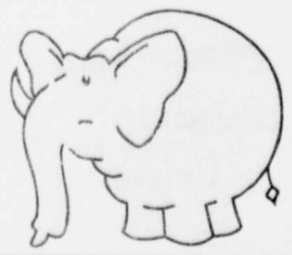

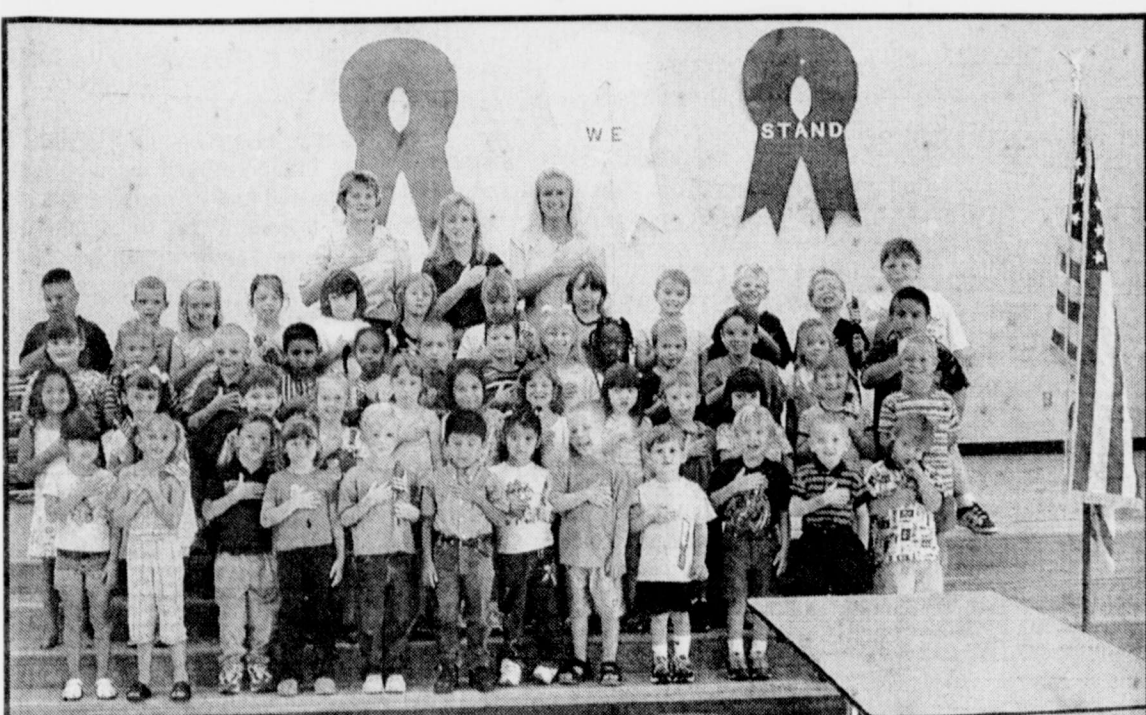

1 Duncan-Hines yellow cake mix
1 can Betty Crocker Coconut Pecan Frosting

Prepare cake by directions & add the frosting mix & pour into Bundt pan & bake at 350 degrees for 35-45 minutes.

Rich and Creamy Cake Glaze
2 tablespoons butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
Combine all ingredients & add enough milk to thin mixture & drizzle over top of warm cake.

Easy Best Chocolate Cake
2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
2 sticks butter
5 rounded tablespoons cocoa
2 eggs
1 cup water
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix flour & sugar & set aside. Melt butter, cocoa & water & bring to a boil. Pour over flour mixture & add eggs, buttermilk, soda & vanilla. Pour in 17 x 11 sheet pan or cup cake pans & bake at 350 degrees until done.

Icing for Easy Chocolate Cake
5 heaping teaspoons cocoa
1 stick butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
6 tablespoons milk (scant)
1 box powdered sugar

Combine all ingredients except powdered sugar & mix well. Add sugar & mix well & pour over warm cake.

Super Breakfast Casserole
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 dozen eggs-beaten
1 pound bacon-chop in small pieces
1-1/2 pound cheddar cheese-cubed
2 bunches green onion-chopped
1 teaspoon salt

Mix & pour into iron skillet that has been sprayed with Pam or a 9x13 pan & bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees. May be made the day before & refrigerated.

Dallas Cowboy Casserole
8 ounce package spaghetti
1 onion-diced
butter
1-1/2 pounds ground round
salt and pepper to taste
1-1/2 teaspoons garlic powder
1-1/2 teaspoons Lawry's season salt-optional
1-1/2 teaspoons chili powder-optional
1 can mushroom soup
1 can tomato soup
dash Worcestershire sauce
grated cheese

Cook spaghetti until tender; set aside. Brown onion in butter & add ground beef & cook until brown. Add salt & pepper & seasonings to taste. Add soups & sauce. Mix spaghetti

& meat sauce together & cover & simmer 15 minutes. Place in casserole dish & top with cheese until melted. Serves 6.

Salmon Loaf
1 can salmon
1 egg-beaten
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped bell pepper
1/2 cup celery-chopped
1/2 cup mayonnaise-not Miracle Whip
1/2 cup bread crumbs
pepper

Mix well & form a loaf; flatten on top. Cook at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until very brown. Better when cool or cold.

Grandmother Canter's Bread Pudding
1 loaf French bread or day old biscuits-torn in pieces
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup butter-melted
2 cups cream or canned milk
3/4 cup brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg

Combine milk, sugareggs and spices & mix well; set aside. Place broken bread pieces in large 13x9x2 pan & drizzle butter over bread & sprinkle with raisins. Pour milk-sugar mixture over bread & allow to soak. Press gently until all bread is completely soaked & little or no liquid remains in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes until brown. Top with Orange-Butter Sauce & serve at room temperature.

Orange-Butter Sauce
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
1/4 cup butter
3/4 cup granulated sugar
2 tablespoons frozen orange juice dash salt

In medium saucepan melt butter & add sugar, sour cream & orange juice. Bring to boil & cook stirring constantly until mixture is slightly thickened. Pour over cooked Bread Pudding.

Sweet and Sour Salad
1 can sauerkraut
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped sweet pepper
1 small jar chopped pimiento

Mix sugar & kraut & let set overnight. Add vegetables & mix well. Serve.

Lemon Pound Cake
1 Duncan-Hines yellow cake mix
1 small box lemon jello
2/3 cup water
2/3 cup Wesson Oil
4 eggs
1 tablespoon lemon extract

Mix cake mix & lemon jello well. Using mixer, combine dry mix & water slowly beating all the while. Add eggs one at a time & beat. Add oil very slowly & then extract. Beat 2 minutes & pour into Bundt pan & bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes until done.

Glaze for Lemon Pound Cake
1 cup powdered sugar
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons lemon juice

Make a thin glaze & drizzle over cake while warm.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
Special Election
NOVEMBER 5, 2002

Explanatory Brief for HJR 2
HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable in a precinct to be dormant if the office has not been filled by election or appointment for a lengthy period and providing a procedure for the reinstatement of the office."

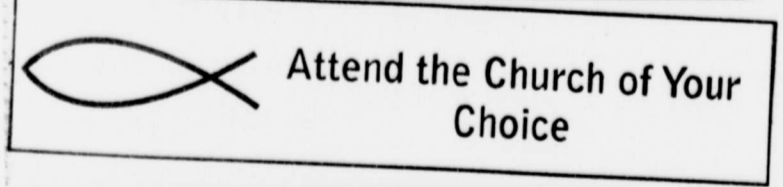

In JV action the Rebels again dominated taking a 26-0 win. On the defense the Rebels recovered

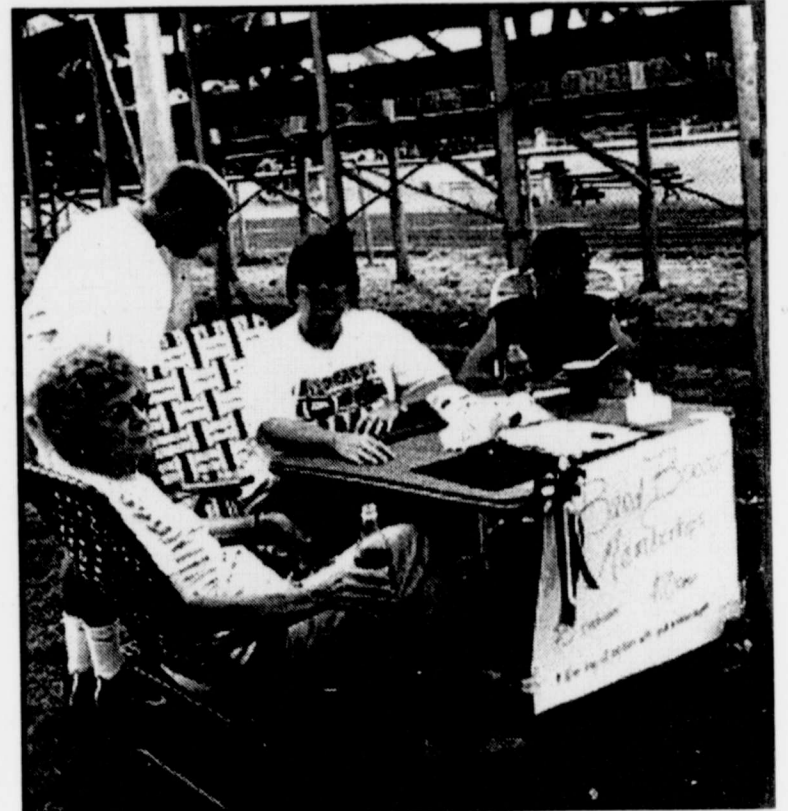
a fumble, caused 7 punts and gave up minus 56 yards offense.

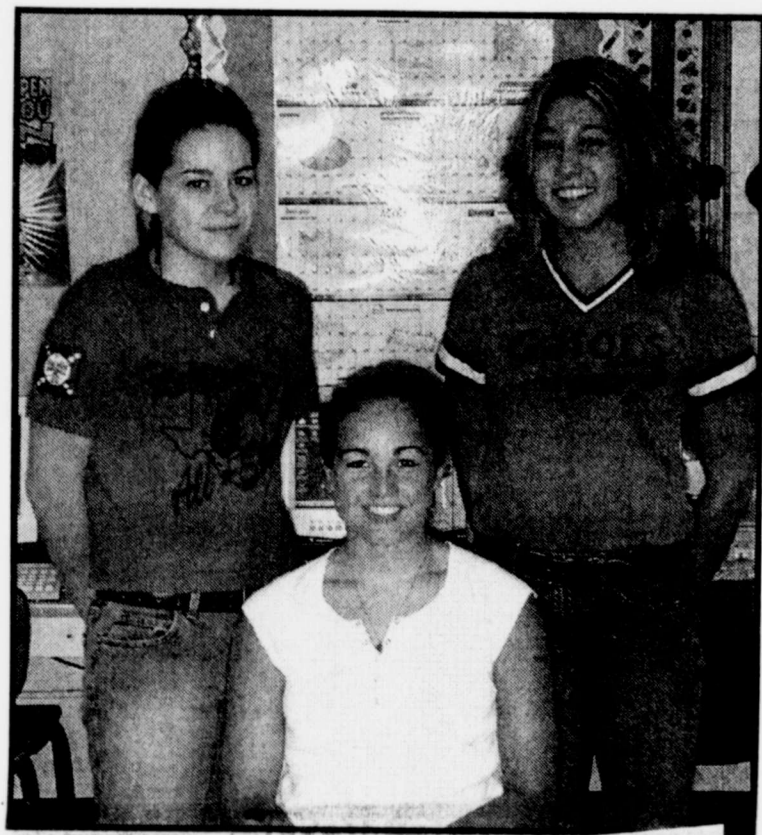



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Richard Rainey to seek Precinct 1 post

My name is Richard A. Rainey. I am 57 years old and retired. I was married for 27 years, but lost my wife six years ago to a sudden illness. I have two children, a boy and girl, and three grand children. They all live in California at this time, but they are all looking very seriously at moving to Texas within the next two or three years. The boy was born in Arkansas and the girl in Texas. My roots in this area go back to just after the Civil War when all my great-great grandparents moved to NE Texas and SW Arkansas from Georgia and Alabama. The Rainey's moved to Cass (then Davis) and then to Bowie Counties, and I am the first generation since then to not be born in NE Texas, I have to admit to Oklahoma. I have often visited this area of Texas since a small child and really fell in love with it and the way of life here. My father worked as an inspector for the government and we followed him for many years. I went to schools in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming, and California (where I met my wife to be). I spent four years in the U.S. Army, one of those in Vietnam. I have a bachelors degree in Business Administration (graduating "Cum laude"), I started college with two years of Engineering then a service break and two years of graduate (needed money) I finally graduated, taking ten years. I have worked as a production supervisor, production scheduler, shipping supervisor, but mainly as the senior budget analyst for Cameron Iron Works, after Cameron I owned a small business for twelve years (which I sold after my wife passed away), then I worked as a production control manager getting my daughter through high school and finally both kids through college.

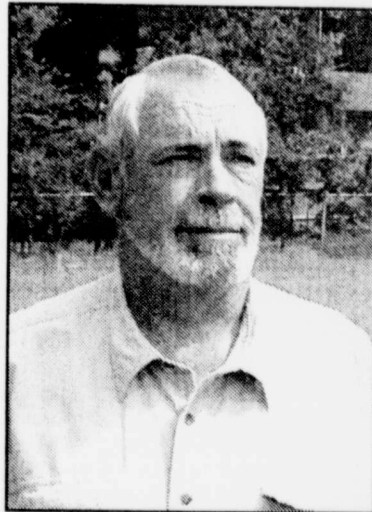
I am running on the Democrat Ticket for County Commissioner of District One, I am a Conservative Democrat. I have only lived in the County just over a year, but I am very interested in the County and have been encouraged to go for this position because of my background. I would like to see Clay Dodd continue in this position, he encouraged me to run, and understand why he doesn't feel it would be to his benefit to run and agree with them. I have been

warned it is a thankless job and to spend 24-7 doing the job, neither of these bother me as this is the way I have made a living all my life, and I enjoy getting into the middle of fray. I see this district as having had the short end of County Budgets for ten or more years. It seems that the rest of the Commissioners cannot understand why this district has a hard time keeping it's roads in condition. District One has from about nine to twenty-eight percent more roads to take care of than the other Districts with the same amount of money (this was after there was redistricting because of inequities). I should point out that historically this District has had as much as thirty-eight percent or more roads than another District (I won't call names, but I have the County supplied figures). Without an equal distribution of funds for so many years it is no wonder that this District has less and much older equipment than any other District. I have been to the Commissioners Court several times (didn't see any of the other Candidates there) and have made these facts heard again and again. The other Commissioners don't want to hear it and they are not willing to give up any of their budget. Occasionally they will offer to get this District out of trouble by offering fifteen or twenty thousand dollars - this is less than one percent of the total budget and they are all sharing the "burden" every time. When individually asked the other Commissioners are willing to give this District an increase, but out of someone else's budget - "NOT THEIRS!". There are answers out there and I intend to find them. There is a way to get more of the budget (a fairer amount anyway), but to this date we have not hit upon it - THERE IS A WAY THROUGH. I intend to dispel or discredit every argument they have given about why our roads bad and so little equipment which is all old and well use. I intend to make it so they cannot go to sleep at night without feeling guilt or have a nightmare (if in fact they have a conscience).

The citizens of the whole county must realize that we are a very poor county and if recent history is representative we will become poorer unless things are

turned around. Look at the population figures of the county, look at the industry in the county, we have lost both. We must understand why this occurred and to do something to reverse this trend. They have taken over the Railroad and put major highways around us. Our labor base just keeps getting smaller and less skilled (the skilled moved to get jobs). Now Dallas wants to take away and control a county major source of water, there is not one item about these proposed dams that have ANY potential to bring in money, long and shorter term jobs, or new residents to the county. Younger people have to go to the jobs - we haven't created any here. We have to look at what we may offer firms and people, what advantages we have for them to be here, once advantages are identified we need to promote and position the county towards those items. We will not get anywhere by giving away a major source of water to Dallas and tens of thousands of acres to wild animals (about one-fifth of the taxable land removed from the tax base and at unfair values - they want to use 1989 land values). I want to pass on assets to my children not debt - allowing these dams to come in will do nothing but promote and bread higher and more long term debt for all the citizens of this county. There have been several larger sources of water offered to Dallas, but Dallas would not have control so they don't want them, besides they can seal it cheaper here, especially after our taxes help build it.

I have many opinions and ideas that would go on for pages, but the paper asked that I keep it short. I do believe that everyone has something to offer and I would like to hear from anyone with ideas, my phone number is 632-0499, if the paper feels uncomfortable about giving it out I am in the phone book. I would appreciate you vote and if elected I will represent you to my fullest. I am practical about it and cannot and will not promise you the Moon, but if that is what you want I will tell the Board just that, I do promise you a bit of my own mind and that I will try to make roads in this District as good as possible given the resources available at the time.

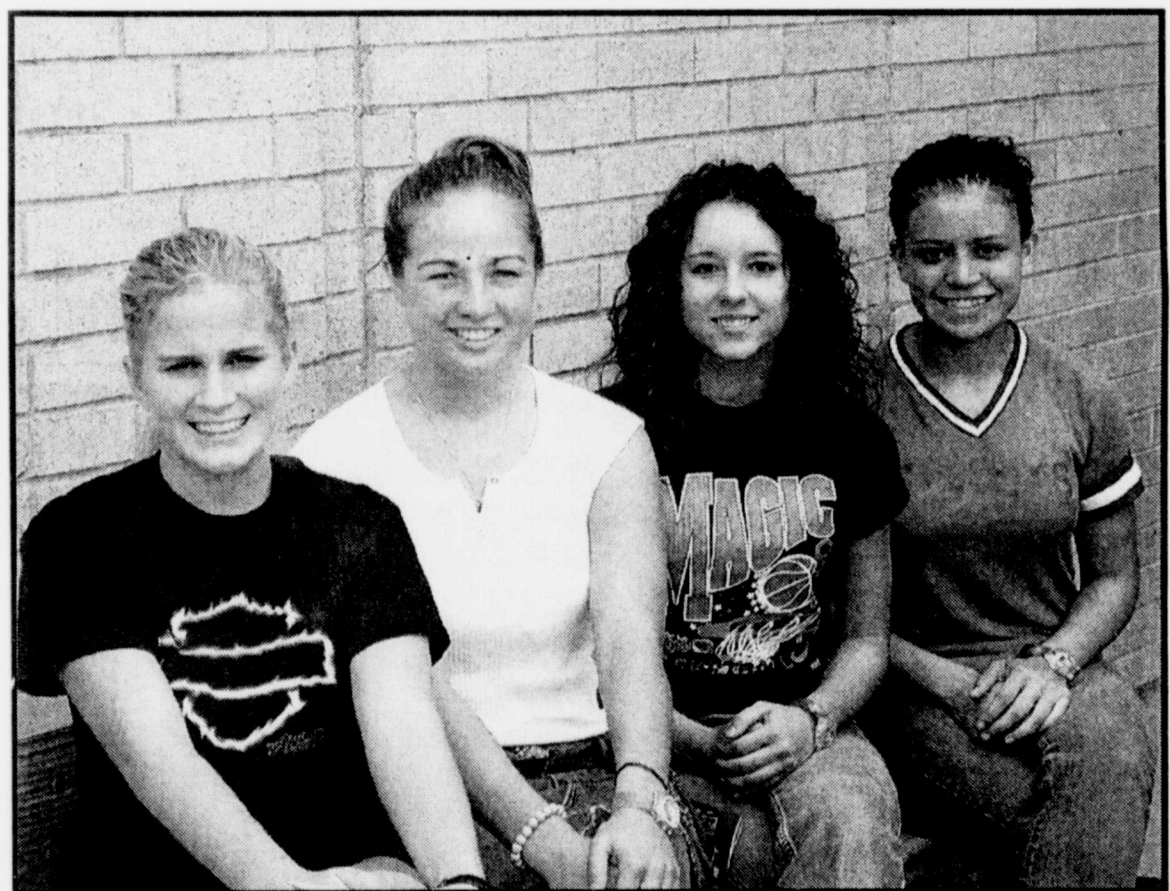

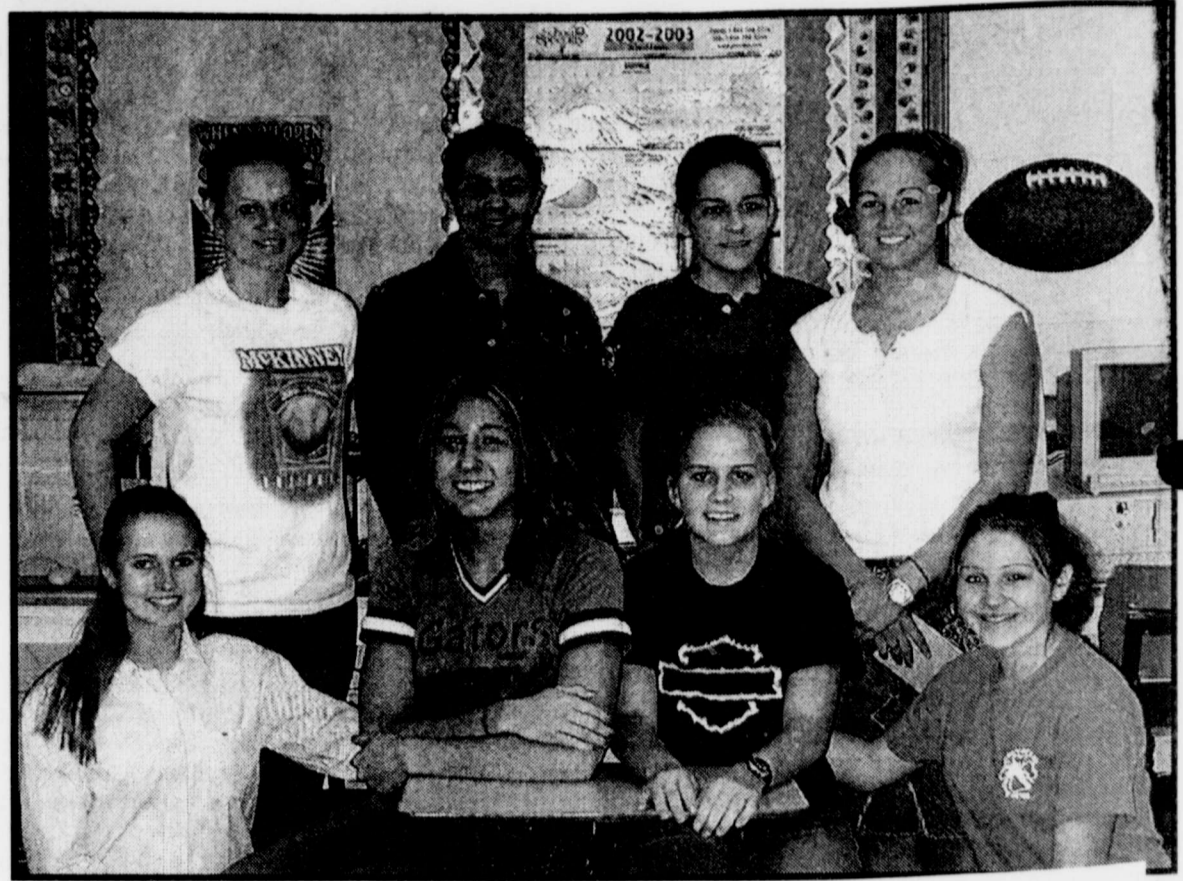

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PJC enrollment shows increase

Paris Junior College has the largest enrollment in history this fall, and the largest single year increase it has witnessed since post-World War II days.

Enrollment at PJC has topped out at 3,653 students after the 12th class day Wednesday, an 11.44 percent increase over last year and nearly 25 percent up from the fall of 2000. PJC has 375 more students this fall than last, and the enrollment is 717 students more than were at the college in the fall of 2000.

"I suspected our enrollment would be up a little this fall, but

this is unbelievable," said Paris Junior College President Bobby Walters. "We were not expecting this, but it is gratifying that so many people are coming to college to continue their education."

Walters pointed out that contact hours, the measure of the number of courses students take, is up in both general academic and the applied science areas and totals 860,456 hours. That is an almost 100,000-hour increase over last year.

Enrollment at both of PJC's Technical Center campuses set new records this fall.

Thanks to you Wyatt. I was also informed that nothing was going to happen to this person because on the day the dog was picked up there was food and water. It must have been his lucky day! I would also like to say thank you Lord for taking this animal because he would not have received help anywhere else!

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I would like to take this opportunity to tell you how our handicapped children are treated in the school system, in my opinion.

When we had 9 ARD meetings the teacher disagreed with what has been said. He does not even want the child in his class. They are bused at least 45 miles one way to another school. They get on the bus around 6:20 a.m. and return home by 4:45 p.m. While they are on the bus they are not allowed to have anything to drink at anytime. That's a long way and time for the kids not to have a drink.

Then when they are at school, if a teacher abuses them they get away with it. Because the school rules in their favor because our children can't verbally tell them word for word what has happened.

The teacher and aide can get away with calling our kids very ugly names.

Then when you confront the school personal about what is going on, a behavior problem.

You ask, what kind of behavior problem they are having, and they tell you that the child does not get along with the teacher. At times the teacher has called in the DARE officer to talk to the kids, but, when they come, the DARE officer threatens our children by telling them they will arrest them and take them to jail. Who gives them the right to threaten these kids?

This child is on a work program in the morning with another aide when it is time for him to go back to class he begs her not to take him back. He tells her they are mean to him.

Yes, I would say he has a behavior problem to a point. But, he does know right from wrong. And the ugly name calling is wrong.

When we told the school this the only thing they had to say was, your child no longer is allowed to go to school, but, we will provide your child with a home bound program. If you don't like it that's just tough because that is all they will offer.

When you ask people in Austin that represent our kids what we can do, they tell us to put it in writing, send it to them and they will look into the matter. Then, when you ask how long it will take them to come and investigate, they tell you they do everything from their desk. They don't come and see what is going on, they make phone calls to the school and ask questions. Well, guess what? We are back to square one, because who are they going to side with, of course, the school!

So, what do our kids do now, they just sit at home and wait for the school to pencil them in when it is convenient for them.

To come and see them 4 hours a week on the home bound program. This is not an adequate amount of time to teach our children, not even our regular ed children can learn anything in this amount of time, because, they are not just teaching one subject but several subjects.
