Vice chairman to address JSUPT Class 96-04

Gen. Joseph W. Ralston, vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, will be the guest speaker for today's graduation ceremony for Joint Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 96-04.

Eighteen JSUPT students will receive their pilot wings during the 9:30 a.m. ceremony in the Simler Theater.

The general assumed duties as vice chairman on March 1. He previously served as commander of Air Combat Command, Langley Air Force Base, Va.

A graduate of the University of Miami with a Master of Arts degree from Central Michigan University, Ralston has also completed the Army

Command and Staff College, the National War College and study at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, Mass.

He entered the Air Force in 1965 with a Reserve Officer Training Corps commission. Ralston earned his pilot wings at Laughlin AFB, Texas, in 1966.

Throughout his career, the general has served in a variety of command and staff positions, including: commander of the 64th Tactical Training Wing, MacDill AFB, Fla.; director of Tactical Programs, Office of the Secretary of the Air Force; commander of Alaskan Command; and deputy chief of staff for

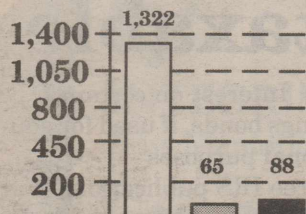

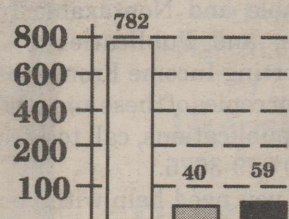

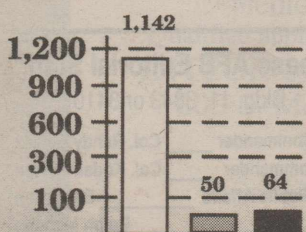

19th AF commander sets visit

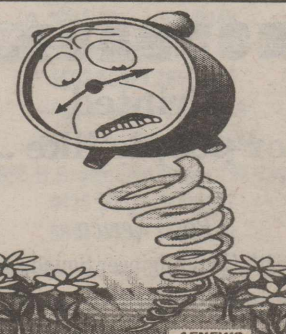
Maj. Gen. Thomas W. West, 19th Air Force commander, is scheduled to visit Reese Air Force Base April 11-14.

It shouldn't hurt to be a child

Reese Family Advocacy says stress is top cause of child abuse

Discipline is a challenge for many parents. Without planning, discipline may be ineffective or even harmful.

I know we have all heard the commercials or seen the ads telling us to "take a moment, count to ten, before you take it out on your child." But, then we forget about it or think, "I don't have children", or "It doesn't apply to me." Right? Wrong!

Child abuse affects everyone and it can be prevented or stopped through the combined efforts of schools, neighbors, families and community support.

In 1995, the Texas Child Protective Services had 2,305 cases of substantiated abuse or neglect reported to their office ... that was in the city of Lubbock alone. In the military, we tend to feel that we and our children are protected from this, but last year at Reese, 36 cases of abuse and neglect were reported to the family advocacy office. Of those, 21 were substantiated cases. So far this year there have been seven cases of abuse or neglect reported here.

When many of us think about child abuse we tend to envision physical abuse, but abuse is any maltreatment or neglect that results in harm or in-



jury to a child. Child abuse can include: physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse or neglect.

Although there is no "typical" child abuser, as they come from all economic, ethnic and social groups, there are cer-

tain traits that are common. These include low self-esteem and poor control over emotions. They may have a personal history of being abused. Stress is usually the major factor in child abuse.

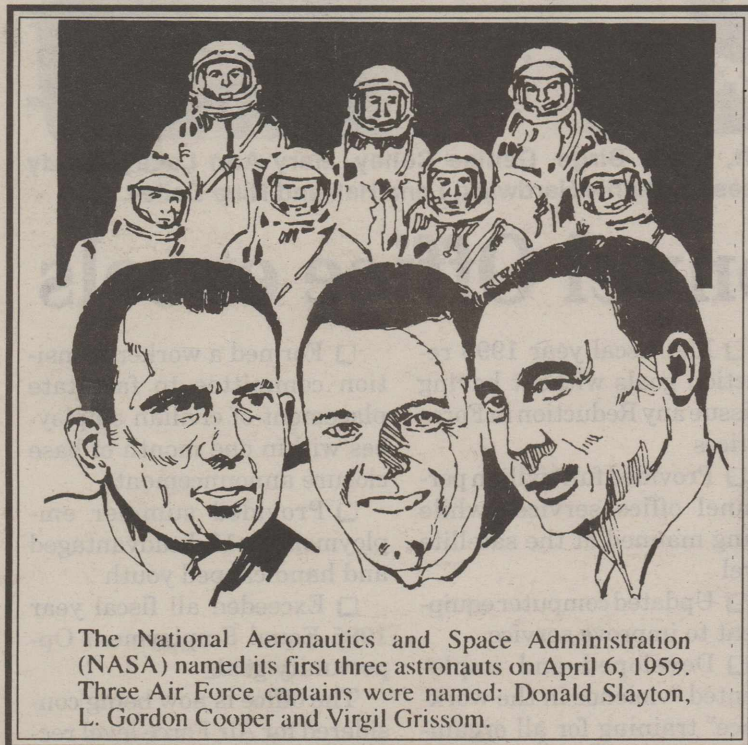
Stress can push even the strongest person to their limit. Learning how to manage anger and frustration can improve family relations and can be vital for personal health.

Here are some tips for coping with stress: recognize feelings, find out what causes anger and frustration then find an appropriate outlet for them; find sources of support, and learn more about parenting; but, most of all, don't be ashamed or embarrassed to get help if necessary.

People who spend time around children need to be alert and notice signs that the child may be abused. Look for physical signs, dramatic changes in the child's behavior, the child's appearance and listen. The child may talk about being abused.

The key is to take any suspicion you may have seriously. Signs like these may not always mean abuse, but it's better to find out for sure. Getting help for yourself or another person can protect the child from further harm and help the family return to healthy functioning.

IRS outlines what's taxable

Did you know the Internal Revenue Service considers lottery winnings taxable income? But military allowances and portions of Social Security benefits aren't considered income for federal tax purposes?

IRS officials admit determining what is income and what isn't can be extremely confusing when doing your 1995 federal tax returns.

Generally, said IRS officials, taxable income includes:

- Wages, salaries and tips
- Cash and noncash prizes
- Alimony
- Certain state and local income tax refunds
- Social Security benefits, above certain limitations

- Royalties
- Interest
- Dividends
- Recovery of items deducted in a previous year; and
- Cancellation of debts by a financial institution, government agency or credit union

On the other hand, said IRS officials, nontaxable income includes:

- Portions of Social Security benefits, annuities and pension benefits
- Certain foster care payments
- Alimony, if not deducted by the payer
- Child support
- Certain income earned overseas; and

- Interest on certain U.S. savings bonds, if used for educational purposes

Free IRS publications that may help with taxable and nontaxable income include IRS Publication 17, Your Federal Income Tax; Publication 525, Taxable and Nontaxable Income; and Publication 531, Reporting Income From Tips.

CSAF challenges officers to 'think outside the box'

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman said Squadron Officer School is "a defining point" for company grade officers and he intends to speak to every class.

"When I attended SOS, not only did I learn to appreciate what others did in our Air Force, but I also came to appreciate their motivation and dedication," Fogleman told a recent class at the Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala.-based school.

Squadron Officer School is the first level of professional military education for company grade officers and Air Force has instituted a policy that all officers will attend SOS in-residence.

Fogleman stressed the importance of SOS for officer professional development and said he expects two things from all company grade officers.

First, he told them to learn

their jobs and focus on becoming experts in their specialties. And second, develop an understanding of what it means to be a military professional in the broadest sense of the term.

"The Air Force exists for one reason and one reason alone — to fight and win the nation's wars," Fogleman said. "As members of the profession of arms, we're charged with the employment of lethal combat power, and this requires each of us to have a strong foundation in the application of air power."

He challenged the students to "think outside the box," and look for new ways to apply the tools and techniques of their profession. He cited unmanned aerial vehicles and space-based surveillance platforms as examples of such innovations.

"One of the most important things I think you can do for professional development is

read," he said, and suggested biographies of military leaders such as Gen. George Marshall, Gen. George Patton and Brig. Gen. Billy Mitchell, and statesmen such as British Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

He also suggested two books about the development of the United States Air Force: *A Few Great Captains and Forged in Fire*.

SOS offers five, 7-week classes and one 4-week compressed class annually for a total of about 3,800 students.

The curriculum is divided into four major areas: officership; air and space power; leadership tools; and applications.

Students normally attend between their fourth and seventh years of commissioned service. In addition to active duty officers, attendees include guard, reserve and Air Force civilians.

Lt. Col. Free assumes command of 35th FTS

Cmdr. Hollyer commands new JSUPT squadron at Vance

Lt. Col. Jerry Free became the commander of the 35th Flying Training Squadron March 25.

Free succeeded Cmdr. John B. Hollyer, who became the commander of the 8th Flying Training Squadron, Vance Air Force Base, Okla., on March 28. At Reese, Hollyer became the first naval officer to command an Air Force flying squadron.

He was in charge of squadron readiness and served as chief of the wing standardization and evaluation section. In addition to being an instructor and evaluation pilot, he planned and executed numerous multi-aircraft deployment exercises and was the detachment commander of the Tactical Leadership Program.

Following pilot instructor training at Randolph AFB, Texas, in 1989, where he was the top graduate, Free was reassigned to Williams as a flight commander and later an assistant operations officer.

In 1991, Free was reassigned to Osan

AB, Korea, where he performed duties as chief of reconnaissance plans in the 603rd Air Control Center. While at Osan, he directed and coordinated many multi-national, joint-service exercises.

Free was reassigned to Randolph in 1992 where he was the manager of the bomber-fighter training program and chief of the executive programs office. He supervised joint training issues and was a key contributor to the Joint Primary Aircraft Training System program.

In 1994, Free was reassigned to Reese. He became the 35th FTS operations officer in October 1995.

Free is a command pilot with over 3,000 hours in the RF-4, T-38 and T-37. He received his masters degree from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University

in 1986, accomplished Air Command and Staff College in 1986, and Air War College in 1993.

Data verification essential to promotion process

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) — The computer-generated read-out of your Air Force career comes every time you're about to be-

gin studying for promotion. For some enlisted members, it brings back memories before being filed away. For others, it brings opportunity.

The opportunity, says Tech. Sgt. Rick Zarder, is to make corrections that could make, and have made, the difference in being promoted to the next highest grade.

"Everyone eligible to test for promotion receives a data verification record," says Zarder, who works for the Air Force Personnel Center's enlisted promotion branch here. "However, not everyone who gets a DVR takes the time to ensure all the information is correct."

Some 80,000-plus DVRs were sent out for the 1996 master sergeant and senior master sergeant cycles. Another 65,000-plus were recently sent out for the 1996 staff sergeant cycle. Now is the time to check the information and ensure the data is

correct, officials said.

The record printout, which arrives before a testing cycle begins, provides individuals with the information that will be used during Weighted Airman Promotion System testing, says Zarder. He emphasizes that uncorrected data have cost some people initial promotion selection.

"People receive points for time in service, time in grade, decorations and much more," explains Zarder. "If a DVR doesn't show a decoration or if any other information isn't valid, the individual needs to ensure that the error is corrected."

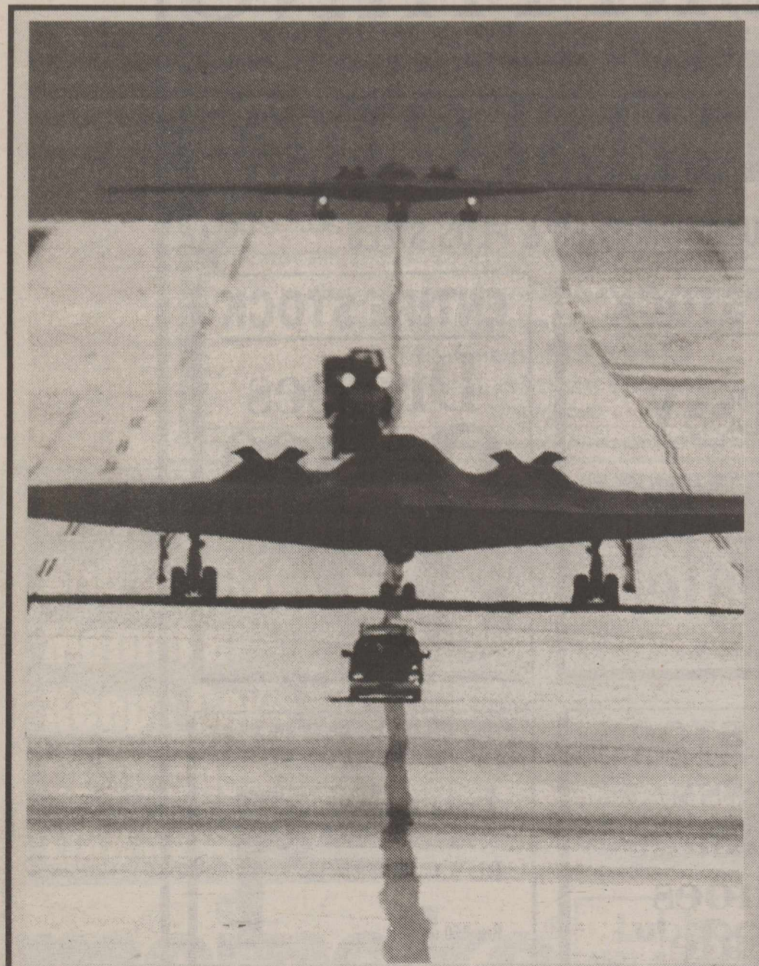
For some, the error can result in promotion, but Zarder warns that if there is an error and it wasn't identified before

promotion consideration, it will definitely be corrected after.

"The selection to promotion is tentative," he says, explaining that the records of all those who make it past the career fields' cutoff scores go through a 100-percent data verification process at the base-level.

"If an error is discovered and the change in WAPS score brings the member below the cutoff, the person is notified by their commander and the promotion is canceled," says Zarder. "If on the selection list there was an error, it will be found. So why go through the embarrassment of losing a promotion?"

The bottom line, say promotion officials, is to closely check computer printouts and ensure that all information is correct.

Exchange service announces policy changes

The Army Air Force Exchange Service has announced changes to its check and credit card policies.

AAFES has increased its administrative fee on dishonored checks from \$20 to \$25. AAFES officials said the \$5 per check increase went into effect Monday.

AAFES has held the line on the dishonored check fee since 1992, even though the number of returned checks and the cost of processing them has increased, officials said.

The increased processing fee will be used for administrative costs associated with returned checks and help protect AAFES contributions to the services' Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs.

In addition, AAFES outlets world-wide will begin accepting American Express cards on Monday.

The stores now accept Discover, Visa and MasterCard, AAFES officials said. AAFES mail order customers have been able to use the American

Express card for purchases since March 1.

Purchases with the government American Express card — that have been issued for use during official temporary duty — will be accepted for a limited range of merchandise and services, officials said.

One example is gasoline that is authorized on TDY orders.

Any purchase that exceeds the authorized levels for the government card must be approved by American Express, which monitors the contract.

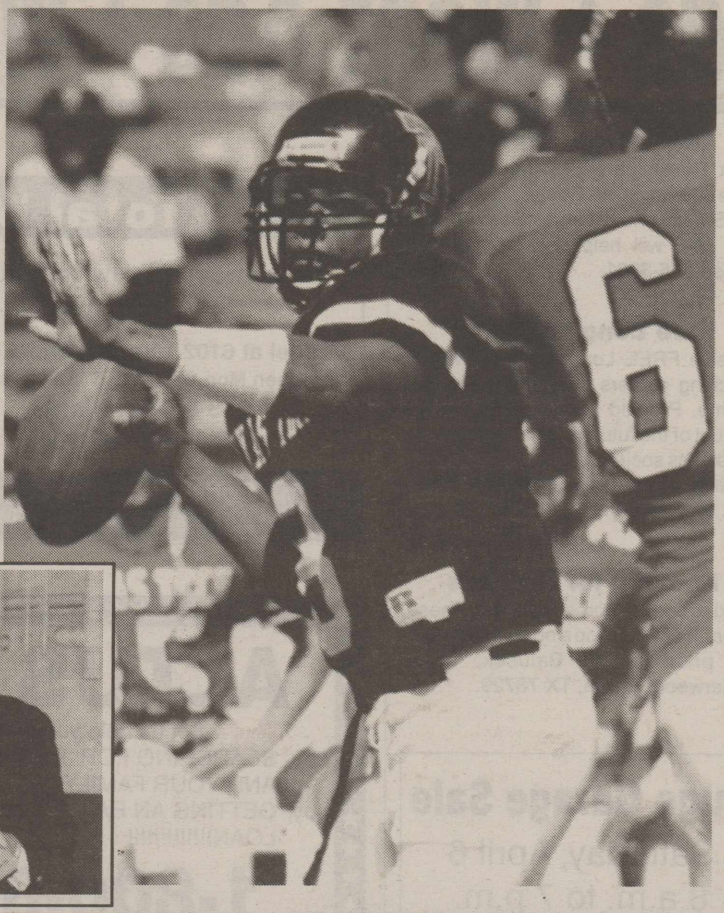

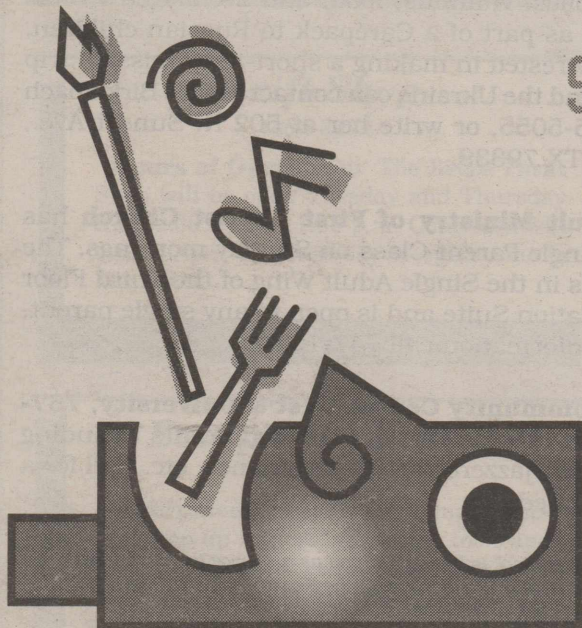
