## Harried at housing

I am calling in reference to the housing situation. When we got here, we were told it would be a four to six month wait. So, we went out and rented an apartment.

We just found out today that it will be another five months, and we're at the seven month point today. We were told at one time that the renovation was going well. Now I guess things are at a standstill.

As each situation is different, it is difficult to give you a complete explanation as to why you and your family have experienced an apparent delay in receiving a housing assignment.

Forecasting housing turnovers continues to be more an art than an exact science, and the housing office uses many sources of information to aid in projecting housing availability.

Having renovation has complicated the process. Phase I and II of the project were

completed, and we were preparing to start Phase III when a housing survey, conducted by higher headquarters, determined the number of housing units on Reese exceeded the need of our assigned population. As a result, Phase III of the renovation project was canceled. In the meantime, the demand for base housing continued to increase and progression on the housing list all but halted.

We have since received approval to continue Phase III on a reduced scale. The progression of the third phase has further slowed advancement on the housing list as we have given approximately 36 families, currently living in units scheduled for Phase III renovation, the option of moving into previously completed Phase I, II or III homes.

As you can see, a number of unforeseen events have made forecasting unit assignments even more difficult than normal. I apologize for the inconvenience you and your family have experienced, but we are making house assignments as rapidly as possible. If you would like more specific information on your situation, please don't hesitate to contact the housing manager, Ron Crain, at 3913.

## Housing gates

I'm calling about the hours for the base housing gates that open on to Fourth Street. I'd like to know when they're open in the morning, or when they close for the afternoon and when they're open for the evening. It seems like there's not a set schedule.

The housing area gates at McGuire and George streets are scheduled to be opened from 6:00 a.m. until 9:00 a.m. and again from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. each duty day.

We will also open these gates on our "goal" days to facilitate the school children and spouses

who work off base. Please keep in mind the security police can get busy and the opening and closing of these gates may drop in priority. Usually, this affects the closing of the gates rather than the opening.

I live in Bldg. 220, and for the past week, when I've gotten up in the morning to go to work, the water in the showers has been cold. I understand the weather is getting chillier outside so people are using more hot water, but I've talked to people who live in other dormitories and they're having the same problem.

I went home today for lunch after aerobics class and thought maybe I'd be able to take a hot shower since nobody would be in the dormitory. When I stepped in, it was still really cold.

I'd like to know if this is a problem with the plumbing or if there is some other reason Bldg. 220 is not getting the hot water it should.

There are few things more aggravating than anticipating a hot shower and getting a blast of cold water!

Yours was a short-lived situation that was corrected Jan. 27. Two hot water recirculating pumps that provide hot water to the bathrooms malfunctioned successively. The first problem was identified Jan. 19 and as that pump was being replaced, a second pump was found to be bad.

# A month for smilin'

February is National Children's Dental Health Month. The Reese Dental Clinic has a few tips to help parents maintain their children's healthy smiles:

□ Put only water in a child's bottle for a nap or at bedtime.

□ Start brushing the child's teeth as soon as the first tooth appears (six months).

□ Brush and floss young children's teeth daily until they can be taught to do this alone. Then encourage them to brush and floss.

□ Take your child to see the dentist regularly. Schedule the first visit by the child's first birthday.

□ Ask your dentist about dental sealants. Sealants are used to protect the chewing surfaces of the child's back teeth.

The dental clinic also said a good diet is essential for children's growth, development and maintenance of a healthy body.

Like the rest of the body, the teeth, bones and the soft tissues of the mouth require nutrients supplied by

a well-balanced diet.

Many factors determine how foods affect the teeth. The more often a child snacks on foods containing sugar and starch, the greater the chance for tooth decay. Other factors include:

□ Frequency of snacks. Limiting the number of times you snack between meals will minimize the number of acid attacks on your teeth.

□ The amount of time the food is in the mouth. Foods such as hard candy and breath mints stay in the mouth a long time, leading to extended acid attacks on teeth.

□ The time of day a food is eaten. Carbohydrates eaten as part of a meal are less harmful to teeth than if eaten

alone. Foods eaten just before bedtime can stick to the teeth through the night.

□ What is eaten. Research indicates that certain foods, such as cheese, may help counter the effects of the acid produced by plaque bacteria.

Colonel Klein will assume duties as a special assistant to the 64th Support Group commander. He is scheduled to retire later this year.

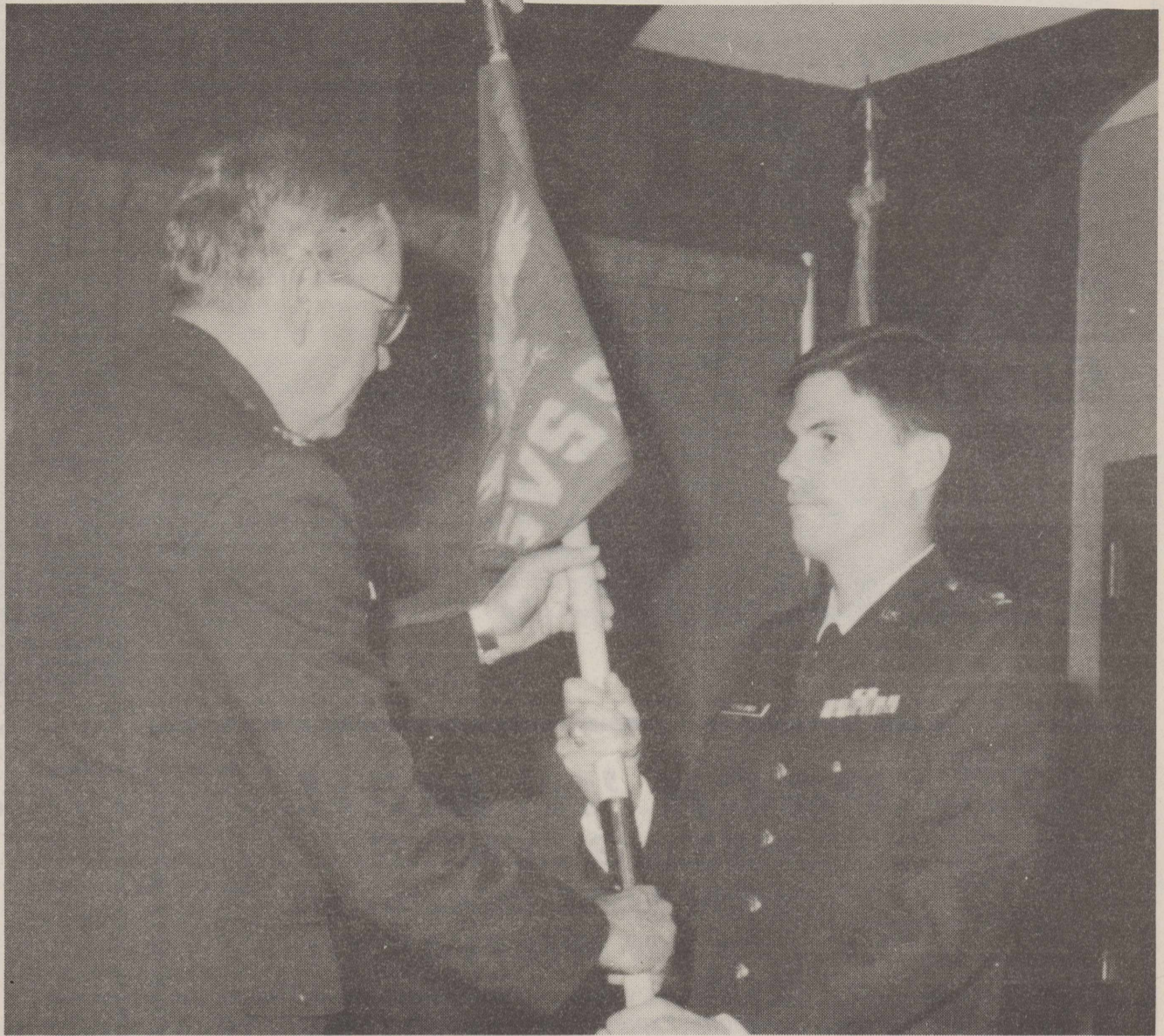

## Air Force opposes retirement cuts

WASHINGTON — The Air Force is challenging a Defense Finance and Accounting Service decision to recompute — and thereby lower — the pensions of 7,000 retired Air Force officers and enlisted people and 650 annuitants.

The move is related to the interpretation of a pay computation formula contained in the 1975 Tower Amendment. This provision protects against inversion of retired pay for members who stay on active duty after becoming eligible for retirement by treating retired pay as if it were based on an earlier, more advantageous retirement date.

The Air Force applied a decision by the Department of Defense Military Pay and Allowances Committee as a waiver to certain of those regulatory restrictions. That application is contrary to the current DFAS interpretation.

The adjustment could result in reductions ranging up to several hundred dollars per month depending upon rank and time in service, and could be effective as early as March 1.

"Air Force leadership is very aware of the hardship this pay recomputation could cause our retirees," said Brig. Gen. (Maj. Gen. select) Allen D. Bunker, deputy assistant secretary (budget), assistant secretary of Air Force-financial management and Air Force comptroller.

"Some Air Force retirees and their survivors have been receiving their checks for nearly 20 years, accepting in good faith that we calculated their retirement correctly.

"It's our responsibility to help our retirees, and working closely with the DFAS, we will do everything possible to ensure they are treated fairly," he concluded. (Air Force News Service)

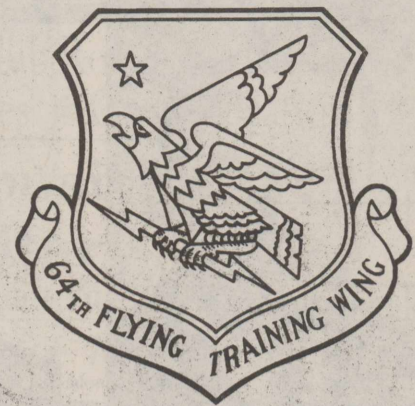

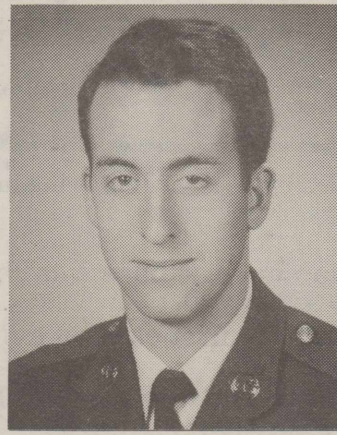

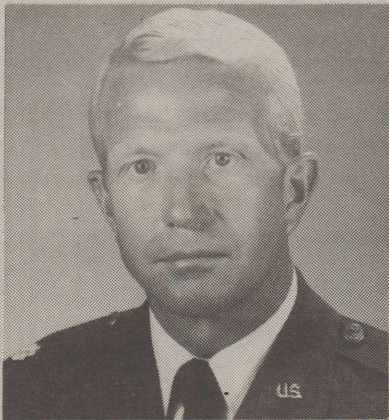

## Medical officers promoted

Three officers from the 64th Medical Group have been selected for promotion by the most recent medical/dental selection board, promotions officials announced Jan. 27.

Heading the list was Lt. Col. (Dr.) Thomas Loftus, MEDG commander. Colonel Loftus is a 17-year service veteran, and has been at Reese since July 1992.

Maj. (Dr.) David Armstrong, chief of hospital services, was selected for promotion to lieutenant colonel. Major Armstrong has been in the service eight years, two of them here.

The third promotee was Capt. Stephen Baker, who was selected for major's clusters. The captain, chief of pediatrics, has been in the military two years. He arrived at Reese in June 1992.

## Tax changes raise exemptions

WASHINGTON — Taxpayers looking ahead and planning for their 1994 taxes will find larger personal exemptions and standard deductions, plus wider tax brackets that begin at higher income levels, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Personal exemptions for 1994 will be raised \$100 to \$2,450.

The standard deduction for married couples will be \$6,350, an increase of \$150 over 1993. For single taxpayers the standard deduction will be \$3,800, an increase of \$100. The extra standard deductions for age and blindness will increase from \$700 to \$750 for married taxpayers and from \$900 to \$950 for singles. The minimum standard deduction for an individual who can be claimed as a dependent on another taxpayer's return will remain at \$600.

For married couples, the 15 percent tax bracket will extend up to taxable income of \$38,000, a \$1,100 increase. The 28 percent bracket will extend from \$38,000

to \$91,850, a \$2,700 increase. For singles the 15 percent bracket will rise \$650 to \$22,750 and the 28 percent bracket will go up \$1,600 to \$55,100.

Tax laws designed to phase out the tax benefits of personal exemptions and limit certain itemized deductions for high income taxpayers will change for 1994. The personal exemption phaseout will start for married couples with income above \$167,700 and above \$111,800 for singles. For 1993, the phaseout for couples starts at income above \$162,700 and above \$108,450 for singles.

The limitation on itemized deductions will affect taxpayers with income over \$111,800, up for the 1993 income level of \$108,450.

The threshold price above which the purchase of a luxury passenger car becomes subject to an excise tax will rise to \$32,000 from \$30,000 for 1994. For more information, contact your unit tax advisor or Capt. Michael Welsh at 3505. (Air Force News Service)

The center's core programs help people adapt to the demands of Air Force life. Many helpful programs are described in the recently-revised pamphlet, "Your Air Force Family Support Center."

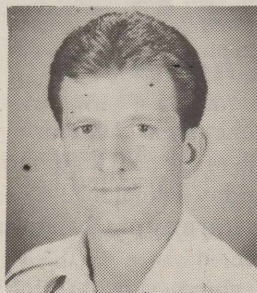
In addition to information, referral counseling and follow-up, the programs include the personal financial management program, Air Force Aid Society, career focus program, family life education and the transition assistance management program.

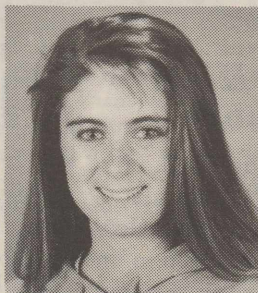

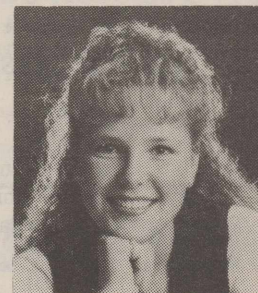

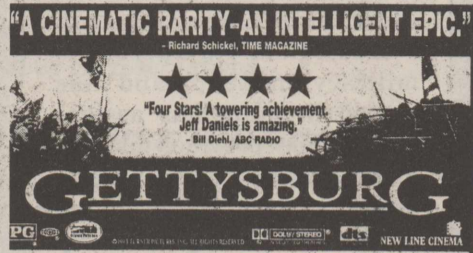

# THEN and NOW!

*Cream Of Wheat Celebrates 100 Years*



This painting "Fifty-Fifty," is among the over 500 works created for the Cream of Wheat advertising campaigns from 1899-1938. These illustrations helped to popularize Cream of Wheat during the "Golden Age of Illustration."

(NAPS)—A nutritious hot breakfast cereal is now celebrating its 100th birthday. Here's a tasteful look back:

**THEN:** The cereal, created in 1893, owes its existence to a fledgling flour mill that was near failure due to the Financial Panic of 1893. The Diamond Flour Mill, a three-year-old entrepreneurial venture, was located in Grand Forks, N.D.

The head miller, Thomas Amidon, frequently brought home leftover "middling"—the nutrient-dense part of the wheat kernel—and cooked a tasty, hot breakfast porridge. Amidon believed this wheat farina could be a popular packaged food item and set out to convince mill owners, George Bull, George Clifford and Emery Mapes.

Succumbing to Amidon's persistence, they allowed him to produce an experimental ten cases. Amidon quickly set up a sterilizer and hand-crafted 360 boxes at a rate of 30 to 35 an hour. Mapes designed the box labels from a printing plate he retained from his years as a printer. Clifford suggested the name Cream of Wheat since the cereal was made

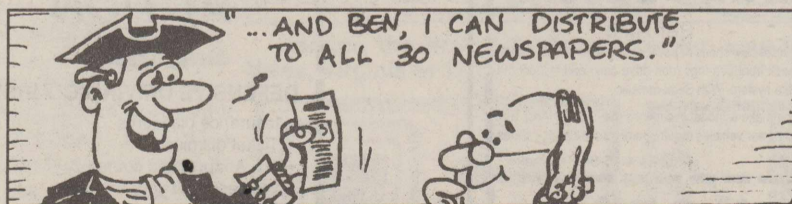
from the best part of the wheat, as in "Cream of the Crop."

The company shipped the first ten cases to New York and within 24 hours received a telegram stating: "Never mind flour, send us a car of *Cream of Wheat*." The North Dakota millers had begun their switch from the flour business to cereal success.

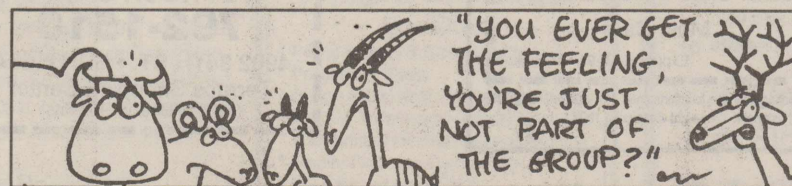

## Persian Gulf Veterans Honored

*Congress Authorizes U.S. Mint To Design And Strike A National Medal*



This finely detailed 1-1/2 inch bronze Persian Gulf Veterans National Medal is a duplicate of a silver version to be minted and distributed to the men and women of the U.S. Armed Forces who have served, and continue to serve, in a combat zone during the Persian Gulf Conflict. The medal was authorized by Congress to thank the veterans of the Persian Gulf Conflict for their contribution to our military efforts.

(NAPS)—The men and women of the United States Armed Forces who served in the Persian Gulf Conflict—and who continue to serve in the Persian Gulf—are being honored for the sacrifices they have made and for their service to our country with the United States Mint's Persian Gulf Veterans National Medal. By purchasing a bronze version of the medal, Americans nationwide can show their support and help speed the award of a silver version of the medal to Persian Gulf Veterans.

Public Law 102-281, passed by the Congress and signed by the President, specifies that the silver presentation medals will not be minted and distributed until such time as adequate funds are received to cover the cost. When enough funds have been accrued, either through the sale of bronze versions of the Medal or from private donations, each U.S. veteran, or their next of kin, who served in the Persian Gulf Conflict, will receive a silver version of the Persian Gulf Veterans National Medal.

According to the Public Law, the Department of Defense is responsible for establishing the eli-

gibility requirements for award of the silver medal and the distribution of the medals to the recipients.

Two display options of the bronze version of the medal are available for sale. The Presentation Package features the medal in a handsome velvet presentation case in a special protective sleeve. The Collector's Package comes with the medal in a unique envelope and includes an easel for displaying the medal and an attractive informational tent card. Both options include a Certificate of Authenticity. Mail order prices directly from the U.S. Mint are \$15.50 for the Presentation Package and \$12.50 for the Collector's Package.
