The argument hitherto has proceeded on the admission that the parties went really into the water. Whether they stopped at the margin or stepped into the water is, in fact, as seen above, of but slight consequence. The pas-sage proves immersion only on the assumption that going into the water necessitates immersion as its object, which has been proven false. The claim of entrance into and exit from the water, is itself based on the assumption that into and out of are the only possible translations of eis and ek, which I shall endeavor to prove equally devoid of truth. Surely an argument based on an assumption which has in turn a prior assumption for its foundation, must be a little deficient in logical conclusiveness.

I now propose to essay the "hopeless" (?) task of showing that there is not a shadow of evidence that the par-ties to this transaction were in the water at all.
