Lesly Alvarado is a senior at Kelton ISD. She is very outgoing and will achieve many things in life. Lesly in





Merely (from Page 1) though incomplete, enables me to solve more effectively (though I suppose you, reader, could be the judge of that) the problem at hand, that is, the composition of this piece. In recent months I have been experimenting with the concept of orderliness as a facilitator to my accomplishing any work. And I have found that an ordered environment lends itself to more efficient work, and inversely, a disordered environment tends to bleed efficiency. One part of me believes this is true for

Wills (from Page 1) cial studies teacher. He held the same position in Hartley, Bovina and New Deal, where he was also head basketball, baseball, and track coach. While coaching at Hartley, he met the person he would build the rest of his life with, Evangeline Stinson. They were married April 8, 1955. His first job as an administrator was as the high school principal his last two years at New Deal. He moved the family next to Morse where he also coached all sports and was the superintendent. Bob and Evangeline both retired from education in 1987 in Wheeler after he spent 15 years serving as the high school principal. All of his 37 years as an educator were spent at small schools in the Texas Panhandle where he wore many hats – coached every sport (boys and girls), drove the athletic and regular route buses, served as the county tax assessor at one town, high school principal and superintendent. He treasured his time spent teaching/coaching at each of these small towns believing that you were able to make more of a difference and truly become a part of the community when you had a chance to get to know not only his students/players but their families as well. His athletic teams won several district and regional championships in all sports and he coached several state track competitors and champions along with state appearances in football and basketball. He remained passionate about the importance of education and also the role athletics can play in children's lives until his death.

Bob and Evangeline were both very involved in the community especially in Wheeler having lived over 40 years there. They were members of the First Baptist Church and especially enjoyed the work and fellowship of the mission trips of which they were a part. They were both Sunday School teachers for many years. Bob was a Scoutmaster for the Boy Scouts for over 20 years. He and Evangeline helped start the Meals on Wheels program and volunteered their time with this organization until their move to Mansfield. He loved being a member of the Lions Club

all people – after all, cars are typically sold bereft of clutter, which I strongly believe is a large part of their appeal – but I also make allowance for the possibility that orderliness is not important to all people, or at least it is not important to the same degree for all. Some people seem to be unaffected by disordered environment; indeed some may appear to thrive in it. And there are others who seemingly become overwhelmed by the disorder, and for these individuals, disorder stifles or limits their ability to reason, to form conclu-

sions, and even to act. I tend to fall in this latter category. I could have begun writing this column with scattered papers and other items all around me, but I determined it would be easier and yield a more favorable result if I took the time to straighten up prior to my beginning this piece. Again, this is something relatively new to me, but I tend to believe it is worth the time and trouble. If it took me 15 minutes to clean up the desk prior to my beginning this piece, essentially I am wagering that I will either conclude writing it at least 15 minutes more quickly than if I hadn't tidied up, or that the quality of the piece will be enhanced by a margin that renders the time investment worthwhile. Or, there is the possibility that both of those benefits will be realized, that is, it will be a net time gain, with an increase in quality to boot. That is a synergistic effect that has real, practical value. The nearest parallel I can think of, though perhaps not a particularly accurate one, is that of exponential returns, where the return is multiplied, or compounded, leaving the beneficiary with increasingly more of whatever is being measured, available to be used elsewhere.

There is another practical reason I believe it was worth cleaning up prior to this task of writing. It is the reality that my enjoyment in writing is enhanced as a result of operating in a more ordered environment. (Author's note: lest you misunderstand my notion of cleanliness and orderliness, there is still plenty of clutter about me as I write. I do not wish to give the impression that I am a tidy person by nature, or that I am operating in a sterile environment such as a surgical room or a research lab. After all, "clean" is a relative word.) This, too, has been a recent discovery for me, and a welcome eye-opener. Essentially it is the idea that if you are going to do an activity, and you have some discretion to effect it, why not do it in the manner that is most pleasant? This occurred to me when I noticed sometimes I was doing things that are typically enjoyable, such as reading, or watching something, in states that by default limited my enjoyment

of the activity, for instance, trying to read when I was too tired to get pleasure from it (not to mention comprehension), or watching something when there were other tasks looming over me, that were nestled in my awareness but not urgent enough to force me to do something about them, but that prevented full enjoyment of watching what I had decided to watch. I shall try to simplify the example: suppose I had a ritual of eating a bowl of ice cream each Friday night (I do not have such a ritual, but perhaps my subconscious is trying to tell me something). Which seems that it would yield more enjoyment: sitting and eating the bowl of ice cream in a relaxing way, after everything else has been tended to, or eating a spoonful each time I passed by the counter upon which the bowl rests, while I am focused on something else? Both acts would "check the box" as to completing the ritual, but the former would yield much more enjoyment than the latter. Essentially, the former yields a bigger "bang for the buck," and I have begun trying to identify situations like this where benefits can be multiplied or enhanced, and deliberately waiting until (or working toward) those circumstances that allow enhanced benefits or enjoy-

ment, rather than plowing ahead mindlessly, and feeling disappointed later. So, I am pleased that my desk has the appearance of tidiness for now, regardless of whether it is an illusion. And looking at the clock as I conclude this piece tells me that the total time invested in cleaning and writing is less than what I typically spend on writing alone, so that particular benefit of cleaning up appears to have been realized. As to the increase in quality, my gut tells me that is questionable in this particular case. Fortunately, the Times audience is merciful, and should the time I spent cleaning fail to be justified in terms of quality of output, I may never know the difference.
