86th Annual county stock show continues

The 86th Annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will began on Tuesday, January 17th and and will run through Thursday, January 19th. There will be a concession stand open during all of the events. See remaining schedule of events.

A Junior Livestock Premium Sale will begin promptly at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 21, 2023, following the Buyers' Luncheon. A maximum of 40% of steers, lambs, barrows, goats exhibited as well as 2 dairy heifers, 2 beef heifers, and 2 rabbits will be sold. In the event that there are less than 140 head in the sale, then the total number sold will be 140 with the remaining sale slots to be divided equally between the steer, lamb, goat, and pig divisions. Order of sale will be determined by the Sale Committee. The Sale will be held under the auspices of a committee directly responsible to and appointed by the PCJLS Stock Show Board. Other rules do apply. See handbook for details.

Friona will receive a \$53,697.04 tax allocation for January

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will distribute nearly \$1.1 Billion in monthly sales tax revenue to local governments. The amount is 7.6 percent increase over the revenue distributed in January 2022. Cities will receive \$674.5M, transit systems will get \$227.3M, counties get \$66.5M, and special purpose districts will get \$100.6M. These allocations are based on sales made in November by businesses that report tax monthly.

The City of Friona will receive \$53,905.21 in sales tax allocation for the month of January. This payment is a 20.90% decrease from the \$68,150.87 received in January of 2022. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$13,476.30 of the allocation for its operating budget.

Parent Involvement Committee has been formed

The Friona Junior High Involvement Parent Committee (P.I.C.) was organized in December 2022. School Board orders General Election

A Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Friona ISD was held on Monday, January 16, 2023 at 7:00 p.m. in the Board Meeting Room of the FISD Administration Building located at 909 E. 11th Street in Friona, Texas.

January is recognized nationally as school board appreciation month. Superintendent Jimmy Burns commended the Board of Trustees for their hard work and dedication to the students. He presented each board member with a token of appreciation from the school district.

During the open forum portion of the meeting. Trisha Winebrinner, representing a

group of individuals, expressed concerns regarding the FISD sports programs. Also, Esmeralda Mills presented an overview of the new Friona Junior High Parent Involvement Committee (P.I.C.) that has been formed to help promote stronger relationships among students, parents, and teachers.

The Board approved a motion to order a General Election for the election of two (2) at-large School Board Trustees to be held on May 6, 2023. The terms of Jamie Lewellen and Wade Schueler expire this year. The deadline to file for an application to become a candidate is Friday, February 17th. Applica-

tions are available at the Friona ISD Administration Building. Approval was also given to enter into a Joint Election Agreement with the City of Friona.

The consent agenda was approved. This agenda includes the Minutes of previous meetings, fund reports, maintenance reports, account reports, and the payment of monthly bills. The Board then went into Closed Session.

Speaker open to resort-style casinos in state

House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, told The Dallas Morning News and other media outlets that he is open to bringing resort-style casinos to Texas. But don't expect to find slot machines in 7-Eleven stores if casino gambling is legalized.

"What I don't want to see is to walk into every convenience store and see 15 slot machines," Phelan said. "I want to destination-style casinos that are high quality and that create jobs and that improve the lifestyle of those communities."

The gambling industry is preparing for another strong push to bring gaming to one of the few major markets that doesn't allow it. But other state leaders seem more hesitant, including Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who said in December that he "doesn't see any movement on it."

Gov. Greg Abbott has softened his oncestrong opposition to legalized gambling, echoing Phelan's support for casinos that also feature golf courses, luxury hotels and other amenities.

The Morning News report said the Dallas-Fort Worth area would be a top location because of its strong convention and tourism industry, as well as access to major airports.

tees, despite being in the minority in that chamber. The Texas Standard reported that was a victory for Phelan, who defied Republicans wanting to ban Democrats from holding chair positions.

Phelan's In first speech after being reelected speaker, he talked about the importance of both parties working together.

"After watching Congress attempt to function last week, I cannot imagine why some want Texans to be like D.C.," Phelan said, referring to the protracted battle over electing a U.S. Speaker of the House.

Another provision is aimed at stopping legislators from skipping sessions to break quorum by levying fines every day they are absent without leave. During the 2021 session, House Democrats left Texas for 38 days in an ultimately

unsuccessful attempt to block passage of a slate of voting restrictions.

Prisoners launch hunger strikes over solitary confinement

A large-scale hunger strike protesting the state's solitary confinement practices began last Tuesday, with about 300 people in Texas prisons reportedly participating, according to the Texas Standard. The prisoners are protesting the state's practice of placing inmates in solitary indefinitely.

Michele Deitch, director of the Prison and Jail Innovation Lab at the University of Texas at Austin, said prisoners have gone on hunger strikes to push the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to meet months-long demands for change. Besides ending indefinite solitary confinement, also called restrictive

housing, the prisoners want to move to a behavioral-based system rather than a statusbased system. Under the latter, prisoners can be placed in solitary simply by being labeled a gang member, not necessarily for breaking any rules.

"I do believe that it is something that the agency should take a very hard look at, whether there are ways that they could be approaching this issue that are both safe and more appropriate," Deitch told the Standard.







mall Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

January 19th is National Popcorn Day. This recipe includes instructions on making clarified butter or ghee, which might come useful in other recipes as well.

Buttery Movie Popcorn • www.recipetineats.com

Ingredients

MOVIE POPCORN:

3 tbsp Popcorn Butter or ghee (Note 1)

3/4 cup popcorn kernels

2 – 3 tbsp Extra Popcorn Butter or ghee (Note 1)

1 tsp Popcorn Salt

POPCORN SALT:

1 tbsp salt

POPCORN BUTTER (CLARIFIED BUTTER / GHEE):

2 sticks unsalted butter

YELLOW COLOURING (OPTIONAL):

1 1/2 tsp warm tap water

1/4 tsp saffron powder, imitation (Note 2)

1/8 tsp turmeric powder

Instructions MOVIE POPCORN:

Place 3 tbsp Popcorn Butter in a large 10L/10qt lightweight pot over medium heat (medium high if weak stove). When the butter is almost melted, pour in Yellow Coloring, if using. Quickly give the pan a shake to disperse the coloring across the base. Add kernels, shake quickly to spread across the base, then clamp lid on. The kernels will start popping after a minute or so. Shake briefly once after 30 seconds or so. When the popping stops, immediately pour popcorn into a large bowl.

Melt Extra Popcorn Butter in microwave. Pour over popcorn, sprinkle over salt. Shake and toss well to disperse. Extra fantastic served warm but still irresistible at room temp.

POPCORN SALT:

Place in a mortar and pestle and grind into a fine powder, or use about 1/2 cup salt and blitz in food proces-

POPCORN BUTTER (VIDEO HELPFUL):

Place butter in a silver saucepan over medium low to medium heat. Leave to melt, it will start to sputter and

spit, then foam. When you push the foam aside and you see brown bits on the bottom of the saucepan, remove from heat. Takes about 10 minutes. Line a strainer with 2 paper towels, then strain butter through - discard brown bits. Pour strained butter into a jar or container. It sets when it cools. Use in liquid or set form. Keeps in the pantry for months (it is now ghee / clarified butter).

YELLOW COLOURING (OPTIONAL):

Mix ingredients in a small bowl until spices dissolve. **Recipe Notes:**

1. Popcorn Butter - Can be substituted with store bought Ghee. Recipe makes more than you need because it's easier to make this quantity, and it keeps for months. We're making ghee here which is clarified butter, which is butter where milk solids and water has been removed, so it's 100% butter fat. Because it's 100% fat, it has a far higher smoking point than butter (you can't cook popcorn in normal butter), and it also means it can be stored in the pantry without spoiling.

The removal of the water from the butter is also the reason why the popcorn stays crispy for days - unlike when you douse it with normal melted butter.

If you skip making Popcorn Butter, you MUST use normal oil to cook the popcorn, do not use normal butter. Then douse the popcorn with normal melted butter but it does soften and is certainly no good the next day. Use leftover ghee in Daal, Tikka Masala, Butter Chicken, or any other recipe that calls for ghee, or in place of cooking oil for any Indian recipe.

2. Saffron Powder - Found in the herbs and spices section of supermarkets. Get the cheap saffron powder which is not 100% saffron and has coloring added. Don't get the expensive saffron powder which is pure ground saffron!

3. STORAGE: Stays crisp for 2 to 3 days in an airtight container. It can even be kept for 4 days if you have a super airtight container.

Gas prices mixed

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 7.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.90 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 31.2 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 0.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.29 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 2.5 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.28 per gallon. The national average is up 14.9 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 2.2 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 7.2 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.56 per gallon.

"We've seen somewhat of a mixed week at the pump with some states seeing gasoline prices rise, while others have stabilized for the time being. The good news as of late has been the continued decline in average diesel prices, which fell over a penny per day last week," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "Oil prices have seen a bit of a rally, finishing last week at nearly \$80 per barrel again as Chinese demand starts to jump as expected, but with Covid cases and deaths now also surging in China, the jump in demand could be short-lived. Gas prices may nudge up slightly in the week ahead in some areas, while others could hold flat. The window on price drops however, appears to be coming up on the horizon as we get closer to what's likely to be a significant refinery maintenance period ahead of summer."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Lessons from Lesotho-A Biblical foundation

On December 7-21, 2022, FBC Friona sent a mission team of six members, all from Friona, to serve the Lord in Lesotho, Africa. This small country in the southern part of the continent is a place of great gospel opportunity and need. It was a privilege to lead this team and my January articles will reflect on Lessons from Lesotho. One of the main objectives of the mission trip was to conduct a three day training on Biblical hermeneutics (biblical interpretation) for church leaders. I took the lead in teaching the 18 pastors and church leaders who attended while others on our team helped the training to run smoothly and some prepared for ministry outreaches later in the week. The pastors from Lesotho were all bivocational pastors who faithfully pour their lives into serving the Lord and their churches the best they can. The purpose of doing a training on Biblical interpretation was to give these

leaders a better biblical foundation for their lives and ministries. As the training flew by, the men eagerly soaked up God's word, and were equipped with principles and methods to help them better handle the scriptures and teach to their churches. In the midst of this aspect of our trip, the need for a solid biblical foundation was so apparent in Lesotho, as there is little to no access to theological training, but there was a great hunger for the Lord's truth. These pastors exemplified the desire to be obedient to 2 Timothy 2:15 (ESV) which says, "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth." Rightly handling the Word of God is dependent upon having a firm biblical foundation, and it is a need in Lesotho, but also a great need in Friona. Building your life on the word of God begins with regularly reading the Bible, and allowing the Holy Spirit to teach you as you read, and being obedient to the Lord's commands and leading.

Some wonder if it could be people who were true believers, totally faithful, loval and obedient to God, like Abraham, Moses, Elijah, Enoch. I wondered if women like Rahab and Mary might be among the 24. One lady in class pointed out that David, the man after God's own heart, "did not ascend into the heavens" (Acts 2:34), but he will ascend when Jesus comes back (Job 14:12). David is someone you would think would be among the 24, so she wondered if these 24 won't be

complete until after Jesus comes back.

I believe the 24 are some of the most Godly people; they have made mistakes, but they repented and became the peo-

ple God desired them to be. Whoever they are, I agree with my mentor Stephanie Saylor who says all believers will be represented by the 24.

While we may not know who the 24 are, Scripture tells us how some of them earned their crowns of righteousness. 1 Corinthians 9:24-25 refers to an athlete who "exercises self-control in all things." Philippians 4:1 encourages us to stand firm in the Lord." 2 Timothy 4:7-8 encourages us to fight the good fight, finish the race, keep the faith. 1 Peter 5:1-4 tells us we are to shepherd God's flock by willingly exercising oversight, doing it eagerly, and by being an example. James 1:12 says, "Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love Him."

I don't know if my class member is right about the 24 being incomplete, but shouldn't we live our lives as if we are a candidate to be one of the 24? If the 24 are already sitting on their thrones around God, shouldn't we live our lives in a way to make God wonder if He should kick

someone out and include us in the 24?

He has told us what we need to do to earn our crown of righteousness; we just need to choose to live that life. If we truly believe and earnestly follow Jesus' two greatest commandments to love the Lord with all your heart, soul, strength, and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself (Luke 10:27), we can exercise self-control, stand firm in the Lord, fight the good fight, keep the faith, finish the race, and shepherd God's flock as Jesus shepherds us through His Word, and we can be qualified to be one of His 24.

Seek and Find

On January 18, 1803, President Thomas Jefferson requested a congressional authorization of \$2,500 to underwrite an expedition by Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, to determine the expanse of the country. According to History.com, the cost ramped up to \$50,000; an equivalent of \$1,177, 765 in contemporary currency.

Sixteen months later, the two explorers, along with a company of fifty, set out on their mission. It included a former African American slave "and a female Native American guide named Sacagawea. The team, which Jefferson called the Corps of Discovery, first surveyed the territory that comprised the Louisiana Purchase, a vast expanse that reached as far north as present-day North Da-



kota, south to the Gulf of Mexico and stopped at the eastern border of Spanish territory in present-day Texas. The team then crossed the Rockies and navigated river routes to the Pacific coast of presentday Oregon. Upon their return, the duo's reports of the exotic and aweinspiring new lands they had encountered sparked a new wave of westward expansion,"

as reported by History. com.


