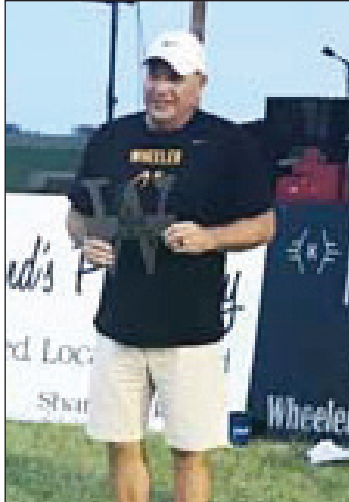

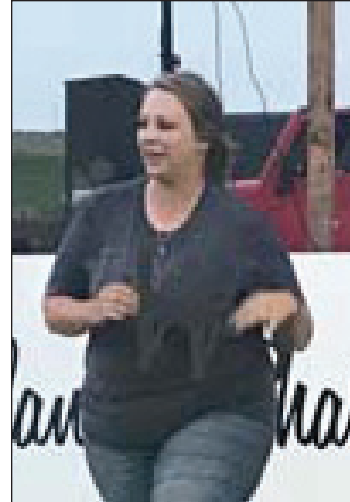

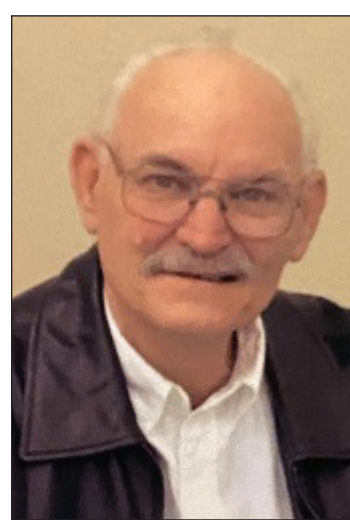

Merely Mustard

It is that time of year, when the cicadas, which have already begun to emerge, will soon be upon us in the thousands, along with the army of grasshoppers which descends each year, and sand burs – the triad of summer aggravations. I used to admire grasshoppers, many years ago, but now find them too numerous for me to enjoy, like the friend or neighbor who stops by too often for one to really enjoy seeing them.

The cicadas are a bit of a

phenomenon in that I can't understand how any individual cicada could find its particular mate by song, amidst the cacophony of sound of so many cicadas chirping simultaneously. The cicadas' presence does have its benefits though – it gives rise to the appearance of one of my favorite insects: the cicada killer wasp. Perhaps you have seen these before: one of the larger varieties of wasp/hornet type insects, with a dark body that has yellow rings on

the abdomen. I believe they live in little bores in the soil, and hunt cicadas for their larvae to feed on. Given my feelings toward their prey, I quite enjoy the cicada killers.

As for sandburs (grass burs, stickers, etc.), I have no need to explain my feelings toward them, and have not yet discovered their virtue. Perhaps they help hold the soil together.

A few days ago I saw a tiny cricket, in the nymph stage

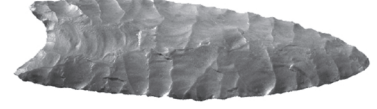

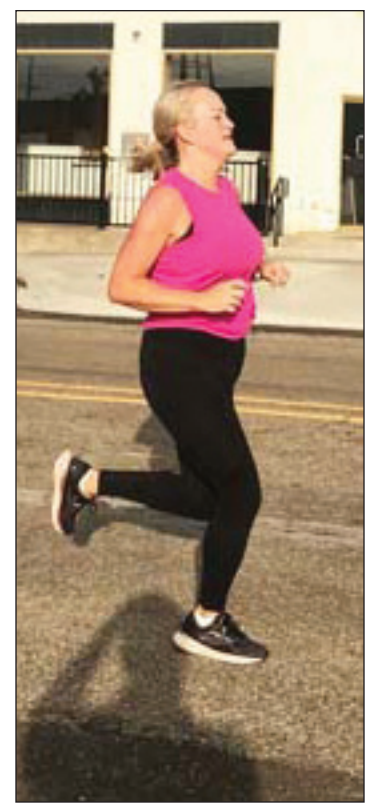
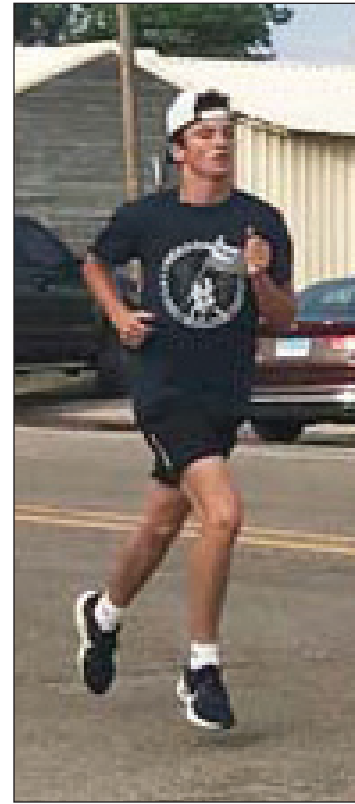

Golden Pheasant in March of 1989 which led to the end of the Nicaraguan forces in Honduran territory. Fourteen missions were processed and departed on his shift in less than 12 hours.

In December of 1989, Roger assisted in expeditiously processing and loading over 1600 Army troops, tanks, helicopters, ammunition, and supplies on 38 missions during Operation Just Cause which led to the capture and removal of Manuel Noriega as President of Panama.
