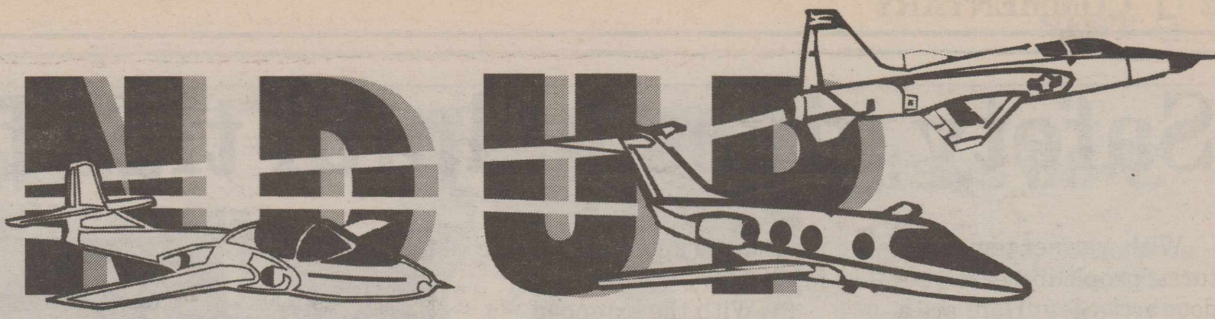

While the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds and the U.S. Army Golden

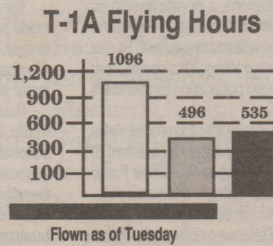
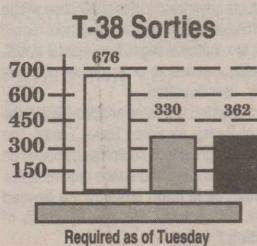
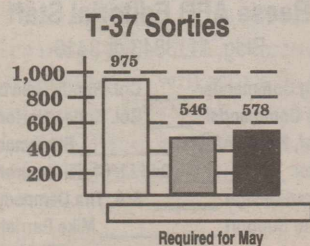
Knights demonstration teams will give spectators a window into the high-tech capabilities of today's military forces, it is you who represent the Department of Defense's most valuable resource — our people.

Safety gives helpful tips for outdoor fun

With warmer temperatures, people increase outdoor activities. Here are a few tips from wing safety on how to have a safe spring, leading into a safe summer.

□ Don't violate safety rules. Unsafe acts account for 98 percent of all mishaps at Reese.

□ Yard tools are not children play toys. These tools have sharp edges that can cause serious injuries.

□ Ensure your ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) outlets function as designed. The test button should be pushed and reset monthly.

□ Preplanning your Memorial Day Weekend activities can make your family outing safer for all involved.

□ Swimming in unautho-

rized lakes and ponds can be fatal.

□ With the extended hours of daylight, watch out for joggers during the early morning and evening hours.

□ With summer comes an increase in the number of motorcycles on the streets. The majority of collisions between motorcycles and automobiles are not the fault of the motorcyclists.

□ Most lawnmower mishaps happen when the operator fails to follow the manufacturer's safety instructions.

□ A water hose strung across a walkway can present a tripping hazard.

By keeping some of these safety tips in mind, you and those you care about can prevent accidents and injuries.

Perry sends armed forces message

Armed Forces Day is the day each year set aside to honor you, America's men and women in uniform. It's an honor you earn every day, everywhere in the world as you do the duty your nation asks of you. And your nation asks a lot.

Several times this decade your nation has called upon you and you have responded brilliantly.

In 1990-91, your nation asked you to fight aggression in the Persian Gulf: You worked with other nations to drive Saddam Hussein from Kuwait.

In 1992, your nation asked you to fight hunger and disease in Somalia: You provided humanitarian relief that saved thousands from starvation.

In 1994, your nation asked you to help bring stability to our hemisphere: You helped restore a democratically elected government to Haiti.

Last year, your nation asked you to bring security to the wartorn Balkans: Today, you are helping give peace a chance in Bosnia.

Whether you serve in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps or Coast Guard, the quality of your deeds and your devotion to duty sets a shining standard for all Americans.

On this Armed Forces Day 1996, your nation asks only that you accept the salute and heartfelt gratitude of your Secretary of Defense and your fellow citizens: We are very proud of each of you and your families!

Discrimination can cost you.

In conjunction with the new Air Force standards of accountability, from now on those who are found guilty of sexual harassment or unlawful discrimination based on color, national origin, race, sex, and/or religion, will have this information documented in their enlisted performance report or officer performance report.

The new policy went into effect April 3, 1996. It is not retroactive. Reese Air Force

Base personnel have no need to worry at present because there have been no open social actions case files since April 3.

Air Force enlisted evaluation policy states that evaluators must reflect substantiated or confirmed allegations of discrimination, to include sexual harassment, in the offender's EPR.

Current policy for officer evaluations states that evaluators must **consider** documenting substantiated discrimination in the OPR.

The new officer evaluation system Air Force Instruction 36-2402 will **require** evaluators to document any sub-

stantiated allegations of discrimination, to include sexual harassment, in the offending officer's OPR.

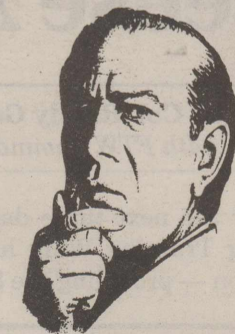
The more stringent standards for officers, which will be consistent with the EPR policy, take effect immediately throughout Air Education and Training Command.

Keep in mind that social actions will not confirm discrimination and/or sexual harassment until there is no doubt whatsoever that discrimination and/or sexual harassment occurred.

Air Force committed to operationalizing quality

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Air Force is taking steps to operationalize quality in a manner that will integrate, standardize and strengthen the program throughout the service.

"We have made a tremendous investment over the last

several years learning how to use the tools for process improvement. Now, it's time to reap the benefits by transitioning from a focus on training and planning to execution," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman.

"We exist to fight and win America's wars," he said. "If this program doesn't strengthen our ability to do that, or detracts from our ability to do that, then we have to seriously reconsider it."

"If you read the preamble to the quality charter, it says a

quality Air Force is an Air Force in which the senior leadership is committed to providing the environment in which people can achieve their full potential.

"We must continue to promote a working environment that inspires trust, teamwork and continuous improvement, while encouraging initiative and innovation," Fogleman said.

Fogleman said senior Air Force leadership is committed to operationalizing quality — making it a routine part of everyday life — much like safety.

To meet this challenge, Air Force is looking at ways to improve operational excellence. Additionally, the Air Force Quality Council chartered a "reengineering" study

that is looking into this; they will report their findings to senior leadership in June.

Other initiatives currently being developed include:

- Establish a blue ribbon panel to conduct an end-to-end review of assessment and award programs. This includes an analysis of how operational readiness inspections and Quality Air Force Assessments are conducted. The aim would be to reduce the number and cost while ensuring Air Force's ability to meet mission requirements.

- Keep the categories in the current Quality Air Force but ensure the criteria are more user friendly for the troops.

- Develop a strategic plan and conduct a unit self assessment for the Secretariat and Air Staff.

AF increases WAPS feedback

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas (AFNS) — For years the Air Force's enlisted corps looked at their promotion test scores and compared how they did against others Air Force-wide.

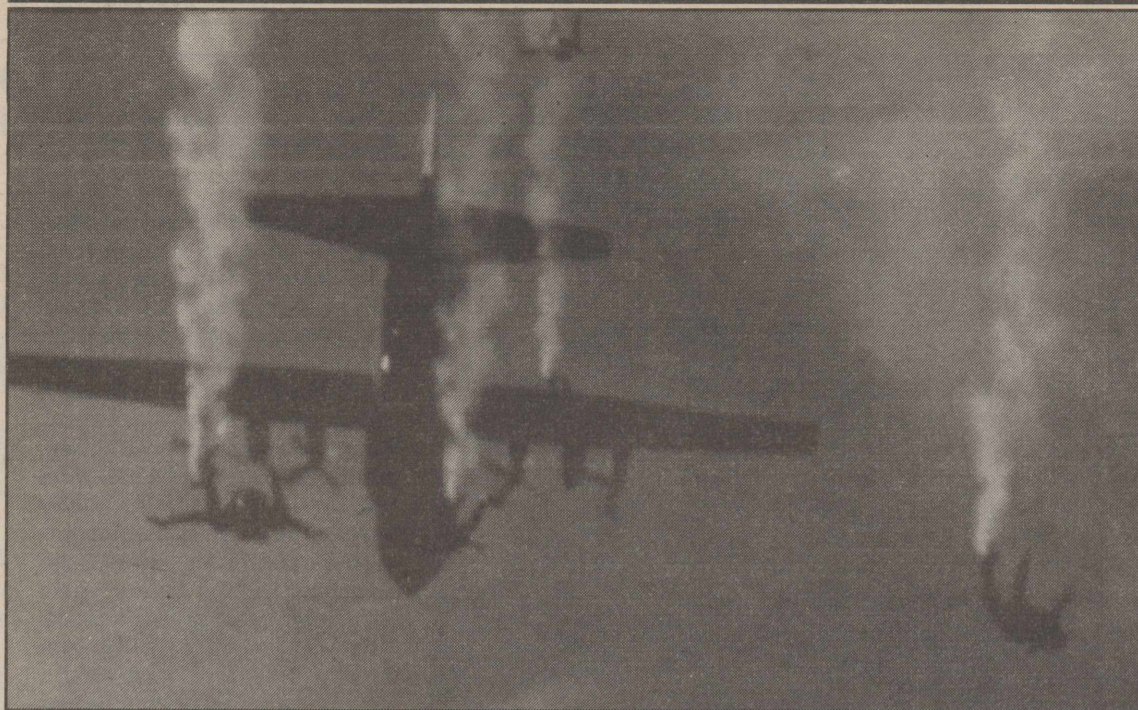
While the information was useful, say officials at the Air Force Personnel Center here, it didn't give individuals a "good feel" for where they stood among their peers in their own specialties.

The Air Force looks to improve its feedback beginning with the technical sergeants who tested for promotion under the Weighted Airman Promotion System. They will re-

ceive an enhanced score notice in late June, allowing them to see just how they stacked up against their counterparts.

"This is the first major change to the score notice in more than 20 years," said Chief Master Sgt. Constantine Sgagias of AFPC's enlisted promotions branch. "The feedback we provide through the score sheets is the cornerstone of WAPS. It makes WAPS a visible promotion system."

The visibility becomes clearer through the new score sheets that will provide the individual with numbers detailing how they scored within their Air Force Specialty.

This will be the last military air show at Reese. As such, it should reflect the legacy of excellence so many people have worked so hard to create. Do it right ... do it smart ... do it safe!

Reese Air Show officials urge spectators to observe "common sense" safety rules

Reese officials ask everyone attending the air show to observe the following safety rules:

□ No pets or alcoholic beverages may be brought into the air show area.

□ Don't smoke near the aircraft because of fumes from the fuel.

□ Do not climb on buildings or aircraft in order to get a better view or to take photos.

□ Safety pins in the landing gear of all aircraft must be left alone. Please don't touch the aircraft. All static display aircraft will have crewmembers available to answer questions.

□ For personal safety, visitors are advised to wear sunglasses and to use sunscreen.

□ Be a good neighbor.

Respect the rights of other visitors to enjoy the air show and the rest of the day's activities. Anyone causing a disruption of activities will be required to leave the installation.

□ Please dispose of all litter in trash containers. This will reduce the possibility of "foreign object damage" that can occur if an object is sucked into a jet engine.

□ Drink plenty of fluids during the day and minimize the intake of beer while in the sun. Free water is available at various locations.

□ It's a good idea for groups to designate a highly visible place to meet if separated in the crowd.

□ Young children and elderly persons should reduce their exposure to the sun to prevent heat sickness.

□ Anyone who is taking a prescription medicine should take the medication as directed by his or her doctor.

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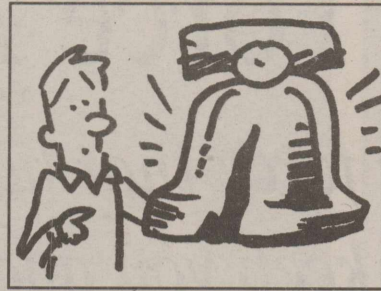

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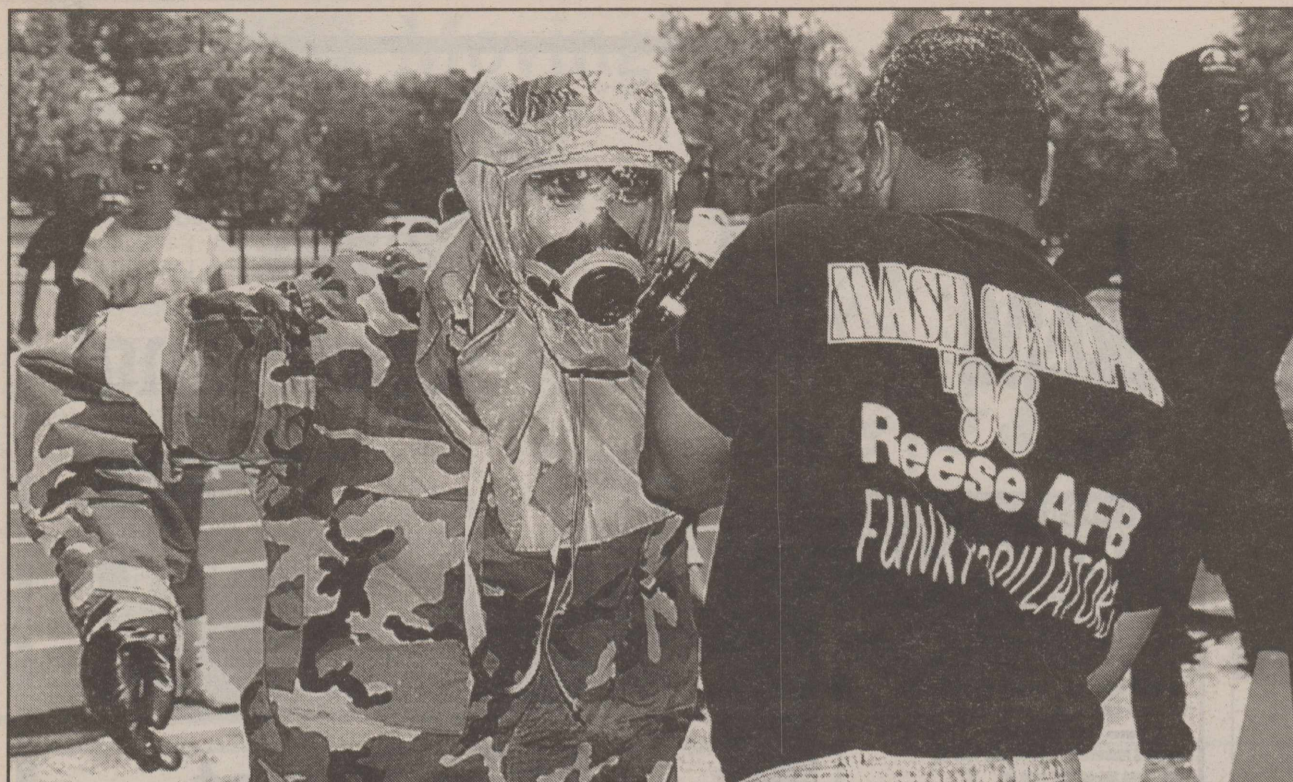
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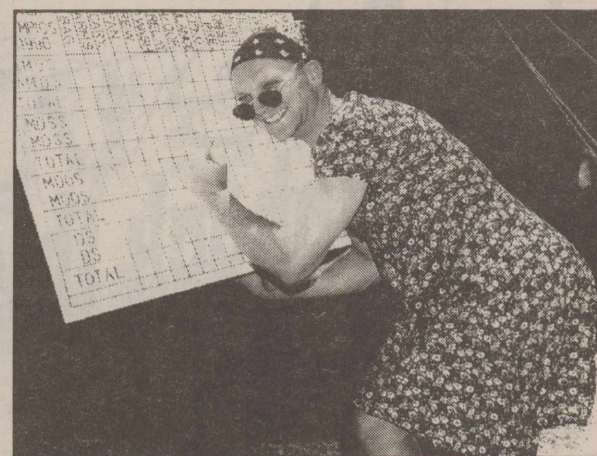

M*A*S*H* Olympics

64th MDG meets annual training requirements

If you weren't there—you missed it.

The 64th Medical Group held its annual training "competition," M*A*S*H* (Mobile Army Surgical Hospital) Olympics, under sunny skies at the base track May 9.

"It's a fun way to meet all of our annual training requirements, called Continuing Medical Readiness Training," said Master Sgt.

"Fun" events were aircrew, bed-pan and mobility bag relays, a Meal-Ready-to-Eat eating contest, and a trivia game—Jeopardy-style—regarding hospital procedures in wartime.

"It's a unique way to train," said Paschedag. "I think it went really, really well."

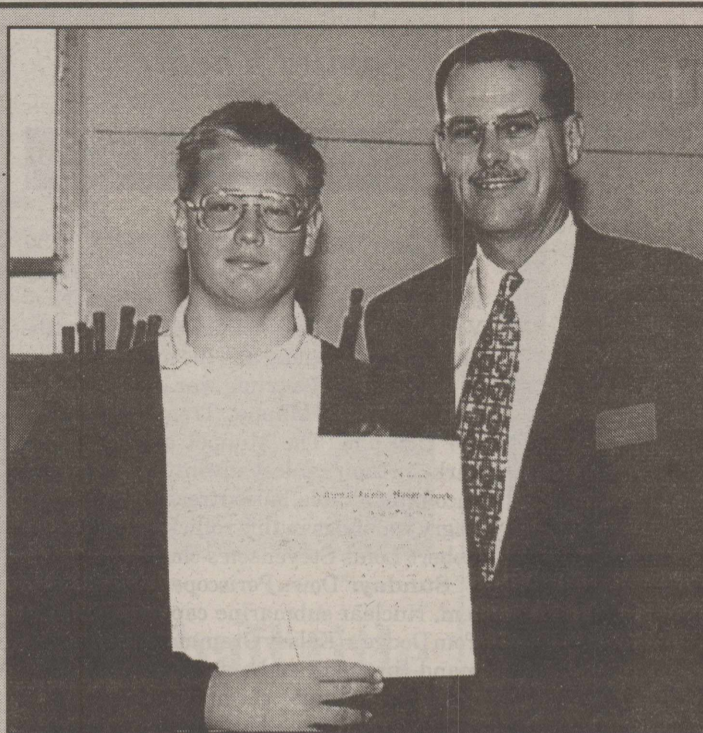

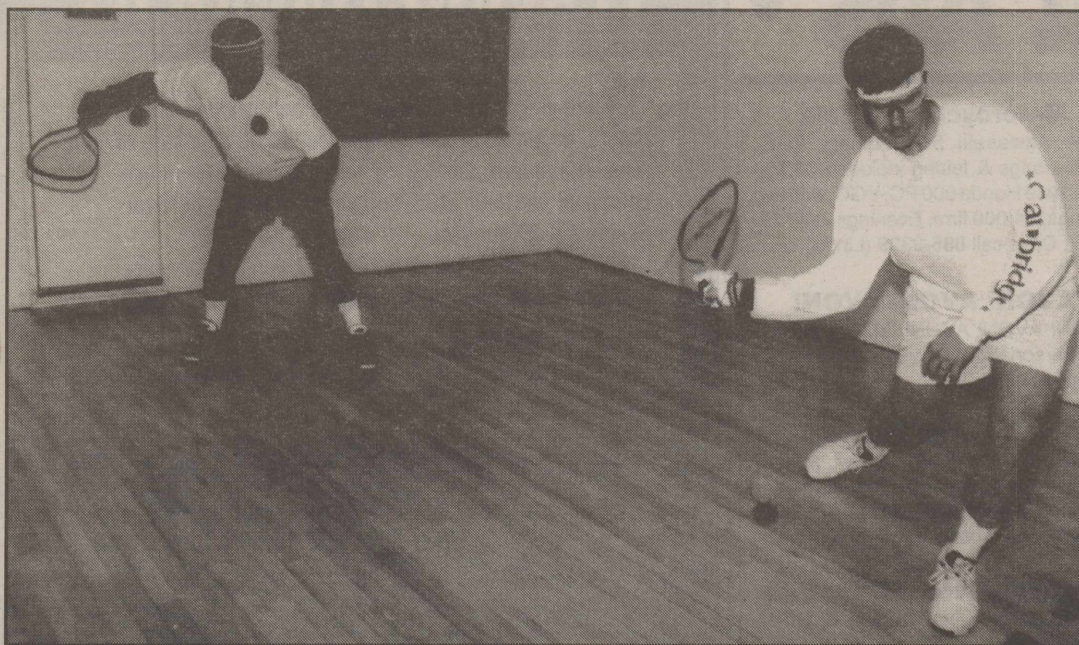
