## Briefly Early voting underway

Early voting is underway in Runnels County and runs through Friday, Feb. 26. As of Tuesday, 45 early ballots had been cast.

Voters may cast ballots at the elections office at 600 Strong Ave. from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Feb. 16-19 and Feb. 22-26.

The contested races on the ballot will include the district attorney's race. Tom Green County Assistant DA John Best will be facing San Angelo Attorney Andrew Graves in the 119th District Attorney race. Sgt. Carl Squyers is facing Toby Virden in the race for Runnels County Sheriff and incumbent Precinct 3 commissioner Sam Scott is being challenged by Roy Mints. All other candidates listed will run unopposed in the primary.

## Sales tax fluctuates in February

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced Feb. 10 that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$867.1 million in local sales tax allocations for February, 0.7 percent less than in February 2015. These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2015 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

Ballinger's allocation was down 3.54 percent from 2015, with \$167,871.72 received for February, versus \$174,034.93 received last year.

Winters sales tax receipts were down 21.59 percent from last year, with \$21,593.29 received this month, down from the \$27,542.23 received in February of 2015.

Receipts in Miles were up 20.58 percent with \$7,417.67 received in February and \$6,151.53 received at the same time last year.

Runnels County showed an increase over last year receiving \$75,496.85 in February up 3.45 percent from \$72,976.54 last year.

## The last drop

Warmer temperatures have returned to Runnels County this week making for spring-like conditions with highs expected to reach the mid to upper 80s by the end of the week according to the National Weather Service in San Angelo. Lows will only reach the mid-50s.

No rainfall was reported from Feb. 11-16 in Runnels County.

Rain chances are in the forecast for Sunday and Monday, with a 40 percent chance predicted Sunday and a 50 percent chance for Monday.

district attorney in Tom Green County, is running for the position. San Angelo attorney Andrew Graves is

also running for the position. Both are running in the Republican Primary March 1. Early voting began Tuesday.

## Best: Dedicated to prosecuting felony crimes

What do you feel qualifies you for the 119th District Attorney position?

I have dedicated myself to prosecuting serious felony crimes in the Tom Green County District Attorney's Office for over 14 years. An experienced District Attorney prosecutes the most dangerous and violent criminals in our community. I've successfully prosecuted hundreds of felony cases including murder, child molestation, drug crimes, and property crimes. In 2015 alone, I was involved in success-

## Drug roundup Monday in Runnels County

More than 16 arrested on drug charges, more expected

On Monday, the Runnels County Sheriff's Office converged on the county and began arresting individuals for drug violations in what was the biggest drug roundup in recent history.

Sheriff Bill Baird said that the roundup was the culmination of an undercover narcotics investigation that has been ongoing for months.

Baird and staff members from the RCSO led the investigation and were assisted by the Ballinger and Winters Police Departments and the game warden in Runnels County. Law enforcement began making arrests on more than 45 warrants issued for 24 persons for drug violations at noon Monday.

"Most of them were for delivery of a controlled substance," Baird explained. "And most involved methamphetamine."

The drug sweep continued throughout the day, Baird said. A total of 15 were arrested on drug violations, one was arrested on a non-drug related charge.

Many of the charges included delivery of a controlled substance near a school or a city

## New travel stop to open in fall of 2016

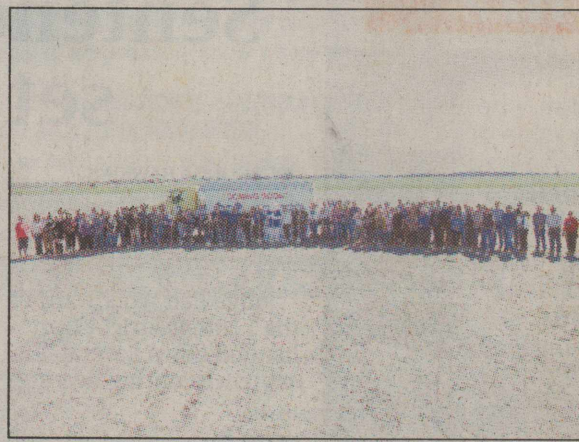

On Higher Ground

"Believe you can and you're halfway there."

— Theodore Roosevelt

If you have never heard of the non-profit organization Higher Ground don't feel alone. Higher Ground military program caters specifically to soldiers with Post Traumatic Stress(PTS) and Traumatic Brain Injury(TBI). When the program was established, it was decided that there were plenty of programs that catered to individuals with physical injuries, but not so much for individuals with psycho-social-emotional injuries. I applied with Higher Ground several years ago, but only just participated due to conflicting schedules over the past couple of years.

Higher Ground currently hosts 13 week-long sports camps every year, completely free for veterans and their supporters. These camps are catered specifically towards

couples, single men and women. After a week of challenging activities that highlights your individual ability, Higher Ground commits three years of follow-up care for each participant, helping to connect participants to local resources and dedicating a reintegration budget to help them achieve goals.

My individual story took place last week as my wife, Jaslyn, and I were flown out to Sun Valley, Idaho to participate in the Winter Sports camp. Now being from West Texas both of our experience with snow means we get excited if it sticks to the ground. In Sun Valley, where they have had their best snow in ten years by most accounts, there were snow drifts several feet deep.

Our first two days of camp took place on Dollar Mountain where I took on the challenge of snowboarding. I chose snowboarding because it relied on both legs working together instead of separate for downhill skiing. What

I didn't know was that manipulation of the board relies on lifting and dropping your toes on the board and since I only have one functional foot and ankle it made this more even more challenging than I expected. What made me even more frustrated was that on my first day on the slopes my boot kept pressing the release on my prosthetic and my leg would come out mid-slide. This led to some pretty good falls, but my instructor and I were able to place some stiff styrofoam around to prevent it from being depressed. The first evening was a shock as we went to a donors house and ate a wonderful home cooked meal and also got to sit down and talk with one of the people that helped to make all of this possible.

Onto the second day and I finally was getting comfortable enough to go down the slope on my own without holding onto a ski-pal for a short distance. Unfortunately

my day was cut short due to injury, but I was feeling very confident that I would achieve my own personal goal of making it down the mountain.

Day three was a day of new challenges as we started out the day with some cross country skiing which was far less challenging than going downhill and although some slips and falls were definitely involved it was a fairly relaxing event. My personal highlight was when I decided that diving headfirst into a four foot snowbank would be a perfect way to cool off. After lunch the ladies went to go have pedicures while the men went to the local hockey arena to go play some sled hockey.

On the fourth day we drove north on a little sightseeing trip and also got to take a nice hike in some snowshoes. Our fifth and final day we went back to the slopes before going to the peak of Mount Baldy and having a lunch with all the people that were involved in making the week happen, including board members and donors.

This was the most amazing week that I have had in a long time. Higher Ground provided me with an experience that was plainly irreplaceable. On top of all of the activities



that we got to do I got to meet many other veterans and their wives and make more connections and relationships that I would have never had otherwise. If you are interested

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Sentences handed down, hearings set in 119th District Court

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Judge Ben Woodward of the 119th District Court handed down several sentences during hearings

Thursday at the Runnels County Courthouse.

April Heitman, 39, was sentenced to three years in prison after pleading guilty to assault causing bodily injury to a disabled person, a third degree felony.

Woodward sentenced her to three years at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and ordered her to pay a \$10,000 fine.

Eliazar Hernandez entered a plea of not guilty to second degree felony charges of burglary of a habitation that were filed on July 11, 2015. Hernandez has since changed his plea and is scheduled to accept a plea offer during a hearing slated for Feb 25 at the 119th District Court in San Angelo.

Crystal Reyes, pleaded guilty to driving while intoxicated with a child on Sept. 12, 2015. She was sentenced to 180 days in jail which was probated to

two years. Judge Woodward ordered her to pay a \$500 fine.

Bobby Cortez, 39, of Ballinger was charged with aggravated assault that causes serious bodily injury for an incident that occurred Aug. 26, 2015 in Ballinger. He was released on a \$50,000 bond. During the hearing, Judge Woodward reminded Cortez that as a condition of his bond, he was to have no contact with the victim. Woodward said if the conditions of the bond were violated, the bond would be revoked. Cortez's next hearing is slated for March 10, with a jury trial tentatively scheduled for May 23.

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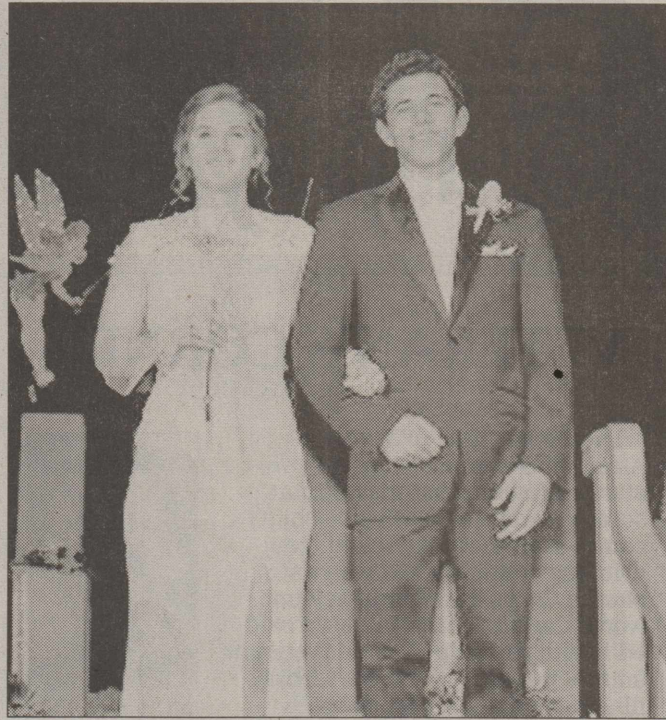

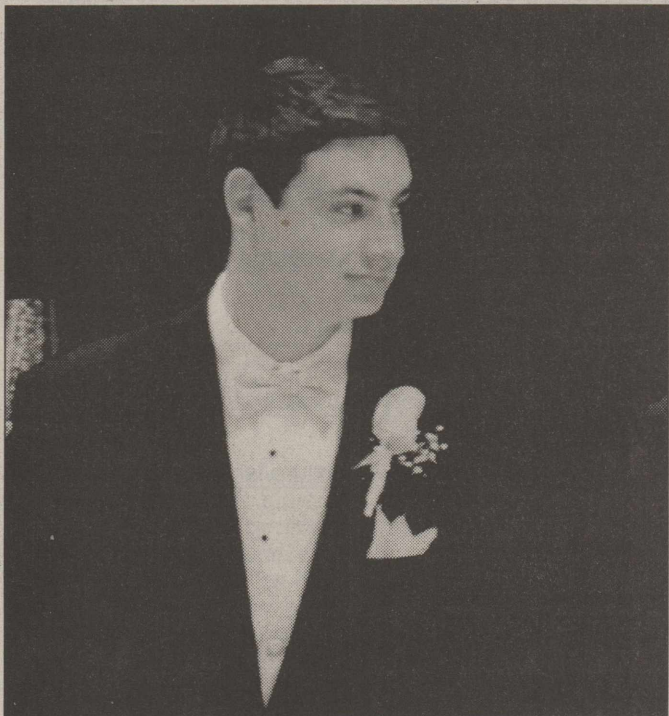

**Weather Whys**

**Q: What's the difference between mist and drizzle?**

**A:** The real difference is only a slight one, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "Mist is composed of tiny droplets of water, so tiny they are suspended in the atmosphere," he explains. "Mist reduces visibility, but not as much as fog, which it closely resembles. Technically speaking, during mist, visibility is one-half mile or more. Drizzle, on the other hand, is fairly uniform precipitation and is composed of small water drops that fall to the ground. The only real difference between drizzle and actual rain is that the droplets in drizzle are much smaller."

### VETERAN'S CORNER

The Department of Veterans Affairs has announced that it will start a program that may permit some veterans to receive disability compensation if they fell ill from drinking contaminated water at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. The VA has provided health care expenses for veterans and their family members with 15 illnesses related to exposure to contaminated drinking water, but it has not given "presumptive status" in order to render them eligible for disability compensation. However, veterans may receive disability compensation if they have one of three illnesses; kidney cancer, angiosarcoma of the liver and acute myelogenous leukemia, and served at Camp Lejeune between 1953 and 1987. The drinking water, which has presumed to affect more than 750,000 people on the Marine Corps base, was suspected to contain volatile organic compounds such as benzene and vinyl chloride. The Marine Corps first acknowledged the problem in 1985 when they found traces of toxins in their water, which they suspected to be the result of illegal dumping by an off-base dry cleaner. Further discussions regarding establishing "presumptive status" for those affected will begin on August 19, 2016 between the VA and the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry. 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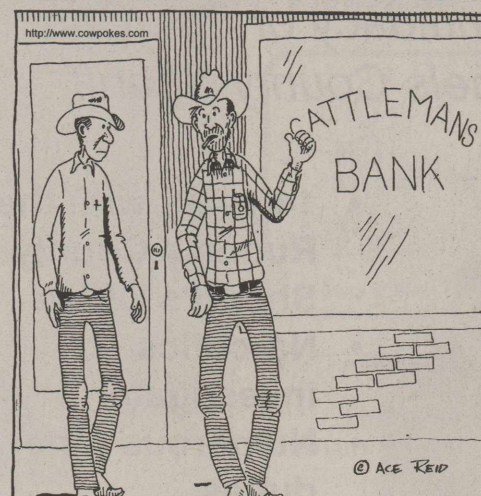

## Commissioners consider new lighting, roof

Runnels County Commissioners are looking to bring new lighting to the courthouse and voted to proceed with a project to upgrade the lighting throughout the courthouse and other county facilities which will ultimately save the county money on utility bills.

Fred Lippe of West Texas Power Co. made a presentation to the panel on Feb. 10 for an upgrade to the lighting at the courthouse that will cost an estimated \$9,700 after incentives are granted through a program with American Electric Power or AEP.

"Your electric costs will go down considerably," Lippe told the court after detailing the project which will change all of the fluorescent lighting to LED lighting at the courthouse.

"The lights will last a long, long time," Lippe explained.

Members asked Lippe to survey the costs to upgrade lighting at the jail as well. Lippe will present the plan to upgrade the lighting at the jail at a future meeting.

Commissioners also heard a presen-

tation from a representative of Booe Commercial Roofing of Abilene on the replacement of the roof at the courthouse at a cost of \$38,975. This is the second contractor who has made a presentation. No final decision has been made on the roofing project.

In other business commissioners:

- Heard a report on new requirements for the meals at the Senior Citizens Center and that the new requirements will cause funding problems for the agency.

- Approved the management policy for the Runnels County Auditor's Office.

- Accepted the certificates of course completion for District Clerk Tammie Burleson and County Clerk Julia Miller.

- Approved a new agreement between the Runnels County Jail and Dr. Bundrant as the new primary care physician for inmates at the Runnels County Jail.

- Accepted the annual report from the Runnels County Emergency Services District No. 1.

- Received the auditors report from the Runnels County Emergency Services District No. 1.

The Wheat family along with city and county officials as well and hundreds from the community turned out for the event. Attendees were invited to bring their shovels and help turn the first dirt for the construction of the market.

"It is such a great day for this groundbreaking," said Winters Mayor Lisa Yates. "It is always a blessing when a new business comes in, especially at the hands of a family that has been so involved in the community."

The Crossing Travel Market, a limited partnership of the Wheat family, will be supplied fuel by Wheat Energy Services, a Winters-based fuel distribution company owned and operated by the Wickets.

The Wickets have envisioned a modern convenience store/travel market, which will be a multi-faceted retail destination. It will have a distinct local feel, from its graphics, design, and store theme, to its West Texas hospitality and service.

With construction beginning in this month, the anticipated opening date should be late fall of 2016, barring any significant delays, company officials say. Waldrop Construction of Brownwood will be the contractor for the construction project, Doug Wheat announced. Hibbs and Todd of Abilene provided the engineering for the project and Security State Bank and First Financial Bank of Abilene are both involved in the financial side of the project.

The Wickets thanked the community for its patience during the planning and design of the retail outlet.

"This day is the result of many hours of preparation and hard work," said Amy Wheat.

"We've been overwhelmed by the support we've had from the entire community," said Doug Wheat.

The Wheat's thanked their entire family, including the patriarch and

matriarch of the family, Gene and Jeanie Wheat, who started Wheat Energy Service in Winters decades ago. They also thanked their current and future employees and all of the businesses and business leaders in Winters.

Doug Wheat also introduced the polar bear, which is the official mascot of the market, which will take its décor cues from the Wickets brand, which means a "cold theme," he said. And, they want to get the public involved, with a contest to name the polar bear in coming months.

He added that the theme of the business will be "a Texas gathering place," which will become a "destination stop" for travelers, commuters, truckers, and local and regional fleets. The Crossing will offer several quick-service food options including Krispy Krunchy Chicken, Hunt Bros. Pizza, and its Hometown Grill, which will feature a variety of menu offerings. The store will have indoor seating for 40 patrons as well as expanded seating in an outdoor, covered area. The Crossing will also feature an exceptional fountain drink and coffee bar and a drive through window.

The Crossing will have four highway entry/exit points, two each from highways 83 and 153, which will greatly assist with customer flow and separation. The Crossing will include 10-position fueling island, and the truck/fleet island will have five fueling lanes. The passenger vehicle area will offer gasoline and highway diesel, and the fleet fueling area will offer highway diesel, off-road diesel, and diesel exhaust fluid. Amenities planned for truck and fleet customers include truck parking, showers, washer/dryer and a relaxation lounge.

Randall Conner, economic development director for the Winters Area Business and Industrial Corp. said the community as a whole is excited about the new business.

"This is a big project," Conner said. "We are looking at this project as

something we can build on for the future and for other things to happen in our community."

With that, Conner instructed the Wheat family to grab the golden shovels and turn the first dirt for the project. Then, they were joined by members of the city, county and community for the groundbreaking.

Conner said the project should take about nine months to complete and that the community will return, in late fall for a ribbon cutting and grand opening.

"We appreciate all of the efforts (the Wickets) are making now that will make this community better," Conner said.

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# Historical Commission reports on 2015

## Official seal presented to commissioners

**STAFF REPORT**

For the Runnels County Historical Commission, 2015 was a busy year. The RCHC presented their Annual Report for 2015 in Runnels County Commissioners Court January 26. In addition, the RCHC presented the first Official Runnels County Seal Medallion to the Runnels County Commissioners' Court to be displayed on the Runnels County Courthouse.

In 2015, the commission established a marker program with the presentation of the Official County Seal. These were both approved in Commissioners' Court in November 2015, along with two amendments to the RCHC by-laws. A committee will work with anyone want-

ing a county historical marker. Applications for the county markers will be filed with the County Marker Committee.

Also in 2015, the commission released Volume II, "The Schools of Runnels County," November 11. The volume was published by Ballinger Printing and Graphics. Work is underway for Volume III, "The Markers and Their History" and "The Post Offices of Runnels County."

In their preservation work, the RCHC achieved a total of 3,450 in volunteer hours and they traveled approximately 9,240 miles. Their work of recording various Runnels County sites included traveling to all of the known school sites in the county, establishing GPS readings, checking Runnels County

bridges, interviewing residents of the county

and visiting other sites of significance. And, most of the information collected was used in the most recent RCHC publication as well as the two upcoming volumes of the books that are now underway.

A marker dedication was held in Winters in observance of its 125th Anniversary as an established town March 1, 2015 at the Pioneer Church of God near the marker site located in Winters Historic Park by the Blue Gap Post Office. This was held in accordance with Texas Independence weekend. The post office and Winters Public Library were all open for the dedication. Several students were also involved in the event.

In addition, a marker application was submitted for the town site of Rowena.

Several appointees attended the Edwards Plateau Historical Association meeting held in Winters in the spring and Burnet in the fall.

The Commission was honored by the presentation of the Distinguished Service Award from the THC for the year 2014. The award was presented in County Commissioners' Court in July of 2015. Several appointees serve and volunteer as officers and directors on the Z. I. Hale Museum Board.

An appointee and two youth restored three Historical Markers throughout

the year.

Several appointees participated in four different webinars sponsored by the THC.

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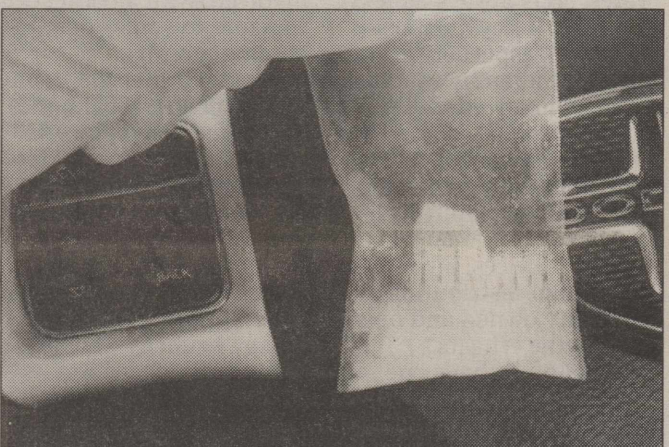

park. Another person was arrested for possession of marijuana and for allegedly making "oil" from the marijuana with a device at his home in the area of 14th and Country Club Drive, in Ballinger.

"This is the largest drug investigation we've had in years," Baird said. "It should help with eradicating the drug trade and deter other related crimes like theft and burglary."

It's important for all of us that these felony cases come to trial. It makes our community safer. It's equally important that the person sitting in the DA's chair has the proven experience to successfully prosecute those felony cases. At trial, we need a DA with proven experience in successfully seeking justice in our courts of law. In addition to my experience as a prosecutor in the courtroom, I have also played an active role in managing five assistant district attorneys as well as more than 20 support staff in the DA's Office. 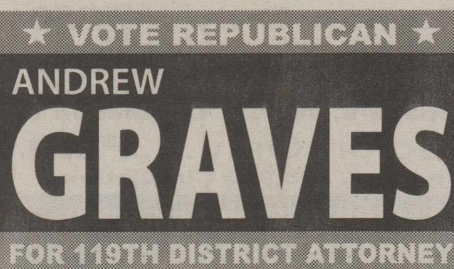
