But the present must be constantly changed and kept conscious of the value and uses of the past as a corrective and enlightner of its own thoughts and ideals. # THE VANDERBILT CASE.

The Tennessee Conference was one of the original patronizing conferences of Vanderbilt University. The following resolutions passed at the recent session of the conference, therefore, will be read with great interest:

Following is the resolution in full: "Whereas, through the report of W. B. Taylor, special commissioner appointed by the Tennessee Conference to act with the educational commission of the Methodist Episco pal Church, South, in the matter of the recor veyance of Vanderbilt University to the origi nal patronizing conferences, we have been offi-cially informed that said commission at a meet ing in Memphis, Tennessee, Feb. 19, 1915, after fully reviewing the case and weighing the opinions of a number of eminent lawyers, de cided that under the decision of the Supremo power to convey or transfer anything whatever to said original patronizing conferences' and that it was 'unwilling to stultify itself by the execution of a useless form of transfer."

"Therefore, resolved:

"1. That we acquiesce in the decision em hodied in the report of the educational commission as a final settlement of the relation between Vanderbilt University and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South,

"2. That, believing with all our hearts in the educational mission of the Church, we hail a providential the auspicious opening of Emory University, at Atlanta, and of Southern Metho dist University, at Dallas, that we expres profound appreciation of the munificent gift of Mr. Asa G. Candler, by which the establishand that we pledge to it our prayers, our faith

"3. That in view of the peculiar relation which the Tennessee Conference has sustained to Vanderbilt University, we deem it fitting at this time that we should make the following statement of our views as to the equity is the case between Vanderbilt University and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and in regard to our present attitude toward said

### Attitude Toward University.

"(a). While, as law-abiding citizens, accept the decision of the Supreme Court of

"(a). While, as law-abiding citizens, we accept the decision of the Supreme Court of Tennessee in regard to the relation between Vanderbilt University and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, we desire, without any intention of reflecting upon the court, to declare our unshaken conviction that our tailers who laid the foundation of Vanderbilt University meant to establish a school owned and controlled by the Church, and that in equity said thicersty is today as much the property of the Church as is the building in which we assembled.

"(b). We believe that in taking a course that resulted in the wresting of Vanderbilt University from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the trustees of said University seriously erred in the interpretation of their duty, and thereby wrought grievous injury and injustice to said Church. We believe that they were the agents and representatives of the Church, and that it was their duty in view of the Instorical facts to which we have referred, if they discovered any defect in the charter of the University, to set about correcting it instead of taking advantage of it to entirely chiminate the Church from participating in the direction and control of the University.

Five hundred and sixty-two individual students have now registered Southern Methodist University.

### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

It means that after four years of labor and sacrifice, of tears and sayers, S. M. U. is now ready to take a place in the front rank of power-lagencies for the upbuilding of Church and State.
