out."

Where the river authority talks about economic development, many opponents talk of land in a family for more than 150 years, homesteads wiped out and old cemeteries soon to lie under water.

Shumake said he traced family

members in Bowie County back to 1839, while other settled in the Cuthand area in the 1870's.

Oren Caudell of Texarkana spoke of Evergreen Cemetery in Titus County, begun by former slaves.

"One of their first acts of freedom was to decide where to be buried," Caudell said. The cemetery and others will be flooded when the lake is completed, he said.

Huddleston predicted 500 to 1,000 construction jobs at the lake, with 5,000 to 10,000 spinoff jobs. Economic impact of the lake is estimated at \$140 million to \$190 million annually, he said.

Landowners and others should face a simple fact, Huddleston said.

"It's going to be built. We're not going to stop it," he said. "But we can control it."

It is the American scheme of things, that the few sacrifice for the many, Huddleston said.

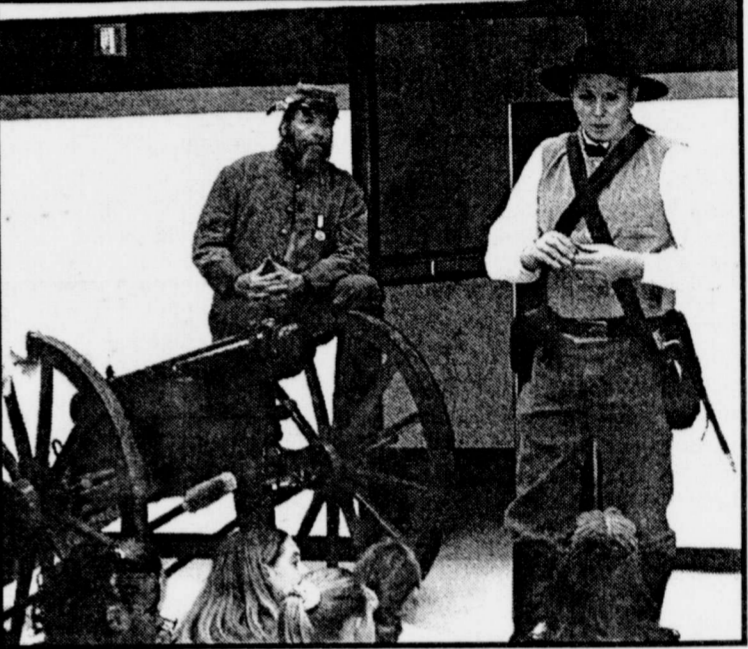
"Well, I guess people in Northeast Texas just haven't sacrificed enough," Shumake said. "I guess people who lost their land to Lake Wright Patman didn't sacrifice enough. People who lost their land to the coal mine didn't sacrifice enough. What are the people in Dallas sacrificing?"

In the end, Huddleston said, numbers matter, and Dallas has the numbers.

"They have the political power," he said. "They can pass any law they want to."

Planning on the lake is expected to take two years, beginning this summer, Huddleston said. Gaining necessary permits for construction is estimated at 13 years, with actual construction to take five years.

The State Legislature will vote on the overall water plan next year.

Chicken Tamale Casserole

- 1 dozen frozen tamales
 - 1 fryer-stew and de-bone
 - 1-1/2 cups chicken broth reserved from chicken
 - 1/4 small onion-chopped
 - 1 can green chilis-chopped
 - 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 - 2 cups velveeta cheese
- In deep oblong pan put tamales on bottom; layer chicken over these and then layer onion. Grate the velveeta or slice it and layer on top. In saucepan heat the broth, soup and green chilis to boiling. Pour over tamale, chicken and cheese, mixture. Cover with foil and bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes.

Refrigerator Rolls

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups water
- 2 tablespoons Crisco
- 1 package dry yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 5 cups flour

In saucepan combine sugar, salt, 2 cups water and Crisco and heat just until Crisco melts. Let cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in 1/2 cup water and add to cooled mixture. Gradually add the flour to mixture in medium mixing bowl. When mixed well, sit in a warm place and let it double in bulk. Put on floured board and knead. Grease tupperware bowl and cover when you place in refrigerator. Make into balls and put two into greased muffin tin for Parkerhouse Rolls. After rising for about 3 hours place in preheated 375 degree oven until golden brown. In warm weather, it won't take as long to rise and recipe makes about 2 dozen. Dough keeps about 2 weeks in refrigerator.

Pastry for Double-Crust Pie

- 1-1/2 cup flour
 - dash salt
 - 1/3 cup Crisco
 - cold water to hold together
- Combine all ingredients except water and use a small amount at a time so as not to add too much. Roll out and chill before making pecan or buttermilk pie.

Pastry for Fried Pies

- 1 cup flour
 - dash salt
 - 1/3 cup Crisco
 - cold water to hold together
- Combine all ingredients except water and add only enough to make crust stick together. Divide into small balls and roll out and fill with favorite filling. This will make 5-6 crusts for pies.

Pecan Pie

- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 stick oleo
 - 3 eggs
 - 3/4 cups Karo-white
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 cup chopped pecans
- Combine all ingredients and bake in crust at 350 degrees for 50-55 minutes. If it browns too quickly, make a tent of foil to place over top.

Cinnamon Red Hot Apples

- 4 large McIntosh apples
- 1 cup water
- margarine
- 9 ounce bag red hot
- 1 cups sugar-divided

Quarter, core and leave peelings on apples. Add water to pan and bring to boil. This will fill a pan 9-10" in diameter. DAdd apples and dot with margarine and put on lid. When apples cook a little, add red hot gradually until mixture is as red as you would like. When red hot is melted add 1/2 cup sugar and then another 1/2 cup gradually.

Buttermilk Pound Cake

- 2 cups flour
 - 1 cup Crisco
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup buttermilk
 - 1/4 teaspoon soda
 - 2 cups flour
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - dash salt
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 teaspoon butter-flavoring
- Blend together Crisco and 2 cups flour. Add eggs, one at a time and beat after each. Alternatley add remaining ingredients and add vanilla and flavoring last. Bake in bundt pan for 1 hour at 350 degrees.

So You Don't Believe In God?

Imagine this scene. You have just purchased a new Cadillac limousine, and you are showing it to a group of your friends. You explain to them how the metal was molded into fenders, bumpers, tailpipes, etc. You point out the slick chrome trim, along with the wheels of a combination of rubber and steel belts. You open the door and show your friends the beautifully sculptured interior carpet, Corinthian leather, and teak-paneled doors. There is a digital clock, windows that go up and down at the touch of a button, emergency blinkers, rear window defroster and a host of other conveniences. One of your friends remarks to you what a beautiful car you have. You reply that you are indeed proud of the new car, since it cost you approximately \$75,000!

Then one of your friends turns to you and asks, "Who made this car?" Without so much as a moment's hesitation, you reply, "No one made the car; it just happened." Can you imagine such a scenario? Your friends would have you committed for a mental disorder were you to suggest such a thing. And rightly so. It is obvious to all sane people that the beautiful piece of engineering we call the Cadillac did not "just happen".

Yet this Universe you live in is infinitely more complex than a Cadillac limousine. And yet you are asked every day to believe that it "just happened" by accident. The Universe is composed of over 2,500,000 galaxies. There are 25 sextillion stars known to exist (and that's as far as our most powerful telescopes can see at the present time). Our own galaxy, the Milky Way, is over 100,000 light years in diameter. Light travels 5.87 x 10¹² miles in one year. In 100,000 years it would travel 5.87 x 10¹⁷ miles. Our nearest neighbor, the Andromeda Galaxy, is over 750,000 light years away. That's 4.4 x 10¹⁸ miles!

The Sun, which heats our galaxy, is poised in space at 93,000,000 miles from Earth. If it were just 10% closer, it literally would burn everything to a crisp. If it were just 10% farther away, eventually temperatures would drop so drastically that life as we know it would perish. The Moon, which is poised in space at 240,000 miles from Earth, would cause 35-50 foot tides over the Earth twice a day if it were moved just one-fifth closer.

The Earth travels around the sun at a speed of 70,000 miles per hour, or 19 miles per second. The solar system itself is traveling through space at a speed of over 600,000 miles per hour, in a path so large it takes an estimated 220 million years just to complete one orbit. If the Earth traveled at only 35,000 miles per hour, our seasons would be doubled and the intense heat would bake the Earth, while the intense winter cold would freeze it. The Earth's troposphere contains exactly 21% oxygen. If it were just a little smaller, say 10-15%, man and beast would die due to lack of breathable air.

All of these things are infinitely more complex than a Cadillac limousine, yet we are asked daily to believe that organic evolution is true, and these things just happened by chance. If we cannot believe that the limousine "just happened" by accident, by what kind of logic do we then say that our great Universe "just happened"?

If you would like to examine the evidences supporting God's existence, and His creation of the Universe we invite you to attend a three-day seminar on Friday, April 5, 7-9 p.m. and Saturday, April 6, 1-5 p.m. at Rivercrest High School. The speaker is Dr. Bert Thompson.

Dr. Thompson holds an earned B.S. degree in biology from Abilene Christian University (1971) and earned M.S. (1972) and Ph.D. (1975) degrees in microbiology from Texas A&M University. He is a former professor in the Department of Veterinary Public Health, College of Veterinary Medicine, Texas A&M University, where he also served as the Coordinator of the Cooperative Education Program in Biomedical Science.

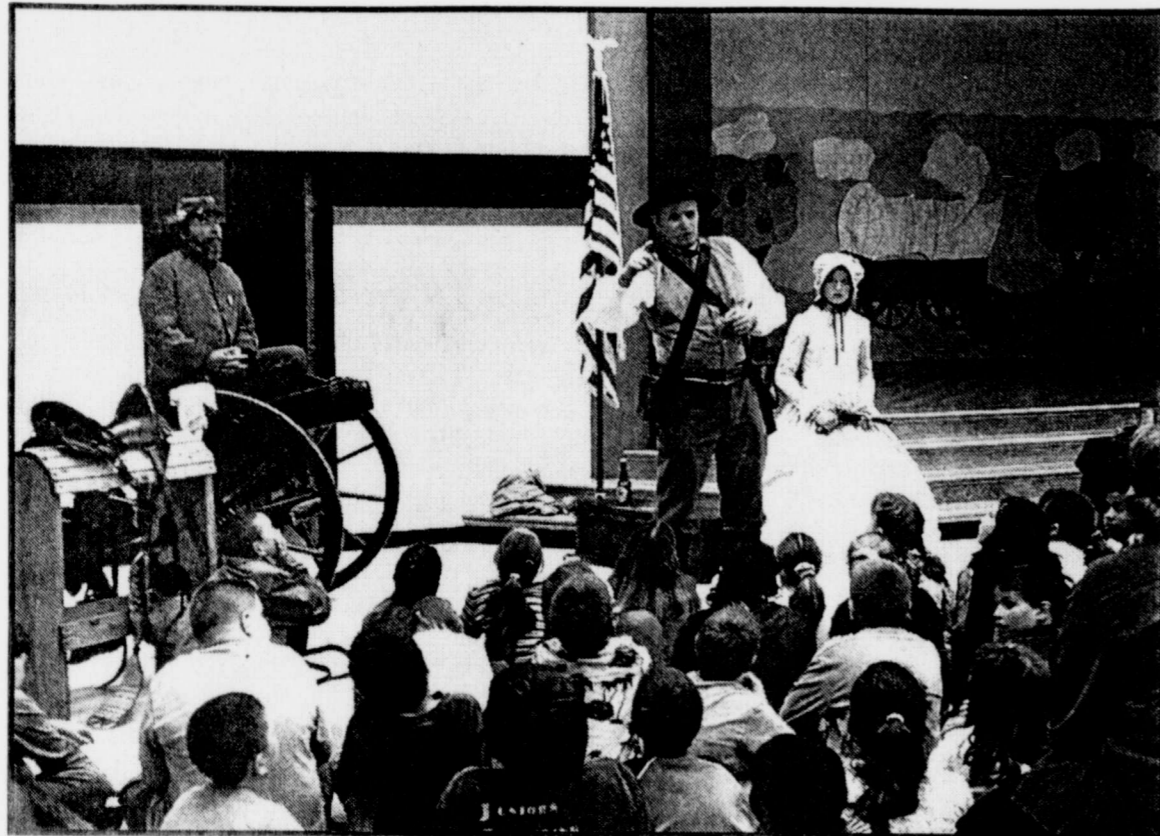
In 1977, Dr. Thompson was nominated to receive the Outstanding Teacher award in the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University. In 1978 he was among those placed in the prestigious listing of American Men and Women of Science. In 1979, he was honored by having his biographical information published in American Youth in Achievement, and was included in Personalities of the South. In 1981, he was listed in the International Who's Who of Intellectuals. He is a member of the American Society for Microbiology and the Institute of Food Technologists.

While teaching at Texas A&M, Dr. Thompson also served as a part time instructor in the School of World Evangelism operated by the A&M Church of Christ in College Station, Texas, where he taught in the field of Christian apologetics and Christian evidences. He also served as Professor of Bible and Science at Southern Christian University in Montgomery, Alabama (and is currently an adjunct professor there). He is a prolific writer and since 1981 has served as either co-editor or editor of Reason & Revelation a monthly journal on Christian evidences published by Apologetics Press, Inc., a non-profit, tax-exempt work that Dr. Thompson helped found, and on whose Board of Directors he sits. Currently, he serves as the Executive Director of Apologetics Press.

He has held a number of debates and has authored numerous book including: Creation Compromises; Theistic Evolution; The History of Evolutionary Thought; Essays in Apologetics (Volumes I-V); Non-Denominational Christianity; Is Unity Possible?; The Christian and Medical Ethics; The Scientific Case for Creation; The Revelation of God in Nature; A Study Course in Christian Evidences; Rock Solid Faith; and others.

Annette graduated from Rivercrest High School in 1969. She attended one year at Paris Junior College and received her BS from East Texas State University with a degree in Elementary Education, Physical Education and a Kindergarten Endorsement. She has 30 hours of graduate work from ETSU and received certification in Early Childhood Development, Generic Special Education and Language Learning Disabilities.

She began her teaching career at Bogata Elementary in a class for first, second and third grade resource students. Since 1977, she has taught in the Houston Independent School District in early childhood handicapped classes. Presently she is teaching a first grade high functioning autism/asperger's class.

This letter of recommendation was sent in behalf of Annette by one of her students parents:

Dear sirs,
I am writing this letter on behalf of Annette Swaim, who has

been nominated for Special Education Teacher of the Year. Let me first begin by saying Ms. Swaim is a teacher who once you encounter, will make a lasting impression on your life. She love and cares for each of her students. In a time where so many teachers are in it for a paycheck, Ms. Swaim is in the profession because she has the heart and passion for the children. It shows on her face and in her voice when she is with the children or whenever she speaks of the children.

My husband and I first met Ms. Swaim in 1992 when our son Bryan, who was 3 years old at the time entered Early Childhood at Burbank Elementary. It was very hard for us because we did not feel that our son belonged in that class. We felt that there was more to him than he could express (his words were trapped inside). It was a very difficult time because I knew how easily a child could get caught up and lost within the school system once they have been labeled as being learning disabled. This label can hurt as well as help because many do not expect much from those who carry this label. We thank God for Ms. Swaim. She does not feel that a label dictates what you are capable of. Our son was not talking when he went into Ms. Swaim's class he had a very high pitched scream and to coin a phrase was "Hell on Wheels". He was in another teacher's class at first but was moved into Ms. Swaim's class. By this point, we were totally devastated. I still can not explain how she did it other than love and patience. She worked with him and worked through the difficulties and did not give up on him. She looked beyond his label and loved the speech out of him. It's as if he wanted to talk to get the praise from her. He loved to do

things to see her smile. He received the Outstanding Progress Award from HISD in November 1993. Ms. Swaim has a way of looking into each child, seeing their potential and pulling it out. She looks into their eyes and connects with them. It's hard to put into words how that makes you feel as a parent. To know that your precious gift is being shown the patience, love and understanding even when you are away from them is indescribable. Ms. Swaim has a way of knowing when that child needs her to be teacher, mother, nurse, friend or playmate. And, she does each without begrudging the child. It is not a burden to her. We know that no one is perfect and most would say that everyone has a bad day, but, I can honestly say that I have never seen one from Annette around the children. She gives them her all when she is with them. These special education students require more of the teachers assigned to them and it takes someone special to undertake such a task. Our son is now 11 years old, in the 7th grade and is in the Honors program at Klein Intermediate. We credit Annette for being there to pull out what was trapped inside during his most crucial learning years. She saw beyond the label. His eyes still light up when we mention Ms. Swaim's name around him and we still have to take him by to see her whenever she is teaching. If that's not impact, I don't know what is.

Ms. Annette Swaim is not just a Special Education Teacher of the Year, she is a Teacher Of A Lifetime.
