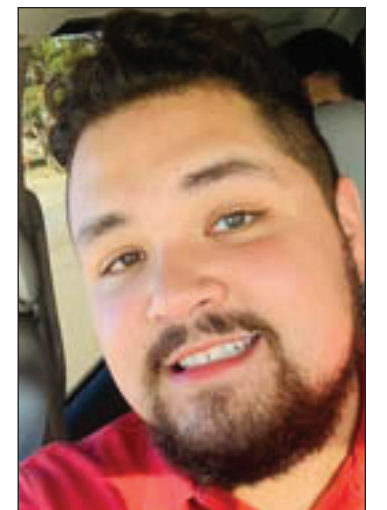

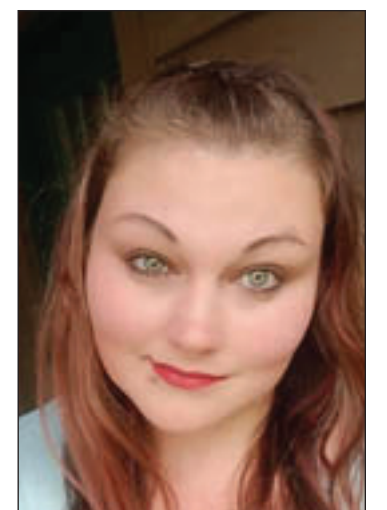

Merely Mustard

I recently read something that was a bit troubling, and a bit motivating. It was an assessment that one of the major messages the culture conveys to each of us is that we don't matter and we can't rise above whatever conditions we find ourselves in; we are in a sense doomed to desperation. The assessment I referenced wasn't written in quite so bleak terms, but that is what it suggested. I have heard that claim before and reading it again was a nice reminder. Sadly, I believe it is generally true that that is the message we are handed down, or spoon fed from soci-

ety much of the time. The reason, I believe, is to keep us numb to our own potential, to stifle any lofty visions or dreams and, by virtue of those visions and dreams being deemed unattainable, keep us in a state of perpetual dissatisfaction. And what do the puppet masters do with this dissatisfaction? They set us up for a state of continuous dependency. And, they sell us things, of course. They separate us from our possessions. Clearly, they separate us from our money when we hand it over to them, as one compelled, under the guise that we will

be receiving the magic elixir that will lift us out of our current state, or the elixir that will numb the voice within, that continues to call each of us to elevate our conditions and reach for those dreams which have been planted within our hearts. I believe that we have dreams and visions bestowed upon us by God, and to a certain extent they are unique to each individual, and are a sort of divine mandate for us to hold on to and work toward. And holding on to the dreams often proves to be the more challenging task than manifesting them. And so the messaging we

receive, which is in opposition to the divine mandate, is one that stinks of nihilism — one that says: "Your dream does not matter; your vision is an illusion; your effort is fruitless; your struggle is meaningless." If this were true, who wouldn't hand over their time, money, attention, and aspirations for some false elixir? For pyrite peddled by charlatans? For counterfeit freedom, which is bondage masked as liberty? What difference would it make to retain our resources if nothing mattered? In the face of such frustration, we hand over our

dergoing health care treatment.

The Medical Center League House is a non-profit hospitality house that serves as a "home away from home" for patients and their families. It seeks to provide comfortable and affordable lodging in the caring environment of support and assistance. It features 31 hotel-like private rooms, with two queen beds in each room, a kitchen, dining room, living room, laundry room and prayer garden.

Wheeler County Farm Bureau worked with other county Farm Bureaus in Texas Farm Bureau District 1 to provide a \$2,000 scholarship this year for any individual or family who needs to stay at the League House but cannot afford the full per night room fee of \$50, according to Matt Moore, Wheeler County Farm Bureau president.

"If the folks are associated with Panhandle agriculture in any way, they are able to get financial assistance from this fund. They do not have to be Farm Bureau members. They just have to be involved in some phase of the vital ag industry that is so important to the Texas Panhandle," Matt Moore said.

In the past 10 years the League House has served over 150,000 guests, including guests from all 50 states and from seven counties.

Matt Moore said numerous small towns in the Panhandle still have a small hospital that is vital to the health of their communities, but major procedures, cancer treatments and births are still mostly handled in Amarillo. That results in numerous car trips every day from these small towns to go see the Amarillo doctor. The League House gives rural folks a place to stay, Matt Moore said.

Updated Property Tax Information Now Available for Texas Taxpayers

(Wheeler) — New and updated property tax information has just been compiled by (Wheeler Central Appraisal District) and is available now to assist taxpayers. This property tax information is current and covers a wide range of topics, such as taxpayer remedies, exemptions and appraisals, and has information for select groups, such as disabled veterans and persons age 65 or older.

"Whether you are a homeowner, business owner, disabled veteran or taxpayer, it's important you know your rights concerning the property tax laws," said Kimberly Morgan, Chief Appraiser of the Wheeler Central Appraisal District. "You can contact us about any property tax issues with full confidence that we will provide you the most complete, accurate and up-to-date available information to assist you."

This includes information about the following programs.

Property Tax Exemptions for Disabled Veterans - The law provides partial exemptions for any property owned by disabled veterans or surviving spouses and surviving children of deceased disabled veterans. Another partial exemption is for homesteads donated to disabled veterans by charitable organizations at no cost or not more than 50 percent of the good faith estimate of the homestead's market value to the disabled veterans and their surviving spouses. The exemption amount is determined according to percentage of service-connected disability. The law also provides a 100 percent homestead exemption for 100 percent disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and surviving spouses of U.S. armed service members killed in action.

Property Tax Exemptions - Non-profit organizations that meet statutory requirements may seek property tax exemptions and must apply to their county appraisal district by a specific date. Businesses that receive tax abatements granted by taxing units; ship inventory out of Texas that may be eligible for the freport exemption; store certain goods in transit in warehouses that are moved within 175 days; construct, install or acquire pollution control property; own and operate energy storage systems; convert landfill-generated gas; or store offshore drilling equipment while not in use may also be eligible for statutory exemptions.

Rendering Taxable Property - If a business owns tangible personal property that is used to produce income, the business must file a rendition with its local county appraisal district by a specified date. Personal property includes inventory and equipment used by a business. Owners do not have to render exempt property such as church property or an agriculture producer's equipment used for farming.

Appraisal Notices - Normally, taxpayers receive a notice of appraised value from the appropriate local county appraisal district. The city, county, school districts and other local taxing units will use the appraisal district's value to set property taxes for the coming year.

Property Taxpayer Remedies - This Comptroller publication explains in detail how to protest a property appraisal, what issues the county appraisal review board (ARB) can consider and what to expect during a protest hearing. The publication also discusses the options of taking a taxpayer's case to district court, the State Office of Administrative Hearings or binding arbitration if the taxpayer is dissatisfied with the outcome of the ARB hearing.

Homestead Exemptions - A homestead is generally defined as the home and land used as the owner's principal residence on Jan. 1 of the tax year. A homestead exemption reduces the appraised value of the home and, as a result, lowers property taxes. Applications are submitted to the appropriate local county appraisal district.

Productivity Appraisal - Property owners who use land for timberland production, agricultural purposes or wildlife management can be granted property tax relief on their land. They may apply to their local county appraisal district for an agricultural appraisal which may result in a lower appraisal of the land based on production, versus market value.

Residence Homestead Tax Deferral - Texas homeowners may postpone paying the currently delinquent property taxes due on the appreciating value of their homes by filing a tax deferral affidavit at their local county appraisal district. This tax relief allows homeowners to pay the property taxes on 105 percent of the preceding year's appraised value of their homestead, plus the taxes on any new improvements to the homestead. The remaining taxes are postponed, but not cancelled, with interest accruing at 8 percent per year.

Property Tax Deferral for Persons Age 65 or Older or Disabled or Disabled Veteran Homeowners - Texans who are age 65 or older or disabled, as defined by law, or who qualify for a disabled veteran exemption may postpone paying current and delinquent property taxes on their homes by signing a tax deferral affidavit. Once the affidavit is on file, taxes are deferred, but not cancelled, as long as the owner continues to own and live in the home. Interest continues to accrue at 5 percent per year on the unpaid taxes. You may obtain a deferral affidavit at the appraisal district.

Notice of Availability of Electronic Communication - In appraisal districts located in counties with a population of more than 200,000 or that have authorized electronic communications, and that have implemented a system that allows such communications, chief appraisers and ARBs may communicate electronically through email or other media with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically instead of mailing.

Protesting Property Appraisal Values - Property owners who disagree with the appraisal district's appraisal of their property for local taxes or for any other action that adversely affects them may protest their property value to the appraisal district's ARB.

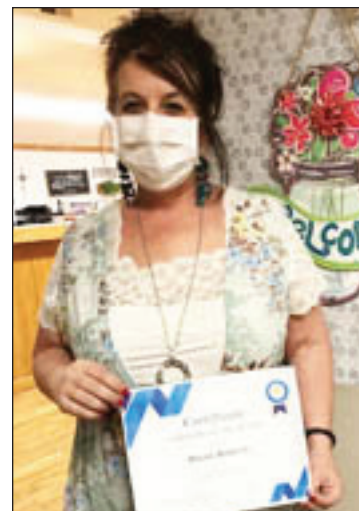

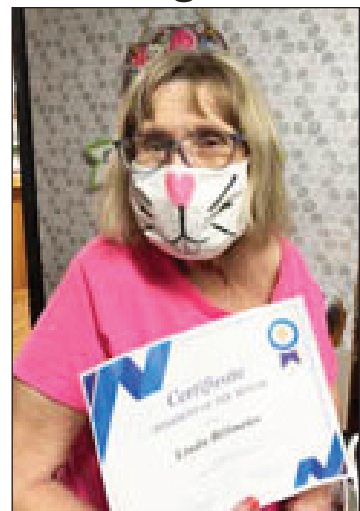
jewels of money, attention, time, and hope, until we are left to beg and receive whatever the puppet masters want us to receive, which serves to keep us on strings like marionettes.

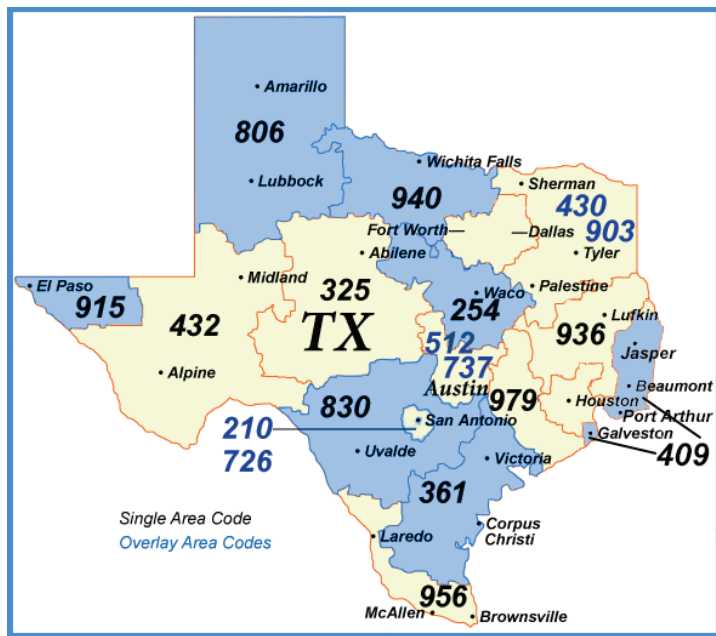
10 Digit Dialing Required In Certain Area Codes

Austin, TX – Starting on April 24, 2021, Texans with phone numbers in the 254, 361, 409, 806, 830, 915 and 940 area codes should get in the habit of dialing 10-digits (area code + telephone number) for all local calls.

On July 16, 2020, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) issued an Order (FCC 20-100) approving 988 as the three-digit abbreviated dialing code for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. The Order requires all telecommunications providers (including telecommunications carriers, interconnected Voice over Internet Protocol [VoIP] providers, and one-way VoIP providers [covered providers]) to make any network changes necessary to ensure 988 access by July 16, 2022.

Several Texas area codes (254, 361, 409, 806, 830, 915 and 940) have numbers with a 988 prefix. Therefore, those areas must transition from seven-digit to 10-digit local dialing. (Areas shown in yellow on this map are not affected by this change.)

April 24, 2021 marks the beginning of a "permissive dialing period" in which callers



in those area codes can still complete a call with seven-digit dialing. When that period expires on October 24, 2021, only calls dialed with ten digits will be connected.

After the permissive dialing period, local calls dialed with only seven digits will reach a recording prompting them to hang up and dial

again using both the area code with the seven-digit telephone number.

What other changes need to be made?

Important safety and security equipment, such as medical alert devices, and alarm and security systems must be programmed to use 10-digit dialing. Many systems operate on 10-digit dialing by default, but some older equipment may still use seven-digits. Please contact your medical alert or security provider if you are not sure whether your equipment needs to be reprogrammed to accommodate the upcoming change to 10-digit local dialing. Any needed reprogramming of alarm and home security equipment must be done during the permissive dialing period from April 24, 2021 to October 24, 2021 to

avoid interruption of those services.

Some other examples of services that may need to be re-programmed are:

- life safety systems or medical monitoring devices
- PBXs
- fax machines
- Internet dial-up numbers
- fire or burglar alarm and security systems or gates
- speed dialers
- mobile or other wireless phone contact lists
- call forwarding settings
- voicemail services and other similar functions

Customers should also ensure the area code is included in all other places where a telephone number is displayed like their websites, personal and business stationery, advertising materials, personal and business checks, and even personal or pet ID tags.

What will remain the same?

- Telephone numbers, including current area code, will not change
- The price of a call, coverage area, or other rates and services will not change due to the dialing change
- What is a local call now will remain a local call regardless of the number of digits dialed

Customers will continue to dial 1+ the area code + telephone number for all long-distance calls

Customers will continue to dial a prefix (such as "9") when dialing from a multi-line telephone system (e.g., in a hotel, office building, etc.) as required

Customers can still dial just three digits to reach 711 (relay services) and 911 (emergency services)

If 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, or 811 are currently available in one's community, they can still be dialed with just three digits

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline can still be reached by dialing 1-800-273-TALK (8255) even after the 988 code is in effect.

Beginning July 16, 2022, dialing "988" will route calls to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Customers must continue to dial 1-800-273-8255 (TALK) to reach the Lifeline until July 16, 2022.
